Additional Shares To Ease Strain

NEW YORK (AP)—The fact that 10,200,000 shares of Ford Motor Co. stock will be sold next month instead of the seven million originally planned will ease the strain of trying to meet demand, but there still won't be enough to go around, Wall Street observers predicted Thursday.

They reported that the filing of the registration statement with the Securities & Exchange Commission yesterday stirred up new interest among investors. As a result, many more people tried to place orders for shares.

Jan. 18 has been set as the tentative date for offering the shares. If you have ordered shares, your broker will try to fill your order—provided he has enough to do so. If he finds he can't take care of all business, he will allot his quota.

When the 10,200,000 shares have been sold, the stock will start trading in the over-the-counter market. Since a quick over-subscription is

expected, such trading could begin the same day the shares are sold. Once trading starts, the shares will find their own price level. If there is a big unsatisfied demand for them, the price could go up. On the other hand, if the price doesn't rise much, speculators looking for a quick profit may decide to get out.

The over-the-counter market is maintained by brokers buying and selling for their own account or as brokers for others. Securities traded over the counter usually are those not listed on any exchange.

It's expected that around March 1, the shares will be admitted to trading on the New York Stock Exchange. Normally, a stock opens on the "big board" at around the same price level it was selling for in the over-the-counter market.

Actually, brokers can't take orders yet. All they can do is note that an individual wants to buy

of at least \$2.60 and some observers went further to predict payment of an extra dividend in the final quarter of next year to bring payments to \$3 a share.

A \$3 annual dividend on a stock selling for \$70 a share would give a yield of more than four per cent, about average in the present market.

The registration statement disclosed that Ford sales in the first nine months of his year totaled a record \$4,012,000,000 and profits \$312,200,000. Earnings in the period came to \$3.83 a share—more than for any full year in the company's history. Dividends paid in all of 1955 amounted to \$3.37 a share.

Ford sales have more than doubled in the postwar period, largely as a result of an expansion program totaling more than 14 billion dollars. Over the next two years, the company plans to spend another 900 million.

The registration statement also showed that a new group of millionaires has been created by the Ford company in a little less than three years.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Primary and general election contests in 16 states appear likely to furnish most of the political fireworks in next year's battle for control of the Senate.

Thirty-two Senate seats in as many states are at stake in the 1956 balloting, 17 now held by Republicans and 15 by Democrats. Democrats now hold a thin edge in the Senate 49-47.

Democrats have an advantage in 1956 because seven of their seats are to be filled in the South where the Republicans either will offer only token opposition or none at all.

As the situation now stands, 10 Republicans and 5 Democrats appear likely to face the stiffest kind of opposition either in primaries or in the general election. One Demo-

"Slim" Galloway, who also answered the alarm and was on hand until the barn was completely destroyed, said that there is a possibility that someone was taking gas from a tractor when the fire started.

More than 40 head of cattle and some calves were in pens adjacent to the barn but were set free and escaped injury from the fire.

Constable Galloway said that a tractor, ditching tool, grader, saddles, several tons of hay and grain feed were all consumed and damaged by fire.

The equipment was new, the Constable said, and in perfect condition. "There is an indication as to whom might have started the conflagration," Galloway said this morning.

Jelliner Spans Sea In 6 Hrs., 8 Mins.

LONDON (AP)—Britain's glittering Comet III jetliner streaked non-stop across the Atlantic from Montreal to London today in a shattering 6 hours, 8 minutes.

The 74-ton, four-jet aircraft covered the 3,370 miles at an average speed of 544 miles an hour, through overcast skies, touching tumultuously welcome.

Strong tail winds boosted the speed to more than 640 miles an hour at times.

The trip ended a 35,000-mile round-the-world proving flight by Capt. John Cunningham and his crew of 10 which began in Halifax, England, Dec. 2 and took the Comet to Cairo, Bombay, Singapore, Darwin, Sydney, Melbourne, Perth, Auckland, Fiji, Honolulu, Vancouver, Toronto and Montreal.

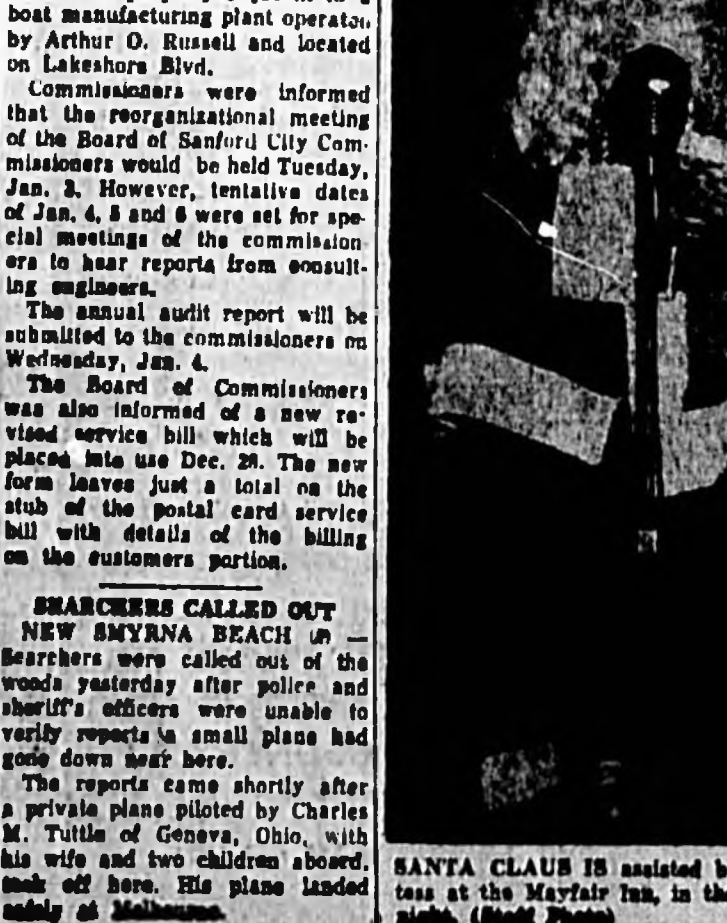
Palooka Originator Ham Fisher Found Dead In Studio

NEW YORK (AP)—Ham Fisher, creator of the popular comic strip here, was found dead last night in a friend's studio.

Neatly were two notes indicating suicide, police reported. Fisher, 51, whose full name was Hammond Edward Fisher, wrote in the notes of falling asleep and a diabetic condition. He said that he had swallowed some pills.

The body was discovered about 9 p. m. in the studio of Moe Luff, where Fisher had been working lately during his absence from town. The discovery was made by another friend, Morris Weiss of Englewood, N. J., whom Fisher's wife Marilyn had called after becoming alarmed over not hearing from her husband.

Police said Fisher's mother had received a call from him, her only child, early in the afternoon. He spoke at length with sentiment and feeling. The time of death was set at about four hours later around 5 p. m.

Prisoners Soaked, Talkative

Two of the prisoners who escaped from the Orange County Jail Christmas Day were captured in Sanford last night shortly before 7 o'clock.

Both of the prisoners, wet thoroughly from the day long rains, were talkative and seemingly well content to be back into custody again.

Robert C. Hall, 28-year-old diesel technician who gave his home address as 94 North Ohio St., Orlando, and Steve Quinn, 33-year-old roofer of Winter Park, were taken into custody by Constable J. Q. "Slim" Galloway in a swampy area north of 20th St. and East of Southwest Road.

Quinn said, "We walked the railroad tracks into Sanford after we left the Orange County Jail." He explained, however, that when they first escaped "we walked along Colonial Drive in Orlando to Magnolia and then called a cab and rode to Winter Park."

Sheriff Denver Cordell, the first to receive word that the two men had been seen in the Sanford area and in the Goldshore section, said that "I was stopped by a colored man who told me they were at Phagan's Store."

Albert "Georgia" Adams, the colored man who first recognized the pair of escapees said, "I chased them in my car but misjudged a turnoff and my car went into the ditch."

Constable Galloway, who was accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Denver Cordell, searched the area in the swampy area and started to jump from the railroad tracks when I saw Quinn. I threw my automatic shotgun into his face."

Quinn said, "That was the biggest shotgun barrel I've seen in my life."

The two escaped prisoners had stopped at Quin's Store and inquired about firearms. From there they went to Clara Service Station and then to Phagan's Grocery where they purchased bologna, cigars and beer.

Quinn said, "We knew we were hot and we had to get in and get out." A colored woman saw my picture in a paper and drew a circle around it, Quinn said. And he continued, "I thought to myself, that woman is going to call a policeman and we'd better get out."

Sheriff Cordell said that he had passed the store where the two men were buying beer and food.

Constable Galloway said, "Dr. Raymond C. Bass was passing by on his way from a hunting trip. Since he had shotguns and rifles in his car we pulled him into service. We were well armed."

Hall, the less talkative of the two escaped prisoners, said "We've been sitting up in the Orange County Jail since March waiting for a trial."

When Sheriff Dave Starr, accompanied by three of his deputies, arrived to take captured prisoners back to Orlando, Quinn told him "the time I got a notion to turn around and give up."

Sheriff Starr laughed and said, "He left me a note wishing me a Merry Christmas and now I'm wishing him a Happy New Year."

Hall and Quinn were taken back to Orange County by Sheriff Starr and Deputies Lester Hardee, Robert Tate and H. D. Blevins.

Sheriff Starr said that the two prisoners still at large are Charles A. Nunnally of Richmond, Va. and Clarence G. Murfee of Hollywood, Fla.

4th Crew Member's Name Is Released

The name of the second fatality in the crash of a Navy AJ1 at Lages Field, Acres was released today.

A02 CCarl J. Haddock, whose next of kin was given as his mother Mrs. Athel Vivian Haddock, 3202 43rd St., Portland, Ore., was killed when the plane apparently smashed into a mountainside about three miles from the base while attempting a landing at the nearby field.

A02 James W. Greek, whose wife resides in Sanford was the other crew member killed in the crash.
