Dog Track Can Stay

The Florida Supreme Court today is reversing a ruling by the Fifth District Court of Appeal in Daytona Beach upheld a June 18, 1981 ruling by Chief Semelino Circuit Court Judge Renwick Laffler that the concession of the track from harness horses to dog racing in 1980 was unconstitutional on the grounds it violated state statutes.

In making their eight-page decision the state Supreme Court said the state has an interest in recreational racing and wagering. It said that it enhances the tourist industry providing entertainment and provides tax revenues, it added that it is very appropriate for the legislature to assist the racing industry like it would any other industry.

Thomas Blaney, general manager of Super Seminole Greyhound Park expressed a statement from Bill Demetree, one of the park owners.

"Three attorneys' firms plus Florida's attorney general's office have maintained from the constitutionality of this law. Otherwise we would never have spent the money making Super Seminole the beautiful facility it is. Unfortunately, new gamblers with wealth and time, and with nothing better to do brought suit to halt our opening. This action has cost the taxpayers and the state unnecessary time and money. We are extremely happy with the decision."

6th Graders Merge School Board Okays Merger With Seminole

The merger of Crooms and Seminole High schools beginning in the 1982-84 school year has been approved despite the protests of a Sanford member.

Seminole County School Board members voted 4-1 Wednesday afternoon to merge the 550 ninth graders at Crooms with the 1,200 students at Seminole High School.

Chairman Richard Williams, the only black on the school board, voted against the merger.

The board also scheduled a work session for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at the School Board offices at 1211 Melville Ave. Sanford, to determine the fate of Crooms and Sanford Middle School.

But the Rev. Arnon Jones, preacher at St. Paul's Missionary Baptist Church, asked board members to delay their decision to merge the two schools until after the work session.

Jones said the School Board is restricting the opportunities of the black community by removing the district's only ninth grade center from the community.

"Unfortunately, there is no plan to build new schools in the deprived community," he said. "This community needs this educational force. I plead with the board not to take away an institution solely needed to remedy these deficiencies."

Jones said "the school stands as a vivid reminder to the community to develop the talents and gifts with which we have been divinely entrusted."

He asked the board not to rule out the continued use of Crooms as a ninth grade center.

To eliminate this one option would make the working an exercise in futility, Jones said.

His arguments raised doubts about the merger with Seminole. Williams asked William Kroll to accept an amendment to his motion to merge the schools, making the merger tentative. But Kroll refused to accept the amendment.

In its work session, the school board also discussed the future of Crooms and the future of Sanford Middle School. School officials are considering closing the middle school on U.S. Highway 179 and transferring the students to West 130 Street.

It is unclear the future of the two schools is tied together. Sanford Middle served as a high school until Seminole High was built. Crooms was the county's black high school until the federal courts ordered the district to integrate its schools.

Under the desegregation plan the district integrated the high school and used Crooms for the ninth graders in the Seminole High attendance area.

The situation remained the same until recently when school advisory groups from Crooms and Seminole along with Lakewood and Sanford Middle Schools asked for a merger of the two schools, citing limited academic and extracurricular opportunities for the students.

The board held a work session last month on the merger question and a large crowd of parents that operational costs at Crooms are about \$600 higher per student than at Seminole.

They said the name Joseph N. Crooms should have an honored place in the county history and should remain as the name of a school.

Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Dan Dagg said today that no plan for transferring teachers from Crooms has yet been developed. He said the teachers have contracts which must be honored.

Drug Activity Here Increasing

Undercover agents are seeing increased narcotics drug activity in Central Florida as the crackdown against illegal drugs in south Florida drives dealers north.

This is the view of Ronald Selbert, a resident agent in charge of the Alamoigne Springs-based Drug Enforcement Administration, whose area created five people Monday in a \$24 million cocaine bust.

The case used cocaine stolen from two men outside a Sanford motel Monday came in recently from South America, Selbert said. But he would not confirm that it came from Colombia.

Among the 20 agents involved in the four-month investigation were two from the Seminole County Sheriff's Department and one from the Sanford Police Department, all on loan to the drug task force.

The suitcase full of cocaine seized Monday has been sent to the DEA's laboratory in Miami for chemical analysis.

There is a lot of cocaine coming into the country via Miami, but a considerable amount is going north across the state line into Georgia, where there's some movement from South Florida up to Central Florida, Selbert said.

"I wouldn't call Central Florida a haven but there is increased activity because of increased pressure on drug dealers in Miami," he said.

Selbert, who has worked out of the DEA's Alamoigne office for 10 months, said some drug investigators can last up to three years and sometimes on not even in the seizure of any drugs but only in completing the paperwork.

The last of the five people arrested in Sanford, Longwood and Alamoigne Springs Monday to be released from the Orange County Jail were Jerry Kiparsky, 37, of Miami, who was released on a \$100,000 surety bond after a hearing Wednesday.

The four other arrests were a large drug bust in Central Florida history were released from jail Tuesday. They were Jerry Anderson, 47, of Lakewood, Deland, released on \$100,000 bond; Joseph Crawford and his wife, Debra, of 1328 Classic Drive, Longwood, both released on \$100,000 bond each. They are all charged with intent to distribute cocaine.

Dick Fisher of Lake Helen is charged with being an accessory to the case. He was also released Tuesday on \$50,000.

All five will appear before a grand jury today.

Conservation Corps Could Mean Jobs For 600 Youth

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Out-of-work youth could join a Florida Conservation Corps and earn the federal minimum wage working in parks, forests and coastal areas under a bill advancing in the House.

The measure (HR 168) was approved 14-3 Wednesday by the governmental operations committee, and now goes to the appropriations committee.

The program would be patterned after the Depression era and would be similar to modern programs in California and Ohio.

Under the Florida proposal, up to 600 unemployed youths between 16 and 23 would be sent into backwoods and along beaches to clean old trails, build boardwalks and perform other tasks to improve the state's recreational and environmental resources.

The program would cost an estimated \$1.1 million to start up and add about \$1.3 million annually to it.

Proponents hope most of the funding would come from the federal government. A \$50 million bill is pending in Congress that would provide 85 percent funding to any state establishing a conservation corps.

Doctors Seeking Allies

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Despite an infamously accurate prediction the 1983 Legislature will do nothing about the malpractice insurance crisis, doctors descended on Florida's Capitol Tuesday to win allies among undecided lawmakers.

Since the Florida Medical Association nomination race to Tallahassee to combat legislators from their former counties Wednesday and heard their case on the malpractice issue.

The physicians' lobby contends that malpractice lawsuits rarely win if there is a fairly good chance of making because if they win, they may collect an award of up to \$500,000.

The woman, who gave her name as Melody Cabot and claimed to be heir to the F.W. Woolworth fortune, presented a \$700,000 Palm Beach merchant for a week, hired limousines and three catered parties for which she ordered champagne, liquor and caviar.

She paid by check, of course. The checks bounced after she left town.

Palm Beach authorities reported Wednesday the "heiress" — whose real name is Melody Egerton — was arrested by police in Washington at a \$150-a-night hotel room and charged with defrauding several firms there.

Hospital Costs Up 36% In Two Years

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Hospital costs have increased 36 percent between 1981 and 1983, more than three times the rate of inflation, insurance Commissioner Bill Gueter says.

"A 36.5 percent jump in hospital charges compared with a 10.6 or 11.8 percent jump in the inflation rate indicates not cost control, but costs out of control," Gueter said Wednesday.

According to Gueter, a Citizens Guiter presented to the Hospital Cost Alignment Board, hospital costs increased from \$2.8 billion in 1981 to a projected \$5.4 billion in 1985.

At the same time, Gueter said, the Consumer Price Index rose only 1.7 percent in 1982 and Congressional Budget Office projections peg the increase for 1983 at only 4.5 percent.

Figures used by the cost containment board and developed by Data Resources Inc. show only an 11.6 percent increase in inflation during 1982 and 1983.

Meanwhile, Guiter announced the legislative sponsors for his proposals to give the cost containment board the authority to review proposed hospital budgets and rates and order refunds and rate reductions in some cases.

The legislation will be sponsored in the House by Rep. Carl Ogden, D-Jacksonville, and Rep. Mike Abrams, D-North Miami Beach, and in the Senate by Sen. Pat Thomas, D-Quincy, and Sen. John Vaga, D-Coconut Beach, he said.

Church Hires Law Firm In Lighting Fee Fight

A new chapter is being written in the battle between the Rev. John Butler Book and Seminole County commissioners.

Book, preacher at the Northside Church of Christ in Altamonte Springs, has hired the prestigious law firm Ball and Threlky of Ft. Lauderdale, Pa. to represent him in fighting the county's decision to keep the church in the Fort Taberner witholdivision from the districts.

The fight between Book and the county has been going on for about three years since the church closed was exempt from the fees paid by members of the lighting district.

Book claims his church's tax-exempt status makes it exempt from the lighting district assessments but County Attorney Nikki Clayton said the tax exemption applies to property taxes, not special fees assessed for special services, such as lighting districts or road improvements.

The Church is assessed \$180 a year in the lighting district. But Book said the light isn't very bright and stronger one if the church is allowed to withdraw from the districts.

Book threatened to sue the county after commissioners voted in October to reject his attempt to be removed from the lighting district, claiming the Harrisburg law firm, the same one which represented two Jones University in recent dealings with the U.S. Justice Department, is the first step, Book says.

Attorney Sandra E. Wibe has sent a letter to Ms. Clayton questioning the legality of including the church in the lighting district without its consent in the first place. She asks if a procedure exists for a church or individual to be withdrawn from a lighting district.

"It is our understanding that religious property is exempt from property tax in Florida," Ms. Wibe said. "Since the special lighting tax is a tax on property, why is it that the Northside Church, being a tax exempt religious property, is not exempt from this tax?"

Polish Interrogators Got Nothing Out Of Walesa

GDANSK, Poland (UPI) — Former Solidarity leader Lech Walesa said he gave no information to Polish authorities during a five-hour interrogation that he called a "near trick" to divide the Solidarity from loyal to the banned union.

The 39-year-old former chairman of the union complained after he was released from custody Wednesday that the government interrogators misrepresented his statements in an attempt to weaken his standing with union activists.

Walesa was taken to Gdansk militia headquarters under threat of force by three armed policemen.

They wanted to know more about his disclosure this week that he held three days of talks with leaders of the Solidarity underground to plan future strategy. "From day to finish I refused to give any answers," Walesa said.

Spain Protests Maneuvers

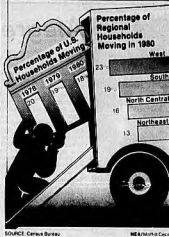
GIBRALTAR (UPI) — British warships conducted naval maneuvers today in the bay off the Rock of Gibraltar despite angry protests from Spain and divided sentiments in the disputed territory.

The Spanish Senate passed a resolution Wednesday denouncing the five-day visit by 12 British warships to the British colony on Spain's southern tip. The Senate warned the British that it could bring Anglo-Spanish relations to a standstill.

For the last 20 years, Spain has demanded the return of Gibraltar, which was captured by Britain in 1704, but talks have stalled. A 1967 British referendum in Gibraltar showed a 98 percent overwhelming preference for continued rule by London.

Although Britain held the same exercises in Gibraltar's harbor last year without protest, the British government claimed the warships have "flagrantly violated" its territorial waters.

The government seemed especially angry by the presence of the Falkland Islands HMS Royal Fleet Auxiliary and the British ship HMS Hermes in the Falklands war, because of Spain's pro-Argentine stance during the fighting last year.

— America is a highly mobile society with nearly every other person changing homes during the last half of the 1970s. The Census Bureau reported today.

In a report detailing population shifts, the bureau also said the nation's population has been slipping away from northern industrial states toward the South and West.

The bureau said that nearly 94 million, or 44.5 percent, of the 210 million people who lived in the country in 1980 had changed residences since 1975.

Of those who moved, slightly more than half stayed in the same county, about 25 percent stayed in the same state and about 25 percent moved to a different state.

The bureau said the figures do not include those who had returned to their 1975 residence by 1980 after having moved in intervening years or those who had moved more than once during the period.

States with relatively high percentages of 1980 residents who lived by another state in 1975 were Nevada, with 31.5 percent, along with Alaska at 29.1 percent, Wyoming at 28.3 percent and Arizona at 23.9 percent. The lowest was New York with 3.8 percent.

In charting where people came from and where they went, the report noted, for example, that of the 1.47 million new Californians over the age of 15 in 1980, more than 178,000 had moved from New York and nearly 129,000 came from Illinois.

In Florida, where the total of those who moved in from other states between 1975 and 1980 was 1.8 million, more than 964,000 of them came from New York and 544,000 from New Jersey. The largest number of Nevada's 234,000 new residents from California, 94,620, but sizable numbers came from New York,

Crime Rampant In Irish Capital

DUBLIN, Ireland (UPI) — The crime rate in Dublin is worse than in the average large city in the United States, a survey published in Ireland said.

The report by Irish Marketing Surveys said one person in five in Ireland has been the victim of crime during the past 12 months, while in Dublin one in three people has been a crime victim during the same period.

"The position in Dublin is worse than in the average large American city of over 1 million people," it said.

"One worrying point is the fact that the reported crime level figures for Ireland are in all cases within 1 percent of the levels reported in the United States a decade ago."

The Irish capital has a population just over half a million. It has gradually and reported to have increased approximately 40 percent since 1970. The report said that the findings of the most recent report by the commissioner of police might suggest that it was not only a cause for concern but that we may set on the same unenviable path as the Irish people admit that there is an area within a mile of their homes where they would be afraid to walk at night, and 46 percent of

Dubliners said responded affirmatively to the same question.

Russians Must Withdraw From Afghanistan

LONDON (UPI) — An Afghan guerrilla leader said resistance movements fighting the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan would not accept a complete Soviet withdrawal from the country.

The Soviet Union aims to impose a political solution on Afghanistan," Barakuddin Rabbani, head of the Pakistan-based Jamiat-e-Islami resistance movement.

"There can be no talks before a Russian withdrawal and establishment of Islamic government in Afghanistan."

Rabbani spoke to reporters Tuesday at a London restaurant, foreign ministers of Pakistan and the Soviet-backed Afghan government met in Geneva under the auspices of United Nations mediator Diego Cordoba.

Rejecting the Geneva talks, Rabbani said, "There are only two issues in any talks, namely the Mujahideen and Russia."

Rabbani is a Muslim fundamentalist described by a U.S. government source as a "moderate cleric" by other Afghan fundamentalists.

Rabbani met with about 45 mujahideen with British Foreign Affairs Undersecretary Douglas Hurd. A U.S. Foreign spokesman said the talks focused on "the current situation and in particular the Soviet bombardment and mining and destruction of crops."

Soviet troops withdraw from Afghanistan — a position taken by Rabbani and other Islamic fundamentalist Afghans.

QUEBEC (UPI) — French-speaking people face a more secure future than anywhere else in the world, the federal deputy commissioner of official languages said.

The French language is the most widely spoken of the world's major languages, and the French Canadian population is the largest of any group in the world, including France, Lalonde said. He noted that the number of French speakers in Quebec has increased in the last decade, and that the French language is being used in more and more areas of public life.

Lalonde said the growing presence of French speakers in Quebec has led to a "considerable progress" and the only language in the world to be the subject of a law of official language and culture.

Anderson Sparks Tigers With Nonstop Optimism

NEW YORK (UPI)—Some days a man storns carefully away in the back of his mind and keeps repressing. Anderson has one like that. The date was June 14, 1979. The reason he remembers it so well is because it was the day he became manager of the Detroit Tigers.

He was on top of the world that day, coming back in triumph in the big leagues again after six months on the sidelines, six months doing TV work, playing a lot of golf and putting around the house in Thousand Oaks, Calif., telling everybody who asked him he was never happier.

"Maybe he really believed it. Nobody else did. They thought he was just kidding," joked the Cleveland Red Sox two world championships, four pennants and five division titles in nine years with them and how much it hurt when the Red Sox lost at the end of 1980 after the club had finished second two years in a row.

I also remember that first day he came to Detroit, having been at the airport to meet him, and you never saw any happier man come off an airplane. He was back where he always wanted to be in the first place, back managing with a club that was so lucky to get him. I gave him a 3-year contract that doesn't expire until October of 1982.

The Tigers helped the Yankees open their home season Tuesday and beat New York 15-3. Talking with Anderson about that first day he arrived in Detroit, I asked him if he remembered what he had said regarding his contract. He saw me leaping asking the question and he laughed.

"I said if the Detroit baseball didn't win a pennant by the time my contract was up, that I ought to be fired," he had no trouble recalling.

"You will have time," I reminded him, not telling him anything he didn't know, and he nodded still smiling. He thought about it a moment.

"I just don't take it seriously," he said with a straight face.

Then he couldn't help himself. He had to smile again. There's no possible way of doing it the first time after losses and who wants to win most, Billy Martin, George Steinbrenner, Dallas Green or any number of others you can think of, but none as much as you, Scotty Anderson. He wants to win so much, you know his beliefs. For the people in Detroit, even then every the same, but I have to believe he wants to win for himself. One of the reasons he does is to win every the same he will be over the way he let go by the Reds.

If you talk to Dick Wagner, the man who let him go in Cincinnati, he'll tell you that he and the club appreciate the job Anderson did and that he, meaning Wagner, still considers him a special manager; Wagner simply felt a change was desired and followed through on his belief. You can't have a man for that.

But even should the Tigers fail to win this season and next one, he has no intention of letting Anderson go despite what he said when he signed with them. You can



take that from Jim Campbell, the Tigers' president and general manager.

"Whatever I would say to that connection might sound like a word of confidence and you know all about those things, but I assure you, Sparky has nothing to worry about," Campbell says. "Working with him is a pleasure. I put him in the same category as Ralph Houk and Charlie Dressen. I asked all three to take over young ball-ops and pull them together and they did it. That isn't taking anything away from Bob Schefelky, Billy Martin and Dave McNamara. They had to work with older players and did well with what they had."

Since taking over the Tigers, Anderson led them through his first two seasons, fourth and in it is his second during the split season in 1981, and fourth last year. He's excited over the Tigers' chances in the American League East this year.

"We're gonna be in the race," he says enthusiastically. "We're today, mature now. Outside of Howard Johnson and Oletto Young, we don't have any players without experience and I don't care what club it is, everyone has a couple like that. Where we go depends on our rear pitching and all I can tell you is I see things about it that make me optimistic."

Sparky is always optimistic. He leads both leagues in department, editing Tommy Lasorda and Chuck Tanner, and does a nothing wrong with that.

For years when he was with the Reds, he couldn't say enough about Johnny Bench, Joe Morgan, Dave Concepcion, Tony Perez and Don Gullett. Now he's Lance Parrish's personal p.r. man, calling the Tigers' pitching manager, "the best ballplayer in America."

He isn't forgetting Kirk Gibson, either, even though the slugger outfielder will miss about a week following removal of a cartilage from his left knee.

"My big guy really has crossed over the river," he says, and does a nothing wrong with that.

Sparky Anderson is an excellent advertisement for the Detroit baseball club. He has so much to get up and go, much natural enthusiasm for his players and the people paying him, that sometimes he gets a little carried away. He realizes that and has the perfect response. "I hope," he says, "it'll be the rest of my life."
