# \$416 Million Tax Bite Called For In Askew Legislative Program

## **GRADUATE?** The question of whether Casselberry Mayor

Gerald Christensen is a college graduate came up again Monday night from a citizen attending the city council meeting. Stephen Solomon of Bayberry Branch Road. noting that Christensen last week said he is a college graduate, asked for specifics.

"Where did you go to college? What is your degree in? And, what year did you graduate?" Solomon asked. Christensen responded, "Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Ind., in civil

engineering.' When Solomon again asked what year, Christensen moved his chair back from the council table and indicated he would answer no more questions.

When no further response was heard from the mayor, the audience reacted with a loud

"You owe the citizens of Casselberry an apology for saying you are a graduate engineer," Solomon told Christensen. Officials at Valparaiso University today could find no record that Christensen ever graduated from the university or even attended the school.

The resolution which named Christensen the city's full-time chief executive at a salary of \$17,800 annually does not require that he be a college graduate even though his duties and responsibilities as outlined are nearly identical to those included in the City's city manager ordinance.

TALLAHASSEE - Calling for \$416 million in new taxes, most of which would come from a higher sales tax, Gov. Reubin Askew today hit the legislature's opening session with an ambitious program in his State of The State message. Here are highlights of his recommendations.

-Taxes. Askew called for \$416 million in new taxes. Most of the money would come from raising the sales tax from four to five cents on the dollar and hiking beer, wine, liquor and cigarette

-Tax relief. Askew called for \$32 million in relief by exempting he first 750 kilowatt hours of electricity a month from the municipal utility tax, \$50 million in property tax relief by providing rebates to low income homeowners and renters and \$35 million in sales and property tax relief for businessmen. -Education, Recommending an additional \$161 million in

education spending, the governor called for a \$32 million program tc aid pupils who have fallen behind in basic skills. -Human services. Askew sought \$13 million more to meet rising Medicaidcosts and eliminate abuses and \$4 million for

better retardation facilities. -Transportation. He asked lawmakers to devote \$87.3 million of the tax increase revenue to a program to improve Florida's roads. Askew said transportations needs have reached "a critical state.'

-Crime. Askew called for laws to stop infiltration of legitimate business by organized crime. He repeated his hotly opposed call or registration of handguns and cautioned lawmakers that too many mandatory sentence laws could add to the problem of prison crowding. -Prisons. The governor asked legislators to build

prisons to keep pace with a booming inmate population. -Environment. He keyed his environmental recommendations to enactment of laws protecting wetlands and state rather than federal control of Florida's drinking water program.

-Insurance. Askew supported efforts to reduce insurance rates, although he said "I don't have an answer to this very complex problem." Askew did not comment on Insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter's plan to abolish mandatory coverage and pain and suffering lawsuits.

-Ethics and elections. Askew urged lawmakers to implement the disclosure provisions of his Sunshine Amendment. He said non-announced candidate should not be allowed to collect contributions and politicians should be prohibited from collecting slush funds for personal or future campaign use. -Human rights. Askew called for ratification of the Equal

Rights Amendment and collective bargaining for farm workers. -Reorgnization. He supported making the Public Service Commission appointive by the governor, instead of elective, and adding two members. Askew said the Department of Business Regulation should be headed by a secretary appointed by the governor instead of a board.

-Gambling. Possibly fearing that casino gambling movements are gaining strength in South Florida, Askew said, "I am convinced it would be a tragic mistake for Florida. I am unalterably opposed to it."

Reiterating programs he has outlined before, Askew said a tax increase is needed to fund state government adequately after two lean years of virtually no revenue growth.

"We must provide our children with a good education," Askew said. "We must improve a neglected transportation network. We must continue helping the growing number of people who require government services. We must respond to burgeoning growth in our prison population. And we must retain quality employes in state government, to provide these services, through salaries that are competitive with the private sector."

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

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) - Vernon Presley. father of singer Elvis Presley, says he expects



## ERA Backers Lose One Vote, But Other Lawmakers 'Firm'

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Supporters of the Equal Rights Amendment have seen their one-vote majority in the Senate slip away but a check today showed that other senators were holding firm.

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - A special council on housing is angry at the federal government for "foot-dragging bureaucracy" which has caused long delays in processing applications for low-cost housing in rural areas of Florida.

The state passed legislation in 1974 to improve rural housing conditions by providing low-interest loans to local governments and housing authorities to purchase and develop

It was designed to work with the close cooperation and support of the housing loan program of the U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FHA). However, state officials and the Florida

Council on State Housing Goals say there has been no federal cooperation, greatly reducing the effectiveness of the program.

## Speaker Race Vote Called

TALLAHASSEE (AP) House Governmental Operations Chairman Hyatt Brown is calling for a showdown vote as early as this week on the 1979-80 speakers race. But his chief opponent says no.

"This thing has gotten to the point where if we're going to have a relatively peaceful session and get down to business - we're going to have to take the vote now," Brown, D-Daytona Beach, said Monday.

But Appropriations Chairman Ed Fortune, D-Pace, who has been fighting hard to make up ground he lost because of late entry in the campaign, turned thumbs down on Brown's proposal

"I won't do it," Fortune said. "It's been determined that the (Democratic) caucus will vote in January and that's when it will be."

## Permanent Crime Panel Urged

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - The head of the House Organized Crime Committee is calling for a permanent legislative panel to investigate organized crime in Florida and mob takeover of legitimate firms.

Rep. Eric Smith, D-Jacksonville, said Monday that the House and Senate should set up a statutory committee modeled on New York and New Jersey panels that focus on

## Vega Rust Problems Claimed

MIAMI (AP) — The Dade County consumer advocate's office is moving ahead with its campaign against what it says are severe rusting problems in late-model automobiles. Consumer Advocate Walter T. Dartland filed a petition Monday with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) alleging that the Chevrolet Vega has severe rusting problems. His office filed a lawsuit against Ford Motor Co. a week ago.

Dartland said the actions are "Phase 3" of his probe into auto rust -- "a general investigation into the problem in all cars."

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## **Statistics Decry** Marijuana Use

Dr. Peter Bourne, taking over as head of the federal Office of Drug Abuse, wants Congress to eliminate criminal penalties for marijuana use. At the same time, Dr. Bourne says his boss, President Carter, wants federal policy to be airaed at discouraging drug abuse.

The idea that laws against the use of a particular drug can be relaxed without encouraging the use of that drug is hard to buy. This has been one of the main objections to the decriminalization of marijuana use - a step already taken by eight states and under consideration by the legislatures of 35 others.

Rewriting federal law to make possession of small amounts of marijuana subject to a civil fine rather than a jail term would be largely a symbolic act. Ninety-nine per cent of the arrests for marijuana possession occur under state laws. The federal government concerns itself mostly with traffic in the drug.

That is part of the ambiguity which is overtaking the subject of marijuana in our society. On the one hand, the law continues to come down hard on those who smuggle marijuana into the country and sell it, while settling for a slap on the wrist - if there is any prosecution at all - for those caught using it or presumably intending to.

Either marijuana is dangerous or it isn't. Dr. Robert L. Dupont, director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse, has just issued an annual review of the research on that question and decries once again the hasty presumption that smoking pot is safe simply because scientists cannot produce definitive findings that say otherwise.

Indeed, Dr. Dupont has added a new to the worries about marijuana use. With signs that pot-smoking has become more than a fad or a gesture of protest, and may be turning into an "enduring cultural pattern" in our society, he raises the issue of what this means to the traffic accident rate.

Police already face the fact that about half our traffic fatalities involve drivers intoxicated by alcohol. Now a study in one city shows that an additional 16 per cent of drivers in fatal auto accidents were high on marijuana. We seem to be compounding an already baffling problem of drugs and public safety.

A survey conducted for the California Health and Welfare Department shows that 14 per cent of the state's adults consider themselves marijuana users - an increase since the laws were relaxed here and a figure higher than what is considered a national average. It is hard to avoid the conclusion that there is a connection between the willingness of people to intoxicate themselves with marijuana and the attitude which the law takes toward what they're doing.

Dr. Bourne is bothered by the stigma of criminal charges brought against "otherwise lawabiding people" who are arrested for smoking pot. Perhaps President Carter is bothered by that, too. But there is a lot more to be bothered about in the implications for the health and safety of Americans, and the moral quality of our society, if the federal government throws in the towel on this

## Who Is Mobutu?

We had better be sure we know our man before we sink any more millions in arms aid for Mobutu Sese Seko. Mobutu has ruled in Zaire, formerly the Belgian Congo, for 11 years. His regime has been friendly to the United States. But now it is threatened by an armed invasion from Angola into the province of Shaba, formerly Kantanga.

Mobutu charges that Cuban troops are involved in the invasion. Castro denies it. The main body of the invaders appears to be made up of Katangan gendarmes who fought for the independence of Katanga and then fled to Angola. In Angola, they fought as mercenaries and opportunists, first on one side, then on another, in the war of liberation and the civil war that followed

The invading force is clearly seeking independence for Katanga, with its rich copper mines, and may be seeking to promote a mass uprising against Mobutu to seize power throughout Zaire.

Some say the Russians are backing the invaders and the Chinese are backing Mobutu. The fighting is in a remote area and the stiuation is not clear.

The amber light is clearly flashing caution against the kind of American involvement that can lead to commitment and can escalate into another Vietnam. Before we go any further, the American people should be told the whole story. Who is Mobutu? Does he have the support of his own people? Does he deserve our support? What are American interests in this area? What are the odds?

"These are NOT mentally retarded children." says Beverly (Mrs. John) Sobik of the students at the PACE School, Maitland. "They are just children who didn't function at their optimum level in public school programs."

Beverly's son Dennis, a student at PACE, is a prime example. "He was attending special learning development classes in public school — but they were only for an hour a day and only two or three times a week," she explains.

Conferences with teachers and counselors led to the recommendation that the Sobiks considered PACE as an educational alternative. "Dennis is a changed boy since he came here to

school," she said. "He used to be quite shy, but now he is as outgoing as others his age. This school is the greatest thing that ever happened to us." "The thing I like best about the school," she concludes emphatically, "is that there are no frills. It's just learn, learn, learn."
