### Sheriff's Office investigating robbery

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating a late night crime that occurred Monday where employees of a Walgreens Drug Store were robbed, threatened and tied up.

The robbery happened just before 11 p.m. at the Walgreens, located at 1201 South International Parkway near Lake Mary. Three suspects entered the store, armed with handguns. They were described as either black or Hispanic males, and they had their faces obscured by, what witnesses described as, either rags, T-shirts, or masks.

As they entered the business, one of the store employees tried to grab one of the suspects' guns. The employee was struck on the forehead and the back of the head.

The trio then began to round up money from within the store. One employee, who tried to explain to them how the safe worked, reportedly had a barrel of a handgun stuffed into his mouth. The employees were tied up with telephone cord and put onto the office floor. The three left the store with an undisclosed amount of cash. Witnesses, who pulled up to the store just as the suspects were leaving, saw the suspects get into a mini-van.

The investigation continues. Anybody with information is asked to call either the Seminole County Sheriff's Office at 407-665-6600, or Crime Line at 1-800-423-TIPS.

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## Riverwalk receives boost from CRA

**SANFORD** — The Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency agreed Tuesday to assist the city of Sanford by funding possible shortfalls in the Riverwalk project after the original contractor withdrew its bid.

Board members voted unanimously to make the offer and recommended the city commission accept the second-lowest bidder, Wharton-Smith Inc.

"The best bang out of the reinvestment

dollars we're charged with overseeing is to spend it on hard-money projects — bricks and sticks," said CRA board member Tom Ball. "The Riverwalk project is an important one for downtown and would be a positive use of our money."

The city needs to find \$1.2 million to fund Riverwalk if it moves forward with Wharton-Smith's \$11.4 million bid. The city

has secured \$10.2 million in state and federal funding to pay for the project, which includes replacing the seawall from Mellonville to French avenues.

Harbco Construction Inc. was the original low-bidder, with a price of \$9.1 million. However, Harbco changed seawall contractors after the bids were unsealed, and the city would not qualify the replacement con-

tractor. The company withdrew its bid last Wednesday.

Sanford City Manager Tony VanDerworp said the city is faced with two options: put the project out for rebid or accept the second-lowest bidder. VanDerworp said rebidding the project would take a minimum of 45 days because city staff would change project specifications to hopefully meet the \$10.2 million budget.

The city commission was scheduled to make a decision on the two options

## 2 suspects arrested in chop shop operation

Two more suspects have been arrested for their alleged involvement in a Central Florida chop shop operation that stole motorcycles pickup trucks and utility trailers.

The suspects are identified as Steven Wayne Noe, 39, and Mark Lee Steward, 36.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office said both are accused of racketeering, conspiracy to commit racketeering, grand theft auto and dealing in stolen property. Noe is being held in the Seminole County jail under a half million dollar bond. The arrests came Tuesday after a sealed, 1,094-page affidavit was filed with the Circuit Court in Seminole County last week.

A number of agencies were instrumental in putting together the case including the Office of Statewide Prosecution, the City-County Auto Theft Bureau and its member agencies which include the Seminole County Sheriff's office, Sanford police, Winter Springs police, Altamonte Springs police and the Brevard County Sheriff's Office.

The arrests are part of an operation that became public last November when a search warrant was served at 1511 Mellonville Ave. in Sanford. At that time, authorities discovered a stolen box-type trailer, a stolen travel trailer and a stolen pickup truck.

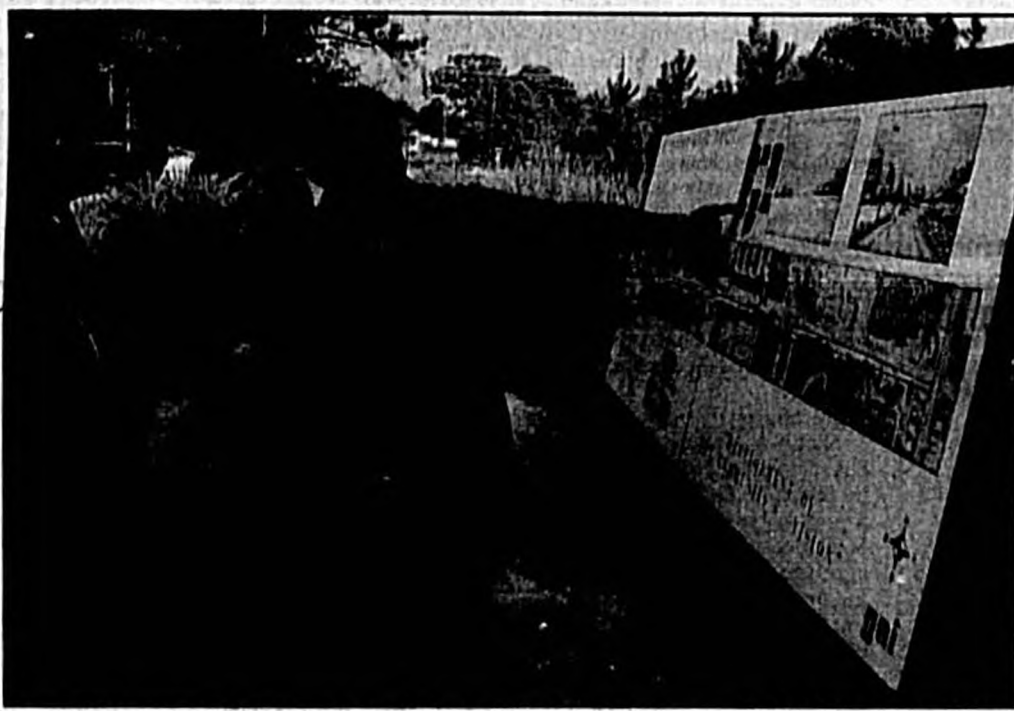
Other stolen property was discovered in the house and the workshop. Subsequent search warrants at other sites yielded even more stolen goods. Eventually, an estimated \$300,000 worth of stolen property was recovered.

Early on, authorities arrested Richard VanAlstyne, 38. He is now serving time in prison. VanAlstyne and Noe were allegedly partners in the criminal enterprise. Steward was one of those who worked for them, as was Timothy Suwalski, 37, and Mark Gizeskowiak, 44, both of whom were arrested earlier this year.

Now as also arrested in March, 2001 on another chop shop charge and was awaiting trial in that case.

## Special Master to determine future of billboards

Whether or not William Kirchoff will receive a billboard permit is still undecided.

Kirchoff had first proposed the billboard on July 25, 2000, to be located in the northwest quadrant of Interstate-4 and Highway 17-92 near the St. Johns River.

On Jan. 23, 2001, however, the Seminole County Commission adopted an ordinance establishing a 180-day moratorium on the issuance of development permits for billboards (within unincorporated Seminole County) stating that pending applications would be part of the moratorium.

Since that time, the matter has been batted back and forth during a number of County Commission meetings, zoning department meetings, St. Johns River Water Management, Florida Department of Transportation, and others.

The subject of allowing billboards however, is not just a few years old. Between 1995 and 1999, approximately 20 meetings were held with billboard companies and county staff regarding billboard issues.

During Tuesday morning's commission meeting, it was suggested that the matter go before a Special Master Hearing officer. Commissioner Grant Malloy, however, spoke against the proposal.

"I would support by-passing the Special Master and allow the applicant to go ahead," Malloy said. "I think that's the fair thing to do."

Commissioner Carlton Henley said he agreed with Malloy. "It's not that I want more billboards in Seminole County, but we have to think about fairness."

Commissioner Randy Morris reiterated that when the moratorium was first established, it included applications which were still pending, which included that of Kirchoff plus several others. "The only way we're going to resolve this is to take it to a Special Master," he proposed.

## Dual Diagnosis Program offers clients chance for brighter future

**SANFORD** — State and local officials gathered last week to honor a new county program that improves the quality of life for individuals suffering from mental illness and substance abuse.

A ribbon cutting ceremony was held last Tuesday at the Dual Diagnosis Program's 919 E. 2nd St. location. The facility offers a service that has often gone ignored within the community.

"Research has found 75 percent of people suffering from mental illnesses also have a substance abuse problem," said Charlotte Giuliani, director of Dual Diagnosis and Forensic Services for Seminole Community Mental Health Center

Inc. "Until now, this problem has not been addressed effectively in the community."

In the past, people suffering from mental illness and a substance abuse problem could not find help for both problems at one facility, Giuliani said. Many, who

had difficulty finding treatment for both problems, entered a continuous cycle of living on the streets and in jail.

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, 22 percent of the nation's local jail inmates in 2001 were mentally ill. On average, a mental health offender costs more to manage in jail, stays longer and recidivates at a higher rate than other inmates, Giuliani said.

"For a variety of reasons, our local jails have become the mental health treatment centers of last resort," she said. "This transference of responsibility for treatment of the mentally ill to the criminal justice system is not only ineffec-

Abby, what should the girls call me — and how do I handle this overbearing father?

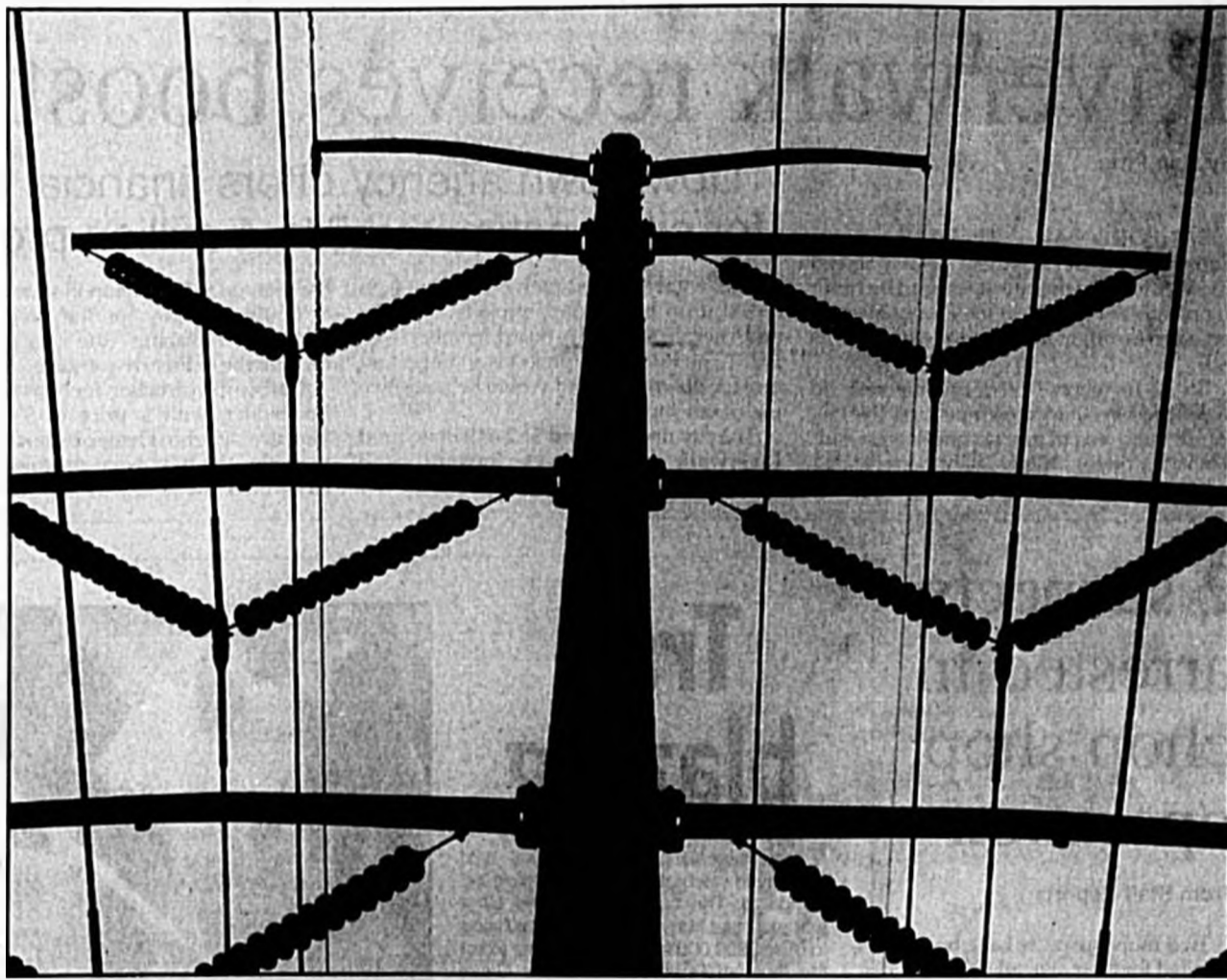
**INSTANT FAMILY IN CENTRAL CALIFORNIA**

"The higher-end lab will allow our advanced students

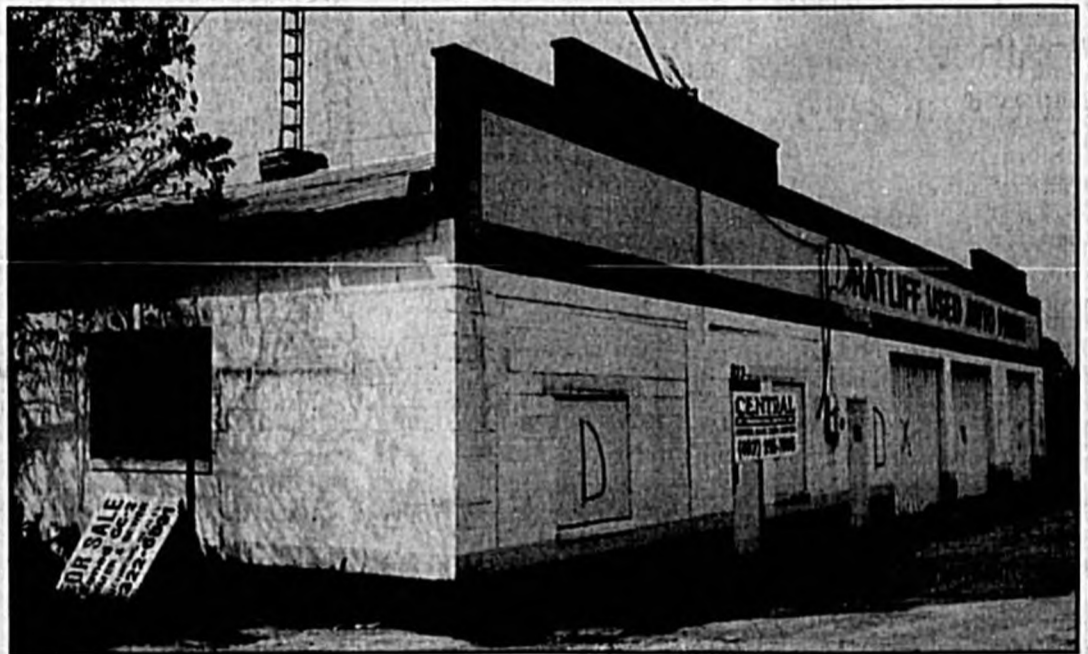
to move into more creative areas," she added. At Monday's dedication, Storch dubbed the facility "The Silver Hawk Lab."

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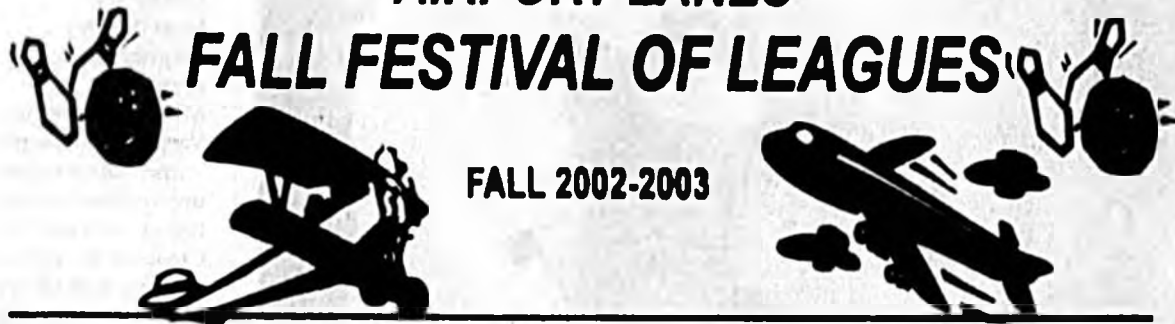

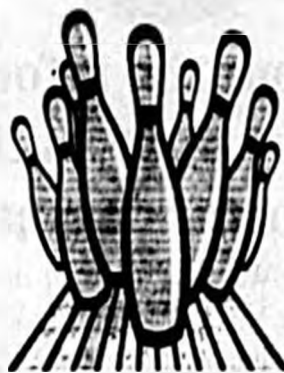

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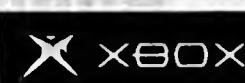

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS  
TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 5, 2002

NOTICE OF ELECTION

I, Jim Smith, Secretary of State of the State of Florida, do hereby give notice that an election will be held in each county in Florida, on November 5, 2002 for the ratification or rejection of proposed constitutional amendments of the State of Florida:

NO. 1  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
ARTICLE I, SECTION 17  
(Legislative)

BALLOT TITLE: Amending Article I, Section 17 of the State Constitution

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution identical to a proposed amendment to Section 17 of Article I of the State Constitution which was approved by a statewide vote in 1998. The Supreme Court of Florida struck the 1998 amendment in a ruling in which four of the seven justices found that the ballot summary was inaccurate. The proposed amendment expressly authorizes the death penalty for capital crimes and expressly authorizes retroactive changes in the method of execution. The amendment changes the prohibition against "cruel or unusual punishment," currently provided in Section 17 of Article I of the State Constitution, to a prohibition against "cruel and unusual punishment" to conform with the wording of the Eighth Amendment to the United States Constitution. The amendment prohibits reduction of a death sentence based on invalidity of an execution method and provides for continued force of the sentence. The amendment permits any execution method unless prohibited by the United States Constitution. The amendment requires construction of the prohibition against cruel or unusual punishment and the proposed prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment to conform to United States Supreme Court interpretation of the Eighth Amendment to the United States Constitution. The amendment would prevent state courts, including the Florida Supreme Court, from treating the state constitutional prohibition against cruel or unusual punishment as being more expansive than the federal constitutional prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment or United States Supreme Court interpretations thereof. The amendment effectively nullifies rights currently allowed under the state prohibition against cruel or unusual punishment which may afford greater protections for those subject to punishment for crimes than will be provided by the amendment. Under the amendment, the protections afforded those subject to punishment for crimes under the "cruel or unusual punishment" clause, as that clause currently appears in Section 17 of Article I of the State Constitution, will be the same as the minimum protections provided under the "cruel and unusual" punishments clause of the Eighth Amendment to the United States Constitution. The amendment provides for retroactive applicability.

Specifically, the proposal amends Section 17 of Article I of the State Constitution, to read as set forth below. The word ~~isolation~~ is a deletion; words underlined are additions:

**SECTION 17. Excessive punishments.**—Excessive fines, cruel and or unusual punishment, attainder, forfeiture of estate, indefinite imprisonment, and unreasonable detention of witnesses are forbidden. The death penalty is an authorized punishment for capital crimes designated by the legislature. The prohibition against cruel or unusual punishment, and the prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment, shall be construed in conformity with decisions of the United States Supreme Court which interpret the prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment provided in the Eighth Amendment to the United States Constitution. Any method of execution shall be allowed, unless prohibited by the United States Constitution. Methods of execution may be designated by the legislature, and a change in any method of execution may be applied retroactively. A sentence of death shall not be reduced on the basis that a method of execution is invalid, in any case in which an execution method is declared invalid. The death sentence shall remain in force until the sentence can be lawfully executed by any valid method. This section shall apply retroactively.

FULL TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

**SECTION 17. Excessive punishments.**—Excessive fines, cruel and or unusual punishment, attainder, forfeiture of estate, indefinite imprisonment, and unreasonable detention of witnesses are forbidden. The death penalty is an authorized punishment for capital crimes designated by the legislature. The prohibition against cruel or unusual punishment, and the prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment, shall be construed in conformity with decisions of the United States Supreme Court which interpret the prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment provided in the Eighth Amendment to the United States Constitution. Any method of execution shall be allowed, unless prohibited by the United States Constitution. The death sentence shall remain in force until the sentence can be lawfully executed by any valid method. This section shall apply retroactively.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
ARTICLE XI, SECTION 5  
(Legislative)

BALLOT TITLE: Economic Impact Statements for Proposed Constitutional Amendments or Revisions

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** Requires the Legislature to provide by general law for the provision of an economic impact statement to the public prior to the public voting on an amendment of the Florida Constitution proposed by initiative.

FULL TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

**SECTION 5. Amendment or revision election.**—  
(a) A proposed amendment to or revision of this constitution, or any part of it, shall be submitted to the electors at the next general election held more than ninety days after the joint resolution, initiative petition or report of revision commission, constitutional convention or taxation and budget reform commission proposing it is filed with the custodian of state records, unless, pursuant to law enacted by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the membership of each house of the legislature and limited to a single amendment or revision, it is submitted at an earlier special election held more than ninety days after such filing.  
(b) The legislature shall provide by general law, prior to the holding of an election pursuant to this section, for the provision of a statement to the public regarding the probable financial impact of any amendment proposed by initiative pursuant to Section 3. (c) Once in the tenth week, and once in the sixth week immediately preceding the week in which the election is held, the proposed amendment or revision, with notice of the date of election at which it will be submitted to the electors, shall be published in one newspaper of general circulation in each county in which a newspaper is published.  
(d) If the proposed amendment or revision is approved by vote of the electors, it shall be effective as an amendment to or revision of the constitution of the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January following the election, or on such other date as may be specified in the amendment or revision.

NO. 3  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 6  
(Legislative)

BALLOT TITLE: Authorizing Amendments to Miami-Dade County Home Rule Charter by Special Law Approved by Referendum

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** Proposing an amendment to Section 6 of Article VIII of the State Constitution to authorize amendments or revisions to the Miami-Dade County Home Rule Charter by special law approved by a vote of the electors of Miami-Dade County and to conform references to the county's current name.

FULL TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

**SECTION 6. Schedule to Article VIII.**—  
(a) This article shall replace all of Article VIII of the Constitution of 1885, as amended, except those sections expressly retained and made a part of this article by reference.  
(b) **COUNTIES; COUNTY SEATS; MUNICIPALITIES; DISTRICTS.** The status of the following items as they exist on the date this article becomes effective is recognized and shall be continued until changed in accordance with law: the counties of the state; their status with respect to the legality of the sale of intoxicating liquors, wines and beers; the method of selection of county officers; the performance of municipal functions by county officers; the county seats; and the municipalities and special districts of the state, their powers, jurisdiction and government.  
(c) **OFFICERS TO CONTINUE IN OFFICE.** Every person holding office when this article becomes effective shall continue in office for the remainder of the term if that office is not abolished. If the office is abolished the incumbent shall be paid adequate compensation, to be fixed by law, for the loss of emoluments for the remainder of the term.  
(d) **ORDINANCES.** Local laws relating only to unincorporated areas of a county on the effective date of this article may be amended or repealed by county ordinance.  
(e) **CONSOLIDATION AND HOME RULE.** Article VIII, Sections 9, 10, 11 and 24, of the Constitution of 1885, as amended, shall remain in full force and effect as to each county affected, as if this article had not been adopted, until that county shall expressly adopt a charter or home rule plan pursuant to this article. All provisions of the Miami-Dade Metropolitan-Dade County Home Rule Charter, heretofore or hereafter adopted by the electors of Miami-Dade County pursuant to Article VIII, Section 11, of the Constitution of 1885, as amended, shall be valid, and any amendments to such charter shall be valid; provided that the said provisions of such charter and the said amendments thereto are authorized under said Article VIII, Section 11, of the Constitution of 1885, as amended. However, notwithstanding any provision of Article VIII, Section 11, of the

Constitution of 1885, as amended, or any limitations under this subsection, the Miami-Dade County Home Rule Charter may be amended or revised by special law approved by the electors of Miami-Dade County and, if approved, shall be deemed an amendment or revision of the charter by the electors of Miami-Dade County.

(f) **DADE COUNTY; POWERS CONFERRED UPON MUNICIPALITIES.** To the extent not inconsistent with the powers of existing municipalities or general law, the Metropolitan Government of Dade County may exercise all the powers conferred now or hereafter by general law upon municipalities.

(g) **DELETION OF OBSOLETE SCHEDULE ITEMS.** The legislature shall have power, by joint resolution, to delete from this article any subsection of this Section 6, including this subsection, when all events to which the subsection to be deleted is or could become applicable have occurred. A legislative determination of fact made as a basis for application of this subsection shall be subject to judicial review.

NO. 4  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
ARTICLE I, SECTION 24  
(Legislative)

BALLOT TITLE: Laws Providing Public Records or Meetings Exemptions: Two-Thirds Vote Required

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** Requires that laws providing exemptions from public records or public meetings requirements must, after the effective date of this amendment, be passed by a two-thirds vote of each house of the Legislature.

FULL TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

ARTICLE I  
DECLARATION OF RIGHTS

**SECTION 24. Access to public records and meetings.**—  
(a) Every person has the right to inspect or copy any public record made or received in connection with the official business of any public body, officer, or employee of the state, or persons acting on their behalf, except with respect to records exempted pursuant to this section or specifically made confidential by this Constitution. This section specifically includes the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government and each agency or department created thereunder; counties, municipalities, and districts; and each constitutional officer, board, and commission, or entity created pursuant to law or this Constitution.  
(b) All meetings of any collegial public body of the executive branch of state government or of any collegial public body of a county, municipality, school district, or special district, at which official acts are to be taken or at which public business of such body is to be transacted or discussed, shall be open and noticed to the public and meetings of the legislature shall be open and noticed as provided in Article III, Section 4(e), except with respect to meetings exempted pursuant to this section or specifically closed by this Constitution.

(c) This section shall be self-executing. The legislature, however, may provide by general law passed by a two-thirds vote of each house for the exemption of records from the requirements of subsection (a) and the exemption of meetings from the requirements of subsection (b), provided that such law shall state with specificity the public necessity justifying the exemption and shall be no broader than necessary to accomplish the stated purpose of the law. The legislature shall enact laws governing the enforcement of this section, including the maintenance, control, destruction, disposal, and disposition of records made public by this section, except that each house of the legislature may adopt rules governing the enforcement of this section in relation to records of the legislative branch. Laws enacted pursuant to this subsection shall contain only exemptions from the requirements of subsections (a) or (b) and provisions governing the enforcement of this section, and shall relate to one subject.  
(d) All laws that are in effect on July 1, 1993 that limit public access to records or meetings shall remain in force, and such laws apply to records of the legislative and judicial branches, until they are repealed. Rules of court that are in effect on the date of adoption of this section that limit access to records shall remain in effect until they are repealed.

NO. 5  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
ARTICLE VII, SECTION 3  
(Legislative)

BALLOT TITLE: Review of Exemptions and Exclusions from the Tax on Sales, Use, and Other Transactions

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** Proposes to amend the State Constitution to create a joint legislative committee to conduct a review of exemptions from the tax on sales, use, and other transactions imposed by law and exclusions of sales of services from such taxation. Provides for submission of the committee's findings and recommendations to the presiding officers of the Legislature not later than March 1, 2004, 2005, and 2006. Requires committee decisions to deauthorize any exemption or exclusion which are approved by a majority of the committee membership to be presented to the Legislature as a resolution, not subject to gubernatorial veto. Authorizes the Legislature to rescind decisions of the committee by joint resolution. Provides that the deauthorization of exemptions or exclusions shall take effect on July 1 of the calendar year following the second regular session following adoption of the committee's resolution. Retains the Legislature's authority to adopt or reauthorize exemptions or exclusions from such tax.

FULL TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

ARTICLE VII  
FINANCE AND TAXATION

**SECTION 3. Taxes; exemptions.**—  
(a) All property owned by a municipality and used exclusively by it for municipal or public purposes shall be exempt from taxation. A municipality, owning property outside the municipality, may be required by general law to make payment to the taxing unit in which the property is located. Such portions of property as are used predominantly for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes may be exempted by general law from taxation.  
(b) There shall be exempt from taxation, cumulatively, to every head of a family residing in this state, household goods and personal effects to the value fixed by general law, not less than one thousand dollars, and to every widow or widower or person who is blind or totally and permanently disabled, property to the value fixed by general law not less than five hundred dollars.  
(c) Any county or municipality may, for the purpose of its respective tax levy and subject to the provisions of this subsection and general law, grant community and economic development ad valorem tax exemptions to new businesses and expansions of existing businesses, as defined by general law. Such an exemption may be granted only by ordinance of the county or municipality, and only after the electors of the county or municipality voting on such question in a referendum authorize the county or municipality to adopt such ordinance. An exemption so granted shall apply to improvements to real property made by or for the use of a new business and improvements to real property related to the expansion of an existing business and shall also apply to tangible personal property of such new business and tangible personal property related to the expansion of an existing business. The amount or limits of the amount of such exemption shall be specified by general law. The period of time for which such exemption may be granted to a new business or expansion of an existing business shall be determined by general law. The authority to grant such exemption shall expire ten years from the date of approval by the electors of the county or municipality, and may be renewable by referendum as provided by general law.  
(d) By general law and subject to conditions specified therein, there may be granted an ad valorem tax exemption to a renewable energy source device and to real property on which such device is installed and operated, to the value fixed by general law not to exceed the original cost of the device, and for the period of time fixed by general law not to exceed ten years.  
(e) Any county or municipality may, for the purpose of its respective tax levy and subject to the provisions of this subsection and general law, grant historic preservation ad valorem tax exemptions to owners of historic properties. This exemption may be granted only by ordinance of the county or municipality. The amount or limits of the amount of this exemption and the requirements for eligible properties must be specified by general law. The period of time for which this exemption may be granted to a property owner shall be determined by general law.

(f) Legislative review of the tax on sales, use, and other transactions.—There is hereby created a joint committee consisting of six senators appointed by the President of the Senate and six representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, which committee shall conduct a review of all exemptions from the tax on sales, use, and other transactions imposed by law and all exclusions of sales of services from such taxation. The committee shall be governed by joint rules adopted by the legislature no later than the 2003 regular session pursuant to the authority to adopt rules under section 4 of Article III. Such rules shall establish a schedule for review of such exemptions and exclusions over a three-year period and shall provide criteria to be considered by the committee in conducting its review. No later than March 1 of 2004, 2005, and 2006, the committee shall submit its findings and recommendations to the presiding officers of each house of the legislature. Any decision to deauthorize an exemption or exclusion must be approved by seven members of the committee and shall be in the form of a resolution adopted by the committee, which shall be submitted to the legislature. The resolution shall set forth the specific changes to the statutes necessary to effectuate the deauthorization, which resolution shall have the force of law and shall become effective July 1 following the second regular session occurring after submission to the legislature, except for those exemptions or exclusions expressly rescinded by joint resolution of the legislature prior to that date. This section does not operate to deauthorize any exemption or exclusion not expressly deauthorized in such resolution, nor does it prohibit subsequent reenactment by law of any exemption or exclusion that was deauthorized. The joint committee is dissolved July 1, 2006.

NO. 6  
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
ARTICLE X, SECTION 20  
(Initiative)

BALLOT TITLE: Protect People from the Health Hazards of Second-Hand Tobacco Smoke by Prohibiting Workplace Smoking

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** To protect people from the health hazards of second-hand tobacco smoke, this amendment prohibits tobacco smoking in enclosed indoor workplaces. Allows exceptions for private residences except when they are being used to provide commercial child care, adult care or health care. Also allows exceptions for retail tobacco shops, designated smoking guest rooms at hotels and other public lodging establishments, and stand-alone bars. Provides definitions, and requires the legislature to promptly implement this amendment.

FULL TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF FLORIDA THAT:**  
WHEREAS, second-hand tobacco smoke is a known human carcinogen (contains cancer-causing agents) for which there is no safe level of exposure, and causes death and disease; WHEREAS, exposure to second-hand tobacco smoke frequently occurs in the workplace; and WHEREAS, ventilation and filtration systems do not remove the cancer-causing substances from second-hand smoke; NOW, THEREFORE, to protect people from the health hazards of second-hand tobacco smoke, the citizens of Florida hereby amend Article X of the Florida Constitution to add the following as section 20:  
**SECTION 20. Workplaces Without Tobacco Smoke.**—

(a) **Prohibition.** As a Florida health initiative to protect people from the health hazards of second-hand tobacco smoke, tobacco smoking is prohibited in enclosed indoor workplaces.

(b) **Exceptions.** As further explained in the definitions below, tobacco smoking may be permitted in private residences whenever they are not being used commercially to provide child care, adult care, or health care, or any combination thereof; and further may be permitted in retail tobacco shops, designated smoking guest rooms at hotels and other public lodging establishments; and stand-alone bars. However, nothing in this section or in its implementing legislation or regulations shall prohibit the owner, lessee, or other person in control of the use of an enclosed indoor workplace from further prohibiting or limiting smoking therein.

(c) **Definitions.** For purposes of this section, the following words and terms shall have the stated meanings:

"Smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning, carrying, or possessing any lighted tobacco product, including cigarettes, cigars, pipe tobacco, and any other lighted tobacco product.

"Second-hand smoke," also known as environmental tobacco smoke (ETS), means smoke emitted from lighted, smoldering, or burning tobacco when the smoker is not inhaling; smoke emitted at the mouthpiece during puff drawing; and smoke exhaled by the smoker.

"Work" means any person's providing any employment or employment-type service for or at the request of another individual or individuals or any public or private entity, whether for compensation or not, whether full or part-time, whether legally or not. "Work" includes, without limitation, any such service performed by an employee, independent contractor, agent, partner, proprietor, manager, officer, director, apprentice, trainee, associate, servant, volunteer, and the like.

"Enclosed indoor workplace" means any place where one or more persons engages in work, and which place is predominantly or totally bounded on all sides and above by physical barriers, regardless of whether such barriers consist of or include uncovered openings, screened or otherwise partially covered openings; or open or closed windows, shutters, doors, or the like. This section applies to all such enclosed indoor workplaces without regard to whether work is occurring at any given time.

"Commercial" use of a private residence means any time during which the owner, lessee, or other person occupying or controlling the use of the private residence is furnishing in the private residence, or causing or allowing to be furnished in the private residence, child care, adult care, or health care, or any combination thereof, and receiving or expecting to receive compensation therefor.

"Retail tobacco shop" means any enclosed indoor workplace dedicated to or predominantly for the retail sale of tobacco, tobacco products, and accessories for such products, in which the sale of other products or services is merely incidental.

"Designated smoking guest rooms at public lodging establishments" means the sleeping rooms and directly associated private areas, such as bathrooms, living rooms, and kitchen areas, if any, rented to guests for their exclusive transient occupancy in public lodging establishments including hotels, motels, resort condominiums, transient apartments, transient lodging establishments, rooming houses, boarding houses, resort dwellings, bed and breakfast inns, and the like; and designated by the person or persons having management authority over such public lodging establishment as rooms in which smoking may be permitted.

"Stand-alone bar" means any place of business devoted during any time of operation predominantly or totally to serving alcoholic beverages, intoxicating beverages, or intoxicating liquors, or any combination thereof, for consumption on the licensed premises; in which the serving of food, if any, is merely incidental to the consumption of any such beverage; and that is not located within, and does not share any common entryway or common indoor area with, any other enclosed indoor workplace including any business for which the sale of food or any other product or service is more than an incidental source of gross revenue.

(d) **Legislation.** In the next regular legislative session occurring after voter approval of this amendment, the Florida Legislature shall adopt legislation to implement this amendment in a manner consistent with its broad purpose and stated terms, and having an effective date no later than July 1 of the year following voter approval. Such legislation shall include, without limitation, civil penalties for violations of this section; provisions for administrative enforcement; and the requirement and authorization of agency rules for implementation and enforcement. Nothing herein shall preclude the Legislature from enacting any law constituting or allowing a more restrictive regulation of tobacco smoking than is provided in this section.

BALLOT TITLE: Exemption for Construction of Living Quarters for Parents or Grandparents

**BALLOT SUMMARY:** Proposes an amendment to the State Constitution to allow counties to exempt from taxation an increase in the assessed value of homestead property resulting from constructing living quarters for a parent or grandparent of the property owner or the property owner's spouse who is 62 years old or older. Limits the amount of such exemption to the increase in assessed value resulting from such construction or 20 percent of the total assessed value of the property as improved, whichever is less.

FULL TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

ARTICLE VII  
FINANCE AND TAXATION

**SECTION 4. Taxation; assessments.**—By general law regulations shall be prescribed which shall secure a just valuation of all property for ad valorem taxation, provided:

(a) Agricultural land, land producing high water recharge to Florida's aquifer, or land used exclusively for noncommercial non-commercial recreational purposes may be classified by general law and assessed solely on the basis of character or use.

(b) Pursuant to general law tangible personal property held for sale as stock in trade and livestock may be valued for taxation at a specified percentage of its value, may be classified for tax purposes, or may be exempted from taxation.

(c) All persons entitled to a homestead exemption under Section 6 of this Article shall have their homestead assessed at just value as of January 1 of the year following the effective date of this amendment. This assessment shall change only as provided herein.

(1) Assessments subject to this provision shall be changed annually on January 1<sup>st</sup> of each year; but those changes in assessments shall not exceed the lower of the following:

1(A) Three percent (3%) of the assessment for the prior year.

1(B) The percent change in the Consumer Price Index for all urban consumers, U.S. City Average, all items 1967=100, or successor reports for the preceding calendar year as initially reported by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics.

(2) No assessment shall exceed just value.

(3) After any change of ownership, as provided by general law, homestead property shall be assessed at just value as of January 1 of the following year. Thereafter, the homestead shall be assessed as provided herein.

(4) New homestead property shall be assessed at just value as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the year following the establishment of the homestead. That assessment shall only change as provided herein.

(5) Changes, additions, reductions, or improvements to homestead property shall be assessed as provided for by general law; provided, however, after the adjustment for any change, addition, reduction, or improvement, the property shall be assessed as provided herein.

(6) In the event of a termination of homestead status, the property shall be assessed as provided by general law.

(7) The provisions of this amendment are severable. If any of the provisions of this amendment shall be held unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, the decision of such court shall not affect or impair any remaining provisions of this amendment.

(d) The legislature may, by general law, for assessment purposes and subject to the provisions of this subsection, allow counties and municipalities to authorize by ordinance that historic property may be assessed solely on the basis of character or use. Such character or use assessment shall apply only to the jurisdiction adopting the ordinance. The requirements for eligible properties must be specified by general law.

(e) A county may, in the manner prescribed by general law, provide for a reduction in the assessed value of homestead property to the extent of any increase in the assessed





# Salvation Army service continues for September 11 victims

According to recently released statistics, The Salvation Army assisted more than 121,000 people in the almost one year since the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, providing grief and mental health counseling, financial assistance, and other basic social services.

## Civil Air Patrol to conduct mission pilot check flights

The DeLand Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol (CAP) will be conducting check flights for members who are pilots on August 31, 2002.

Six aircraft will be flying in from around the state with CAP officials to test the skills of CAP pilots. Flying skills for a number of different missions CAP members perform include slow flight, precision tracking and emergency radio beacon searching.

The Civil Air Patrol is the United States Air Force Auxiliary. The CAP's three main missions include Emergency Services (Search and Rescue, and Disaster Relief), the Cadet Program (leadership training for young people age 12-18), and Aerospace Education (to further public awareness of the history and advances in aviation and space exploration).

The Civil Air Patrol was created in December, 1941 and quickly became the mainstay of coastal patrols of the United States. During WWII, the CAP was responsible for the sinking of at least two German U-Boats, and for doing serious damage to countless others. After the war, a high-ranking German military official confirmed that U-Boat patrols off the coast of the US were halted as a result.

The CAP was on site directly after the 9/11 attacks, providing the first reconnaissance photos used by emergency agencies for damage assessment, as well as transporting much needed blood and supplies, and securing crop duster aircraft from terrorists across the country.

 tive and burdensome to an already overburdened justice system; it is also costly.

According to Giuliani, it costs between \$25,000 and \$40,000 per year to incarcerate a misdemeanor offender. However, it costs between \$12,000 and \$15,000 for community-based treatment per year for the same offender.

A few years ago, a small group of individuals from Seminole Community Mental Health Center Inc., decided to find a treatment solution for people suffering from dual diagnosis — taking the burden away from law enforcement. They approached state Rep. David Meador about sponsoring a bill allocating funds to the Seminole project.

"David Meador took the ball on the house side, and then Sen. Lee Constantine picked it up in the Senate," said James Berko, Seminole Community Mental Health Center Inc. executive director. "The bill got the backing of House Speaker Tom Feeney, and he really punched it through."

The program received more than \$300,000 in state funding and about \$100,000 in local matching funds. According to Giuliani, the program's staff is also aggressively pursuing grants for the new treatment alternative in Seminole.

Services in the Dual Diagnosis Program include assessment/psychological evaluations, crisis stabilization, detoxification, inpatient treatment, out-patient treatment, case management, vocational rehabilitation and day treatment. In-patient clients are usually referred to the program through the court system or law enforcement agencies.

"Individuals charged with a low-level misdemeanor may be diverted from jail to our program," Giuliani said. "Here, we can offer them help with their substance abuse and make them realize the importance of the

proper medication for their mental illness."

The in-patient treatment lasts a minimum of 45 days, and longer if needed, Giuliani said. Each client works with a personalized team comprised of psychological and substance abuse professionals.

"During the treatment, the client establishes their personal goals, and our staff tries to make those goals happen," Giuliani said.

Although the program's focus is treatment for dual diagnosis, it also offers clients vocational training and GED courses.

"We want to see the re-integration of the homeless into society," Giuliani said. "We want them to go from living on the streets to becoming a member of society and holding a job."

Although it is too early to measure the success of the program in its entirety, there have been numerous personal success stories.

"One of our first clients was a homeless man, who was either in his late 50s or early 60s — it was hard to tell," Giuliani said. "He was picked up on trespassing charges; and when he got here, he was catatonic. But, he slowly began to open up.

"We learned he had family in Michigan and had been reported missing 10 years ago," she said. "He was presumed dead."

The man stayed in the program for 10 months. Last month, he flew back to Detroit, Mich., and was reunited with his family.

"It's stories like this that make the whole thing worthwhile," Giuliani said. "It makes the job very rewarding."

 Monday. Commissioner Whitey Eckstein was sick, so the commission continued the meeting until 7 p.m. Thursday so each commissioner will participate in the decision.

Mayor Brady Lessard has said he is opposed to rebidding the project and believes the city must move forward with Riverwalk because it is a vital component in revitalizing downtown.

"The people of Sanford are tired of hearing us talk about the Riverwalk," Lessard said. "I think the city commission should take under advisement the recommendation of the CRA to go with the next bidder. Those five people feel as strongly and have followed this process as closely as the city commission."

Commissioner Art Woodruff said it's a tough decision for commissioners.

"I think you have to weigh whether you think we could save

enough money to justify the delay," Woodruff said. "I don't think we should leave the Riverwalk half done."

Projections by VanDerworp indicate the CRA could bond up to \$3 million for projects. City Commissioner Art Woodruff, whose district includes the downtown/waterfront area, cautioned against dipping too deeply into the CRA's bonding capability.

"I don't want the CRA to lose the ability to fund other projects that are needed in downtown," Woodruff said.

Lessard agreed. "I think it's great that the CRA members share the city commission's view about the importance of the Riverwalk," Lessard said. "That's a great spirit of cooperation, but I'm hopeful that the city can identify funds that will make the CRA's participation as minimal as possible. They've got their own projects to fund."

Monday, Aug. 26, Seminole County Property Appraiser H.W. "Bill" Suber mailed 156,000 Notices of Proposed Property Taxes (TRIMS) for 2002, to taxpayers. The notice represents estimated values for property as of January 1, 2002.

The 2002 Preliminary Just (Market) Value for Seminole County is \$23,623,757,674. This represents a 10.96 percent increase in value over the past year. The 2002 Preliminary Taxable Value for Seminole County is \$18,401,147,317. This represents an 8.59 percent increase over the past year. These percentages represent an overall increase but may not be reflective of individual property values.

For the first time, a new service is available for taxpayers to view "on line" the 2002 Notices of Proposed Property Taxes. This may be accomplished by accessing [www.scpafl.org](http://www.scpafl.org) and following the

simple directions from the Property Appraiser's Home Page using "Record Search".

When asked about this new feature, Mr. Suber said he is confident, "this innovative use of web technology will efficiently provide information to the public enabling them to view and print their proposed tax notice." Taxpayers without Internet access may receive a duplicate copy of their notice by contacting the Customer Service Department at the Property Appraiser's office.

Questions regarding property value or how it was determined may be answered by contacting the Property Appraiser's office at 407-665-7506. Additional questions regarding proposed taxes, budgets or other assessments should be addressed directly to the taxing authorities. Their phone numbers are listed on the Notice of Proposed Taxes. The Property Appraiser has no role in establishing tax rates or levying special non-ad valorem assessments.

The Lake Mary and Oviedo girls got the earliest start, playing their opening rounds on Monday.

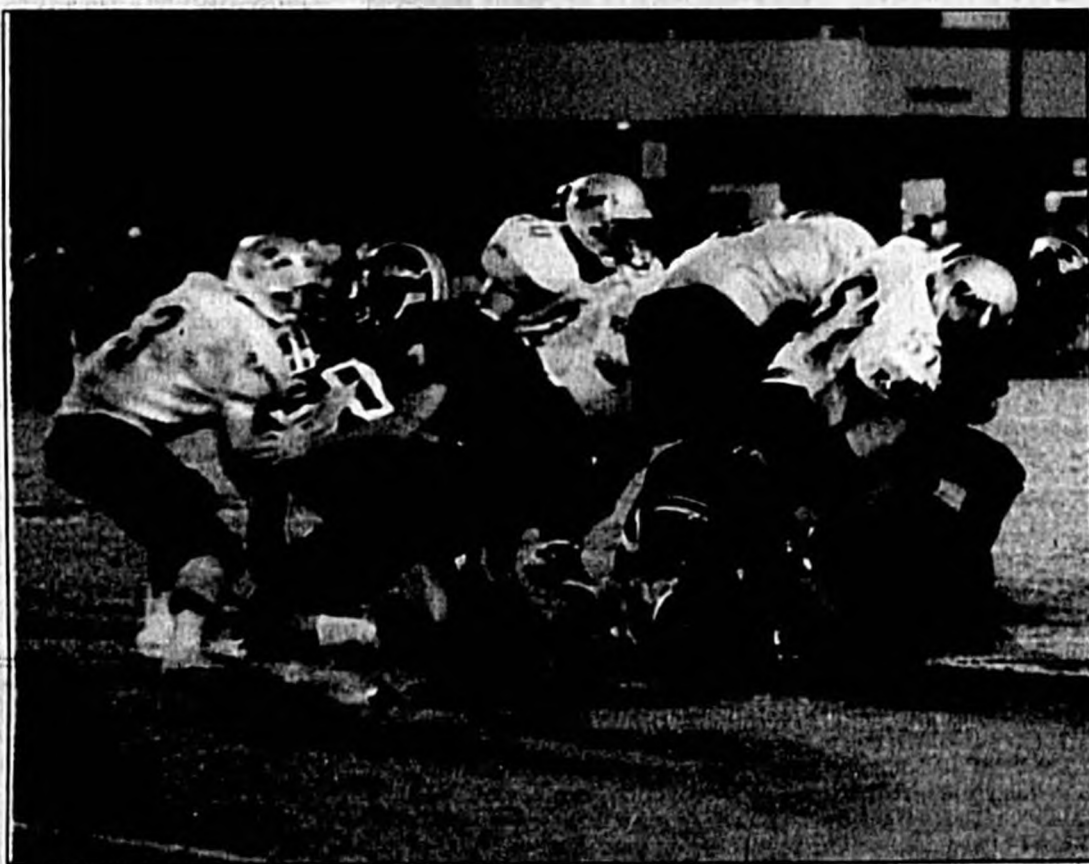
The schedule hit high gear on Tuesday with both the boys and girls teams from all of the schools playing.

## Boaters could face problems from heat

ALEXANDRIA, VA. — With Labor Day fast approaching, July and August's hot oven-like temperatures across much of America could spell trouble for some boaters over this holiday weekend, said BoatU.S., the nation's largest association of recreational boat owners.

If you haven't run the boat a lot this summer, there's a potential for gasoline to 'go bad' or oxidize in the tank, said Bob Adriaance, director of BoatU.S. Technical Services Division. Unfortunately, the first sign of the oxidized gas — which can eventually turn to a gooey sludge — is a coughing, sputtering engine. Adding an off-the-shelf stabilizer to suspect gas before you go out on Labor Day will not resolve the problem. The same is true with diesel fuel — adding a microbicide also won't restore bad fuel. Such treatments need to be added before fuel goes bad, not afterwards.

Other than draining the tanks — an expensive proposition — most boaters will simply elect to run whatever fuel that's been in the tank through the engine. Jerry Cardarelli, vice president of BoatU.S. Towing Services, advises that if you think your fuel may be old, you may want to travel with other boaters, within range of on-the-water help, and bring some extra replacement fuel filters.

Another concern for those who haven't boated in a while is that we all forget routines that we haven't regularly performed, says Ruth Wood, vice president of the BoatU.S. Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water. Wood recommends that boaters take their time before casting off this See Outdoors, Page 2B

## JEWEL OF NORTH-EAST FLORIDA

Nassau Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in extreme north-east Florida may just be one of the state's best kept hunting secrets. Situated between Yulee to the east and Callahan to the west, the 25,000-acre WMA offers hunters an excellent opportunity to bag a whitetail buck in an area of planted pines, hardwood forests and swamp bottom habitat.  
 In order to hunt on Nassau WMA, hunters must apply for and receive a recreational use permit which costs only \$197 for the 2002-03 hunting season.  
 "The good news is, there are still about 190 permits available as of August 15," said Joy M. Hill, public information coordinator for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation

Commission (FWC). "However, it's only mid-August and I suspect that once people start getting into the hunting frame-of-mind, those remaining permits will go fast."  
 Lt. Mike Edwards, a law enforcement supervisor for the FWC, has lived and worked in Nassau County for a long time. He says the WMA is loaded with deer and squirrel, and hunters should take advantage of the opportunity to hunt there.  
 "The average hunting lease in Nassau County costs about \$500 per year per hunter. The hunting at Nassau WMA is as good or better than most of those private hunt clubs for a fraction of the cost," said Edwards.  
 "Unfortunately, people have the perception that since it's a public hunting area it's not as good as a private club but that's simply not true in this case."

He thinks one of the reasons the WMA has such an outstanding deer population is because access is extremely limited and allowed only during the hunting season to those who hold a valid recreational use permit.  
 "The gates are unlocked a week before the opening of archery season and remain open throughout the hunting season. After that, they are locked for the rest of the year," said Edwards.  
 For those willing to pay \$197 for a permit, there are many hunting opportunities: Archery

from Sept. 21 through Oct. 20; Muzzleloading Gun from Oct. 25-27; General Gun from Nov. 9 through Jan. 5; Small Game from Jan. 6 through March 2; Spring Turkey from March 15 through April 20; and Trapping from Jan. 6 through March 1.  
 "This is really an exceptional place to hunt," said Edwards.  
 Christopher L. Inman knows that. Last year during archery season he bagged an 8-point buck at Nassau WMA that qualified for the Florida Buck Registry with a score of 129 7/8".

While there is no camping allowed on the property, there are campgrounds within a few miles in the Yulee and Callahan area.  
 To apply for a recreational use permit to hunt on Nassau WMA, download one from the FWC's website at <http://wild.fwc.state.fl.us/hunting/pdf/rec-use-application.pdf>, or call the FWC's Northeast Region office at 352-732-1225 for an application. Applications are also available at Nassau and Duval county tax collector offices.

 great thrill to be able to compete against one of his teams, and I look forward to shaking his hand at the end of the game. It will be something I will always remember."  
 The junior quarterback has seen limited action since late last week due to soreness in his shoulder, but is aware that the rest was precautionary and his arm is ready for the season.  
 "My arm feels as good as it did at the start camp," stated Schneider. "I was able to put some zip on the ball and was able to make it explode out of my hand. I would not miss this; we are all looking forward to the challenge."  
 The team will continue to prepare throughout the week and will get an early start on things. Due to a brooding weather forecast and the possibility of afternoon washouts, the Golden Knights will be up before the sun to take the field from approximately 5:15 a.m. to 7:15 a.m. allowing the players enough time to make their morning classes.  
 The opener will be televised live this Saturday (Aug. 31) at 12:10 p.m. on ESPN.  
**NO SURPRISES AT GOLDEN KNIGHT CLASSIC**  
 The outcome was never in doubt, but UCF coach Mike Kruczek saw what he wanted Saturday at UCF's Golden Knight Classic scrimmage at the Citrus Bowl.  
 The event was a scripted game, right down to the final score that had UCF's varsity defeating the scout team 28-23. The 90-minute simulated game in helmets and shoulder pads encompassed 37 plays for the varsity offense and 30 plays for the varsity defense.  
 Prior to the game the players went through what will be their pre-game routine from the time they wake up to the time the game is over, including getting taped, meeting with their coaches, warming up and playing the game.  
 "The guys got an idea of the kind of routine they are going to go through when we play Penn State next week," Kruczek said. "There are going to be a lot of nerves going into that situation so we had to rehearse everything that could happen in a football game. I know the people sitting in the stands probably didn't realize what we were trying to get accomplished with snaps over the punter's head and all that went on, but you really have to go through those situations before you get into the battle in the first game so that you don't suffer the mistakes that can happen early in the season."  
 The game did not go completely as planned as the scout team scored a legitimate touchdown against the varsity for the first time in recent memory. On a scout team drive that was supposed to result in a field goal, Brandon Marshall caught a long touchdown pass from Gerry Connell. As if that play never happened, though, the scout team lined up to kick a field goal on the next play.  
 Afterward Kruczek joked about the touchdown pass that was not scripted. "I told the defense we've never been scored on in this game and I don't intend to be scored on," he said. "On the script you are scored on, but that's not supposed to happen in execution out there."  
 Several key players sat out the scrimmage while recovering from injury, including starting quarterback Ryan Schneider, leaving Brian Miller to take all the snaps for the varsity. Schneider is expected back to practice Monday after resting a shoulder bothered by tendonitis.  
**TICKET SALES CONTINUE TO RISE**  
 With a less than a week before UCF's season opener at Penn State, and still a month before the first home game, UCF's season ticket sales have already topped the 12,000 mark and are expected

to soon exceed last year's final total of 12,467. At the close of business Thursday, the ticket count had reached 12,044.  
 "We've seen a steady increase in ticket sales in the weeks leading up to this point." UCF Athletics Ticket Manager Shawn Potts said. "If the demand for season tickets continues to grow as the first home game draws near, we could pass the 14,000 mark."  
 With a win in any of UCF's first three road games, all of which are on television, that number is expected to go even higher. With an 0-3 record before its first home game in 1997, interest in tickets skyrocketed after UCF lost a close game to eventual national champion Nebraska. Fans waited in long lines all week to purchase tickets for the home game against Idaho. A record crowd of more than 41,000 showed up at that night as UCF went on to average a school record 29,585 fans per game.  
 "A lot of fans do not sense any urgency to buy season tickets at this time because we plays in such a large stadium," UCF sports marketing director Gert Garman said. "If you take a good look at the numbers, though, there are more reasons than not to buy season tickets now. Soon enough, all the best seats will be sold out."  
 Despite the fact the Florida Citrus Bowl, has permanent seating for 66,000, and with temporary seating can hold as much as 70,000, some of the best areas are already sold out. The lower-level priority seating on the west side (home) of the stadium is already full and other sections are not far behind.  
 Because the upper-level seats are not available for advance sales, and the student section accounts for a large portion of seating on the east side, there are less than 8,500 sideline tickets remaining before all the sideline seating is sold out. That number will continue to shrink in the coming weeks.  
 In addition to the attention that will be generated by the beginning of the season, Garman hopes to spark interest in tickets with a carefully planned marketing campaign that includes a television commercial that will begin airing this past weekend.  
 "We are targeting young UCF alumni and the general sports fan, as well as entire families," Garman said. "UCF football is a great entertainment value. There are season ticket options to fit into a variety of budgets and the games are a fun atmosphere."  
 The six-game ticket package is only \$102 for reserved sideline and just \$72 for end zone seating. A family of four can purchase a season ticket package for the entire year for \$150, which is a tremendous savings. Possibly the best deal is the one targeted toward young alumni. Those who have graduated from UCF in the past five years can purchase a season ticket for just \$30.  
 After spending the past 23 seasons as an independent, UCF, finally has a conference to call home. That in itself will give fans to cheer about this year. The Golden Knights joined the Mid-American Conference and will begin conference play this season. They will have the opportunity to play for the MAC title as well as the league's bowl game slots.  
 The season kicks off at Penn State Aug. 31 in a game televised nationally on ESPN. The team will play at Arizona State on Sunshine Network, and at Marshall on ESPN2, before its home opener against Liberty Sept. 28. Another non-conference game against Syracuse and games against four MAC teams, including defending champion Toledo, round out the six-game home schedule.

## Magic exercise option on Miller

**ORLANDO** — The Orlando Magic have exercised their option on forward-guard Mike Miller, General Manager John Gabriel announced Friday. Per team policy, terms of the deal are not disclosed.

Miller (6'8", 218, 2/19/80) appeared in 63 regular season games with the Magic last season, averaging 15.2 ppg., 4.3 rpg. and 3.1 apg. in 33.7 minpg. He also made 53 starts, averaging 15.5 ppg., 4.5 rpg. and 3.3 apg. in 34.8 minpg. during that span.

"We had until October 31 to exercise our option on Mike (Miller), but it wasn't necessary to wait that long," said Gabriel. "We are very excited to have him signed through the 2003-04 season."

During the 2001-02 campaign, Miller shot .383 (116-of-303)

(from beyond the three-point arc, ranking second on the team and 37th in the NBA. He scored in double figures 51 times, including a career-best 32 points on Nov. 24 vs. Charlotte. Miller scored 20-plus points 13 times. He led (or tied) the team in scoring 10 times, in rebounding seven times and in assists seven times.

Miller was named the 2000-01 NBA Rookie of the Year and was the lone unanimous selection to the 2000-01 NBA All-Rookie Team. During his rookie campaign, he was the only NBA rookie to play in all 82 games and averaged 11.9 ppg., 4.0 rpg. and 1.7 apg. in 29.1 minpg., while shooting .407 (148-of-364) from three-point range.

Originally selected in the first round (fifth overall) of the 2000 NBA Draft by Orlando, Miller has played in 145 career games, all with the Magic, averaging 13.3 ppg., 4.1 rpg. and 2.3 apg. in 31.1 minpg. He has connected on .396 (264-of-667) of his three-point attempts during his career.

**STEVEN HUNTER SUFFERS TORN KNEE LIGAMENT**

Orlando Magic forward-center Steven Hunter has suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) in his right knee, General Manager John Gabriel announced Monday. The injury occurred while Hunter was participating in Big Man Camp at The Basketball Academy in Bradenton, Florida. Following surgery (date TBD), Hunter is expected to be out four to six months.

Hunter (7'0", 220, 10/31/81) appeared in 53 regular season games during his rookie campaign with the Magic last season, averaging 3.6 ppg. and 1.8 rpg. in 9.7 minpg. He also made 21 starts, averaging 5.3 ppg., 3.1 rpg. and 1.52 blkpg. in 15.7 minpg. during that span.

Originally selected in the first round (15th overall) of the 2001 NBA Draft by Orlando, Hunter played two seasons at DePaul University. He finished third in

school history with 128 career blocked shots and in field goal percentage, shooting .586 from the floor.

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# Quarterbacks ready to let it fly in 2002

Will this be the year of the quarterback in Seminole County?

With the graduation of most of the top running backs from the 2001 season and with a good looking group of strong-armed youngsters who are not afraid to throw the ball, five of whom are veteran signal callers who started at least part of the time last year, the quarterback position could be the glamour position in the Seminole Athletic Conference this season.

Leading the way will be Lyman senior Victor Johnson, who established himself as one of the top quarterbacks in Central Florida last year, Oviedo's Lee Sloan, Lake Mary's Jon Clarke and Lake Brantley's Jonathan Venters, all of whom led their respective teams into the playoffs last year.

Johnson, 6-foot-4, 195-pounds can do it with both his arm and his feet as he passed for 601 yards and ran for another 1,370 as a junior. He also has one of the better receivers, senior Travo Woods, returning.

Sloan, who's father Frank was a standout athlete at Seminole High in the 1970's, did not begin 2001 as the starter but impressed the coaches enough to become the starter and played well enough to earn Honorable Mention in the Seminole Athletic Conference. Senior tight end Matt Lougee will probably be his favorite target, but seniors Robert Santilla and Joey Cameron and juniors Jason Raulerson and Charlie Parker are all capable receivers.

Venters led the Patriots to an undefeated record before being suffering a broken collarbone in the fifth game of the season. He did not play again in the regular season, but came off the bench in the

playoffs and led a comeback effort that very nearly let Lake Brantley upset Edgewater.

Seminole also has Carl Harris, who played parts of every game last year and even started a couple of games, but he is being pressured by newcomer Mike McKinzie who has shown great promise.

The two newest quarterbacks in the county, however, will also probably be under the most pressure.

Jacob Garcia will be behind center for coach Steve Katz's Winter Springs squad and he will be under the microscope because he has the top two returning receivers in the county in 2001 All-SAC selections Kyle Hill and Chris Narsesian. Narsesian, who has already committed to the University of Central Florida, transferred over to the Bears for his senior season after emerging as a standout at Lake Howell last season.

Sophomore Jeremy Francis will have the world on his shoulders at Lake Howell as the Silver Hawks have the county's only new head coach for this season in Tim Smith and also must find a way to score after losing All-SAC standouts in Brandon Marshall (UCF), Narsesian, fullback George Ashworth and running backs Dre Goree and John Williams. Not to mention the fact that Lake Howell plays in questionably the toughest district in Florida.

And while most teams, especially Winter Springs, are expected to throw the ball more, the running game has definitely not been forgotten.

At Lake Mary, coach Greg Stanton will have a stable of running backs led by senior Reggie Campbell who has rushed for 2,890 yards on 360 carries and scored 30 touchdowns in his first two seasons.

But he is far from the only Ram capable of leading the offense as seniors Derrick Grayson and Will Allison and junior Cameron Bateman all showed signs of brilliance at times last year.

At Oviedo, juniors Will Harrison and Brice Patrick were the top two rushers for coach Greg Register, but they will get pressure from juniors Travis Gallo, Johnny Girard and Brett Joyce and seniors Ladarin Rudolph and Howard Lingard, a transfer from Pine Ridge.

At Seminole, junior Deon Casey was outstanding at times last season, while seniors Chris Castillo and Tyler Flavin will add depth as the Tribe tries to replace several graduated stars.

As usual, defense and line play will also be strong in the county.

Lake Brantley senior Gordy Lipsey is the leader on the offensive line. The 6-foot-4, 265-pound three-year starter at center is being touted as one of the best ever in the SAC and is being heavily recruited by just about every name school in the country.

Lyman has a pair of 6-foot-3, 315-pounders in Dustin Stone and John Ford, Oviedo has 6-foot-4, 265-pound Matt Beard and Seminole has 6-foot-4, 252-pound Marcus Hubbard.

On defense, Oviedo's Clint McMillan, who is an honor student and concert pianist, is making the move from defensive line to outside linebacker. The 6-foot-3, 265-pounder impressed the University of Florida coaches enough in their camp this summer that he has already been offered a ride and has given his verbal acceptance.

Lake Mary all-county selection Keith Rivers is another terror at linebacker with his 6-foot-3, 220-pound frame.

The 2001 season did not go as well for the SAC schools as was hoped, with only three teams, Oviedo (8-3), Lake Brantley (7-4) and Winter Springs (6-4), recording winning records. But all seven of the schools were competitive in nearly

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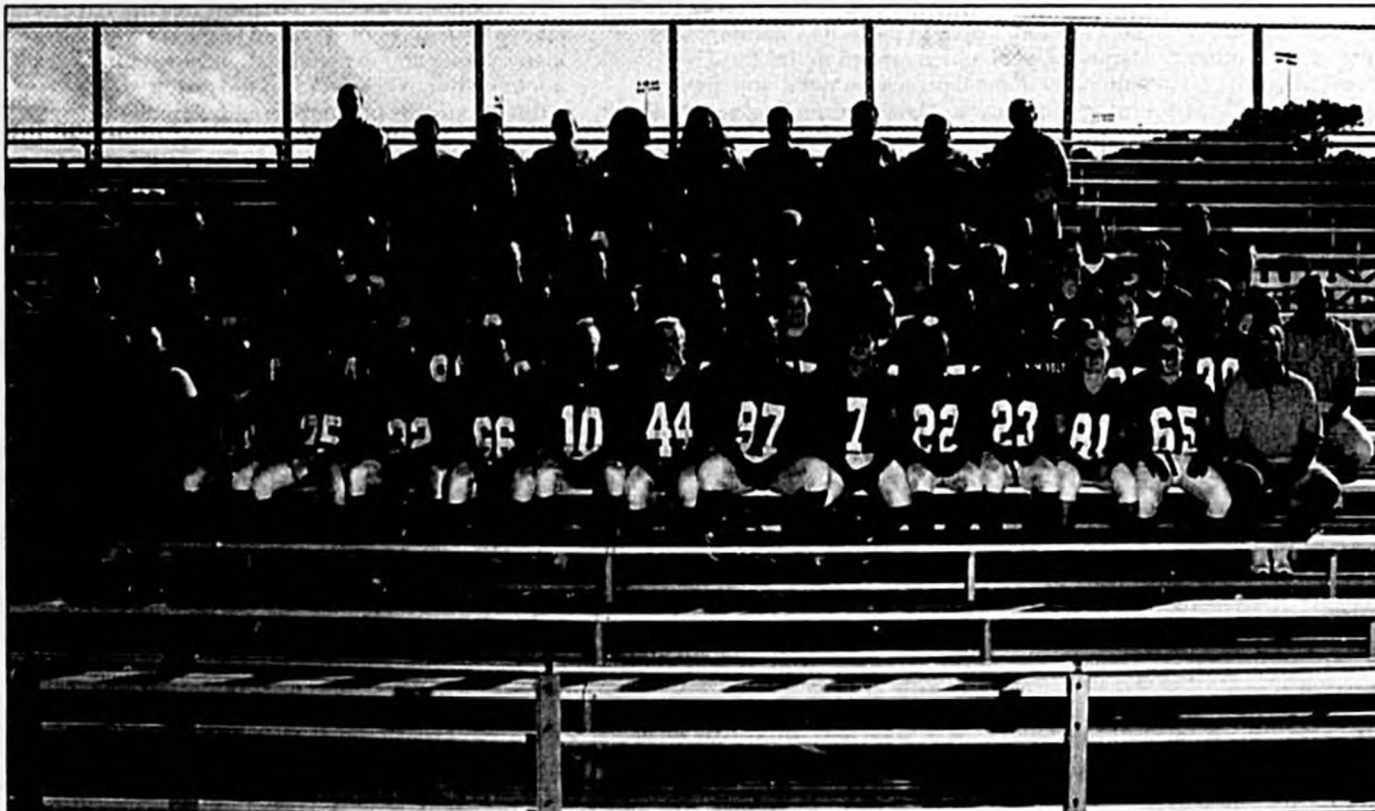

every game and showed that they could play with anyone. But with all seven also playing very difficult schedules and usually pounding on each other on a given Friday, it was still a successful year despite the final records.

This season doesn't figure to be any easier as it is the second year of the new district alignments and most of the non-SAC teams look to be strong.

In Class 6A-District 1 all three of the Jacksonville schools, Mandarin, Sandalwood and Ed White, are rumored to be very strong and DeLand is expected to be much stronger this season.

In Class 5A-District 3 Mainland and Spruce Creek

are always strong.

And then comes Class 4A-District 5, which features Palm Bay High School, which won 12 straight games before losing in the State Championship Game last year and is ranked in the Top Five nationally in most preseason polls, and always strong programs in New Smyrna Beach and Merritt Island.

"I don't think we've ever played a stronger schedule," said Lake Brantley head coach George Clayton. "It may be the toughest in the state. Oviedo is loaded and we hear the Jacksonville teams are all strong and we have to go up there twice this season after beating one team by one point and beating the other in overtime. DeLand is

going to be stronger this season and Apopka is always very good."

As mentioned by Clayton, most coaches have tabbed Oviedo as the favorite in the county with so many young and experienced players returning, not to mention 35 seniors on the roster.

But opponents had better not overlook Lake Mary, which returns eight starters on defense and has by far the best running attack, allowing the Rams to control the game.

A darkhorse figures to be Winter Springs, where second-year head coach Steve Katz finally has some depth and the Bears are still flying high after making the playoffs for the first time in school history last season.
