

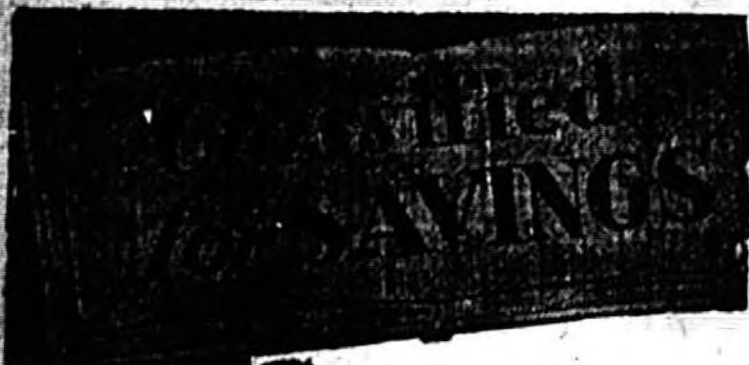

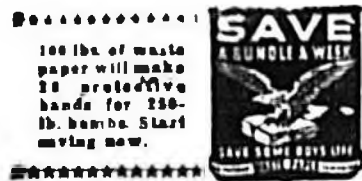

Truman Talks With Other 2 Of Big Three

Has Lunch With Prime Minister And Then Visits With Stalin Later In Afternoon

POTSDAM, July 18. (AP) President Truman went calling today to talk things over separately with Churchill and Stalin. He first conferred and had luncheon with the Prime Minister, then visited the Soviet head later in the afternoon. Truman yesterday was selected as the conference chairman.

There was no definite information of another formal session scheduled later this afternoon.

Chief among the aims of the American was President were speedy victory over Japan and settlement of age-old disputes to help preserve peace in frequently-unrestful Europe.

European relief problems which are being considered at the Big Three at Potsdam, will be discussed at length Aug. 7 when the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration opens its third major conference in London.

Shortly after its meeting Denmark, potential food source, and Italy, hungry and hopeful for more aid, may take their seats as full fledged members of UNRRA.

In Madrid, Generalissimo Franco said he is only the acting head of the Spanish government pending return to monarchy which would be decided by "national" elections of the Falange movement. Washington regarded the statement as a move designed to maintain Franco in power and resist all criticism which the Allied world, particularly Russia, has directed against his regime.

Red Cross Workers Needed More Than Ever, Says Leader

"American Red Cross workers are needed more than ever since V-E Day," Mrs. E. A. Dyson, Chairman of the Seminole County Chapter of Red Cross, said today in reference to the need for recruitment for social and recreation workers for military and naval hospitals.

Mrs. Dyson explained that this need was not affected by the Army Surgeon General's recent announcement that the need for nurses had been filled. The workers now being recruited will follow up the work done by nurses in assisting the wounded servicemen to recovery.

Hospital workers are needed both overseas and in the United States, she said. In Europe many wounded soldiers are still waiting to be moved, and hospital services will be necessary with the army of occupation in the Pacific mounting casualties are creating an urgent need for workers in hospitals. In the United States thousands of men are being returned to hospitals from both theaters of operations.

The jobs pay \$140 to \$350 monthly, plus living quarters. Local Red Cross Chapter, ready to discuss these positions with applicants who are interested.

Pfc Bruce Cameron Serves With Group Catching Notables

Pfc. Bruce J. Cameron, son of Robert A. Cameron of Sanford, was with special troops of the 330th "Polar Bear" Regiment on the day they discovered many famous German political prisoners and immense caches of gold, currency and art works in the Dolomite Alps in Italy.

The 330th, part of the 8th "Custer" Division, fought as a unit of the Fifth Army.

Men of the regiment discovered a camp containing 138 of Europe's most famous military leaders among them Leon Blum, You Schuschnigg, Martin Niemöller, Joseph Stalin's son, Dr. Halmar Schacht, and Fritz Thyssen.

Hidden in an old castle, they found 400 masterpieces valued at \$400,000,000.

In a dark subterranean vault beneath an ancient fort in Breno, Italy, the 330th found more than 25 tons of gold, jewels and paper currency including \$40,000 in American bills of small denominations.

Total value of the cash and valuables taken by the Germans from the Bank of Italy when they fled Rome in June, 1944, was placed at \$25,000,000. The regiment is commended by Colonel John C. English of the 33rd Infantry, 23-year-old West Point graduate.

Posthumous Award Of Silver Star Is Made To Sergeant Robert L. Evans

Announcement of the posthumous award of a Silver Star medal to Staff Sergeant Robert L. Evans, who on May 9, was instantly killed by Japanese machine gun bullets as he attempted to administer first-aid to a wounded comrade during action at Marapan, Mindanao, Philippines, has been made by Major General Martin of the 31st Infantry Division.

In addition, Ernie Evans, manager of the A and P Store in Sanford and bereaved brother, has received a letter of sympathy from Brig. Gen. Joseph C. Hatcher, son of Sanford, serving in the Philippines theater, and is in receipt of expressions of sympathy directed to his late brother, Edward R. Evans by Gen. Hatcher, Brig. Gen. Joseph C. Mass X-Ray Of County Adults Will Be Made

Grand Scale Test For Detecting Tuberculosis Will Be Made Beginning October 1

A mass X-ray survey of adults of Seminole County will take place from Sept. 4 to 28 inclusive. A State mobile unit will make the X-rays for the purpose of detecting any possible early stages of tuberculosis not discernible through symptoms and it is planned that 10,000 or more persons be tested, it was announced this morning by Dr. L. L. Dame, director of the Seminole County Health Unit.

Dr. Dame pointed out that this survey will precede that in Volusia County, scheduled for Oct. 7. While this is the first of a mass survey of persons in any county for tuberculosis tests that has been made in the state, said Dr. Dame, "the tests in Seminole County will be the first one that scale using the State Board of Health Mobile X-ray Unit. This refutes recent publicity to the effect that Volusia County would be chosen as the location for the first survey of this kind ever attempted by the State Mobile Unit."

"This X-ray is to be of persons 15 years of age or over (not any under) and as many as 10,000 are wanted. The Unit will be in Sanford two or three weeks and a week or more in each of the other counties. The State Board of Health technicians will direct the work under direction of the director of the Seminole County Health Unit."

Arrangements for the mass survey were made in early June by Dr. E. J. Teagarden, director of the division of tuberculosis of the State Board of Health. According to Dr. Teagarden this survey is part of an effort to X-ray every adult in the State of Florida.

"With your cooperation we know that we can count on a fine response in Seminole County," he writes Dr. Dame. "We wish to average no fewer than 300 persons daily."

Kiwanis Speaker Stresses Need Of Work In TB Field

Mrs. Kircher Describes Conditions Prevailing Thru-out State

Florida has only 450 beds for hospitalized tuberculosis patients and needs 2,000 beds, declared Mrs. Elizabeth Kitcher, secretary of the Seminole County Health and Tuberculosis Association in a talk to Kiwanis today at the Hotel Mayfair in which she stressed the need for more facilities to combat the disease.

Prior to her talk, Mrs. Kitcher played the accordion to accompany her sister, Mrs. Ernest Southard, in the singing of an original composition by Mrs. Kitcher entitled "Till The Stars Fall."

Mrs. Kitcher told of her work as an ordained minister and of how upon her return to Sanford, she was approached by Mrs. Mary Hastings of the Sanford Clinic who stressed the need of someone leading a crusade against tuberculosis in the county.

"Now, I am not only interested in souls, but also in the physical wellbeing of men and women, boys and girls," said Mrs. Kitcher. She declared that the Association was not a medical or professional group but is composed of lay men and women who want to prevent and control this disease.

She quoted statistics to show that there were 40 known and 100 cases not spotted in Seminole County. Nearly 900 persons died in 1943 in Florida from tuberculosis, she said. She urged that everyone avail the opportunity of x-ray tests announced today by Dr. LeLand H. Dame, which will take place in the early fall.

Discharged Vet Of 10 Years Service Facing Induction

NEWPORT, R. I., July 17. A former Army captain who was discharged from 10 years' service, including more than three years in this war, decorated for heroism, and medically discharged now faces induction as part of an effort to Paul F. Solecki, 29, native of Newport, had word today that he must return to active service in Boston ordered last week by Local Selective Service Board 2 of Wheeling and was informed that within the next two or three months he would be inducted.

A veteran of the invasions of North Africa, and Sicily, and the actions at Anzio Beach and Cassino, Solecki, an artilleryman, was the possessor of a Bronze Star Medal for heroism at Cassino December 26, 1943. A subsequent victim of malaria, he was medically discharged three months ago.

The Newport Daily News said today it had asked the Wheeling Board why Solecki was being called up for further service, and that the board declined to explain.

The citation accompanying Solecki's medal declares that "during an intense shelling of the battery area an ammunition box of a 90 millimeter gun pit received a direct hit setting fire to the ammunition, causing damage to the gun and endangering the lives of members of the battery."

"Captain Solecki obtained a fire extinguisher, entered the blazing pit, and extinguished the fire."

"His heroic action reflects great credit upon himself and the military service."

Veterans' Rights Are Explained At Legion Gathering

Provisions Of GI Bill Of Rights Are Discussed In Detail

Problems of returning veterans securing employment with an equitable living wage or of retraining college or school education under provisions of the GI Bill of Rights, were discussed in detail at the meeting of Camp Lowell Post 51 of the American Legion, Monday night.

Beneficial angles of the GI Bill of Rights were explained to the large group present by Russell Hill district representative of the Veterans Administration, John J. Karger, assistant training officer with the Veterans' Bureau, gave a talk from the point of view of a training supervisor.

It was brought out that after a veteran has found employment through the U. S. Employment Office and has been certified, he takes up his duties at a living wage. His beginning's rate of pay is determined by the government in relation to the veteran's disability pension and the number of his dependents.

A check on his employer and income under this program must be made in order to benefit him, which was asserted must be up to their obligations.

Veterans who are taking educational training will be provided with text books of literature necessary to their courses, and will receive from the government \$50 a month if they are single or \$75 a month if married. Grady Duncan, city sanitarian, declared this morning that he would confer with Mayor Edward Higgins to see if something could be done in the way of area spraying in an effort to eliminate the pests.

Meanwhile in Brevard County, large quantities of the new insecticide, DDT are now being used in work of controlling mosquitoes, according to Samuel A. Harper, Brevard county mosquito control director. This has been put into effect in all sections of the county, he stated yesterday in the Titusville Star Advocate.

"The insecticide is being sprayed over the breeding areas by use of a plane from the Banana River Naval Air Station. Mr. Harper says that the station has added to its equipment and its personnel for this work and an additional experienced man has been put on by the county.

"There has been a good many mosquitoes in some sections of the county during the past week, which is a natural result of the heavy rains we had the last week in June," Mr. Harper said. "The total equipment of the Navy and the county have been on the job, however, doing the best they could to keep on with the situation and much benefit has certainly resulted from these operations."

Mr. Harper added that, contrary to some reports, bees have not been killed by the insecticide and the bee industry has not been seriously affected in any way. "The men in charge of this work understand how to use DDT and it is being carefully supervised, so as not to endanger anything except our common enemy, the mosquito," he said.

The official citation reads: Staff Sergeant Robert I. Evans, Medical Department, United States Army, for gallantry in action at Maramba, Mindanao, Philippine Islands, on May 1945.

"When the infantry battalion to which he was assigned a section leader of the medical section met heavy organized resistance from an enemy force and engaged in a fierce battle, Staff Sergeant Evans, with several other technicians, upon hearing the call for litter bearers, voluntarily and with complete disregard for his own safety moved forward in front of the lines in the face of heavy automatic and sniper fire to evacuate the wounded.

When, as darkness approached, the companies were ordered to withdraw and establish a perimeter, Staff Sergeant Evans, who had already made several trips to evacuate the wounded, again moved forward to the front lines, without hesitating, to care towards the men who were continuing heavy fire but were mostly wounded. He was severely wounded in the process but continued to care for the wounded until he was taken to a hospital.

Speedy Service To Pacific Announced By Western Union

Due to the capacity of the Navy's communication channels to Guam, Saipan, Okinawa and other points in the Pacific was increased by the application of Western Union multiple systems on Naval radio cable, the Navy announced today by Lester Thiel, local manager of the telegraph company.

The multiple system, used for many years by Western Union on both its landlines and high speed ocean cables, permits the sending of four messages simultaneously in each direction on each circuit so equipped.

Anticipating the needs for press service from the Pacific theaters, the Navy recently assigned an exclusive radio channel from Guam to San Francisco for press service and by supplying both ends with the Western Union multiple system, was able to provide four automatic printing telegraph channels to handle the load.

Because of the greater capacity thus made available battle stories now can be relayed from the beachheads directly into the press association offices in the United States. Each such force, such as those which operated at Leyte, Saipan and Okinawa, now has ships with special radio equipment to transmit press text to Guam, where it is relayed to San Francisco on multiple telegraph channels.

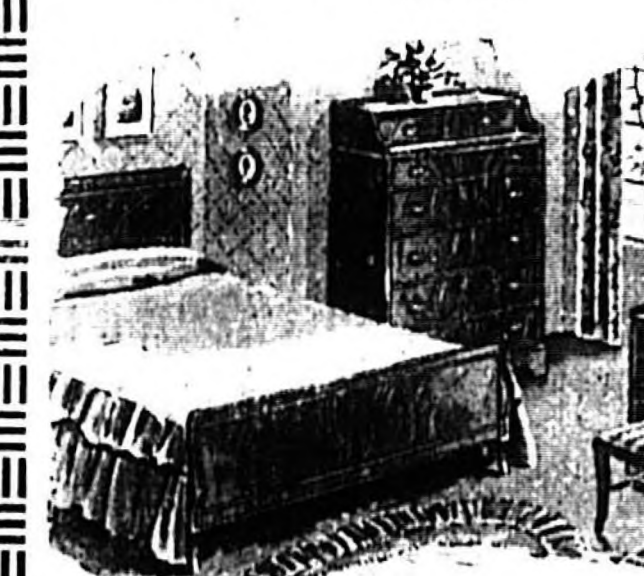

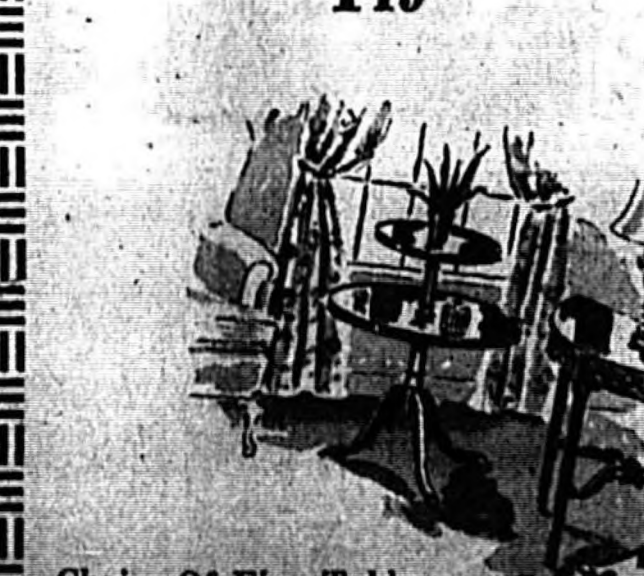
