



The roll vote was 373 to one. The lone opponent was Rep. Byrnes (R-Wisc).

The House accepted a compromise version of different bills passed by the House and Senate. The complomite now goes to he Senate.

This was aimed at the so-called Knowland Amendment, sponsored by Senator Knowland (R-Calif) and opposed by President Truman. The Knowland Amendment was

It restricts the power of Secretary of Labor to withhold unemployment compensation funds from states when he questions whether the compensation system of a state conforms with federal standards.






