**GOOD TENNIS GAME**

But Rollins Students Were Too Much Sanford Men  
Winter Park, Fla., Oct. 30.—Monday afternoon, the first tennis match of the season was played on the home court against L. M. Fox and R. C. Wildeman, of Sanford. A. D. Prentiss and E. J. Holmes represented Rollins. Both appeared for the first time in a match tournament at Rollins, and the tennis supporters were eager to see what sort of successors had been provided for the championship team of last year. The showing made was excellent, considering the lack of practise at such an early point of the season, and it seems assured that tennis at Rollins will again be in competent hands.  
Play began at 2:15 between Fox, of Sanford, and Prentiss, of Rollins. The match brought out the best tennis of the afternoon from the spectator's point of view. Both were evenly matched, and fought on point by point in a dead tie for sixteen close games, when Prentiss succeeded in winning two in a row, and the set at 10-8. The second set of the match was a replica of the first, with Prentiss finally coming home the victor 7-5.  
Holmes, of Rollins, then faced Wildeman, of Sanford, and by brilliant work defeated him two straight sets 6-1, 6-7. This assured Rollins the match, but the outcome of the doubles was awaited with almost as great interest as though the victory depended on the result. The Sanford team started out with a rush, and by superior team work got through the Rollins' defense and won the first set 6-2, but the younger men rallied, showing superior staying powers, and as they became accustomed to playing together, took the second set, 6-0. The third and last set of the tournament was likewise developing into an easy victory for Rollins and stood at 5-1 when darkness intervened and put an end to the playing. The match thus ended with a score of 2-1-2 to 1-2 in favor of Rollins.  
The tennis men of the college plan for an extensive campaign through the state, and will try to secure matches with all the other colleges of the state. The showing of the team in this preliminary tournament has created interest and confidence. A. D. Prentiss, who has been elected captain of the team, is the brother of A. A. Prentiss, who last year led the Rollins team to victory in every match. His work was the mainstay of the Rollins game, but Holmes, his partner, also played a brilliant game, especially at the net. They will form a combination hard to beat.

**One Inch of Rain**

On every daily weather bulletin or chart the amount of rainfall at various places during the preceding 24 hours is printed in inches and hundredths of inches. In a general way the public understands that a rainfall of 2 inc in one day is heavy, and that one tenth of an inch is light, but no attempt is made to associate the linear measurement of the water with its equivalents in weight of bulk. This is necessary for a proper understanding of the actual quantitative value of the rain and its few figures following may prove of assistance in making calculations.  
An acre of ground contains 43 560 square feet. Consequently, a rainfall of 1 inch over 1 acre of ground would mean a total of 43 560x144 or 6 272 640 cubic inches of water. This is equivalent to 3 630 cubic feet. As a cubic foot of pure water weighs about 62.4 pounds the exact amount varying slightly with the density it follows that the weight of a uniform coating of 1 inch of rain over 1 acre of surface would be 3 630x62.4—226 512 pounds or 113X short tons.  
The weight of 1 United States gallon of pure water is 8.345 pounds. Consequently a rainfall of 1 inch over 1 acre of ground would mean 226 512 divided by 8.345 would equal 27 143 gallons of water on the acre. This is equivalent to 603 barrels of 45 gallons each, and would be sufficient to fill a tank or pool about 200 feet square and 9 feet deep. Should a farmer desire to build a cistern to be supplied by rainwater from a roof, he can, if he knows the annual rainfall of his locality, so construct his cistern as to make the best possible use of the rainfall. For instance, a rainfall of 1 inch on a roof of 3,000 square feet capacity would mean a total volume of 432 000 cubic inches, or 250 cubic feet, available for the cistern does from splashing, etc., not considered. This is equal to 1,870 United States gallons, or about 41.5 barrels of 45 gallons each, enough to fill a cistern 8 feet in diameter to a depth of 4.97 feet.—Florida Grower.
