

Following an on-site inspection of the clinic in November, King said clinic staff presented him with a number of charges of improper practices at the clinic, but none of the charges have been proven.

Alleged abuses included turning away patients who could not pay for medicine, throwing away lab tests of patients who could not pay, overcharging patients, forgery of medical charts and lab tests and analyses conducted by unsupervised and unlicensed personnel.

The heaviest charges mismanagement, Lovett said, were directed against the clinic's 33-year-old director, Anita Montgomery. Lovett said

### Lake Mary Voters Should Be Heeded

Despite a resounding defeat at the polls of a proposed racetrack in Lake Mary, its promoter says he interprets the results as a victory and is still undecided on whether he'll toss out the idea And that despite his pre-election promise to

abide by the voters' wishes. Marc J. Robinson, developer of a proposed racetrack in Lake Mary said Wednesday the way he sees it, even though voters turned down his

proposal by large margins to build the track in

their city, 'We think we've won."

The voters had two questions to mark, one whether or not they want a racetrack built at I-4 and Lake Emma Road. The other whether or not they want a racetrack anywhere in Lake Mary. The first question went down to defeat 574 to 236,

the second lost 605 to 204. But Robinson insists he won. His logic: Since the number of no votes cast (574) on the first question, that is, the one on the Lake Emma-I-4 location, represents only 39 percent of the total number of registered voters in Lake Mary (1,442), it must mean those who did not go to the polls either favor the proposal, or don't care either timistic about her intentions as he charges

Cute. But somewhat distorted thinking. Straw ballots on questions intended to express voter approval or disapproval are precisely what they imply — voter preference.

Those who choose not to vote, for whatever reason, effectively remove themselves from the issue and the preference resulting from the ballots cast is the only consideration properly worth assessing.

WASHINGTON (NEA) - Life as a female politician during the past decade has become distressingly similar to the enduring episode in the "Peanuts" comic strip in which Lucy romises to hold the football while Charlie Brown attempts a kick.

Apparently oblivous to Lucy's unbroken record of yanking the football away at the last second, Charlie remains hopelessly opoward the ball - only to be disappointed yet

Women seeking public office are the Charlie Browns of modern American politics - always certain that the next election will produce a major breaktrhough, invariably chagrined by the results yet convinced that one more determined effort will somehow

Notwithstanding the recent headlines proclaiming the election of a "record number" of women to seats in the House and Senate, this year's campaign provided little relief from a tradition of perennial mor-

of prime consideration in giving the go-ahead to correct, but a closer examination suggests any development.

The new female House members are Bobbi Fiedler of California, Lynn Martin of Illinois, Marge Roukema of New Jersey and Claudine Schneider of Rhode Island.

The lone female incumbent in the Senate, Republican Nancy Landon Kassebaum of Kansas, isn't required to seek re-election until 1984. She will be joined next year, however, by Paula Hawkins, a newly elected Florida

That's the "record" - one more senator than currently and no more House members than in 1975. Women will comprise more than 50 percent of the nation's population but less than 5 percent of the House and only 2 percentof the Senate next year.

Even those numbers don't tell the full story because the worst-kept secret of the campaign to increase female representation in politics is that many of its leaders embrace a liberal philosophy and identify themselves with the Democratic Party.

All five of the women newly elected to Congress, however, are Republicans. Some are in the moderate-to-liberal category, but others are quite conservative.




