COPELAND BACKS EQUALIZING FEE AS AMENDMENT

Senator Offers Plan As Substitute For Debenture Measure

WASHINGTON, Apr. 26—(INS)—The equalization fee which dominated farm relief battles during the Coolidge administration only to be abandoned as an issue at the recent presidential campaign, returned to Congress yesterday when Senator Copeland (D) of New York, sponsored it as an amendment to the Senate's new farm bill.

Copeland introduced the fee as a substitute for the export debenture plan which President Hoover condemned but which the Senate Agriculture Committee added to the bill over his protest. Copeland copied the equalization fee language off the bill vetoed a year ago by President Coolidge in drafting his amendment.

Copeland's action was the first step in a Democratic maneuver calculated to force the Republican side of the Senate into a repudiation of the farm relief program adopted in preceding sessions of Congress. The very Republican leaders—McNary of Oregon, Watson, of Indiana, Nye of North Dakota, and Capper of Kansas—who championed the equalization fee in other years have abandoned it this year.

Copeland's move to bring the fee to a vote thus forcing these senators to publicly proclaim their change of heart.

"I am not attempting to preclude the debenture plan," said Copeland in sponsoring his amendment, "I offer the equaliza-

tion fee as a substitute because I believe it would be a great pity to emasculate—to ruin this bill by providing no actual relief for the farmers. I offer this amendment so the Senate can vote on real relief."

The Republican leaders announced privately they expected to defeat the Copeland amendment with plenty of votes to spare. The Republicans, who formerly supported it, will justify their switch by contending both major parties repudiated the fee at the last election, that it is not in either party platform and that the American people approved its repudiation by the Coolidge administration.

Bids Will Be Asked On Construction In Army Housing Plan

WASHINGTON, Apr. 26—(INS)—Bids for completion of about one-fourth of the Army housing program for approximately \$12,000,000 of construction will be opened within the next few months, the War department announced yesterday.

The program covers army posts throughout the United States and in Porto Rico. One contract has already been awarded for \$800,000 worth of construction at Rockwell Field, Coronado, California.

Camp McClellan, Anniston, Ala., and bids will be opened tomorrow for another \$300,000 job at Fort Meade, Md. on Apr. 29.

bids will be opened for one totaling \$582,000 at Rockwell Field, Coronado, California.

The projects on which the bids are to be asked locally include:

Fort Benning, Ga., \$200,000; Maxwell Field, Ala., \$100,000; Fort Bragg, N. C., \$360,000; Fort Humphries, Vn., \$180,000, and

Fort McPherson, Ga., \$150,000.

GIRL Flier Will Attempt To Fly Alone To Rome

Elinor Smith Planning Non-Stop Flight To Win Mac Laurels

ALBANY, N. Y., Apr. 26—A non-stop flight, New York to Rome, is the ambition of Miss Elinor Smith, famous American girl flier.

"I'm planning on trying it this summer," she said yesterday as she rested in her home here after her strenuous feat of establishing a new world's endurance record for women yesterday after she had been in the air 26 hours, 21 minutes and 52 seconds, besting the former record held by Mrs. Louise Thaden of Los Angeles by four hours, 18 minutes.

A little win but very happy, the slim, blue-eyed Miss Smith occupied her time opening and answering telegrams and taking "cat naps." She smilingly remarked that she was a little behind on sleep.

She was quite certain she would make the Rome flight and she merely laughed when asked if she felt any qualms about making such a hazardous journey. And all alone, as is Lindbergh. Even her mother, Mrs. Thomas Smith, a former actress, is not afraid, she said.

"Elinor is a natural flier, and I'm no longer the least bit alarmed when she takes the air. She has sold me on the idea that she can fly."

Miss Smith herself was quite elated over her latest achievement. Asked how she occupied her time while in the air 26 hours, she replied, "I read Mark Twain's Adventures of Tom Sawyer."

White House Pet Dies Despite Medical Aid

WASHINGTON, Apr. 24.—(INS)—Gloom was cast over the White House this morning. "Pat," an Irish wolf hound, died from distemper after the Army's foremost surgeon, Dr. Walter Reed, had tried to save him.

The four other dogs in the White House kennel bark and run about, apparently wondering what's become of "Pat." He was presented to President Hoover by a Miss Smith of Virginia.

Today's death marked the third in the presidential kennel. During the Coolidge administration two white collies, "Prudence Jim" and Rob Roy" passed away.

Carlton Measure Designed To Lower Road Indebtedness

TALLAHASSE, Fla., Apr. 26—(INS)—More revenue would pour into the administration's pool for the retirement of county and district road and bridge indebtedness under gubernatorial bill, the fifth of Governor Doyle E. Carlton's measures, under consideration today by the state legislature.

The bill was introduced in the House by the committee on finance and taxation. It proposes the collection of an ad valorem on automobiles by the county tax collectors at the time of issuing license tags. The revenue would be placed in the \$12,000,000 annual pool proposed by the chief executive for the retirement of the highway indebtedness.

The solons already have begun the consideration of other principal phases of the Governor's tax division program, which include measures to divert the two-cent gasoline tax of the highway bonds. This problem, the retirement of the \$160,000,000 county and district road and bridge indebtedness, is one of the greatest facing the present administration.

British Plane Upon Long Distance Hop Crosses Into India

LONDON, Apr. 26—(INS)—The great Royal Air Force Fairchild monoplane which hopped off at Cranwell Airdrome on Wednesday for Bangalore, India, in an effort to smash the long distance and duration records, crossed the frontier from Persia into India at noon today, Greenwich Mean Time, according to a Karachi dispatch to the Evening News.

The monoplane flew over Kanchanaburi, which is on the frontier. Kanchanaburi lies about 1,135 miles northwest of Bangalore. The plane carries Squadron Leader A. G. Jones-Williams and Flight Lieutenant N. H. Jenkins.

The distance from Cranwell to Bangalore is about 5,000 miles on a bee line course but from the course the fliers have taken, they will have to cover several hundred miles more than that before reaching their destination.

The present long distance record is now held by the Italians

Ferrarin and Del Prete who were credited with covering 4,850 miles in their flight from Rome to Brazil. The non-refueling duration record of 65 hours and 25 minutes is held by Germany.
