Pin Ball Machines Are Termed Illegal

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Coin-operated pin ball machines, that offer free games as rewards, are illegal in Florida.

Attorney General Richard Ervin said such machines are as unlawful as if they paid off in cash, and under Florida law "it is unlawful to possess or to permit the operation of such a machine."

Ervin said the fact that a state and county license has been purchased for the machine does not make it legal "because the law does not authorize the licensing of such a machine."

The attorney general said the State Supreme Court has ruled "it is unlawful to possess a coin-operated machine which pays off no money or slugs but upon which a player might win free games."

He gave his ruling in an opinion in Sheriff Alva Thomas of Bay County who asked if one-half coin operated machines which offered free games were legal.

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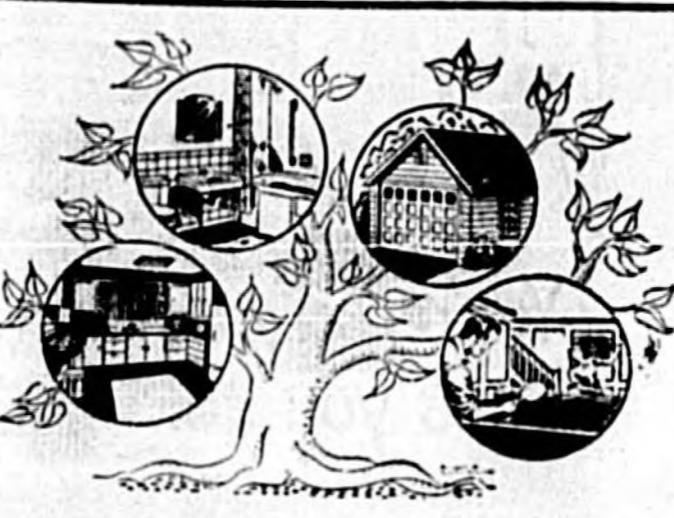
Each day it's the same. Out in the field all days and then more work in the office at night.

THE WORLD TODAY

You are a United Nations soldier (say American) on a battle line across the inhospitable terrain of Korea, half a world away from home. Why are you there? What are you fighting for?

You ought to know the answer to that, as you fight through the mud of the rice paddies or over the precipitous heights against a foe whose language and ways of life are wholly strange. What does he mean to you?

Well, idealism of course does enter into the sacrifice. America and other countries again are fighting "to make the world safe for democracy"—to protect a small state against aggression which it couldn't deal with alone.

Should Communism overtake the Orient, its next main objective would be the Western Hemisphere. Those, in the larger world, where we lend aid to Korea now, are in fact defending our own country from an assault which is bound to come if Communism gains further great strength.

That gives rise to another query: in view of these circumstances, must we keep right on sending our soldiers 120 far

U.S. air observers over the battlefield brought back the first reports that the Reds were fleeing in terror after the bombings.

Two observation pilots, Capt. Irving S. Corryell of Atlanta and Lt. William Turner of Dallas, saw Red troops splashing across the river from positions on the Allied east side that had not been bombed.

Ma. General Earle E. Partridge, U.S. Fifth Air Force commander, flew low over the tortured hills. He reported seeing a small group of North Koreans running from the area.

Our daughter Margaret's 15th birthday was yesterday and being a true child of her father, she wanted nothing more for her birthday than to go to the Washington-Boston Red Sox baseball double-header last night. Of course I hated to "have" to go, but I made the "sacrifice" and took her.

Back in 1926 a devastating hurricane hit Miami and its environs. Tragedy was the order of the day with great loss of life and destruction of property. Mad winds and was brought disaster to unformed and unprepared thousands.

A few years later another hurricane hit, this time at Matanzas Key, one of those stepping stone islands stretching out between the Florida mainland and Key West. It was found fitting after that awful storm to erect a monument to the many unprepared and unformed CCC boys who had been stationed there and who were practically obliterated.

After disaster it sometimes breeds longer life in others to question why. And it was discovered, upon investigating these storms, that the greatest loss of life occurred not in the first great onslaught of the storm; then, it seems, those who possibly could dig in and hold on tight. The heavy tragedy was enacted after the lull, when the ravaged area was passing through what is known as the eye of the storm.

The eye of a hurricane is an area of peace. In the direct center an unformed person would believe the danger had passed. And so it was in the instances of these storms. And it was in the midst of rejoicing at danger gone by that the second slaughtering winds and seas roared and swept the many to their death.

A hurricane, the survivors of that area learned of experience, is a circle of mighty winds surrounding an eye of calm. In those days, too, the warning of the approach and the troops seemed to be in a state of complete confusion. They were spotted by Lt. Turner appeared unharmed and demoralized.

AP correspondent Leif Erickson reported the enemy troops, displaying obvious fright at the sight of any plane, took cover when the two small, unarmed observation planes flew low over them after the big raid. No shot was fired at the observers.

Brooks said his group may get around to formal voting on various proposals later today.
