CONSOLIDATE R.F.D. ROUTES INTO ONE

SIXTY FOUR MILES IS TO BE COVERED DAILY BY ONLY ONE CARRIER

There are grave doubts in the minds of many of the wise ones here as to whether the postal department know how many miles a man in a car can cover over the R. F. D. routes in this district.

The government experts who evidently mapped out the routes in the expansion of the office at Washington think that one man can cover the 64 miles necessary for the three rural routes and can cover it in eight hours, the necessary schedule.

At the present time there are three carriers on No. 4. The government reports an examination in this city for the carriers who wished to take the job of taking all three routes one day at the month's end for \$1800 per year, the carrier to furnish his own car and equipment.

The board accepted the resignation of W. N. Royall general manager of the road and promoted P. R. Albright, assistant general manager to succeed him. Royall retired because of ill health.

J. N. Brand, now general superintendent of the third division at Jacksonville will become assistant general manager. J. C. Murchison, superintendent at Charleston, S. C., will succeed Brand and J. P. Walker will succeed Murchison. W. H. Hansell has been made superintendent at Sanford.

THE MESSAGE OF PRESIDENT WILSON TO CONGRESS

WILL BE PREPARED THIS WEEK AND SENT TO THAT BODY

Washington, Nov. 18. President Wilson plans to work all this week on his message to congress and expects to have it finished before Thanksgiving day. He discussed some features of it today with the cabinet.

National defense will be the principal subject treated in the message, which is also expected to take up recommendations for raising the additional revenues.

Conservation measures, especially failed of passage at the last congress, and the Philippine bill will be endorsed again.

Orlando, Fla., Nov. 18. James Grantham, the yegg man who was held for entering a hardware store in this city, fled from his leg shackles at St. Luke's hospital during the night and fled from the place only in his right shirt.

PINELLAS COUNTY VOTES BONDS FOR BRICK ROADS

St. Petersburg, Fla., Nov. 18. By a majority of seventy-three Pinellas county yesterday voted in favor of the \$715,000 issue of good roads bonds. The majority was 103 less than that which voted in the previous election, which was thrown out by order of the court.

St. Pete Voted for Bonds

St. Petersburg gave in her seven precincts a majority of forty votes in favor of bonds. In the last election bond-issuement in the St. Petersburg precincts by a majority of seventy-five.

Both Clearwater precincts rolled up bond majorities, though not as large as in the previous election.
