



In times, such as these, it is difficult to draw attending to the suffering of animal. I am thankful, therefore, to learn that the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs is sponsoring a movement for an anti-steel-trap bill in the coming legis-

The steel-trap is without a doubt the most di instrument of torture left in a so-called civilized age. It does not kill its victim, but catching and crushing its leg, holds it there for days in agony from pain, swelling, struggle, fever and thirst, until the trapper returns to club it to death, or until it escapes (as at least one-third do) by gnawing off its own foot. Since the present craze for furs came in, more than 100,000,000 animals suffer in this way every year in North America.

Florida supplies large numbers of the smaller ones, coons being the chief catch. Coons are one of the most intelligent and highly sensitive of mammals. What woman would want a raccoon coat or trimming if she had seen the creature gnawing off its foot after days of anguish? What woman would buy a scarf if she had come upon the fox awinging from a spring-pole-trap which, fastened to a bent sapling, had sprung upward and kept the animal suspended there by the broken-leg for a week?

Women do not know these facts; yet they go on all

about us, in every woods and swamp and hammock. And quite unnecessarily. For there are now on the market a dozen kinds of humane traps, which either catch the animal by the head instead of the leg, killing instantly, or take it alive and unhurt. All that is asked of the trapper is that he use these instead of the old, torturing kind. He will still take his pelts; women will still have their furs; but the business will be robbed of its cruelty.
