FARM LOANS IN COUNTY REACH \$376,000 MARK

(Continued From Page One) funds received here for crop production loans, home loans, and payment of tools and materials needed for CWA workers.

Before leaving for Alabama where he will spend the holiday period, S. E. Andrews, secretary of the Farm Loan Association stated that he has noted increased activity through his office during this month.

Since Sept. 15, he said, 188 applications for loans were filed with him, 67 of which are already approved to a total of \$376,700, and about 100 of them pending.

Twenty-six applications were filed since Dec. 1, he said. If all of the loans that are asked for are approved, as Mr. Andrews believes they will, more than \$600,000 will have come in to this section through one source.

Most of this money remains in Sanford, Mr. Andrews stated, since it is used to make improvements on buildings or lands, to purchase livestock and fertilizer, to pay local debts in the form of mortgages on the property, and to buy additional land.

Farm loans are made for many other purposes than those named above, Mr. Andrews stated as he invited all persons interested to visit his office, at the Valley Hotel building, for a discussion of the loans leading to a loan.

Residents of Sanford are not the only ones who have applied for loans, Mr. Andrews stated, he has accepted applications and returned money to residents of Chuluota, Geneva, Oviedo, Ocoee, Altamonte Springs, Forest City, Longwood, Park, Lake Monroe, and Lake Mary.

As he explained before, loans are repayable in from 10 to 15 years at an interest rate of 4 1/2 per cent. The first payment on principal does not come until July 1, 1936, while the first principal installment is due on July 1, 1934.

(Continued From Page 1) tion of how soon he thought such action might be feasible. Meanwhile, the political implications of the silver were absorbed by many students of the President's monetary program.

Although many of the inflationists called the President's action only a step in the right direction which should be followed by outright renunciation of the white metal, they expressed a determination to continue working toward that goal.

However, the opinion was expressed generally that they had been stripped of much of their last extreme following and that the President's action had broken the combine which less than a year ago came within six votes of passing the Senate's approval of a proposal for free and unlimited release of silver at the rate of 100 million dollars a month.

Tampa Bridge Is Scene Of Tragic Death Of Pair

ment, Dr. J. E. McEachern, city health officer and Dr. Joseph B. Spoto, who examined him, told police he was drunk. He was locked up in the county jail, charged with manslaughter in a warrant sworn out before Justice of the Peace Jackson of the Gary district.

Five miles out beyond the bridge as he was returning to Tampa, Jackson, as those who saw him reported, was running with no regard for the safety of others on the highway. Even before he had hit the five-mile point from the causeway he had hit another truck driven by Sam Carson.

There was no damage in that crash. The Lovelace boy and the unidentified victim were fishing from opposite sides of the bridge as there was a warning sign from near Ybor City which saw the truck coming and told speed swinging to one side, then to the other, in the most terrifying dash anybody there could remember afterward ever to have seen.

Fishing alongside his father, the boy was struck, his head crushed, both legs almost severed. An instant before the truck had sidwiped the right hand guard rail of the bridge.

Out of control as it started across the bridge, the truck was stopped by the driver who must have been brought back to his senses as he realized what he had done.

Suffering from the shock of the tragedy, the Lovelace boy said how the plugging truck caught the fishing party in a trap, striking and bouncing so fast it could not be dodged.

"We had just reached the bridge my boy and I and a neighbor boy, Stanley Reeves, 14, and we were getting ready to fish," he said. "Then we heard the truck."

"We scarcely paid attention to it until it was on us. The draw is narrower than the highway, and the truck struck a rail on the right side leading at an angle down from the steel span railing. The truck struck this about eight feet from the span.

It bounced to the left side, and went up in the air, half rolling on to the span. It struck the south side, and we saw it was coming across. It was half rolling and jumping in the air. We tried to dodge, but it went 'round side and side so fast we could not tell where it would hit.

"Then it was past, and I saw my boy lying there. I went and picked him up. I don't remember much how we got to the hospital."

The amount of the metal offered. The result is that the silver miner now receive 64 1/2 cents an ounce, as compared with a previous speculative market price of about 20 cents less than that figure.

Of the silver brought to the mint, the government keeps half as a fee, and coins the other half into standard silver dollars which it then returns to the vendor of the metal. man prelates in his annual Christmas address today. Severely criticizing the sterilization program in Germany, Pope Pius said the inconsistency of such practices in the light of religious teachings was clearly set forth in a Papal decree in 1931 and in the encyclical "Casti Connubii."

Declaring that the international situation is fraught with an uncertain and distant, but the clashing interests of nations, the pontiff said that the most common and most effective way to solve the world's problems is through prayer.

Those who had expected a long analytical pontifical address this occasion were to be disappointed, he added, saying that the situation did not warrant a message that inflicts talk with the churchmen.
