BOTH SIDES OF NAVY LOBBYING TO BE PROBED

Church Activities In Reducing U.S. Fleet To Be Investigated Along With Shearer

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(INS)—A protest was today lodged with President Hoover against the proposed large expenditure to investigate and repair the damages incurred in Florida by the Mediterranean front. The protest, headed by the Florida branch of the American Shipbuilding Association, was presented to the White House and conferred with Mr. Hoover. The protest declared that Florida interests were demanding "the high as \$90,000,000" from Congress, whereas the government experts set to Florida to survey the situation had proposed a \$25,000,000. "We would like to consider the \$25,000,000 'too much'."

Huge Aircraft Makes Successful Flights

British Fight Fans Believe They Have Found Fine Battler

LONDON, Sept. 10.—(INS)—British boxing fans believe that in Nipper Pat Daly they have unearthed the finest fighter England has produced since Jimmy Wilde. Nipper Pat Daly, who may shortly be matched against Teddy Baldox for the British bantam title, is said in his sixth year, has had some fifty or sixty fights, meeting with only one serious reverse, and even so, he came out on every outing. He is one of the most peculiarly built boxers of modern times. Fighting at 110 pounds, he is 70 inches high, and with very long legs, an extraordinarily short body.

It is in his fighting methods that he is so reminiscent of Jimmy Wilde. He has a hard left jab, a powerful right, and a very effective clinch, especially at close quarters, and his spirit is amazing. Recently he has been himself possessed of a lightning right-hand punch which has put a number of opponents into the hospital. He is probably the most intelligent trainer in England, and although he is fighting frequently he will not be allowed to wear himself out before he comes to his best. For the next year or two he will be one of the most valuable assets of the British boxing scene.

NEW PLAN WILL PERMIT INDIANS USE OF MONEYS

Tulsa Bankers Desire Redskins To Spend Funds As They Wish

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 10.—(INS)—Unassailable restrictions which have bound the rich American Indian for years will probably be soon removed, that is, if present plans designed by Tulsa financiers and executives throughout Oklahoma are carried out.

Tampied upon the past by railroads, schoolers, and plotters, he will soon be given his chance to utilize a greater part of his wealth than he now is permitted to enjoy. To obtain ready money without going through a "comptroller's system" of red tape, the rich Indian classes at times use the "strict government" rules before securing his own money. Tulsa business men in their new attempt to remove the Indian and his money from the hands of the government, should not enjoy his wealth as those others who have to more reason to lavish in the fruits of their endeavor than the "red man."

It is the plan of these men to remove the government's strict regulations from the Indian and to give him the right to use his money as he wishes. The establishment of trust funds in substantial amounts for the benefit of the Indian is the ultimate object of this plan.

Wave Of Sabotage Occurs In Charlotte In Anti-Red Drive
CHARLOTTE, N. C., Sept. 10.—(INS)—A wave of sabotage and mob violence brushed over Charlotte and nearby towns today in the wake of the sensational close of the trial of 16 alleged communists and atheists for the assassination of Police Chief O. F. Adair of Gastonia.

With a swirl of "long live our undivided Americanism" piercing the early morning air, mobs gathered in Charlotte, Gastonia and Bessemer City and raided the offices of communist organizations which financed the legal battle for Fred Edwin Neal, communist organizer of Gastonia, strike, and 15 of his aides, charged with slaying Chief Adair.

The trial of the 16 strike agitators came to a dramatic close yesterday when a verdict was ordered by Judge M. V. Barnhill after J. G. Campbell, one of the jurors, became violently insane. His condition was described by physicians as acute religious mania.

Early today he was whisked away to the state hospital for the insane at Morganton.

The temper of the town was further indicated by the beating of two railroad textile workers' union organizers, Ben Wells and Cliff Saylor, were found about eight miles from Concord, N. C. early this morning and brought into Charlotte. Wells was beaten badly and was unconscious when found. Saylor had been kidnapped by a mob at Gastonia, taken to a deserted spot outside Concord and there whipping and manhandled.

At Gastonia a mob armed with sticks and stones and estimated to number several hundred men stormed the public high school, union and destroyed great quantities of communist literature.

An Old Temple

Cigarette Consumption

The United States is rapidly becoming a nation of smokers. Practically everyone, from the child in toddling clothes just out of the crib to the old gray bearded veteran, with the exception of a few college athletes, is addicted to the cigarette.

Cigarette consumption in recent years has increased from 37,139,858,157 in 1917 to 102,756,000,000 in 1928. This apparent growth in popularity is due in large measure to the tendency of women to follow in the footsteps of men.

A college degree is worth \$56,000 more than a high school diploma, according to statistics gathered by Dr. C. B. Glenn, superintendent of Birmingham schools.

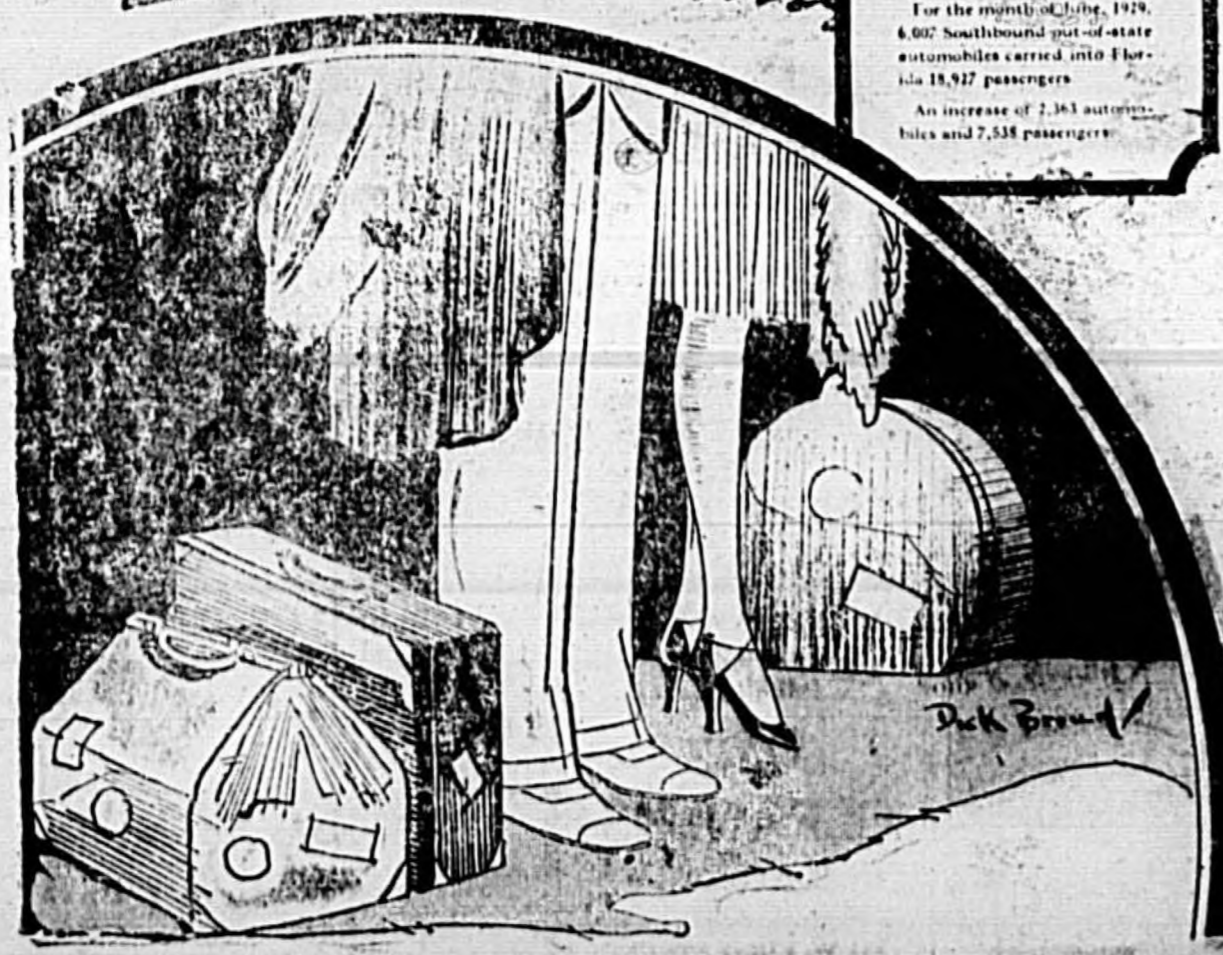
Traffic Increase

For the month of June, 1929, 3,641 Southbound out-of-state automobiles carried into Florida 11,383 passengers.

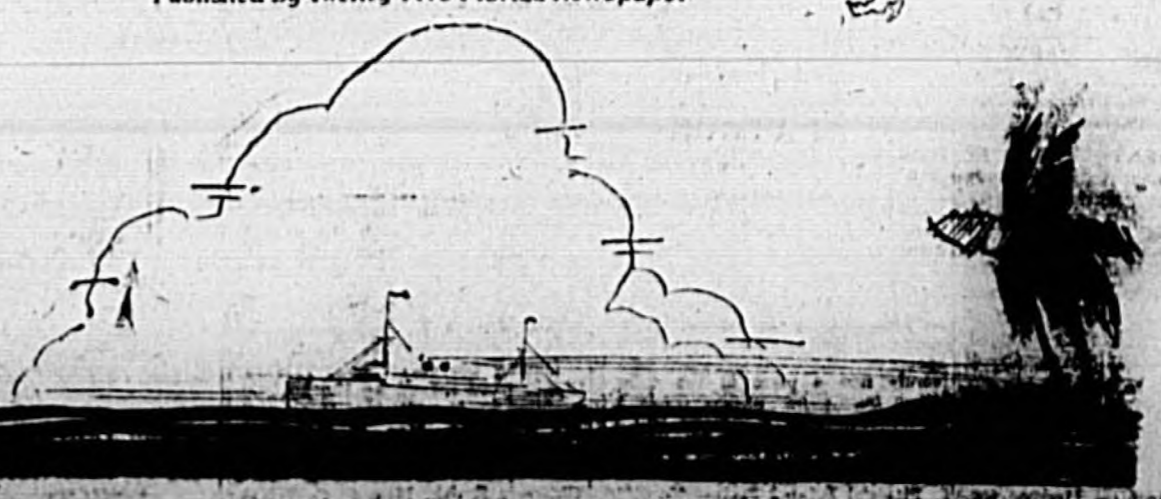
For the month of July, 1929, 6,007 Southbound out-of-state automobiles carried into Florida 18,917 passengers.
