

Obesity Affects Hiatal Hernia. DEAR DR. LAMB—I am 47 years old and have been having indigestion and problems swallowing. I have lost weight. I used to be 115 and I went down to 98. X-rays showed a hiatal hernia. I was put on medication and the condition has improved. I am eating better, but I seem unable to go beyond 105 pounds, sometimes to 108. I would like to know if surgery is necessary. Is there a diet I should follow? Would I ever be rid of this condition? Any advice you can give me on the treatment of hiatal hernia would be greatly appreciated.

Dr. Lamb. Answer to Previous Puzzle. DEAR DR. LAMB—This is a fairly common condition. It is literally a hernia of part of the stomach through enlargement of a normal hole in the diaphragm. We all have a hole where the esophagus passes through the diaphragm. In about half of people older than 40 a part of the stomach intermittently slides through the enlarged hole. Women are more likely to have this condition because of pregnancy. Anything that distends the abdomen may increase the pressure in the abdomen enough to literally push part of the stomach through the normal opening. Obesity is also a contributing factor. Whether it is fat or fetus the results are the same.

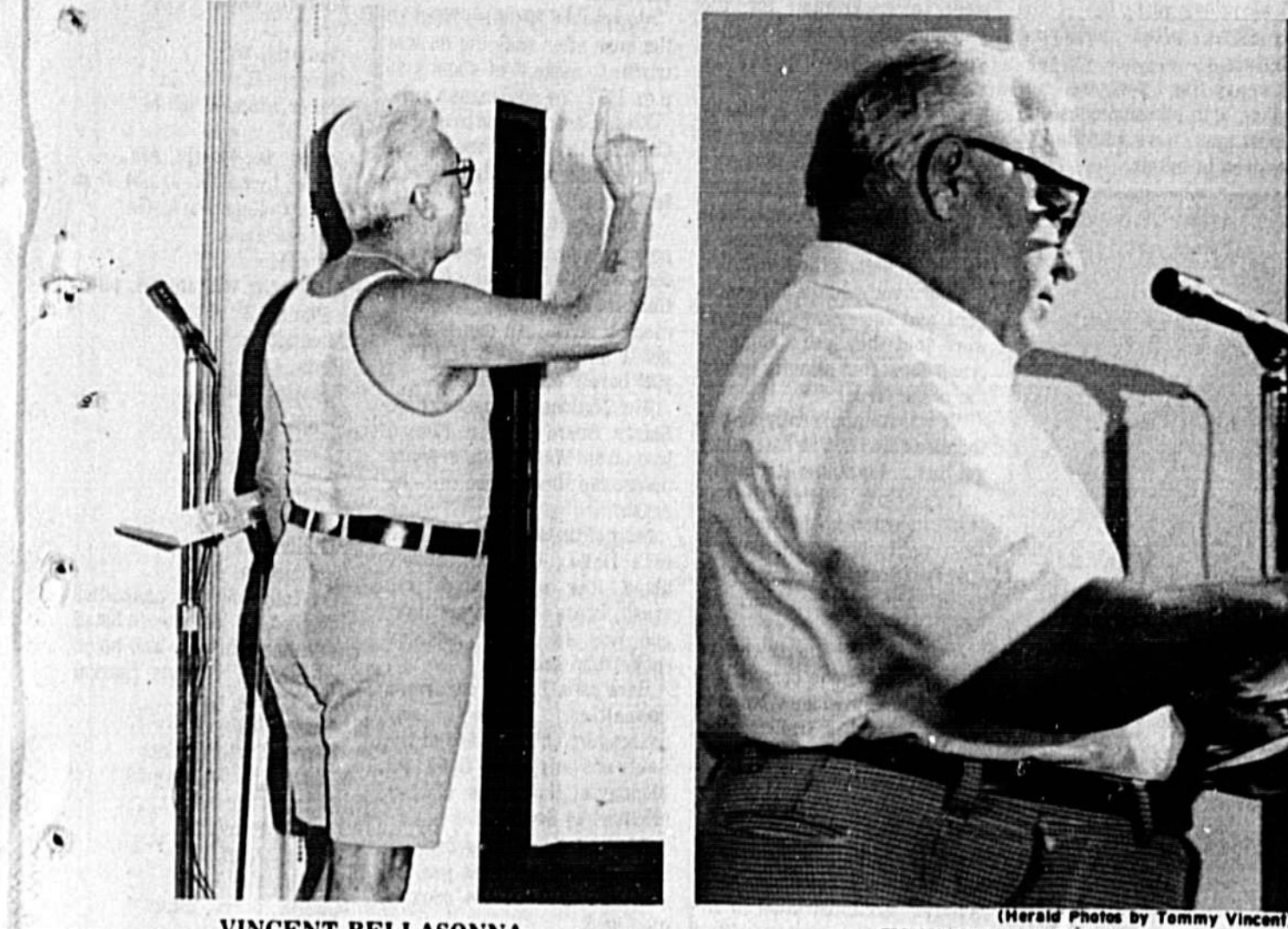

Anti-Mayor Petitions On Road To Certification

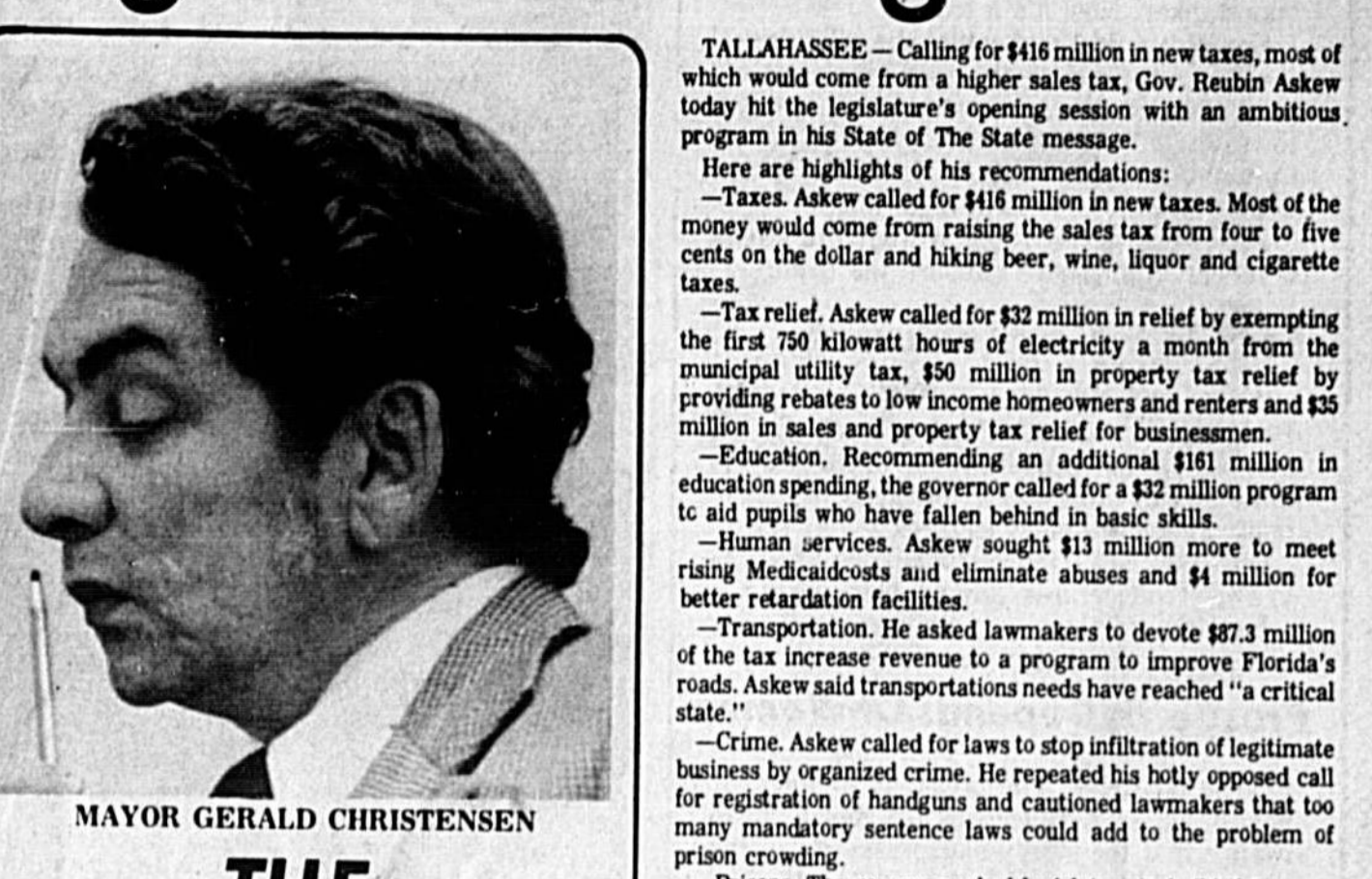
Petitions submitted by citizens to the Casselberry City Council Monday night demanding a special election be called within 90 days to allow the citizens to vote on whether to repeal a resolution naming Mayor Gerald Christensen the city's full-time chief executive with a \$17,800 annual salary can be certified before the end of this week.

Council Chairman Nathan Van Meter said Mrs. Hawthorne would take appropriate action under the law and insisted that the council could not take any action on the petition until it was certified. Motions made by Councilmen Frank Schutte and John Lightly to discuss the petition in work session and to reconsider the action adopting the resolution were defeated on 3-2 votes with the majority of the council — Van Meter and Councilman Carl Robertson Jr., and Donald Willson — Mrs. Hawthorne said this morning that she had entrusted the petitions to City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh to be delivered to Mrs. Bruce today.

Former City Council Chairman Charles Glasscock Monday night submitted the 81-page document he had gathered the signatures of 902 registered voters seeking the referendum. He said in addition he has petitions containing another 137 signatures, but would submit those at a later time after the appropriate affidavit is executed by the person who circulated the petition.

Glasscock said there is a number of signed petitions that he had not picked up that would be submitted later. The petitions request that the special election be called by the city council no later than June 30. The council has 30 days to act on the petition. \$416 Million Tax Bite Called For In Askew Legislative Program



TALLAHASSEE—Calling for \$416 million in new taxes, most of which would come from a higher sales tax, Gov. Reubin Askew today hit the legislature's opening session with an ambitious program in his State of the State message.

—Tax relief. Askew called for \$32 million in relief by exempting the first 750 kilowatt hours of electricity a month from the municipal utility tax, \$50 million in property tax relief by providing rebates to low income homeowners and renters and \$35 million in sales and property tax relief for businessmen.

—Education. Recommending an additional \$181 million in education spending, the governor called for a \$32 million program to aid pupils who have fallen behind in basic skills.

—Human services. Askew sought \$13 million more to meet rising Medicaid costs and eliminate abuses and \$4 million for better retraining facilities.

—Transportation. He asked lawmakers to devote \$7.3 million of the tax increase revenue to a program to improve Florida's roads. Askew said transportation needs have reached "a critical state."

—Prisons. The governor asked legislators to build three new prisons to keep pace with a booming inmate population.

—Environment. He keyed his environmental recommendations to enactment of laws protecting wetlands and state rather than federal control of Florida's drinking water program.

—Insurance. Askew supported efforts to reduce insurance rates, although he said "I don't have an answer to this very complex problem." Askew did not comment on Insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter's plan to abolish mandatory coverage and pain and suffering lawsuits.

—Ethics and elections. Askew urged lawmakers to implement the disclosure provisions of his Sunshine Amendment. He said non-announced candidate should not be allowed to collect contributions and politicians should be prohibited from collecting slush funds for personal or future campaign use.

—Human rights. Askew called for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and collective bargaining for farm workers.

—Reorganization. He supported making the Public Service Commission appointive by the governor, instead of elective, and adding two members. Askew said the Department of Business Regulation should be headed by a secretary appointed by the governor instead of a board.

—Gambling. Possibly forcing that casino gambling movements are gaining strength in South Florida, Askew said, "I am convinced it would be a tragic mistake for Florida. I am unalterably opposed to it."

Reiterating programs he has outlined before, Askew said a tax increase is needed to fund state government adequately after two lean years of virtually no revenue growth.

"We must provide our children with a good education," Askew said. "We must improve a neglected transportation network. We must continue helping the growing number of people who require government services. We must respond to burgeoning growth in our prison population. And we must retain quality salaries in state government, to provide these services, through salaries that are competitive with the private sector."

Seven Little Words Cause Mistrial In Murder Case

He Almost Made It Death Toll At 66 In Air-Ground Disaster

NEW HOPE, Ga. (AP) — Through lightning and hail the pilot of the crippled DC-9, its windshield shattered and both engines dead, spotted a winding country road and fought desperately to save 85 lives. He almost made it.

But at least 66 persons died Monday when Southern Airways Flight 242, bound for Atlanta from Huntsville, Ala., hit trees, cars and a grocery store, exploded and burned in the woods of this quiet Georgia town about 35 miles northwest of Atlanta.

At least four persons on the ground died when they were hit by parts of the plane. Authorities said among the dead were both flight officers.

'County Should Run Landfill In Osceola'

The Seminole County Solid Waste Management Team this morning recommended that the county continue to operate the Osceola landfill and not to contract with a private firm to run the landfill.

Waste Management Inc. was the only contractor to submit a bid to the county to operate the landfill.

The county commissioners, who received the solid waste management team's report this morning, decided to delay action on the recommendation for a week in order to study the report's contents.

County Planner Bill Kercher, who presented the report to the commissioners, was asked by Commissioner Bob French to develop "other alternatives" by next Tuesday's meeting.

Kercher said the county could continue to operate the landfill "with some additional options" he promised to spell out for the commissioners.

If the private contractor were to operate the landfill, he would collect fees directly from county residents and businesses, with the county paying \$1.2 million to \$1.3 million a year, regardless of receipts from fees.

The management team's report stated the cost to the citizen would increase by about 56 cents a month above current rates and the cost to the citizen would increase every year based on the Consumer Price Index.

The report also concluded that Waste Management Inc. did not provide all information requested when it submitted a bid to operate the landfill.

ERA Backers Lose One Vote, But Other Lawmakers 'Firm'

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Supporters of the Equal Rights Amendment have seen their one-vote majority in the Senate slip away but a check today showed that other senators were holding firm.

Sen. Pete Skinner, D-Lakeland, who opponents have concentrated on to switch, said that he was still supporting the anti-sex discrimination amendment.

Sen. Edgar Dunn, D-Daytona Beach, said he was having second thoughts about his own support but that for now still intended to support the measure.

However, opponents hailed as a major breakthrough the announcement Monday by Sen. Henry Saylor that he was switching his vote.

'Foot-Dragging' On Housing?

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A special council on housing is angry at the federal government for "foot-dragging bureaucracy" which has caused long delays in processing applications for low-cost housing in rural areas of Florida.

The state passed legislation in 1974 to improve rural housing conditions by providing low-interest loans to local governments and housing authorities to purchase and develop sites.

It was designed to work with the close cooperation and support of the housing loan program of the U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FHA).

However, state officials and the Florida Council on State Housing Goals say there has been no federal cooperation, greatly reducing the effectiveness of the program.

College Quarter System Stays

PENSACOLA (AP) — Despite objections from some top education leaders, the Board of Regents has voted to keep Florida's nine universities on the quarter system.

The regents voted 6-3 Monday to reject a proposal to return to the regular 16-week semester system used by community colleges.

The change had the support of State Education Commissioner Ralph Turlington, the council of university presidents and university system Chancellor E.T. York Jr.

Regent Chester Ferguson of Tampa argued that the quarter system "affords a better use of facilities and makes it easier for students to come in and out of the university."

Speaker Race Vote Called

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — House Governmental Operations Chairman Hyatt Brown is calling for a showdown vote as early as this week on the 1978-80 speakers race. But his chief opponent says no.

"This thing has gotten to the point where — if we're going to have a relatively peaceful session and get down to business — we're going to have to take the vote now," Brown, D-Daytona Beach, said Monday.

Sen. Lori Wilson: Schlafly ERA Claim An 'Out-And-Out Lie'

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - The chief Florida sponsor of the proposed Equal Rights Amendment said today an allegation that a Presidential lobbyist was working at taxpayers' expense for ERA was "a plain out-and-out lie."

Sen. Lori Wilson, I-Cocoa, told a press conference that charges made Tuesday by Phyllis Schlafly, national president of the Stop-ERA movement, were "blatant misrepresentations" of the activities of Mark Segal, a legislative assistant to President Carter.

She said it was her understanding that Segal fielded telephone calls and questions on both sides of the issue for the President and "has not been traveling around lobbying anywhere" or pressuring anyone, as Mrs. Schlafly told an anti-ERA rally on the Capitol steps.

Sen. Wilson appeared with Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin and Maureen Reagan, daughter of former California Gov. Ronald Reagan, to clarify and correct what she and Shevin called "phony issues and red herrings" raised by ERA opponents.

Shevin said passage of ERA would in no way weaken the powers of any state, as some ERA foes have charged. "Ratification of the ERA would not limit the right of the legislature to enact laws and regulations in any area it is presently competent to act, provided its action would not deny or abridge the rights of any citizens on account of sex," the attorney general said.

Altamonte Update Lock Law Row Simmers...

Fire Chief Tom Siegfried told Altamonte Springs City Commissioners Tuesday night there is no way under the city's fire ordinance to solve problems with security at Grand Distributors.

Sam Kahn, president of the firm, at a city commission meeting last week, said his store on SR 406 near Maitland Avenue has had losses from theft totaling \$45,000 and blamed the losses on a city ordinance banning key locks on exit doors.

Kahn said the thefts occurred during the daytime, mostly by employees using a back door. Siegfried said Kahn wants "tight security and all doors key locked." He explained exit doors, according to city law, must not be key locked during business hours so that persons will have exits available in case of fire.

...County Opposes Annexation

The Altamonte Springs City Commission Tuesday night struck a dirt road from an annexation ordinance to eliminate county objections and to avert a possible court battle.

County Attorney Joe Mount, on behalf of the county board, told commissioners the county wanted its objections to the annexation recorded. He pointed to state law forbidding city annexations which create "enclaves," - areas wholly or partly surrounded by city territory. He said the annexation under consideration created four enclaves.

Mayor Norman Floyd, said the city in the past annexed some 36-39 county roads surrounded by city territory and assumed responsibility for their maintenance to assist the county.

In the annexation in question several properties bounded by Douglas Avenue, a portion of Douglas Avenue and a dirt road - Harwood Avenue - were included in the petition submitted by Alan Bixby for inclusion within the city limits.
