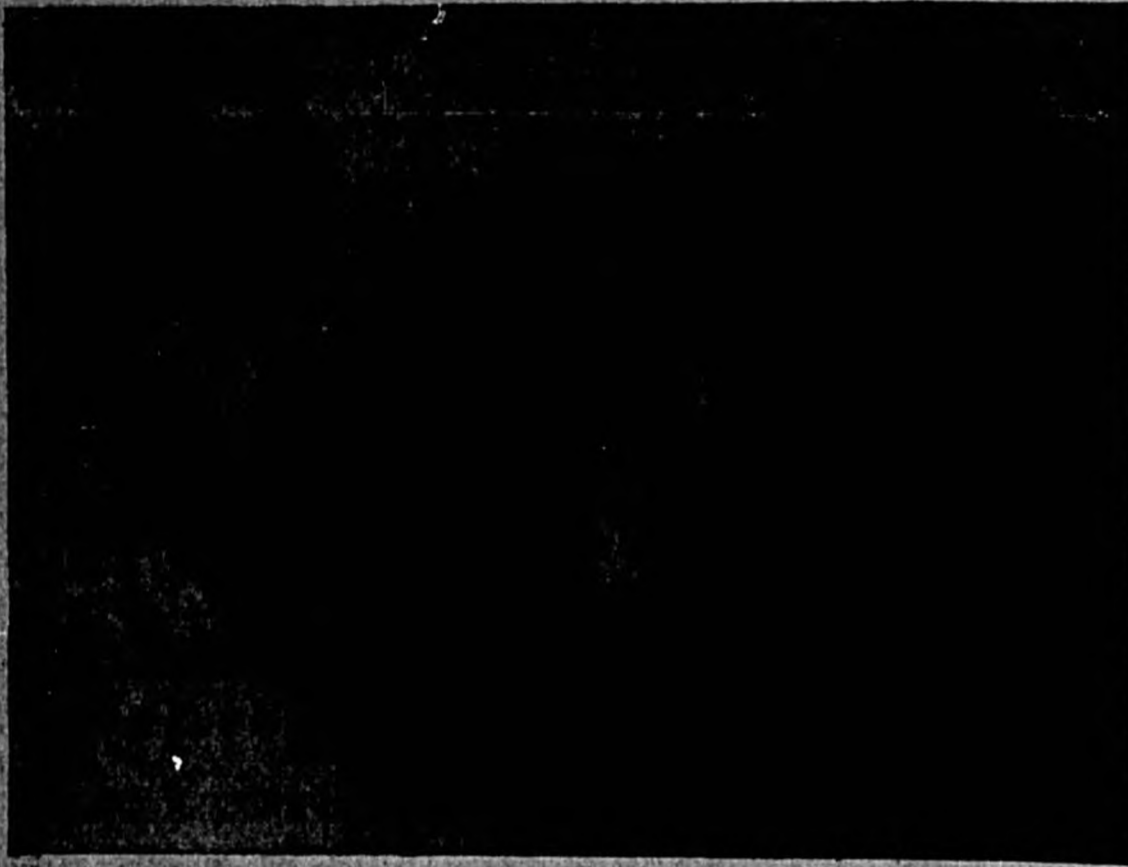


Energetic Volunteers Provide Altamonte Library Support

County Hopes To Get Light Near Forest City

The county hopes to get a traffic light at the intersection of SR 436 between SR 434 and SR 431 near Forest City.

The County Commission authorized Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. to draw up a resolution to the State Road Department pointing out the need for such a light at that District 3 Commissioner James F. Avery cited the "terrible" road hazard in the area.

Avery said, "the intersection is so bad, I'm afraid to drive by there for fear of seeing an accident."

The board hopes to pay for the project out of secondary funds.

Lake Mary Road Extension Planned To Start Soon

County Engineer Carlton Elias will start work next week on right-of-way acquisition for an extension of Lake Mary Road which will cross Interstate 4 and according to Elias will serve that area of the county as an important link in future development.

The County Commission Tuesday authorized Elias to start planning for the road.

The county official emphasized that clearing must be in process before the state can construct an overpass at the limited access highway.

The extension, according to Elias, will eventually tie in with the Longwood-Markham Rd.

He explained today that County Commission Chairman J. C. Hutchison raised the question of an overpass at a public hearing on the interstate last year in Winter Park.

Road officials assured Hutchison that if the county would con-

sider the Lake Mary Rd. extension (about a mile and a half) they would put an overpass to take care of the traffic.

This is one of the recommended state projects, studied a few years ago, Elias said.

Longwood Woman To Build Stores

Mrs. Bobbie Joe Hunt, Longwood businesswoman, last week told the City Council that she is planning to build three more stores on her E. Lake property.

Plans for the building program were revealed when Mrs. Hunt asked the council to remove four large oak trees bordering the property, saying that their roots crack the sidewalk and create a safety hazard.

Discussing what the job would entail, councilmen estimated that removal of the trees would run somewhere near \$185 per tree excluding costs of replacing a sidewalk and making repairs to the street. School Board Faced With Increase In Millage

1 Mill Hike In Support Budget Expected

The County School Board is faced with the bleak prospect of raising the support and maintenance budget millage for the 1961-62 fiscal year by one mill.

The only alternative to this, school officials said Thursday afternoon as they spent close to five hours discussing the forthcoming budget, is to slash the school's bond construction program which would mean there would not be enough funds available to complete a new Bear Lake Elementary School or the new Junior High School in Casselberry.

Double Growth Predicted For Dynatronics

Dynatronics, Inc. should double its gross business during the coming year, its top officials predicted Thursday.

Dynatronics President Parker Painter Jr. and Vice President George F. Anderson told stockholders at Orlando that "presently negotiated contracts already assure your company of more than \$3 million in business" and "announced that we anticipate reaching the \$4 million mark before the end of the fiscal year."

This was the first annual stockholders meeting for Dynatronics, which specializes in research, design and manufacture of electronic systems to support the nation's space and missile efforts.

Total business for the fiscal year was reported at \$2,324,577. Earnings showed an increase from \$400,480 to \$1,112,343.

Bryant Hurls Charge At Cramer

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant fired a charge of "misinformation" today at U. S. Rep. William C. Cramer's claim that Bryant administration road plans will lose federal funds for the state and ruin a proposed East Coast freeway.

Cramer said in Washington Thursday that if Bryant goes ahead with plans for extending the toll road northward, the state will lose more than \$60 million in federal funds, as well as a planned freeway between Daytona Beach and Fort Pierce.

Bryant's plan is to extend the Miami-to-Fort Pierce turnpike northward to Wildwood in Central Florida — providing the Federal Bureau of Roads agrees to move Interstate Route 75 slightly eastward to hook up with it.

This would provide a link with the Florida West Coast, which the Interstate route will serve. The bureau has made no decision on the request to move Route 75 eastward.

House Okay

The Senate was expected to give final congressional approval to a bill designed to crack down on water pollution and increase federal grants to communities for building sewage disposal and treatment plants.

The House passed the measure Thursday. It gives the federal government new powers to police lakes and streams and punish polluters.

'Weary' Eickmann Admits Orders

JERUSALEM (UPI) — Adolf Eickmann admitted wearily today that he passed on the order for Jews to be sent to extermination camps.

"But I had to," he asserted. Bobbing and weaving under the sixth day of cross-examination, Eickmann denied repeatedly he was the master killer of European Jews. But he conceded he passed on the orders from his "superiors" to send Jews to death camps.

Man Space Shot May Be Delayed

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — Bad weather in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean is threatening U. S. plans to rocket another man into space next Tuesday.

Scientists running the nation's \$400 million "Project Mercury" astronaut program were keeping a close watch today on an area of thundershowers about 300 miles east of the Lesser Antilles.

NEW YORK (UPI) — The era of the Salk vaccine may be nearing an end, but the pioneering scientist who gave the anti-polio drug to a grateful world is determined to prevent its early extinction.

Dr. Jonas E. Salk, vigorously defending the effectiveness of his killed-virus vaccine, Thursday criticized the American Medical Association for advocating a "change-over" to a live-virus vaccine that has not yet been licensed for mass production.

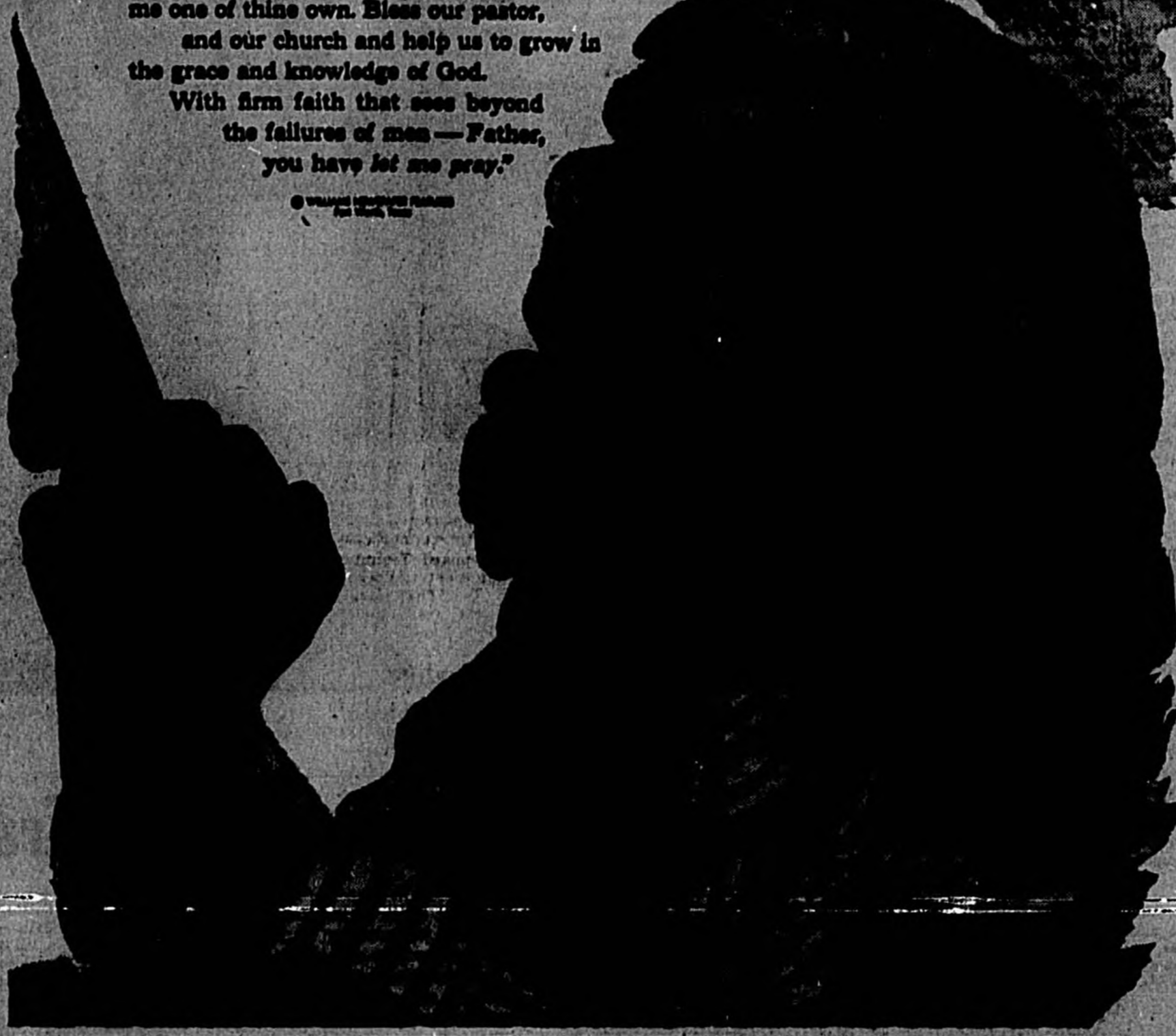

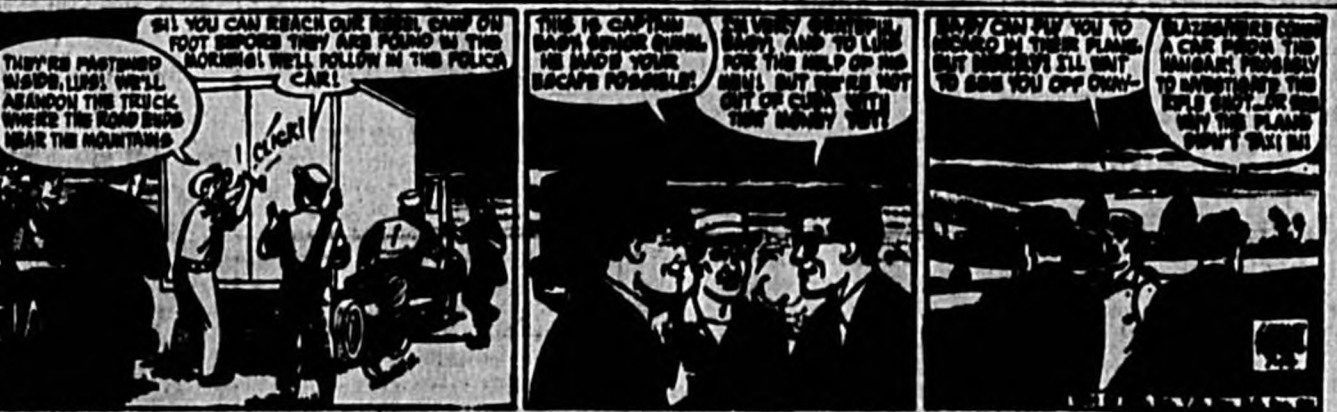

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Circusland To Abandon Sanford Property Site

More Developed Area Needed--Officials Say

Circusland will close offices in Sanford Aug. 1 and will abandon its 250-acre site on Hwy. 17-92 in favor of a more developed area. Several reasons were listed for the move from the Sanford site, but Circusland officials stressed that the primary one was that pressure from potential leasees of space at the attraction dictated the change.

Maurice Marshall, president of Entertainment Enterprises, said: "We have not been able to hold Sanford's fine location above certain economic advantages. In short, we cannot sell Sanford to enough national firms to satisfy Circusland's lease requirements. Enough are sold, however, contingent upon a relocation.

"There are three ways in which to create a major attraction for any area," Marshall said. "Solicit and sell stock, have the necessary millions in your pocket, or put the project together with conventional loans and available private capital. We have traveled the latter route from the beginning and it is an exacting one.

"We leave Sanford with regret, but must consider the move definite progress toward the early construction of Circusland."

Marshall declined to name the ultimate location of the attraction, but said there would be an announcement within 30 days.

Circusland, which has had the usual troubles encountered by big attractions in organization and financing, had gained considerable notice for the Sanford area within the past year.

The current issue of Amusement Business magazine praised the soundness of its planning, saying "it may be the canniest piece of theme construction to come down the pike in several years."

Many firms interested in concessions and institutional exhibit space on its grounds continued to balk at the location, however, Marshall said, resulting in dictation of a move to another location or joining them altogether.

"Attempting to hang onto the Hwy. 17-92 site cost Circusland a total of \$25,500 in option money before the company gave up, Marshall pointed out.

He also revealed that a former employe of Entertainment Enterprises reportedly had been soliciting financing without authorization and said any such inquiries should be checked.

Everything Looks 'A-OK' For Space Trip Tuesday

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—Everything is "A-OK" for America's second man-in-space venture Tuesday morning.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration confirmed that 35-year-old Air Force Capt. Virgil I. Grissom will be the pilot aboard Liberty Bell 7, the Mercury man-in-space capsule.

Marine Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr. who will be 40 years old Tuesday, will be backup man for Grissom as he was for Navy Cmdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr. who made America's first space hop May 5 aboard the capsule Freedom 7.

Lt. Col. John A. Powers of NASA told reporters at a news conference that everything, including the weather, appears to be all set for Grissom's trip, scheduled to start around 7 a. m. EST Tuesday.

"All elements," he said, "are A-OK for the MR4 mission." MR4 stands for Mercury-Redstone No. 4. Shepard's trip was MR3.

Powers, public information officer for the Mercury program, said Grissom was picked for this flight because "he was the man most ready."

Glenn, presumably will get a rocket hop later with one or more of the other five astronauts following suit before the year is over. Purpose of the hops is to provide training and to check out all aspects of the capsule and the recovery system.

The Redstone rocket now poised on pad No. 5 will hurl Grissom about 115 miles up and 300 miles out to sea on a path roughly paralleling Shepard's.

The "flight countdown" began at 7 a. m. today. Grissom, Glenn and their five fellow astronauts and the scientists in charge of the nation's \$400 million Project Mercury program returned to the job of getting the man and machine ready.

Late weather forecasts indicated little possibility of a delay from that quarter. The morning forecast said conditions were expected to be within the prescribed limits and added: "but the weather" is not expected to be any great concern in Tuesday's firing.

West 'Rebutts' Soviet's Demand Against Berlin

LONDON (UPI)—The United States, Britain and France sent notes to Moscow today firmly rebutting Russia's demands against isolated Berlin.

The Western notes, which were approved by the entire 15-nation NATO Council Saturday, were sent to embassies in Moscow for imminent delivery to the Kremlin.

At the same time diplomatic sources in London said the U.S., British and French foreign ministers may meet in Paris early next month to coordinate allied policy on Berlin.

Sources said a foreign ministers' conference could be a prelude to a Western summit conference of President Kennedy, Premier Harold Macmillan and President Charles de Gaulle, if it was necessary to serve a more serious warning on the Soviets. But they said no move inward such a top level gathering had yet been made.

Earlier in the day, deputies and state agents arrested three men at DeLeon Bridge for gambling. One of the men, Coy Griffin, was charged with operating a gambling place. The others arrested were Alex Hodges and B. W. Collins. Collins and Hodges were charged with gambling and held under \$25 bond each while Griffin was held under \$100 bond.

County To Set Budget Hearings

The County Commission Tuesday is expected to set up a series of budget conferences with county officials to start work on the 1961-62 budget.

Most of the departments already have submitted their budget requests for the coming year with about 75 percent of them asking for personnel increases and more money for operating services. The commission also is expected to establish a directive taking all blind-bid men off the county welfare rolls. The board authorized District 3 Commissioner James P. Avery to write up the directive and Avery said this morning that it will be submitted for adoption Tuesday.

School Board Sets Budget Meeting

The County School Board is expected to meet in special session Wednesday and give its tentative approval to the 1961-62 budget raising the support and maintenance millage by one mill.

The tentative budget figure has been set at somewhere around \$3,110,000—some \$100 shy of last year's budget figure.

The school board met in special session last Thursday and was told by Supt. of Schools R. T. Milnes and administrative Assistant Walter Teague that the only alternative to raising the millage was to slash the building fund program.

Both officials stressed that some 1,200 additional youngsters would be in the county schools this fall.

The present support and maintenance millage is five-with-one and-a-half set for debt service. On Wednesday, the commission either will approve the budget and advertising for a public hearing July 27 or ask officials to rework the budget.

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
