**RED CROSS ASSISTS
DISABLED VETERANS**

The American Red Cross is carrying on a wide program of service for the disabled World War veterans receiving treatment in United States Public Health hospitals, and those being trained through agencies of the Federal Board for Vocational Education.

In each of the Public Health Service hospitals Red Cross workers devote their time to the general welfare of the service men from the day they enter the receiving ward until they are discharged. After the soldier's discharge the Red Cross continues its friendly service through the Home Service Section in his own community.

The Red Cross maintains a convalescent home at all of the hospitals, where patients can amuse themselves after they are well enough to be up and around. Parties and picture shows in the wards are also furnished, with occasional excursions when convalescence comes.

Great service has been rendered by the Red Cross in mental cases in identifying those who have appeared in state hospitals for the insane, and helping them secure compensation due from the Bureau of War Risk Insurance.

In the Federal Board's various district offices the Red Cross worker, acting with the Home Service Section, makes necessary loans to the men, arranges suitable living conditions, helps collect evidence and supply facts to the Board, assists in "appealing cases" and settles various personal difficulties for the men. The workers also follow up and aid all men who discontinue training.

The Red Cross agents and men "lost" to the Board, help clear up delayed cases and aid the college counselors in their friendly work with the men. Many Red Cross chapters have set up recreation facilities, and in some instances living clubs, so these victims of war may have attractive surroundings and the fun which must go with effective school work.

To the American Red Cross Institute for the Blind near Baltimore, Md. more than half of all the Americans blinded in the World War have come for training. The Institute, through the Red Cross, long ago conducted an exhaustive industrial survey to determine the vocations for which blind men could be fitted. As a result it is putting forth well trained men equipped to meet the social, civic and economic requirements of their respective communities.

Aid for Spanish Red Cross.
The Iberian chapter of the American Red Cross, composed of Americans resident in Spain, has just contributed \$450 to a fund being raised by the Spanish Red Cross and the League of Red Cross Societies for the purpose of fighting malaria.

NEED HOMES TO ACCOMMODATE THE PEOPLE

Housing Problem in Every Part of Country Is Most Acute

A scarcity of houses is reported from nearly every city in the land and this despite the fact that the majority of them have a much smaller increase in population during the last ten years than for any other equal period.

With a scarcity of houses rents are naturally high and there is no reason for this besides the one furnished by the law of supply and demand. It costs fully twice as much to build a house as it cost to build precisely like it in 1914 and if they are to pay the same per cent of their value in rent they must rent for 75 per cent more.

But this drags up the rent of houses constructed under lower price conditions and while one man may be getting only eight per cent for his house another may be getting fourteen for one just like it without charging any higher rent.

One reason of the scarcity of houses may be found in the fact that most of the carpenters and some of the other workers have been busy building ships. If the carpenters had been compelled to depend on house construction for the last six years they would have starved. They have kept so busy despite the decrease in the erection of home and business buildings that their wages are about twice as high as six years ago.

In many places special efforts are being made to induce men to build. High rent would be an inducement but for the fact that it is no more than the result of high cost of construction or if it is higher it is unreasonably oppressive. The country is faced by a threat of excessive rents and the people of the cities will probably suffer greatly. But it cannot be helped until more houses are built and more houses will not be built until wages and materials come down unless rents remain high.

In New York plans are being discussed of encouraging building but it is not easy to hit upon a workable plan. The one that seems to receive the most attention proposes the exemption of new buildings from taxation for a number of years. The country will have relief when conditions become normal again but the housing problem is apt to be one of the last to become normal.—Jacksonville Times Union.

FIRST VEGETABLE HOUSE TO INSTALL MACHINERY

During the past week considerable new equipment has been added to the Fort Myers Trucking Association packing house in this city. An innovation is being added in the handling of peppers in the way of installing a washing apparatus similar to that in use in citrus packing houses. This will be the first vegetable house in the state to install such an apparatus. It was thought out and designed by the manager of the local packing house, M. O. H. Draughon, and was built in the building. Mr. Draughon is an old packing house man and has had a wide experience in packing fruits and vegetables. It will eliminate sand and other foreign matter doing away with a large part of the discoloration caused by spray materials, and the immersion in water will serve to freshen the peppers enabling them to be placed on the market in better condition than formerly. It is an established fact generally accepted by growers that washing of the peppers allows them to reach markets in better condition than they could otherwise, and before the packing house was built many of the growers washed the peppers by hand before packing them for shipment. The peppers are carried out of the water by a drip conveyor drying them sufficiently for them to dry directly to the graders.

Provisions have been made for the handling of another grade of peppers this coming season, making five grades in all. The new grade will be known as "Extra Fancy". The purpose of the new grade is to give the growers an extra quality peppers a chance to reap a benefit in the way of better prices for such a product. The Association felt that such a consideration should be given growers of superior quality vegetables. Heretofore such products were listed, packed and sold under one fancy grade. Another belt was added to the grading machine so as to take care of this special grade. Another innovation in the vegetable packing house methods that will be used by the association this coming season patterned after citrus fruit packing methods will be the system of marking or labeling the crates of vegetables. The first three will be designated by the colors blue, red and yellow; denoting respectively the grades of extra fancy fancy and choice. The other two grades vs. red and plain peppers will bear no labels on the crates but will be stamped either red or plain as the case may be. This is the system and colors used for similar grades by the fruit packing houses. These colors being already made standard and established in the packing houses and markets, will be a great asset to the vegetable business.—Ft. Myers Press.

CROP CONDITION ABOUT THE SAME AS LAST YEAR

Gainesville, Sept. 15.—According to the September report of the bureau of crop estimates of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, field crops in Florida show little change from a month ago.

Total production will probably exceed last year's for peanuts sugar cane, sweet potatoes, rice and tobacco; while for corn velvet beans, sorghum and hay crops will show a total production smaller than last year.

The estimated corn crop is 10,934.

000 bushels, against 12,600,000 for last year.

Irish potatoes 2,520,000 against 1,824 last year. Sweet potatoes 4,290,000 bushels against 4,100,000 bushels last year. Peanuts 4,317,000 bushels against 3,900,000 last year.



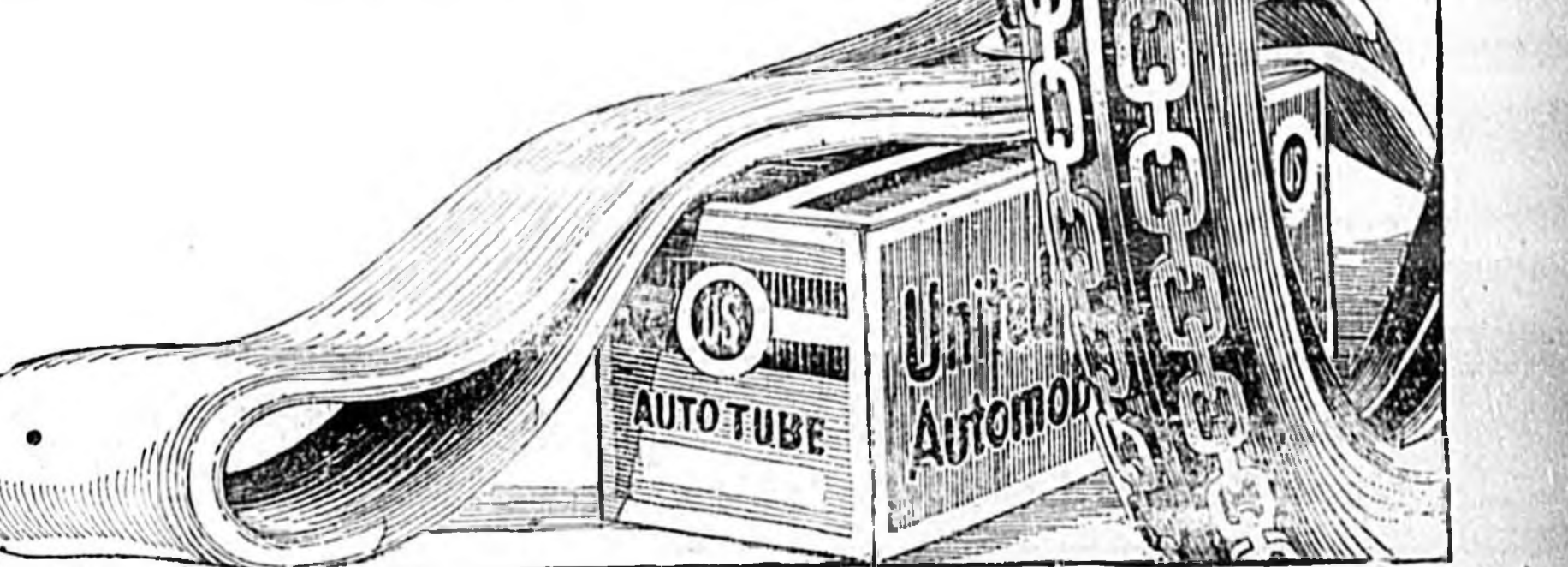

This afternoon the agents will be taken by auto to visit a number of the outstanding livestock farms of Alachua County, directed by County Agent C. D. Dunn.

Each day points to this conference being considered the best of its nature ever held in Florida. 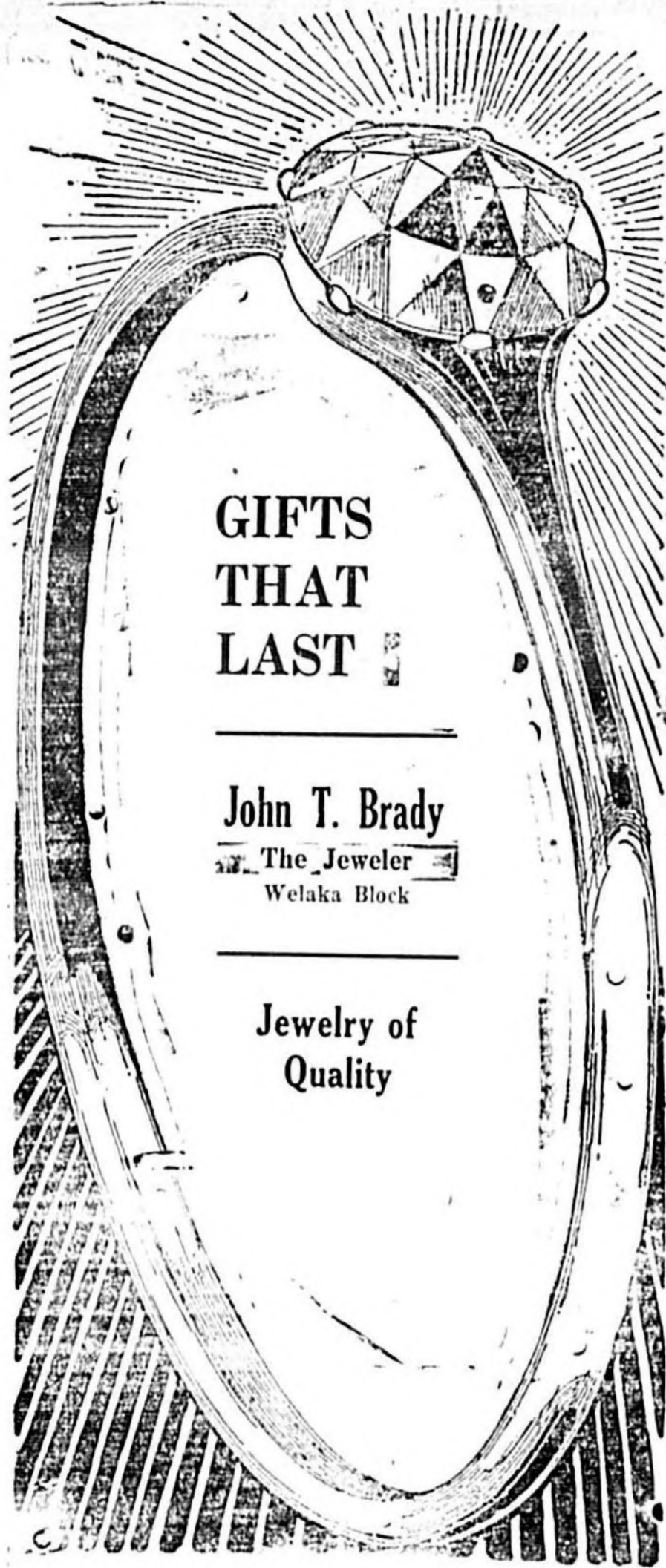

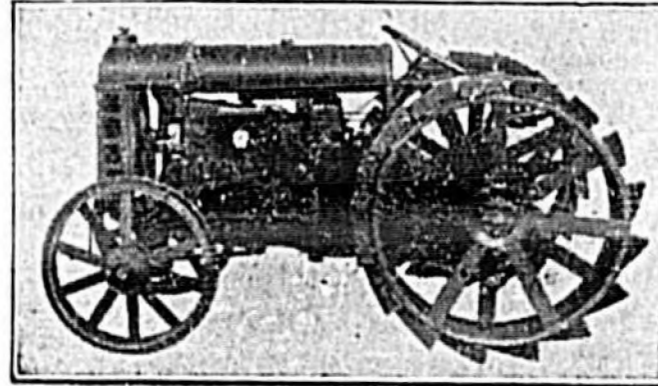

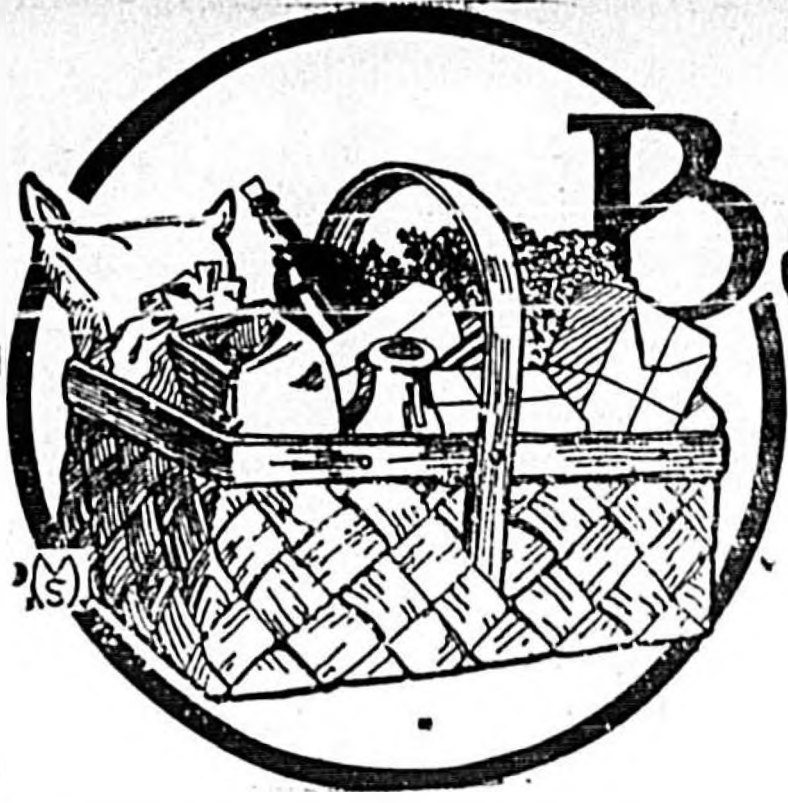

Populations of 43 of the state's 54 counties have been announced and it is likely that the total population of the state when given out will run close to 925,000. The exact figures if all the 11 counties should grow at the same average rate as these announced would be 924,943. It is not likely however, that the exact rate will maintain because most of the fast growing and populous counties have been announced. Those still to come are likely to lower rather than raise the average of the state. However, if they should merely hold their own the population of the state will be 904,498.
