knowledged that nothing less than Germany's abandonment of her newly announced campaign of submarine ruthlessness could prevent war and no one here supposed that Germany would change her determination.

All the allied nations openly gave indications of their belief that the United States soon would be involved in the war and that possibility was recognized in Germany before the new submarine Mampai was announced when Foreign Minister Zimmermann, working through Count von Bornstorff and the German minister in Mexicao, attempted to unite Japan and Mexico in an alliance to make war on the United States.

All the resources of the United States, industrial as well as military, are speedily being mobilized to place the nation in the fullest state of readiness.

## WAR HAS MANY EQUINE HEROES

Rival the Men in Distinguished Service on the Battle Front in France.

#### **GET BEST OF FOOD AND CARE**

Horses Find the Front More Nearly Approaches Their Idea of Heaven Than Home—Hospital Service Most Efficient.

With the British Armies in France.—. It would be difficult to find a more pampered lot of beings than the war horses. In the stress of battle they suffer with the men, but the number of equine "casualties" among the hundreds of thousands of horses employed is very small.

There are veterans among the horses who have been wounded three or four times, there are even those who have suffered nervous breakdowns from the shattering shock of shells. If they were men in khakl they would have

gold stripes of honor upon their sleeves, but the faithful old horses go back to the front time and time again, asking nothing in the way of rank of distinction.

What they get instead is the very best of food and plenty of it, the kindest of care and the keenest appreclation of the services they render. Visitors to the battle zone invariably express management at the appearance, and condition of the horses.

One reason for the splendid appearance of the horses at the front is the fact that the moment one begins to show signs of over fatigue or debilitation he is taken out of service and sent back to a hospital to recuperate.

The hospitals provided for them by the army must very nearly approach the horse's idea of heaven. It is a joy to go into one of the convalescent "wards," especially at meal times. Sometimes the convalescents stand almost nose to nose, and if the horse across the way gets his hay first there is a terrible hullabaloo.

Fed Four Times a Day.

All the horses in hospitals are fed four times a day. The more debilitated ones are fed tive and six times. When they are particularly run down and in langer of being mistaken for boneyard batracks of some sort, the patients get nothing but cooked foods, and they fairly revel in them. They have tonics, too, and it is remarkable to see the improvement in their condition that

#### billities" consists of outmeal gruel, linseed gruel, boiled turnips and scalded outs. Later they get crushed outs and chopped hay, and almost before they know it are in the convalescent ward. The operating rooms with their big beds spread upon the concrete floors are as cheery and immaculate as if intended for human beings. For all except the most minor operations an anaesthetic is administered.

"The horses take the chloroform remarkably well," said the officer commanding, one of the hospitals to the correspondent of the Associated Press, "I don't think we have lost but one patient in the last six months,"

"Patient" seems a most appropriate designation for the horses. They are very pictures of patience until they reach the stage of convalescence. Each patient has a little aluminum tag and a hospital chart which tells his age, color, where he came from, what he shall have to eat and drink and take, when he shall have a nice hot bath, and various notations as to his condition and behavior. There is a personal touch about the treatment of the horses which in itself bespeaks the esteem in which they are held. Walking about the wards the genial "O. C." had a kind word or two for his patients. It seemed a particularly human thing to

So thorough is the work of the veterinary service that if a patient develops a contagious disease all the horses in the unit from which he came are called in for disinfection and examination. So successful is the work that 82 per cent of all sick cases and "casualties" are returned to active service.

"If we were dealing with human beings," said the officer commanding, "we could run the percentage up to the nineties. But unfortunately in dealing with the horses we have at times to weigh their cases in the scales of pounds, shillings and pence. In other words, we have to decide whether it will pay to save the animal. Is he too old to be of much service when he is cured, or will the course of treatment he so long and expensive as to outwelch the value of future usefulness? In striving for war efficiency and the highest potentiality of horse power all these things must be considered. It is the old, old story again of the survival of the fittest. There is no other way."

Some idea of the number of American horses "doing their bit" in the war can be gained from the fact that 40 per cent of all admitted to hospital come from the United States.

#### EFFORT TO ERADICATE RAT

Government Officials, Make Public a Report on the Work of Exterminating National Plague.

The connection betwee rats and plague has led to the accumulation of information regarding the frequency of their association with human habitations as well as their destructiveness. Studies have been made which throw light on the question of the number of parasites which have been permitted through carelessness to exist in the immediate neighborhood of man. Until these comparatively recent investigations scarcely anyone would have believed how large a number of rodents find a means of livelihood for themselves in our cities and towns, especially those which have a series of docks and wharves. A special report of plague eradication work at New Orleans, made by the surgeon in charge of the United States public health service work at that point, contains rather startling Illuminating facts concerning these parasites, says the Journal of the American Medical Association.

"The total number of rodents captured up to November 13 of the last year runs up to 497,983," says the writer. "Some idea of the immense labor and the meticulous care required for thoroughness in sanitary work may be gathered from the fact that over 300,000 of these rodents had been examined up to the same date, and, though nitogether only 265 cases of rodent plague were discovered, it is easy to understand how-much of a danger for the dissemination of the disease these animals were. Until the actual report; it would have been almost impossible to believe that a city like New Orleans, with Its 509,000 rodents, actually harbored a larger population of rats and mice than it did of human

"New Orleans is probably no worse in this-regard than most of the coast cities of the southern part of the country, at least, and it is probable that as careful a hunt for the creatures would reveal their presence in proportionate numbers even in many of the towns of the interior.

"Coast cities like New Orleans, San Francisco, Seattle and some of the other towns on Paget sound have been compelled to take up the problem of obliteration of their rodent parasites by the occurrence of plague. The Journal of the American Medical association thinks, however, that it would be well worth while for health authorities in other towns and cities to face this problem frankly before it becomes a source of actual immediate danger to health."

Keep watch to see that the hatton does not start growing again as it will if the work is not thorough. The button may he picked out or peeled off with a sharp knife if this method is preferred.

In dehorning older animals it is necessary to peel the skin around the horn well back and cut the horn close of the head. If this is carefully done a neat poli will result. The hurn may be sawed with an ordinary butcher's or bone saw. There are several patent shear dehorners now on the market that do the work rapidly but not as neatly as the saw and knife. 





For the fancy sleeve, close seam as notched. Gather between double "TT" perforations. Join sleeveband with a straight gathered 3 inch ruffle. Bring ends of sleeveband together; finish for closing. Sew in armhole as notched, small "o" perforation at shoulder seam easing any fulness.
