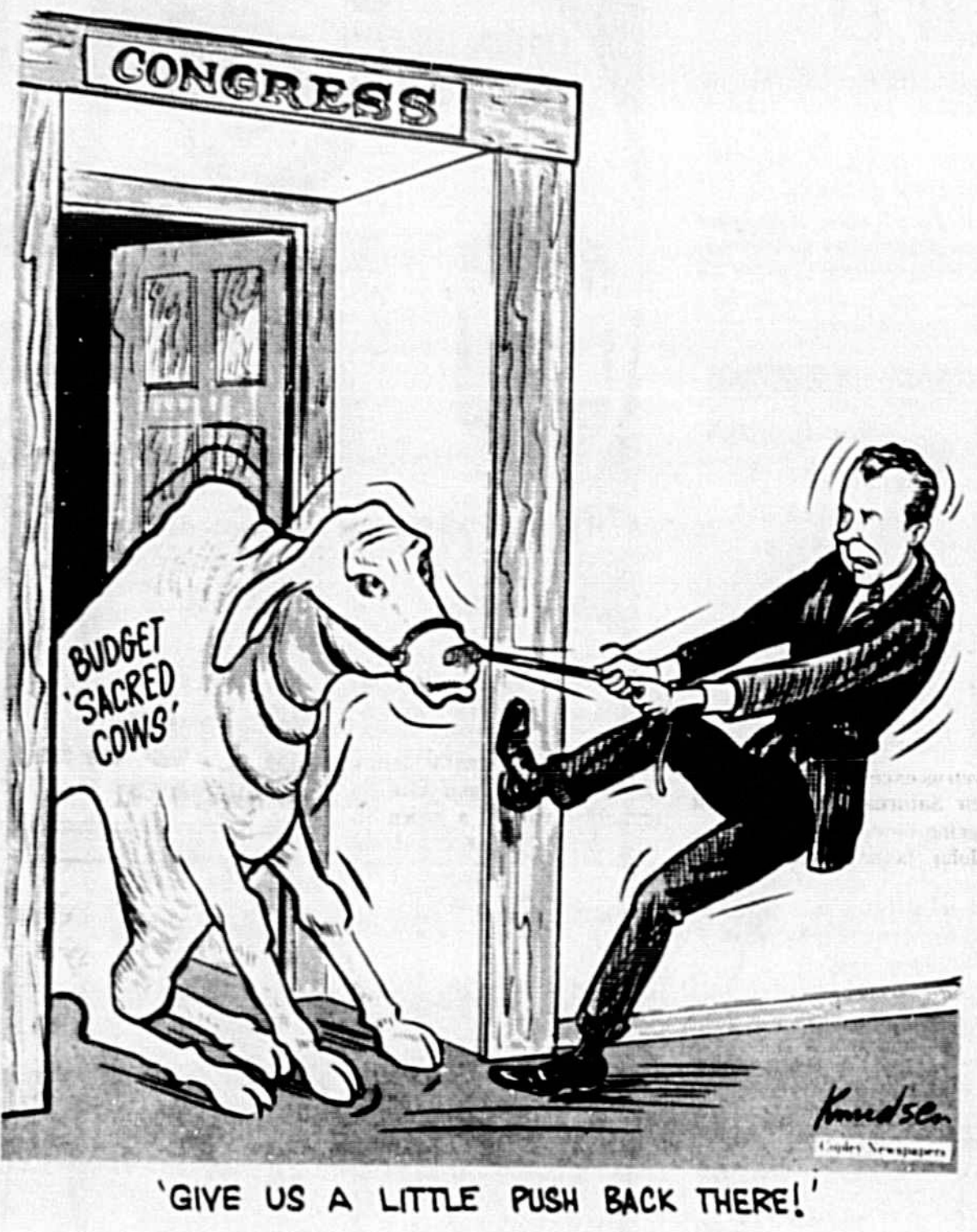

# Winter Oil Shortage; Summer Gas Shortage

WASHINGTON (AP) — The notion that runs on oil ran short this winter, and might just run short of gasoline this summer. Shortages already have forced a partial lifting of oil-import limits, and the Nixon administration is known to be considering changes that would lift the lid even higher.

Official explanations of this winter's fuel shortages emphasized increasing oil usage because of cold weather, Midwest grain-drying and a jump in gasoline consumption.

The state Cabinet approved Tuesday the agency's hiring of 469 new employees as part of a \$14 million federal grant program, and division director Jack McAllister said the agency planned an increased budget of \$60 million next fiscal year.

## Dredging, Filling To Be Tightened

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — After hearing 41 persons testify on a proposed new statewide dredge and fill rule, state Pollution Control Board Chairman David Levin says he feels the recommendation "needs to be tightened up quite a bit."

The proposed guidelines which put into writing many policies already followed informally by pollution control officials would forbid dredging in water used for drinking or shellfish harvesting.

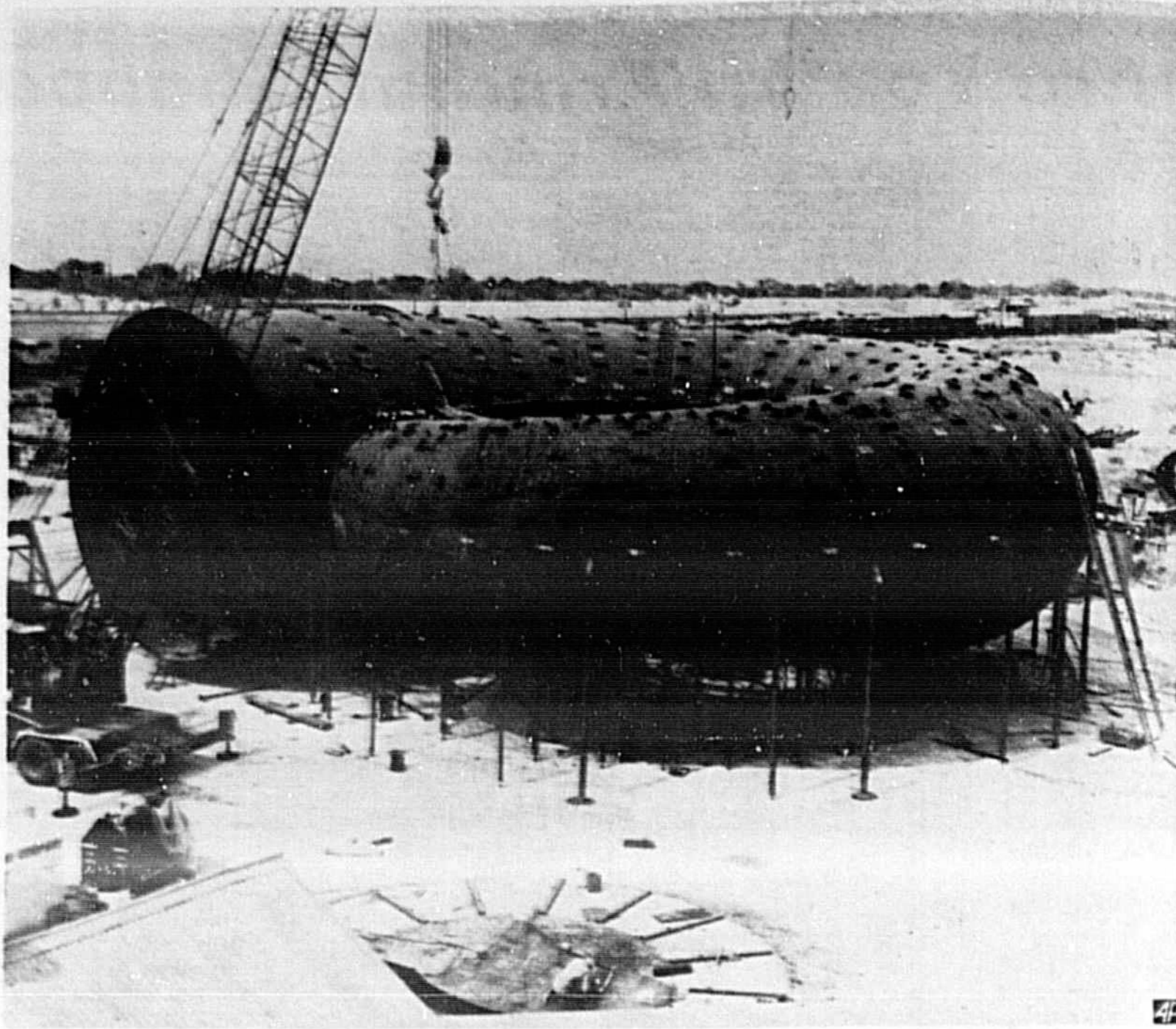
## Joseph Jackson Is This Week's 'Citizen'

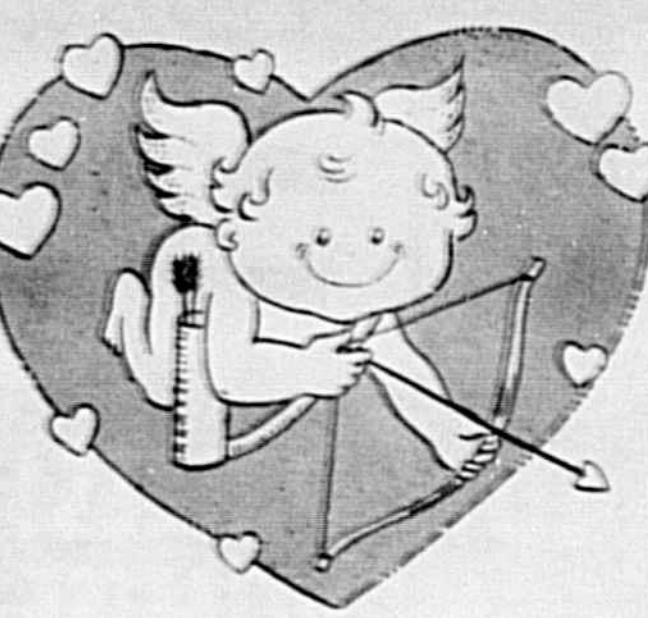

## Fighter Jet Crash May Leave 40 Dead In California Town

ALAMEDA, Calif. (AP) — Rescue crews searched today for more victims believed buried in charred debris after a Navy fighter jet crashed into an apartment house and exploded, touching off an inferno that spread to two adjoining apartment buildings. The local fire chief said as many as 40 persons may have perished.

Four persons were known dead and at least 17 were injured, with an unknown number missing, including the plane's pilot. Many residents of the apartments were families of Navy men assigned to the nearby base where the plane was headed when it crashed Wednesday night.

Fire Chief Ernest Servente estimated that 42 to 45 tenants were inside when the jet slammed into the four-story, 27-unit structure apartment building.

The building exploded in flames and witnesses said they saw only a very few people escape.

Servente said that "it probably will take all day" for firemen, Marines, coroner's officials and rescue squad members to sift through the heap of steaming rubble that remained of the apartments.

Authorities said that in all, more than 200 persons were believed living in the buildings affected by the crash and fire in the San Francisco Bay area community.

"There's no question they're going to be pulling bodies out of there. There's no knowing how many are dead," said city councilman Malcolm Longaker.

Intense heat prevented workers from entering the rubble for several hours after the 8:25 p.m. PST crash. Workers wearing asbestos clothing and firemen protected by a stream of

Is SEA After School Maintenance Money?

The approximate \$300,000 set aside for renovations and maintenance of the county's dilapidated schools, most of them in Sanford, may be one of them in the move by the Seminole Education Association (SEA) teachers union in its request that the county School Board voluntarily agree to collective bargaining over teacher contracts.

This was disclosed today after conversations with Owen Arnold, SEA executive director for Seminole and Lake Counties and Walter Teague, school finance officer.

First, Arnold stated that the SEA would approach the Board with a "package" asking for improvements for teachers in various areas, but he declined to name specifics until after the SEA meets with the Board Wednesday night; however, when questioned concerning "money matters," Arnold stated 80 per cent of the proposals to be brought to the Board were of a "non-money" type, but later he advised that moneys not allotted by the Board for capital outlay (new schools) would be up for negotiation between the Board and the SEA. "It has been designated for capital outlay, then it can't be used for anything else, but if not designated, then it is up for negotiation," Arnold said.

Later, a conversation with finance man Teague disclosed that money already ticketed for new schools, if the four mill tax request is passed by the voters on March 13, and money from the sale by the state of school education bonds could only be used for new schools, but the \$300,000 or so left in the maintenance or renovation account could be spent anywhere the School Board decided.

The SEA negotiator advised, "The teachers want to start negotiating solutions to those many problems with this school board as soon as possible." Any agreements made to improve the schools will apply to all teachers and students, the SEA representative added.

Adding to a possible state law passage that would force the board to negotiate with the SEA, it was disclosed by the speaker that some school districts were entering into negotiations on their own.
