Longwood to begin interviews

LONGWOOD - Friday morning Longwood City Commissioners will kick off interviews with city administrator applicants.

Commissioners plan to meet at 9 a.m. with the four candidates selected for personal

interviews for the \$56,000 a year job. The commissioners hope to meet with all the candidates informally throughout the day to get to know them individually. The city administrator applicants may also get the oppor-

tunity to look at Longwood. Beginning at 5:10 p.m. Friday, the commission will conduct 20-minute interviews with each candidate in the commission chambers of city hall during a work session.

The commissioners will conduct a special meeting at 5 p.m. approving the funds related to the interview process, such as airline fares, hotel expenses, rental car fees and meals.

The four candidates being interviewed are Douglas A. Clark, Pella, lowa; W. Shelton Smith, LaGrange, Ga.; Dodd A. Southern, Miami Springs, and Larry D. Stoever, Greenville, Ill.

Town meeting addresses garbage

GENEVA - A town meeting tonight will present the pros and cons of mandatory garbage collection in the unincorporated areas of Seminote County. The debate between mandatory proponent commissioner Daryl McLain and opponent commissioner Larry Furlong will be held at Geneva Community Center, beginning at 7 p.m. The meeting is open to all residents.

Since the county's new garbage collection program began in 1990, commissioners have debated whether to have a mandatory collection program or not. In general, suburban residents prefer the program, largely to reduce littering and illegal dumping in their neighborhoods. But many rural residents oppose the system because they haul their own garbage.

McLain supports the mandatory collection program to reduce costs and improve service. Furlong opposes it, saying costs will be lowest under a free-market system.

Interactive TV trial delayed

Time Warner Cable postponed a high-profile test of advanced two-way TV services like movies-on-demand and home shopping because the technology isn't ready.

The Time Warner Inc. unit on Tuesday delayed the test in the Orlando area, from next month to at least October while refinements are made in the TV set control box and the computer software that runs it.

Stopping the violence

Schools stress added skills to thwart conflict

SANFORD - The idea of turning young people away from violent solutions to conflict has, over the last few years, become a "hot topic."

Schools have begun to teach conflict management skills, conflict mediation and negotiation skills as a part of the curriculum.

In Seminole County, the schools have all been declared weapon-free zones and the district has begun to strictly enforce its bans on fighting and possession of weapons.

In March, to focus attention on the Violence Free Community Month, which began as a celebration in Seminole and Orange counties last year, the district is asking the schools to encourage students to put into practice what they have learned about violence-free living. "We're seeing the schools promote this in many

ways," said Mary Balk, a district drug prevention specialist, who is helping to coordinate the event in the schools.

Seminole County schools don't limit their violence, drug and crime reduction celebrations to the month of March.

School resource officers are developing plans to help students find out about the hazards they may face in school and in the community and to let them combat those situations peacefully and

At Milwee Middle School, for example, Deputy Tony Diaz has begun a Youth Crimewatch program. At Tuskawilla Middle School, Deputy Wendell Bradford has started to produce a weekly crime talk show on the school's closed circuit television station.

"Our deputies are working very hard to develop: programs to help the students they work with." Undersheriff Steve Harriett said. "They are designing creative programs.

Diaz said the Milwee students are "ready to clean up their school." They are, he said, taking a new pride in the school community, in themselves, and in each other.

Diaz said his program is not completely original, though it is the first of its kind in the central Florida area. See Watch, Page 5A



TAMPA - Mayor Sandy Freedman has banned gun shows from the Tampa Convention Center, saying she wants to avoid sending a mixed signal to residents worried about unregulated

The neighborhoods are concerned about guns and most Floridians are concerned about guns," said Freedman spokesman John Dunn. "When we're trying to cut down on crimes committed with guns, it sends a mixed signal if we allow gun sales in a public facility."

Gun show promoters in Tampa and Fort Lauderdale were notified two weeks ago of the mayor's decision.

The mayor does not want Tampa's buildings to be used by unlicensed dealers who can avoid the state's three-day waiting period and criminal background checks, said Joe Abrahams, a top Freedman alde.

"If you're trying to combat crime, why would you want to have a gun show to promote the sale of guns?" Abrahams said. Last month, Clearwater city commissioners banned gun shows from city buildings. Houston and Norfolk, Va., have enacted similar bans, and a similar ban is being considered in Jacksonville. The Florida State Fair Authority allows only licensed dealers at its shows.

Marion Hammer, a lobbyist for the National Rifle Association and Unified Sportsmen of Florida, said the NRA believes city bans is illegal because it violates a state law prohibiting zoning designed to restrict firearms sales.

Arrest made for issuing illegal licenses

CLEWISTON - A former examiner with the state Division of Driver Licenses has been charged with selling illegal Florida

driver licenses to illegal aliens and others, police said. Darlene A. Vanoers, 43, of Clewiston, was charged Wednesday with four counts of issuing fraudulent driver licenses. She was released from Hendry County Jail after posting \$1,500 bond.

The investigation into Vanoers began seven months ago after Florida Highway Patrol troopers received a tip licenses were being sold for \$300 at the Clewiston office of the state Division

of Driver Licenses, said FHP Lt. Ernest Rainey. 'We were told they were primarily being sold to Mexicans. illegal allens and those who could not pass the test," Rainey

Authorities have yet to prove Vanoers took money for the driver licenses, or how many fraudulent licenses were sold. Rainey said other people possibly are involved and the case remains under investigation.

Vanoers resigned from her job Nov. 19, one day after authorities used a hidden camera to videotape her issuing driver licenses to four people without having them take a driving test. Rainey said.

State law requires a person to complete a written exam, eye test and driving test before being issued a license.

Vanoers was fired Wednesday as an auxiliary police officer with the Clewiston Police Department. She had worked there

Vanoers' husband is a corporal with the department.

Winter Park couple awarded \$2.2 million

ORLANDO - A federal jury has awarded \$2.2 million to the owners of a family company who claimed its chief competitor,

Shari and Bill Elmer's family business in Winter Park makes

the popular signs used by Pizza Hut and Domino's Pizza and other businesses. For five years, they claimed, they were copied by ICC Fabricating of Ferndale, Mich. "They've been bothering us for five years copying what we do." Shari Elmer said after the decision Wednesday. "I'm glad

the jury told them they can't copy our signs anymore.' ICC Fabricating was ordered to pay \$1.2 million in damages and a \$1 million punitive award for infringing on Bill Elmer's patent for two types of signs.

During the two-week trial in Orlando, company attorney Bernard Cantor disputed that ICC copied the signs.

The Elmers, operators of HTH Inc., have made automobile-mounted aigns since 1985. Their attorney, Herb Allen of Orlando, said the couple was first to sell triangular signs that mount on a car roof with magnets and straps.

HTH sued in Orlando in 1989 and won a settlement against ICC. Allen said. Then ICC began to produce a window-mounted sign that Bill Elmer also claims to have invented. Allen said the ICC-made duplicates turned up at trade shows and in magazines using advertising similar to HTH.

The Elmers sued again in 1992, seeking royalties and profits earned on the signs by ICC and punitive damages.

Lawmakers look at bonuses for welfare birth control

TALLAHASSEE - A proposal to pay welfare recipients to use birth control barely survived a House panel, which first defeated the legislation on a tie vote then agreed to reconsider the bill next week.

Women could get \$100 every three months for 10 years if they use birth control in a pilot project set up under the measure. (CS-HB 1451). Men could get a single \$500 payment for vasectomies.

To be eligible, women must be on welfare or have an income below \$10.587.50. Instead of cash bonuses, they could also opt for annual \$400 vouchers that could be used for dental work or education.

Men would have to be between 21 and 30 and have an income below \$10.587.50.

Rep. George Albright, one of the bill's sponsors, told the Aging and Human Services Committee that lawmakers owed It to the state and nation to try creative ideas to stem the number of births to single and teen-age parents.

One of every three children now born in Florida has unwed parents, according to the Ocala Republican. He also said in the last six years, two of every three new state dollars went into Medicald, the joint federal-state health care program for welfare recipients.

Children born to poverty face an "ugly, ugly future." Albright

"A lot of us are concerned that some of our past welfare policies have used economic incentives to promote things that inadvertently caused destructive behavior," he said.

The \$38 billion budget lawmakers are working on includes an increase of \$1.5 million for family plaining services provided by the state. If Albright's bill is passed, about \$100,000 would go to the bonus project.

"Whatever costs this has will be minimal in comparison to the costs to the state in taking care of their pregnancies and ultimately whatever happens." said Rep. Elnine Bloom, D-Miami Beach.

The legislation began with an incentive for using Norplant, a long-term contraceptive that is implanted in a woman's arm. but was changed in subcommittee to include other kinds of

TALLAHASSEE - A state senator whose district includes the former settlement of Rosewood said the state should not compensate survivors of the rucial violence that wiped out the black hamlet in 1923.

Sen. Charles Williams, D-Tallahassee, said Wednesday he will oppose efforts to get the state to pay Rosewood's victims more than \$7 million.

"I don't think money can repair all of those social injustices," he said. "I think it'll open a Pandora's box to many other claims of social injustices by others other than blacks.

The Legislature is considering a claims bill (HB 591) to pay \$7 million to survivors and descendants of the violence in January 1923 that destroyed the community near Florida's Gulf coast

It has nothing to do with any ractal issue whatsoever. Williams said. "It's strictly that I'm opposed to us establishing i precedent, which would attempt to make whole a situation that occurred 71 years ago in this

Douglas wants name off Everglades bill

TALLAHASSEE - Marjory Stoneman Douglas, the leading defender of the Florida Everglades, wants her name off the law passed to help save the vast ecosystem.

Douglas said she doesn't want to be associated with the "Marjory Stoneman Douglas Everglades Protection Act of 1991" or any changes lawmakers are considering this year.

"The act, and now the new proposed amendments to it, are directly contrary to the goals and policies of my organization, Friends of the Everglades, which I formed in 1969 to protect and restore the precious Everglades," the 103-year-old Douglas wrote Gov. Lawton Chiles and top

"I personally want you to take whatever steps are necessary to remove my name from this act and refrain from using my name to any reference to the act." she

Douglas campaigned for years to make the swamp a national park, and wrote "The Everglades: River of Grass" in 1947, which called for preserving Florida's natural environment. Last year, President Clinton gave her the Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award.


Her request caught the Chiles administration and some lawmakers off guard Wednesday. The governor and some lawmakers are seeking to revise the 1991 Everglades act and get the cleanup plan said the governor's spokeswoman Jo-Miglino, "Certainly, the only intention is to strengthen that act.

NRA halts sale of ex-members'

WASHINGTON - The National Rifle Association, besieged by members angered to learn that the group was selling former members' names to any. one with the money to buy them, canceled the practice. effective immediately.

Wednesday's action by NRA Executive Vice President Wayne The Associated Press reported that the group had been selling lists of more than 697,000 former NRA members who had dropped out in the past four

"The privacy of our members is of paramount importance and outweighs the revenue benefit of renting the lists," LaPterre said, stressing that active NRA members' names have always been and will remain confiden-

Robert Marcarlo, the NRA's managing director of mem-bership, had said earlier: "Our rule is, somebody gone for six months, they're fair game and we can sell their name."

Many organizations sell membership lists, but the NRA promises to keep its members' names secret. The chief reason: fear that any such list of gun owners could aid registration or confiscation of firearms.

Dave Edmondson, a lifetime NRA member from Dallas who used to be on its board of directors, said he was outraged

by the sales.
"It's a form of extortion for current members and intimidating to new members," Edmondson sald.



A civil war in South Africa?

South Africa is now at last approaching its moment of truth, and the liberal media in the Western world who suppressed the facts for so many years are finally being forced to admit what they so long and successfully concealed.

For decades Western Journalists drew a wildly simplistic picture of the situation in South Africa. On one side were the blacks — five times as numerous as the whites, but denied the vote. On the other were the whites, hanging on grimly to their life of privilege. The issue was when the whites would yield.

It was only a few years ago that Western correspondents in South Africa were compelled to admit that a battle in a Cape Town suburb had been between two bands of blacks, and to cobble together a plausible explanation of this presumably unprecedented event.

More recently, as negotiations over the fate of the huge Zulu tribe reached their climax, New York Times reporter Bill Keller suavely explained that Prime Minister de Klerk and his black African National Congress allies had a strategy for splitting the troublesome Zulu political leader, Mangosuthu Buthelezi, from the tribe's nominal head, his nephew King Goodwill Zwelithini — thereby "isolating" Buthulezi, But when the King was ultimately heard from, his demands turned out to be more extreme than anything Buthulezi had requested.

The truth is that the Republic of South Africa, as presently constructed, is a product of white domination. It is an illogical amalgamation of nine major black tribes, most of which detest each other cordially, 3.5 million "Cape coloureds" (of mixed blood) wholly distinct from the blacks, a 1.5 million "Asians" (of Indian descent) more different still, and 5 million or 6 million whites. Why must these quite different peoples be mashed together in a single nation?




The issue was when the whites would yield.

They needn't, and they shouldn't. The obvious solution, for decades, has been to give each of these 12 groups political sovereignty, and hence secure control of their own fates, while linking them economically by mutual consent. That is what the Zulus, and the Tswanas, and the white Afrikaner farmers on the highveld, are still demanding.

But there are two powerful forces that want South Africa to pass in toto under the control of the African National Congress, which is dominated by the Xhosa tribe — an ancient enemy of the Zulus. One is the British-controlled business interests (for whom the country's minerals are a prize beyond measure) and their allies in the National Party, who have quite simply sold out their lower-and middle-class Afrikaner brethren.

The other force favoring a single sovereignty is, of course, the African National Congress, whose political leaders can hardly wait to inherit political — and ultimately economic — control of the whole enormous region. According to private information reaching me from South African sources, Nelson Mandela is already quite coolly demanding (and getting) his cut of every major economic melon being shared out in South Africa today.

Put governors on Capitol Hill

In a subterranean sanctum nestled between the White House and the Congress, 50 out-of-towners — 29 Democrats, 19 Republicans, two certified independents — recently carved a grand foundation for a new Washington monument, of sorts.

What they carved, to be precise, was a monumental lesson in how government ought to work: Problem-solving through bipartisanship.

Unfortunately, but predictably, the lesson left behind by these visitors, who are the governors of the 50 states, was lost on the nation's capital. Washington remains awash with partisans, and nowhere is that more apparent than on Capitol Hill. There, 100 senators and 435 representatives work at giving us government by rhetoric (See also-government by news release). In their world of words, they strive to exploit every political difference into a political advantage. In contrast, the 50 state governors must work at

making government work.

When the National Governors' Association met a few weeks ago, in the cavernous basement halls of the J.W. Marriott Hotel, it produced news that is rare in the nation's

crime bill.

So it was that Senate Finance Committee Chairman Daniel Patrick Moynthan, D-N.Y., whose panel is wrestling with health reform even as we speak, was moved to gush to the govs: "You made more progress in one day yesterday (on health reform) than we've made

in six months!"
Indeed. The governors had discovered, upon their arrival in Washington, that they were divided on health reform along rather classic partisan lines. But they immediately began searching for common ground and produced a compromise reform proposal that resolved many of their differences. And they came out with a proposal that was not entirely to the liking of either President Clinton or his leading

Why is it that governors seem to operate in ways that are so different from those of senators and representatives? I put the question to a man who's been both: California's Gov. Pete Wilson, a Republican who served seven years in the U.S. Senate.


Republican adversaries on Capitol Hill.

"There is clearly a difference — and I've experienced it firsthand," said Gov. Wilson. "Because governors have to manage, they form a common bond. As governors, we share common concerns whether we are Republicans or Democrats. We are all concerned, first and

foremost, about knowing what does work and doesn't work. We are all more concerned about cost shifts (from the federal government to state governments) that might occur as a result of a misfired good intention — no matter which party made the proposal initially."

It was no surprise that we got the same sort of answer from a Democratic governor, Colorado's Roy Romer:

common problems we all have to cover the same basics in running prisons, education, health care. The 50 governors are like 50 sea captains. We may be 30 Democrats and 20 Republicans, but we're all in the same sca and we've all got to run our golf-darned ships. We may run them with different stylesand philosophics, but we must make them run. And the buck stops at our desks every day. So we have to know how to reach compromises.

I've got to make it work."
In the Congress, senators and representatives aren't responsible for making anything work. In fact, they aren't individually responsible for anything. For any bad idea that becomes bad law, at least 51 senators and 218 representatives voted for it.

How instructive it would be to really reinvent Washington — by giving our senators and representatives the rest of the year as a paid vacation, and having the 50 governors do their voting. We'd give each governor two votes in the Senate, and votes weighted in proportion to their state populations in the House.

Then we'd sit back and watch — as Washington's new bipartisanship sailed, ever pragmatically, along the grand Potomac.

Now, perceptive observers will be quick to point out that these people did not actually expire and therefore there is no Croakgate. But, my friends, this was only the beginning. In 1992, 20 people in America keeled over after eating raw oysters. In a six-month period last year, five people fell off the rim of the Grand Canyon and perished. One minute they were standing on the edge of the fissure, posing for pictures peaceful as you please, next minute they're carrion.

I am not inclined to conspiratorial theories, but it appears to me that something mysterious is at work here. Somebody somewhere is apparently thinking up new and exotic ways to cross the Stygian ferry. Even with all my well-honed investigatory skills, I have been unable to pinpoint precisely who or what constitutes this enigmatic force, but I think I have detected some of the projects they are working on:

Death by neck twist. Any quick twist of the neck, doctors say, can trigger a clot or an arterial tear that can cause a stroke. Chiropractic manipulation is a leading cause of this malady. A woman had a stroke when she turned her head to back out of a parking lot. Some have been stricken at the beauty parlor when they lean back for a shampoo. One man had a stroke when he crawled under his sink to unclog a drain and looked

Death by rampaging bacteria. There's a new bug out there, doctors say, which is resistant to all known drugs and which could cause a plague of deaths by infection. If allowed to grow uncontrolled, experts say, they would soon cover the earth. It would be, one researcher told a recent gathering of scientists in California, "nothing short of a medical disaster."

"Death by Chinese food. Not having visited China, I have no first-hand knowledge of what people there really eat, but I have gleaned some hints from my research. A track coach sakt last fall that he feeds his runners a special tonic made from dried worms, as well as millet, dates and dog meat simmered in chicken soup. Last month, a team of Chinese scientists announced they had cultivated a new strain of highly nutritious maggots. "Maggot products are surprisingly appealing," said one researcher, and potentially "a huge new source of nourishment."

Harborview Properties Development Company, represented by Bernard Sandler, is attempting to take over ownership of the building from Resolution Trust Corp., (RTC), which took posession last year.

To do so, an agreement is required regarding leasing of the city owned land on which the the Feb. 14 commission meettwo sides were headed toward agreements on several points.

One controversy dealt with Sandler's lease suggestion that no other motel and/or restaurant would be allowed in the waterfront area. Commissioners saw that as a move which would not be in keeping with growth plans being developed by the Waterfront Master Plan Steering

By this pust Monday's com-Holiday Inn is located. During mission work session meeting. several other differences were ing, it appeared as though the still considered as major points of disagreement. One stipulated, "During the first five years of the lease, the city waives all lease payments as recognition for the infusion of new capital required to correct the deficiencies that have placed the Holiday Inn franchise in jeopardy."

Poll: Minorities say whites insensitive, bigoted, bossy

NEW YORK - White people in America are insensitive, bigoted and bossy, according to two-thirds of the nonwhites questioned in a new poll. The survey also found individual minority groups have widespread prejudices against each

"Whites and people of color are divided by a vast perceptual gap," the National Conference said in releasing the poll Wednesday.

The councilcal group was founded in 1927 as the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Eighty percent of blacks, 60 percent of Hispanics and 57 percent of Asian-Americans are convinced their opportunities are unequal, the poll found. Within each group, majorities also feel that the other groups are discriminated against.

Yet when it comes to specific treatment in the workplace, schools, courts, media, housing and credit markets, whites are much more likely than blacks to see opportunities as equal for minorities, the poll found.

Two in three minority group members agreed with assertions that white people are insensitive to other people, have a long history of bigotry and believe they can boss other people around.

At the same time, minority groups are even more likely than whites in the poll to agree with negative stereotypes about other minorities.

Sanford Cloud Jr., who Wednesday became the first black president of the group, said, "There's a lot of work that needs to be done within communities of color regarding their feelings toward each other."

The poll by Louis Harris asked respondents whether they agreed or disagreed with alternating positive and negative generalizations about various groups other than their own. Sizable numbers concurred with some ugly stereotypes:

- Nearly half the Hispanies and four in 10 blacks and whites agreed with the claim that Muslims "belong to a religion that condones or supports terrorism."

- A third of the whites, half the blacks and a majority of the Asian-Americans endorsed the assertion that Roman Catholics "are narrowminded because they are too controlled by their church."

- Fully 54 percent of blacks, 43 percent of Hispanics and 27 percent of whites agreed that "when it comes to choosing between people and money, Jews will choose money."

- More than four in 10 blacks and Hispanics and 27 percent of whites agreed that Asian-Americans are "unscrupulously crafty and de-

On the other hand, large majorities of those polled agreed with some of the positive statements. And the percentage who agreed with the stereotype that blacks have less native intelligence was 12 percent, compared to 25 percent in a 1978 Harris survey.

Harris' LH Research used minority interviewers for minorities and told the 2,755 people surveyed by telephone that they were being asked about "some statements reflecting common attitudes." Other pollsters said the poll could have been done differently and gotten lower numbers agreeing with prejudiced views.

Stanley Presser, director of the survey center at the University of Maryland, said he would not make too much of any single number in the poll, but was not surprised by the pattern it showed.

"There's a lot of evidence that whites and blacks see the world through very different eyes." said Presser, a sociologist.

Cloud said the gap between white and minority views could result in part from the entertainment choices that keep people isolated in their homes and exposed to repeated insensitive media portrayals of minorities.

"As long as we continue to have such differences of opinion we cannot possibly come together and reach our full potential as a nation." he said. Discussing the intolerance exposed by the poll is necessary so the country can unite against problems like homelessness and street violence, he said.

The survey, co-sponsored by the Ford and Joyce foundations, has an overall margin of sampling error of plus or minus 2 percentage points, 3 points for the black subgroup and 4

Beavis & Butthead make room for Batman and Bullwinkle

TALLAHASSEE - Beavis & Butthead have a thing or two to learn when it comes to TV violence.

Florida parents who monitored TV for a week found that Looneytoons and Tom & Jerry showed nearly 17 acts of violence in an average 30 minutes. Bullwinkle showed 11, and Beavis & Butthead showed nine.

The most violence was seen on a FOX show called Bonkers, with 19 violent acts every average half-hour. Bonkers was closely followed by Captain Planet. which airs on TBS.

Batman canie third with 17 acts. MTV's Beavis and Butthead was last on the list of the top 10 violent animated shows.

In general, animated shows were more violent than nonanimated.

In the second category, the top 10 list was led by Code 3, a FOX show that had an average 14 violent acts in 30 minutes. The Adventures of Brisco County Jr. came in second with 11 violent acts and Get Smart was third with 10.

The weeklong survey, sponsored by the Florida Parent-Teacher Association and the state Department of Education, was conducted in January in the state's seven major TV markets.

Some 300 parents and teachers completed 3,235 rating sheets covering 130 programs. The survey covered ABC, CBS, NBC. FOX, MTV and Nickelo-

deon from 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. Because of the number of volunteers, the results don't have a high level of scientific validity, the survey warned.

All told, 52 percent of the programs seen were reported to contain violence. Two thirds of the shows with violence had threats, half had shootings, stabbings, rapes and physical
