



Some UF Answers

It is with the purpose of informing those who are interested and with the hope of making those interested who today are not, that we make these comments:

1. The UF was started in order that there would not be a parade of solicitors from many agencies asking for public support; that those agencies which are approved—such as the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, the Boy and Girl Scouts-could combine in one annual drive; that agencies who do not qualify would be so known. 2. UF funds are assigned to each of the 11 approved agencies by a budget committee composed of laymen, who make realistic allotments which are, unhappily, far from adequate to give the support the agencies need.

3. Campaign costs are kept at a minimum as the overhead is kept down and the principle of "united giving" dominates. Even the report luncheons are not supported by the UF. Individuals and company managements pick up the

4. The local approved agencies spend almost their entire allotments in the local area. Only those which have national obligations where the national organization itself supplies emergency help, get a very small slice of the dollars raised

5. Perhaps the most hard-headed answer to a query raised when the hard-working volunteer presents the UF request for contributions is this: Is it not better to make this one UF contribution than have to consider the requests from 11 agencies? How much would your port be, per agency, if so divided?

We believe that the United Fund way is the only sound approach to this civilian support of the civilian agencies which do such good for all of our people in all of our county!

Medical News

Men and women susceptible to recurrent lower abdominal pain may be suffering the consequences of becoming an erect hiped.

This is the conclusion of Dr. William Hunter of the Permanente Medical Group of the Kaiser Foundation Hospital. He bases his contention on clinical observation of more than 100 patients with this condition as well as on anthropological evidence. The physician, working with an anthropologist, has been tracing the evolution of the human locomotor system, particularly the muscles of the buttocks. At the American Medical Association meeting here Dr. Hunter described 36 patients, 24 women and 12 men, who

has suffered from pain in the lower abdomen for at least a year. Ten patients had had a variety of operations - ranging from an appendectomy to removal of the ovaries - in a vain effort to relieve their pain. After performing simple daily exercises for several
