Tojo Asserts Japan Fought For Protection

Former Premier Says He will Base His Defense Largely On Thesis At Trial

TOKYO, May 1 (AP)—Japan's war-time premier, Hideki Tojo, today told the Associated Press that he believed his country fought a war of self protection. He indicated that he would base his defense at his war crimes trial largely on the thesis that the war was righteous.

In the interview, Tojo admitted frankly that he had signed against surrendering, but he said he made no effort to block Emperor Hirohito's surrender rescript.

Tojo repeated much of Japan's favorite war-time propaganda theme about an Asiatic co-prosperity sphere. He declared that if, in 1941, Japan could have taken any other course than war as an independent country, he as premier would have taken it.

Tojo said he had not wanted to invade any other oriental country since he viewed the war as one to liberate the Orient. But to carry out the war, it was necessary to exploit the natural resources in occupied areas and to impose severe restrictions on the populace.

NUERNBERG, May 1 (AP)—The presence of foreign observers at Hitler's party rallies proved a bone of contention today at the German war crimes trial. The Nazi financial genius, Hjalmar Schacht, has attempted to tell the International Tribunal that the attitude of foreign ambassadors was a factor in Germany's acceptance of the Hitler regime.

VOYAGE (From The Washington Post)

Nothing of departure is as final as the seabird's cry, Mowing in cold chorus to the cold note of ship's bell; Nothing of winter evening sky is chill as are their graywhite wings. Weaving and waving the ultimate forlorn farewell. For it is not you to whom they say goodbye, goodbye, Not yet the voyaging ship for they follow in its wake. Preoccupied their gaze with terrible indifference of questing gods. Headless of what course they follow or what forsake. No; their cry is not to seaward ship nor to the moving land. For there is the music of farewell to a moment set in time. A place, a point of journeying to which there shall be no return. More than lost hour would sound again on ship's sad chime. Late winter afternoon; the harbor slips away in graying mist. Salt damp on rail, a rustling wash of foam along the keel. Foghorn and clank of channel buoy mark end of land. Former Governor Holland is confident of nomination by the Democratic party for the U. S. Senate. "I will carry 57 of the State's 67 counties in the first primary next Tuesday," he predicts. That is a big order with three opponents in a race in which there are many uncertainties. But Governor Holland is an old campaigner, knows his politics and has covered the state in the present race. He probably knows whereof he speaks.

Not all of those who denounce the CIO are hostile to labor. The charge that a "group of communists shapes the policies of the CIO" and "the whole organization is foreign controlled" comes from no less an authority than William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor. When some spokesman for Republicans or businessmen points his finger at the communists in the CIO, the cry of course is "Fascist!" but when Mr. Green indicates the same thing, there is nothing to do but accept it.

Ice Cream Marches On

Ice cream is being introduced to Yemen in southern Arabia. Yemenite diplomats, arranging for an exchange of ministers with the United States, had their first taste, and enjoyed it so much that some ice cream mix is being sent to their sultan.

Thus a long time debt is paid. Ice cream, popularly supposed to be invented by Dolly Madison at a White House party, really goes back to the Orient. Apparently it was not so much invented as evolved from drinks cooled by ice or snow, which are said to have been served to Alexander the Great. In the Crusades Saladin, the chivalrous Mohammedan ruler, sent the leader of the opposing army, King Richard the Lion-hearted of England, sherbets topped with snow while Richard lay sick with fever. How these refreshing drinks survived transportation through the Asia Minor heat is not stated.

Catherine de Medici, 16th century French queen, and Charles I of England, are said to have delighted their courtiers with this new dessert. It got into 18th century cookbooks long before Dolly Madison. In the 19th century its advance was spectacular. The first literary reference is said to be in "Vanity Fair," where Becky Sharp, Thackeray's gold-digging heroine, enjoyed it on her honeymoon.

Now it is a universal American delight. The ruler of Yemen should think kindly of the country that has introduced it to him.

Speed

Recent accidents emphasize again the terrible toll of life in American railroading. The Burlington disaster alone was reported as killing or injuring nearly 200 people. Speed and carelessness together make a combination as bad as war itself. And the heavy losses of the recent war should be in themselves incentive enough for more careful procedure in every phase of American life.

Much of the speed that proves so fatal on American railroads and highways is in no way necessary. Moreover, Americans were geared to certain types of speed when cars were new and railway equipment first class. The years of war have taken toll of both, and speeds safe five years ago are not safe now. But speed becomes a mania, an obsession, or a reckless game of chance, to a degree never indulged by any other nation. It is often a mere substitute for thought.

Changes In The Court

The speed of time's flight is shown by the fact that Chief Justice Stone's death leaves Justice Hugo L. Black of Alabama the senior member of the court. His service dates back to only 1937. The hullabaloo which his appointment called forth is still fresh in the minds of many, yet since then he has established himself as a hard-working and talented judge.

The cause of the rapid turnover on the bench was the advanced age of many of the incumbents. Chief Justice Hughes and Justices Sutherland, Van Devanter, McReynolds, Butler, Brandies and Roberts were all 70 or more when they retired, several close to 80. The gibe, "the nine old men" had some truth in it.

Now the justices are younger. The oldest is Felix Frankfurter, who was born in 1882. On this account changes in the bench may be expected to be less frequent in the next few years.

TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

You know if these oil folks keep heading in the area for the big gusher around with their drilling rigs, first thing you know they'll tap a gusher and smear black oil lase on his land is thrilled at the news and feels confident that the day will come when he will cash in on the black gold that he is certain lies hidden below his land. As was the case when the other producing wells were brought in, the success with the new well has caused a rush of curious to the spot. Fella from all over South Florida climbed in their cars and drove by for a look at the well. It has also spurred interest in other wells being drilled in the State all the way from Apalachicola to Florida Keys.

State Geologist Herman Gunter gives the following information as to the status of these wells as of April 9th: The Pure Oil Company well in Franklin County is now down 11,375 feet. The Ohio Oil Company's well in Hernando County, 11 miles northwest of Brooksville, is down 5,783 feet. The Republic Oil Company's well, southwest of Homestead, is down 10,754 feet and the Gulf Oil Company's well, 30 miles east of Key West, is down 5,580 feet.

In Osceola County, Humble's Ray Carroll Well No. 1, north of Deer Park, is down 1,814 feet. The first two Humble wells produced a total of 43,500 barrels of oil through 1945 and while most of the oil produced was used in the field and therefore was untaxed, the State Comptroller collected \$419.97 for such oil as was subject to the 5 per cent of the gross value tax placed on Florida produced oil by the last legislature. Oil, quantities of it, will eventually come from Florida wells to

Another good indication is that the oil from this new well is better quality than from the other wells, with a specific gravity of 24.9 compared with about 20 for the other two wells. The No. 1 well was brought in during October, 1943 and it is still producing about 20 barrels a day. The No. 4 well was brought in a few months later and it is producing from 130 to 140 barrels a day, so the total production today from the three producing wells all owned by the Humble Oil Company is over 500 barrels a day. The new well is not quite as deep as the other two producers. It is 19 feet shallower than the No. 4 hole and 148 feet less than No. 1. The new well showed a pressure of 360 pounds per square inch which was below the 425 pound pressure recorded during the test, which oil men say is good sign. Initial pressure on the No. 4 well quickly dropped while with the new well it is consistent. Interest is reaching a fever

### Cage Athlete Signs For More Than \$60,000

#### George Mikan Also Writes Way Into Legal Profession

CHICAGO, May 1, 1940.—When young George Mikan autographed a \$60,000 contract to play professional basketball for the Chicago American Gears of the National Basketball League, he also signed himself into a future in the legal profession.

All Mikan has to do to pocket the \$60,000 is play basketball for five years with the Gears.

But as soon as he gets his law degree from De Paul University—next summer—he'll go into the legal department of the American Gear Manufacturing Company. His unannounced salary that work will add to his income.

"I may want to do a little basketball coaching on the side just to keep in touch with the game when I go over the hill as a professional player," he said recently after winning the most valuable player award in the world professional championship tournament here. "The law profession will come first, though."

Big Mike, who never played high school basketball and was turned down by Notre Dame as "too awkward" to play, was the first rookie in the pro ranks ever to win the most valuable award in the world tournament. He set a new tournament scoring record of 100 points as the Gears finished third in the 14-team meet.

He turned pro after he finished an intercollegiate career at De Paul during which he won almost every honor available to a college player, including the rating of "all-time All-American" of the Helms Foundation, Los Angeles organization that rates college cage stars.

With it all, this sixfoot, ten-inch giant has remained completely modest, and probably has no peer among the "big boys" of the game as a team player. While setting one scoring record after another, he was asked "why don't you shoot more?" His answer: "I don't care if I ever score so long as we win. I'll pass to any player cutting toward the basket if I think he has a better chance to score than I'd have."

Mikan's professors at De Paul have complete faith in his future in the legal profession. He's almost an "A" student despite the time he lost from his classes and lectures because of basketball. He is "quick on the trigger" in classroom debates, an excellent speaker, and his industry is unusual.

During the recent world tournament, he was taking mid-term examinations.

"But he came down here in the afternoon to help me coach the freshmen," Ray Meyer, his De Paul coach said.

Mikan says he may play baseball again this summer. As a pitcher for an amateur team in Joliet, Ill., his home town, he had a strikeout average of almost 11 per game last year, but passed up tryout offers with major league teams.

"Don't worry, he'll do all right where he is without professional baseball," Meyer avers.

## Railroad Strike Is Seen As Probable As Parley Fails

### No Hope Is Held For Settlement Of Coal Strike This Week; Byrd Hits Royalties

CHICAGO, May 2, (AP)—Hopes that railroad operators and the Engineers and Trainmen's Brotherhoods would be able to settle their differences by mutual agreement received a setback today.

The two big operating brotherhoods, which have called a strike for May 18, walked out of a conference with the operators this morning.

The president of the trainmen, A. F. Whitney, said that the brotherhood delegates left the meeting after about 15 minutes because the operators offered nothing substantial. Whitney said that the brotherhood negotiations will discuss the situation further with the operators, but will not meet with the operators again unless they make a substantial offer.

The brotherhoods have issued the strike call after rejecting the recommendations of a presidential fact-finding board.

In Washington indications mounted that John L. Lewis has ruled out the possibility of an early settlement in the strike of his 400,000 soft coal miners. Observers pointed out that in calling his 250-man policy committee to Washington for a conference next Tuesday, Lewis showed that he did not expect a strike settlement by that time.

He may have summoned the committee, however, to hear a report on progress or to make up problems connected with the opening of contract parleys for 75,000 hard coal miners. In any event, Lewis apparently does not expect the soft coal strike to end within the next five days.

In Atlantic City, United States Senator Harry Byrd said the nation was headed for another catastrophe if the soft coal strike continues for two more weeks. The Virginia democrat told the 34th annual meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce that John L. Lewis was trying to collect an annual royalty of \$60,000,000.

Byrd said he did not believe that our business economy can operate by paying royalties to labor leaders such as United Mine Workers Chief Lewis and James Petrillo, head of the Musicians' Federation.

## Conservation Of Power In Effect Today

### Illinois Commerce Commission Takes Action Because Of Critical Coal Supply

CHICAGO, May 2, (AP)—A drastic power conservation order is in effect in Chicago and about 1500 other Illinois cities. The Illinois Commerce Commission ordered the reduction of electric current to protect public health and safety during the critical shortage of soft coal.

The commission directive apparently means that about two-thirds of Illinois will have no movies after 6:00 P. M. and no shows in legitimate theaters or sporting events at night.

A weekly total of 24 hours electric power will be permitted for manufacturers and industrial users operating Monday through Friday. Commercial users may operate from 2:00 to 6:00 P. M. Monday through Saturday.

The order bans the lighting of show windows and signs, car heating and interior lighting in excess of minimum requirements.

Establishments essential to public health and safety and protection of property and transportation facilities will not be affected. Domestic users are asked not to use any more electricity than necessary.

The electric companies are empowered to cut off service from firms or persons who won't cooperate.

The commission chairman, C. D. Biggs, estimates the week's saving in coal will total 17,000 tons from commercial and industrial users alone.

## Syrian Cabinet Of Premier Jabris Reveals Platform

DAMASCUS, Syria, May 2 (AP)—The new Syrian cabinet under Premier Badshah Jabris has announced a platform which includes condemnation of the British-American Palestine inquiry report. The statement of policy by the new government promises unlimited Syrian support of Palestine in fighting Zionism.

The cabinet also proposes compulsory military service for Syria and the consolidation of the state police, gendarmerie, and desert corps under the Ministry of Defense.

The new government's program calls for close relations with all Arab states, strong support for the Arab League and help to Arab states to achieve their independence.

The cabinet also pledged cooperation with the United Nations and friendly relations with the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union.

## Whirlwind Campaign At Junior High Is Climaxed With Today's Election

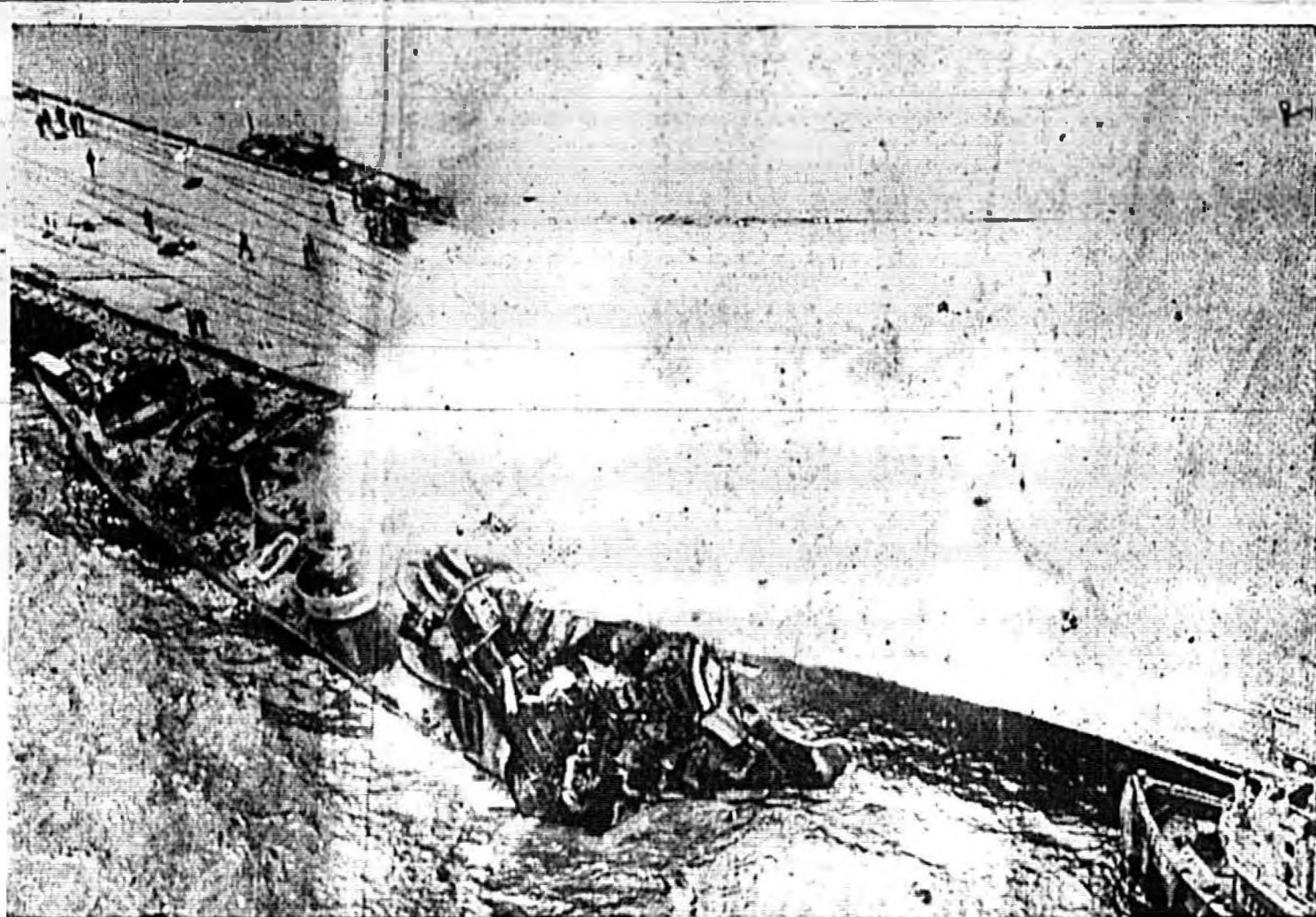

## Fire Destroys Seminole Feed Company Building

### Blaze Discovered At 2:30 A. M. By Passing Taxi Driver

Fire of undetermined origin which was first noticed by a passing taxi driver on First Street at 2:30 o'clock this morning, destroyed the building and contents of the Seminole Feed Company on North Elm Avenue and only prompt action by firemen prevented its spread to a much larger property, hay, poultry feed and fertilizer was unburned.

The fire was well underway when the firemen arrived, according to Fire Chief Mack Cleveland, and six lines of hose, including two 2 1/2 inch lines from pumps and two 1 1/2 inch lines were directed at the blaze. The iron roof of the building collapsed and the metal covered sides buckled from the intense heat. A 1939 Dodge one and half ton truck, parked in a garage in the rear of the building, was completely destroyed, including six tires.

Two of them brand new. One fire crew remained until 6:00 A. M., the other until 10:00 o'clock.

J. N. McCaskill, manager of the plant, termed it and its contents a complete loss, and while much grain, hay, poultry feed and fertilizer was unburned, the building, which was insured with contents, fronted 50 feet on Elm Avenue, next to the Crown Paper Company, and was 105 feet in depth. Some part of the east end of the building was saved, and office records were not lost.

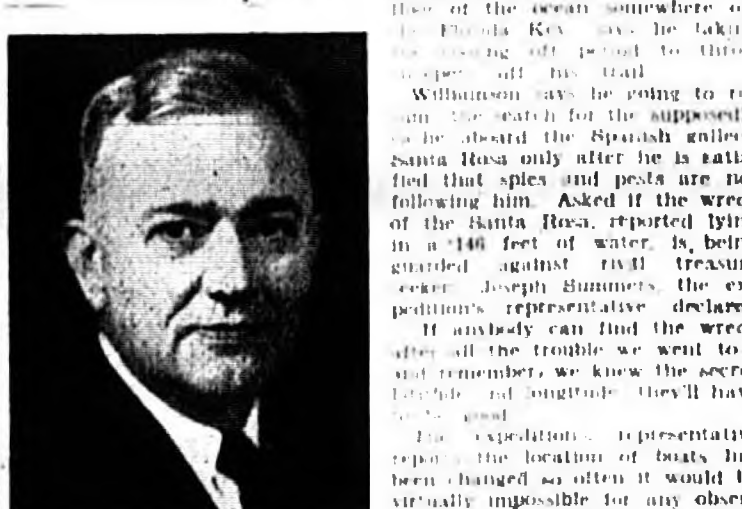
Only recently a carload of hay and a carload of fertilizer were received, said Mr. McCaskill. There was a lot of dried citrus pulp for cattle feeding on hand, but there was less than a carload of poultry feed stored. The plant had been closed for the half holiday on Wednesday noon.

Chief Cleveland pointed out this morning that the fire could have been caused by spontaneous combustion in grass or damp hay or from fertilizer, with its nitrate of soda content. No estimate has yet been made of the loss. Sills on ventilator openings on the Chase Building were burned and the flames could easily have spread to the flooring had they not been checked.

## Virtual Ultimatum Delivered Threatening Uprising If Jews Are Admitted

JERUSALEM, May 2 (AP)—An Arab official announced that the powerful Arab high committee today delivered to Britain a letter which he says is the next thing to an ultimatum. The spokesman asserts that the note rejects the Anglo-American recommendations on Palestine.

He declares that the Arabs now will prepare all means for defense in order to resist what he calls the national struggle. The spokesman is Ahmed Shukairy, director of the Arab office in Jerusalem. In effect, he said, the letter to Britain threatens an Arab uprising similar to those of 1936 to 1939.

Earlier today Arab leaders announced plans for a mass resistance to the Anglo-British recommendation that 100,000 Jews be allowed to enter Palestine. A committee has been set up to consider a possible Arab disobedience strike.

The Arab committee also named an emergency committee to study plans for a possible Arab uprising similar to those of 1936 to 1939.

In New York, the Arab office today said that the United States should demand that the United States should demand that there might be something definite on this in the next 48 hours. He said he did not know who would take the initiative in bringing the Palestine dispute before the council. But he indicated it might come either from one of the Arab states in the United Nations or from one member of the Security Council, as yet at the request of 25 Arab groups.

He said the Arab office would be in touch with the United States and the United Kingdom to bring about peace in the Middle East. There can be no doubt of that.

FRANKFURT, Germany, May 2 (AP)—Rations of American occupation troops in Europe will be reduced by 300 calories a day beginning May 5. Official estimates place the present ration of the American soldiers at 3,600 calories a day.

The reduction is said to mean a daily cut in calories equivalent to two milk chocolate bars.

According to the order from United States Army headquarters the reduction will be brought about by less sugar, less bread, less butter, less meat, less fat, less coffee, less tea, less fruit, less jam, less jam, less jam.
