## FP&L Pact Nixed, Union Eyes Strike

(Scott Burns, local manager of Florida Power & Light Company, said this morning that information in the following news dispatch is "news to me." He added that local operations are proceeding as normal and that it will continue to do so, in the event of a state-wide strike. A Sanford police spokesman said there has been no request here for "police protection" as mentioned in the dispatch.)

MIAMI (AP) — Electrical workers voted about 2-to-1 against a proposed one-year contract with Florida Power and Light Co. and waited today for word from international headquarters whether to strike the massive utility corporation.

"It was voted down ably," said Z. H. Niles, spokesman for the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers local. "We're waiting for the word."

Washington headquarters of the IBEW had expected to issue an order regarding a strike later today.

Niles said the dispute centered on "general wage increases and pension benefits," but declined to elaborate.

IBEW local was reportedly asking \$1.33 an hour pay hike and the company offered 85 cents per hour.

FP&L officials said they asked local police units to keep an eye on substitutions "because of possible strike developments." They said it was a normal precaution.

Niles said the IBEW has never had a full-fledged strike against Florida Power and Light.

There are 3,100 IBEW members statewide who work for Florida Power and Light, about half the company's total force.

## Top State Road Aide Opines: 'Red-Head Stepchild'

(First of two articles)

TALLAHASSEE — "Seminole County has been treated as a red-headed stepchild" by the State Department of Transportation.

This was the observation yesterday morning by Jay W. Brown, commissioner of the department (formerly the State Road Department), in answer to a query why there have been only a few tangible improvements in Seminole County in the last 6.8 years.

While there has been some road activity in Seminole County, the "cream" has been skimmed off the road funds to finance highways to serve the Disney World area, Brown said.

Pointing that the first four cents of the gasoline tax is retained by the state for primary road construction, Brown said this yields approximately \$10 million annually for the Fifth Road District, which includes Seminole, Central Florida and Disney World.

The other three cents of the gasoline tax is retained by the state but earmarked for county secondary roads and used according to priorities established by the respective county commissions. This provides about \$500,000 annually for Seminole County, Brown said.

Currently, the state is spending \$67,000,000 in widening and patching SR 44 between Interstate 4 and SR 427 at Longwood.

The state department is holding a public hearing at 2 p.m. Thursday at the County Commission chambers on the proposed to improve SR 46 from Interstate 4 to the Wekiva River.

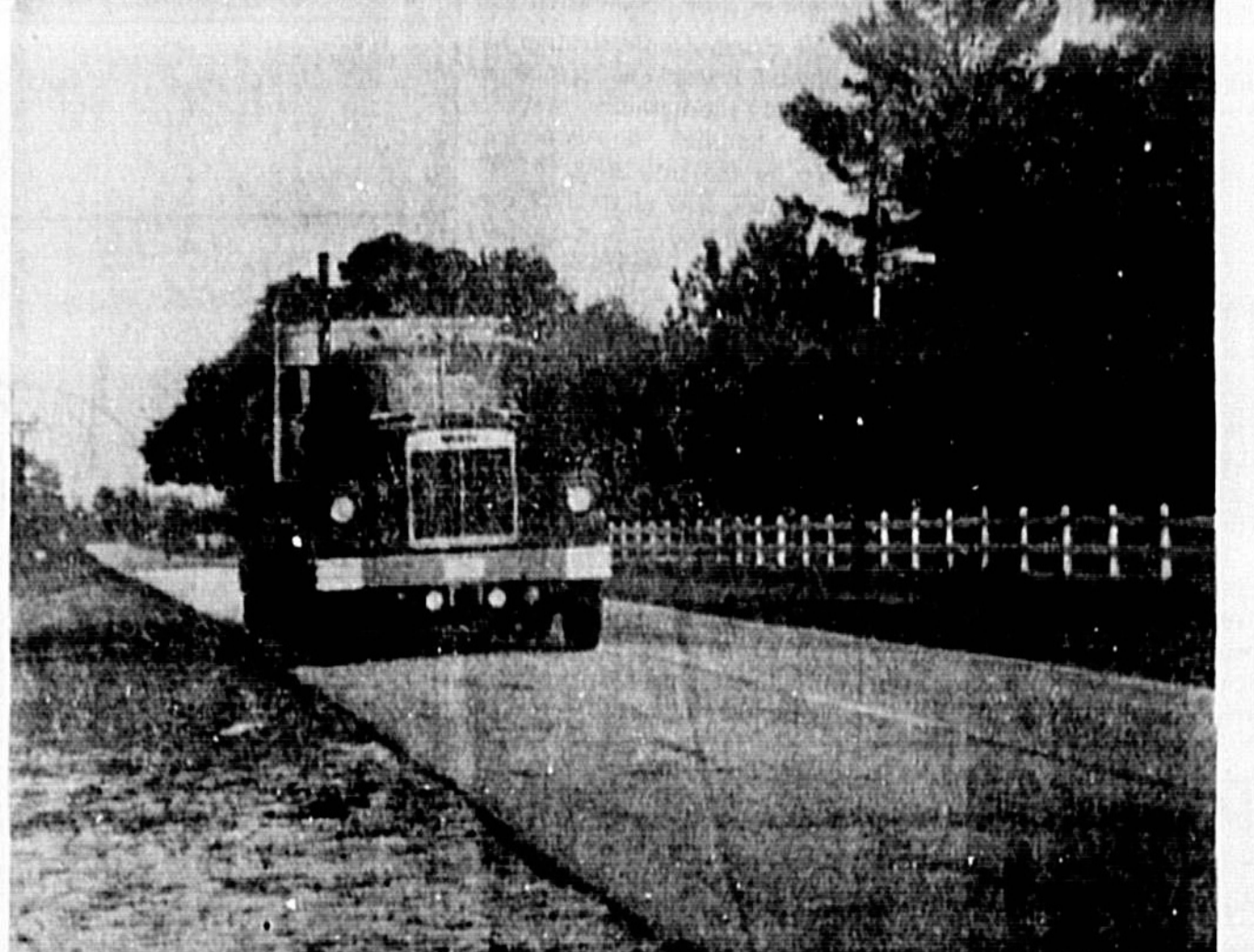
Brown was queried why so much state primary money is being funneled into the Disney World area, including south and west of Orlando, to ease traffic into and out of the amusement center, while nearby counties are being passed and thus the same traffic will be bogged down.

Brown's reply was that the gasoline tax yields only so many dollars.

## Perspicuous Summation

John Krider, executive director of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, gave a perspicuous summation of the critical road situation in Seminole County with the statement that "Seminole County does not have any reputable east-west road anywhere in the county other than 1792 and 141."

Krider envisions the most pressing road needs as adequate access to Florida Technological University, north and south, and major improvements on the present SR 46 and SR 46.

The causeways spanning Lakes Jessup and Monroe are not "dead issues" in Krider's opinion. However, he states, there is no feasible way of financing at this time. The causeways were based upon certain commitments of county money, Krider continued, which are not possible to have forthcoming.

The Chamber of Commerce still contends that the Lake Monroe and Lake Jessup causeways are vital to the economy of this area.

## County Approves Ambulance Pact

After a week's delay, the Seminole County Commission today accepted the low bid of \$25,000 submitted by Herndon Ambulance Service of Orlando, renewing its contract for emergency ambulance service for one year starting Nov. 1.

In other action this morning, borrow pit operators came under fire for not following county regulations. Commissioner Greg Drummond remarked during the controversy, "Borrow pit operators speak with forked tongue." Drummond also said, "They are not maintaining the road that they said they would."

The county discussed revised borrow pit regulations and directed Attorney Harold Johnson to advise two of the county's borrow pit operator's bonding companies that they are in violation of regulations and that bonding companies will be held responsible.

The proposed borrow pit regulations were again sent back to the zoning and planning office for further revision and stricter specifications. As Commissioner Drummond stated, "Regulations with more teeth in them."

Commissioners learned this morning that the State Department of Transportation has authorized a traffic signal light to be installed at the intersection of Highway 436 and Matland Avenue in Altamonte Springs.

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Willard Peebles, former state road board vice chairman, today was appointed director of the Labor Division of the Commerce Department, Lt. Governor Ray Osborne announced.

Peebles replaced Thomas W. Johnston, who resigned earlier this month after he announced that he would seek the office of state treasurer.

"Mr. Peebles is an outstanding administrator and will make an extremely valuable contribution to state government," Osborne said.

## Ex-Port Aide Submits Bill Pay Request Questioned

Request by the former Seminole Port Authority administrator for two weeks pay for time he spent in helping his successor become acquainted with his official duties caused a spark during last night's meeting of the authority members.

Problem concerned a bill from Francis Roumillat III, Sanford druggist and resigned administrator, which was presented by James J. Ryan, administrator, to port members for approval for payment.

Elsworth W. Bassett, port chairman, said no provision had been made in the fiscal budget which started Oct. 1 to pay Roumillat and a budget item change would be required before \$466 could be paid for a two-week period from Oct. 1 to Oct. 15.

Bassett said the County Commission might have to authorize the payment and indicated there was doubt whether the port had authority to approve the payment.

Edward Yarborough said he felt the county commission would not approve the amount for Roumillat. Yarborough is a member of the port authority and the County Commission.

J. R. Dyeus, port accountant, said he had researched the minutes and could find nothing indicating Roumillat was to be paid for the period after Oct. 1.

Bassett replied, "We have an obligation to pay the man if we can legally do so. The transaction was accomplished in six hours and it all depends on how much value is placed on six hours."

The chairman stated Roumillat's resignation was offered some time ago but was held in abeyance at Bassett's request and was never officially accepted.

This brought on a discussion among board members that resignation should be accepted immediately to avoid having Roumillat submit another bill for rest of October.

## Steel Plate Firm Eyes New Port

A can materials supplier is interested in the Port of Sanford, now under construction on the St. Johns River, and has indicated a desire to handle 1,500 tons of processed steel plate monthly through the port when it opens in May.

According to James J. Ryan, new administrator for the Seminole Port Authority, Citrus-Simpole Corporation of Chicago has contacted him concerning the storing of 1,800 tons here initially and the monthly shipping of steel through the port for the manufacture of cans.

Ryan said he had arranged to meet with a company representative here later this week to discuss the transport by barge from Jacksonville of 1,500 tons of steel each month.

He said the metal would be processed at a North Carolina facility before being barged here for storage.

The firm wanted to have enough raw material to draw on monthly in serving the many can manufacturers located throughout the central state citrus belt, he added.

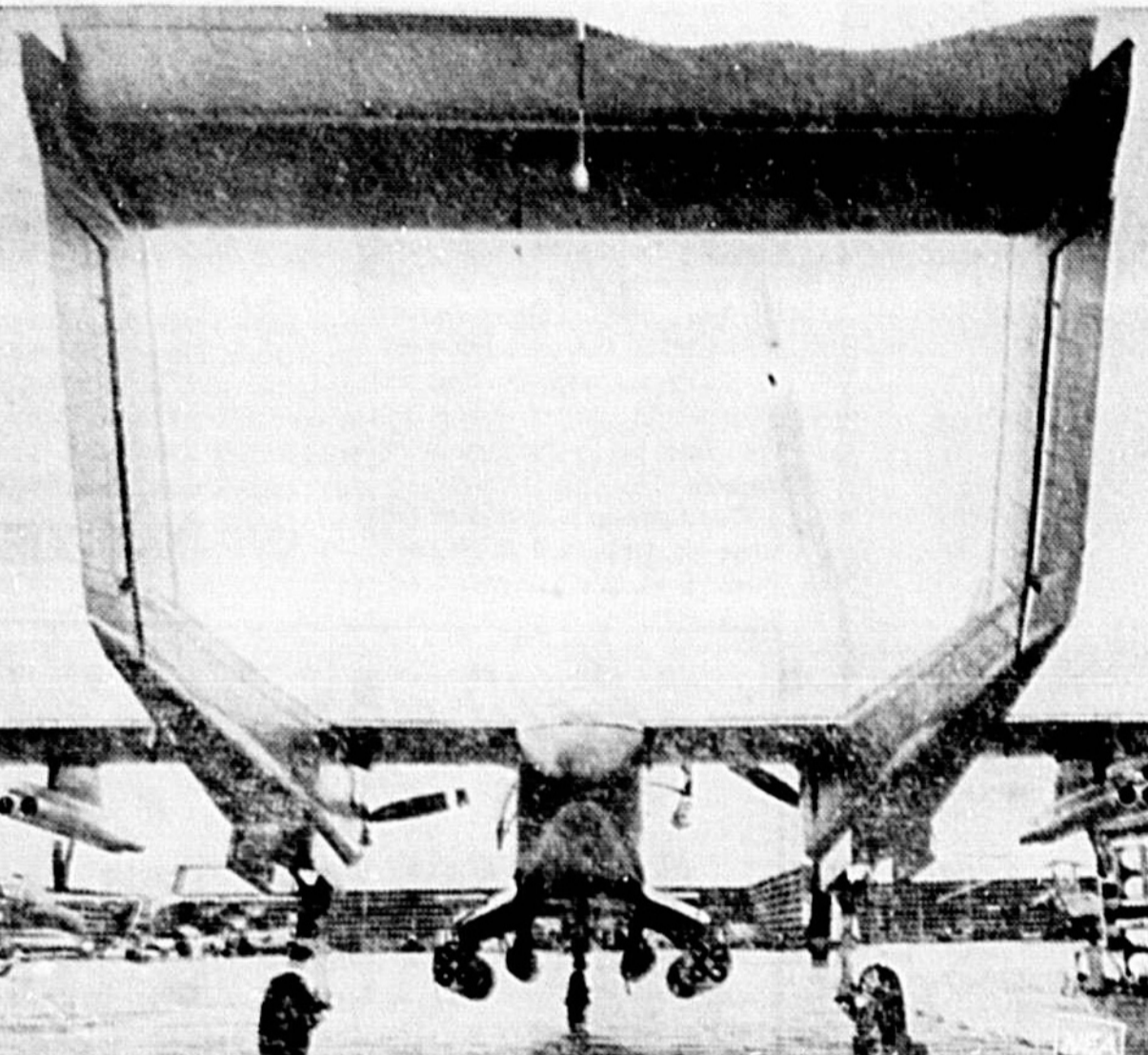

### Other Americans Killed In 'Surprise'

## Seven GIs Slain In Two Clashes

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese troops killed seven Americans, wounded 18 others and damaged two helicopters in two sharp fights Monday near the Cambodian border north of Saigon. The U.S. Command said 16 of the enemy were killed. Further south along the border, other American air cavalrymen exchanged machine-gun and rifle fire for nearly three hours with North Vietnamese troops 58 miles northwest of Saigon. Two helicopters supporting the ground troops were hit by machine-gun fire which wounded three crewmen, but the helicopters made it back to their bases. U.S. spokesmen said two Americans were killed and two were wounded on the ground, and two enemy bodies were found on the battlefield.

One North Vietnamese force apparently took about 150 troops by surprise as they waited in a landing zone 83 miles north-east of Saigon for helicopters to pick them up after a reconnaissance patrol. The North Vietnamese opened up with a 23-round mortar barrage and machine-gun and rifle fire, killing five Americans and wounding 11 before the company could take over. American artillery, helicopter gunships and dive bombers raked the enemy positions; and 14 North Vietnamese soldiers were reported killed in the 30-minute counterattack. As the fall in the war continued in its seventh week, South Vietnamese headquarters reported a slight increase in enemy terror attacks.

## Uncle Sam Abets Junk Mail

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service is considering selling some data collected from tax returns to private businesses, which could encourage an invasion of privacy. Rep. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., says the information also will target the nation's citizenry for the target of junk mail. O'Hara said in a statement Monday more than a half-dozen firms engaged in direct mail advertising—including the biggest in the industry—are seeking the information. Among them, he said, are Sears, Roebuck and Co.; Spigel, Inc.; Associated Merchandising Corp.; American Mail Associates, Inc.; and R. L. Polk and Co., which furnishes mailing lists to various businesses promoting their products through direct mail advertising. Since 1960, the IRS has published income statistics for the nation's major metropolitan areas. This year, by using the first three digits of the five-digit zip code taken from every taxpayer return, it published the information for 427 zip code regions. The information shows the number of returns and levels of income in each area, and has been made available to other government agencies. It can be purchased by industry or private firms at cost to the government. In a letter to the tax agency O'Hara wrote: "I question whether it is the business of the Internal Revenue Service to draw targets for commercial interests who can proceed to invade the privacy of citizens who happen to live in moderate or relatively high income areas as identified by the IRS statistics."

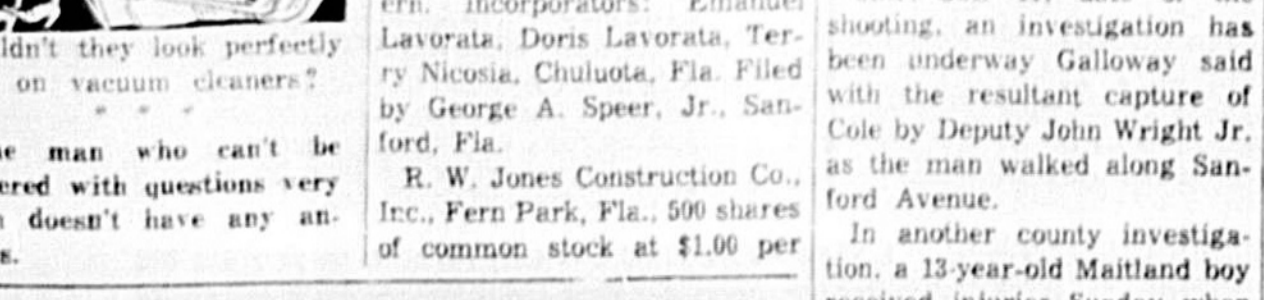

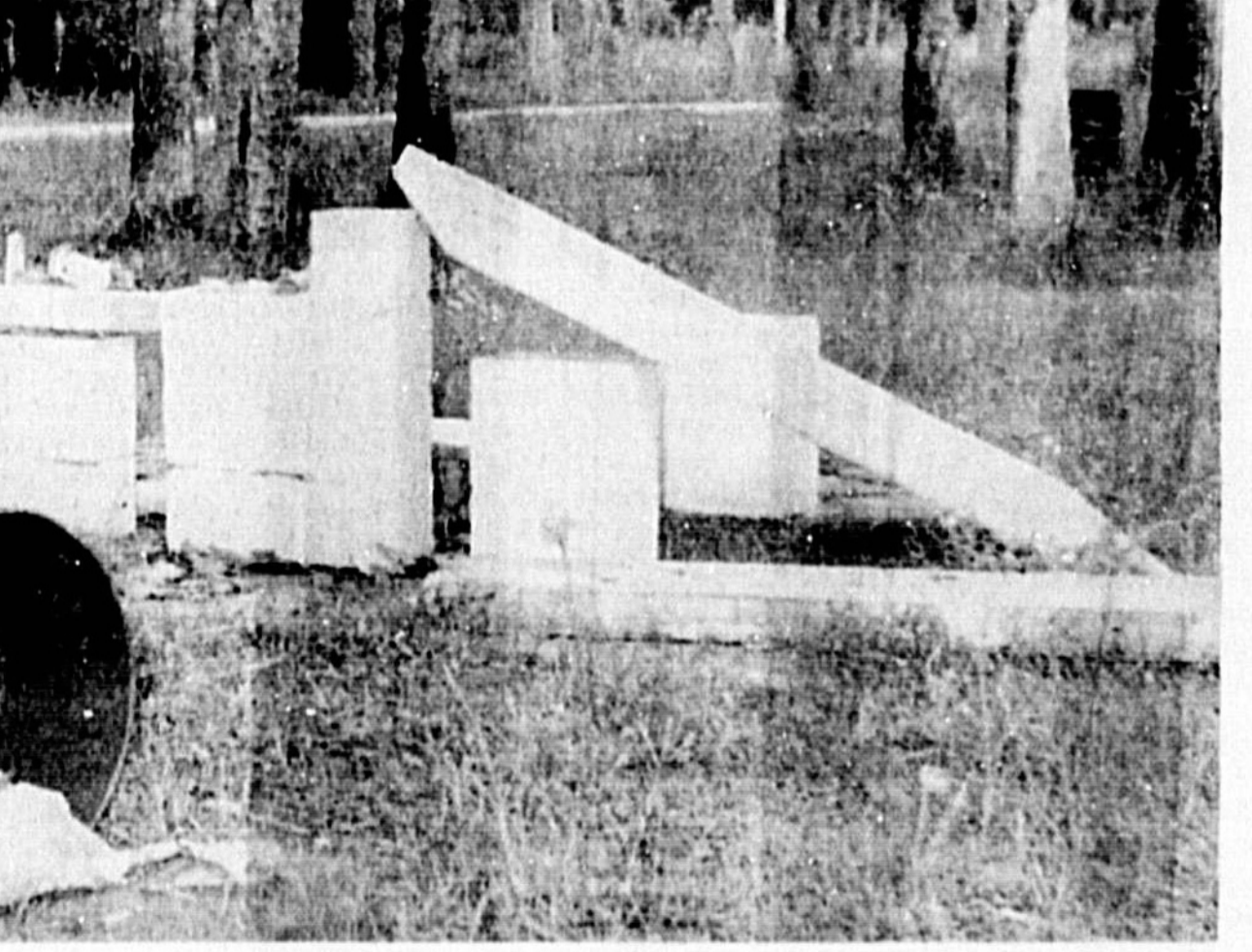

## Doctor Testifies In Kopechne Hearing

WILKES BARRE, Pa. (AP) — A Philadelphia medical examiner says an autopsy on the body of Mary Jo Kopechne would tend to confirm, tend to modify or could negate the drowning verdict issued by a medical examiner in Massachusetts. Dr. Joseph W. Spelman said he had performed several thousand autopsies and that an external examination alone, such as was performed on Miss Kopechne, "even if carefully and thoroughly done, frequently failed to reveal internal injuries."

## Sales And Use Tax Climb

The office of Comptroller Fred O. Dickinson, Jr., in a recent news release has announced the steady uptrend of Florida's sales and use tax collection, reaching a peak of 10 billion dollars for the month of September. Comparison with Sept. 1968 receipts shows that the state collected five million or 12 per cent, additional money from this source. Collections for the three month period since July show an even greater percentage edge of 16 per cent above the tax for a similar period last year. "Receipts for the month of September reflect collections made during the month of August, the tail end of the visitor season in Florida," Dickinson pointed out. Gains in revenue were also reported from the state gasoline tax, with collections reaching above 17 million for September. This was a five per cent increase over September 1968 revenues reported.

## Sanford To Replace Orlando's Herndon?

Barring a last minute change, the Orange, Osceola, Seminole Planning Commission will recommend to Orlando City Commission, Sanford City Commission, City of Kissimmee, and other affected governmental and aviation-oriented bodies that Herndon Airport be closed.

Harlan Hanson, Tri-county planning director, was contacted today and advised "it is a bit premature at this time, since the City of Orlando has four consulting firms working on the same situation and it will be awhile before their recommendations are known."

Hanson admitted that Howard, Needles, Tammen and Bergendoff, an Orlando consultant and engineering firm, had made known its findings during yesterday's Tri-County meeting on airport planning, and these included the closing of Herndon and construction of two additional airports at Winter Garden and in east Orlando.

The planner said the Tri-County recommendations would be made about a month after the reports from other consultants are known.

Problems with the U.S. flight paths of landing planes from McCoy's Jet Port across Herndon, making a potentially dangerous situation for Herndon, Hanson advised.

It is expected to close Herndon is forthcoming, it could have considerable effect on the Sanford Airport situation as air industries and airlines now located at the Orlando facility would be casting an eye toward Sanford as a future location.

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## Jessup Span Endorsed

TALLAHASSEE — Seminole County is in line for some major road improvements within the next five years, principally construction of Lake Jessup causeway and a new Oslen bridge with approach from SR 46 east.

This was the "message" received from Jay W. Brown, commissioner of the State Department of Transportation, who evinced great interest in the Lake Jessup causeway project. (Apparently the state's No. 2 road chief had not been apprised of the county's interest in causeways across Lake Monroe and Lake Jessup.)

Brown studied a map as this reporter rested (from memory) facts to date about the two proposed highways.

The district office at Deland, under Engineer C. A. (Bill) Benedict, some time ago completed preliminary planning for the Lake Jessup causeway.

Purchase of right-of-way for a widened and improved Sanford Avenue from Osborn Road to the lake would cost \$300,000. Construction of a two-lane causeway across the lake would cost \$2.6 million. This much is included in the state's five-year program. Additional construction to widen the causeway to four lanes would cost an added \$1.7 million. This much is included in the state's 16-year program. The latter plan includes a widened Sanford Avenue from the lake.

Brown evinced interest in expediting this project since he saw, on the map, that it would increase access to Florida Technological University, three miles south of Oviedo. Benedict said his office is ready to commence work on the project "as soon as funds are made available."

It was pointed out to Brown that the causeway would cut the mileage between Sanford and Oviedo from 15 to about nine and would provide a straight "shoot" from the Sanford area to the lake. Taskavilla Road and a new road which would by-pass Oviedo to the school.

Brown promised early conference with Benedict on this project.

### Laurie Skirts Keys

MIAMI (AP) — Coastal residents from Cuba to Texas watched warily today as Hurricane Laurie crested slowly toward the Florida Keys with 90 mile-per-hour winds.

The big, wet storm circled slowly southward during the early morning hours and lost some of its fury in the waters of the Gulf of Mexico.

It was moving on a southwest course, headed for Florida's southwest tip.

Forecasters at the National Hurricane Center in Miami said Laurie was about 315 miles southwest of Fort Myers and 375 miles west-southwest of Key West at midmorning, moving southward at about 10 m.p.h. The storm's calm center was pinpointed in the Gulf of Latitude 25.4 north, Longitude 86.8 west.

Gales extended out 175 miles to the east, toward Florida and storm tides were forecast along the Florida West Coast. Boaters along a 200-mile stretch of shoreline were alerted to watch for the storm.

Laurie's slow movement made it's future track hard to predict, said Gil Clark at the hurricane center. But he said the shift to a southerly track made further identification unlikely.

If Laurie continued on it's southeasterly course it would enter remote Florida Bay, some 50 miles south of Naples, early Thursday and across the Florida Keys north of Key West.

However, Clark pointed out forecasters had no way of knowing.
