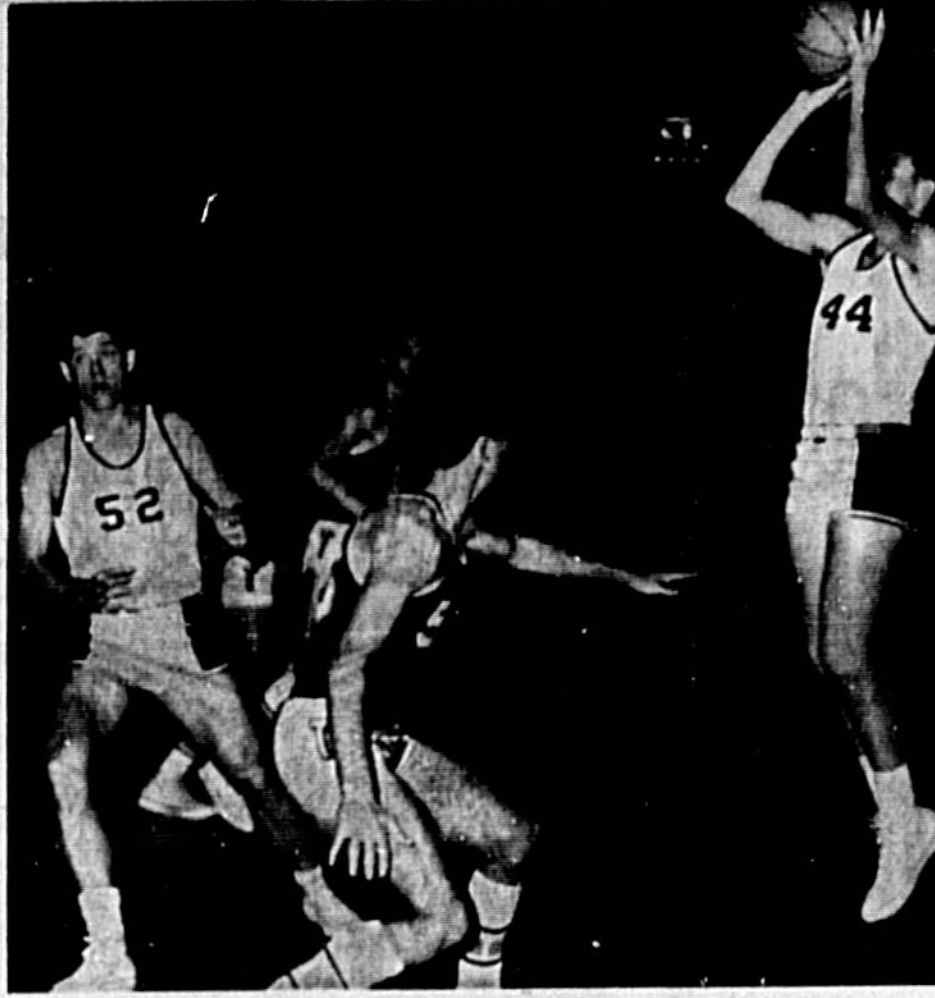
In the second chapter, the Braves raved to a 26-6 lead over their opponents at the 17-minute mark in the first half.
