Lyons wants to supervise elections

SANFORD - A former San-ford City Commissioner is running for public office once

Kerry Lyons, who served on the City Commission the last four years, is running for Seminole County Supervisor of

Lyons wants to use technology, education, and greater voter access to increase turnout at elections. The general election will be held Nov. 7. 2000.

"I have a strong commitment to public service." Lyons said. "This is something I'm very intent on doing. I want to use my experience as a commis-sioner to improve voter turn-

out in the county."


For the March 2 city election in which A.A. "Mac" McLanahan was chosen to replace Lyons on the commission and the public safety departments were placed under the manager's supervision. registered voters cast ballots.

Lyons did not run for reelection to the commission. In Sanford's District 3, the only district where voters could cast ballots in the commission race, just 8 percent of the registered voters turned out.

In the general election of No-vember, 1998, 46.6 percent of the county's registered voters cast ballots. This is a nearly 15 percent drop from the gen-eral election of 1996, when 61.5 percent of the county's registered voters went to the poles.

In the general election of 1994, 64.4 percent of the registered voters cast ballots. In the 1992 election, 85.7 percent of the registered voters turned out. In 1990, 60.1 percent of the registered voters cast ballots.

Helmet law can prevent injuries, save lives

SANFORD - On March 25 in a quiet Sanford neighborhood, rescue workers responded to the scene of a child who had been struck by a vehicle while riding his bicycle without wearing a heimet.

The boy was rushed from 100 Anderson Circle to Orlando Regional Medical Center, and survived the accident. However, the boy also received head injuries that may have been prevented by wearing a helmet.

Lake Mary gives fire chief more power

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary city commissioners voted unanimously last night to amend the city's alarm ordinance and allow fire chief Craig Haun the same power now granted po-lice chief Richard Beary to waive false alarm fees and prohibit occupancy of a structure cited for disconnection of a required fire alarm or sprinkler system.

Chief Haun said the amendment "addresses the specific-ity of adherence," because in the past it only addressed the power of the police chief for both burglar and fire alarms.

The commissioners also voted unanimously to amend the fire ordinance:

make burn permits

two consecutive days. No more than two burn permits may be issued for any one location within a 30day period. Currently, there is no time limit and no fee assessed for the permit;

to authorize issuance of a Fireworks sale permit and giving fire officials the ability to revoke the permit in drought scenario. It is now issued as a tent permit with fire officials verifying the tent permit and fire extinguisher accessibility:

to amend the installation and use of key-lock boxes and tamper switches on new structures. Key lock

-- allowing emergency re-sponse officers instant access to a structure without waiting for a key from the

boxes and tamper switches

owner -- will eventually be required in all existing buildings as well. According to Chief Haun, this has been addressed in building plan reviews in the past and relates to alarms and power shunts (electrical cut-off). "Now as an ordinance, it makes standards enforceable."

to amend installation standards and supervision of fire sprinkler systems

to clarify the code for renovations of existing structures;

to details charges for standby fire protection or rescue service. There is no

fee structure currently in in the past charges were assessed on a case-by-case basis. "Now we have a set standard." He explains that the fee is not a revenue source for the department. It serves to offsets additional costs and could be waived if needed;

SEMINOLE COUNTY - On his last day of work, County Manager Gary Kaiser said "Good Luck" to Acting Manager Cindy Coto and gave her a can of aerosol B.S. Repellent.

The county has received 60 or so applications as the result of a nation-wide search for a successor to Kaiser, who left public service last week to become president and chief executive officer of HTE, Inc. in Lake Mary.

Cooper was a farmer and a biology teacher

R.F. COOPER

Ruby F. Cooper, a young Sanford man, divided his time between teaching biology at Seminole High School and farming. He was a North Carolinian who stated that he had rather live in Sanford that anywhere else because of the tremendous possibilities.

Mr Cooper was raised on a farm near Salemburg, N.C. He had to assume its responsibilities at the age of 12 when his father died, leaving him as the only boy in a family of five

tte graduated from Mars Hill High School and then worked his way through the University of Florida from which he was graduated with a BSAE de-

In August 1922 he came to Sanford where he taught agriculture at Sanford High School from 1922-1928. While he was there, he was instrumental in getting the football team well established by assisting as

From 1928-32 he was aclively engaged as a farmer: during the past year he had returned to SHS as biology teacher as well as operating his farm.

During 1925 he did some research work at Cornell University in New York; while there he traveled around the area which comprised the extent of his travels.

Mr. Cooper was an active member of First Baptist Church where he had been Superintendent of the Inter-Department since mediate

DEAR ANNE AND NAN: I need several old cylinder-type phonograph records that were used on the Edison type phonographs and dictating machines in the early 1900s to complete a school exhibit. Information as to availability would be appreciated.

DEAR IDDO: In a couple of our reference books we found the name of a person who collects, among other things, cylinder records. He's Steve Ramm, and his address is 420 Fitswater St., Philadelphia, PA 19147. He specializes in phonographs and related memorabilia from before 1930. Our suggestion is to write to him—and be sure to include a stamped, self-

addressed envelope.

DEAR ANNE AND NAN: I once had the recipe for "old-fashion rice pudding." I have lost it, and no other recipe is the same. Can you send me this recipe? — JENNY O'DON-NELL, Naperville, III.

DEAR JENNY: Here's our favorite recipe for rice pudding. It comes from "The Fannie Merritt Farmer Boston Cooking School Cookbook" (Little, Brown and Co., 1959).

Old-Fashioned Rice Pudding
This is very soft and creamy. For a
firm pudding, use 1/2 cup of rice
Brown rice gives a delicious flavor.
For a richer pudding, stir in 1 or 2
well-beaten eggs 30 minutes before
the pudding is done.

4 cups milk 2/3 cup sugar

1/4 cup uncooked rice 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla

I teaspoon vanilla or a dash or nutneg or the grated rind of 1/2 lemon 1/2 cup raisins, dates or figs, cut small.

Combine the first six ingredients in the casserole. Bake uncovered for 3 lours at 300 degrees. During the first lour, stir three times with a fork so that the rice will not settle. 





Anglers who purchase five-year licenses by phone will be able to start fishing immediately and will receive their credit-card atyle license by mail, along with a package of free samples and special offers.

We live in a society where many consumers over extend themselves by taking on more debt than they can comforta-bly afford. 





There's no need for flamboyance

Willard Duncan Vandiver, in a speech at a naval banquet in Philadelphia in 1899, said, "I come from a state that raises corn and cotton and cockleburs and Democrats, and frothy eloquence neither con-vinces nor satisfies me. I am from ...

Successful defense is rarely flam-boyant, or frothy. It is usually undra-matic. Take the West cards in the diagram. Against four spades, you lead the heart king: three, seven, four. What now?

While deciding, what would you re-spond with that North hand? The eight high-card points might lead you to believe that two spades is sufficient. However, the singleton club and the known nine-card fit make it worth a

limit raise of three spades. Yet if you still use the old-fashioned forcing raise (say it isn't so!), taking a shot at four spades is better than settling for a single raise. You might not make it, but at least you pressure the opponents, and you're paid a game bonus for success.

for success. When the deal occurred in Springfield, Mo., West continued with the heart jack. Declarer won with dummy's ace and conceded a club trick. In a moment, South raked in 10 tricks via five spades, one heart, one diamond and three club ruffs in the

Dummy's singleton club should have been like a proverbial red rag. Anticipating declarer's ruffing club losers, West should have switched to his trump. When declarer gives up the club trick, East returns a second trump. Now South gets only two ruffs in the dummy and nine tricks in total. As you've probably guessed (or knew), Vandiver was from Missouri.

two distinct things to doctors: light-headedness (a vague, uncertain feel-ing like unsteadiness or faintness) or vertigo (a sensation of spinning). Lightheadedness is often caused by circulatory disturbances. For example, if you suddenly stand from a sit-ting position, your blood pressure may not instantaneously compensate for the rapid change. Consequently, you may experience a temporary feeling of wooziness, until the blood pressure rises to force blood to your brain against gravity. This commonly occurs with age, is more common in treated hypertensives and ordinarily is no cause for concern. A similar but more pronounced reaction can appear

when a person's pulse falls, if the blood pressure suddenly drops or if the blood pressure is too low (as may be the case in hypertensives who are aggressively treated).

blood vessels is another common cause of lightheadedness in older patients. Yet, young people will also experience lightheadedness. During the 1940s, bobby soxers would often faint when listening to Frank Sinatra sing. Old Blue Eyes lost this signature in his waning years, and we will probably never know with certainty what caused adolescents to swoon when he crooned — but swoon they did.

On the other hand, vertigo is a different problem. "Swimming" of the head, loss of spatial orientation, a feeling of revolving or spinning are symptoms that point to the vestibular appa-ratus of each inner ear, a form of paired gyroscopes that tell us about

body position. When you close your eyes and turn around repeatedly (or suffer from motion sickness), the dizziness you experience is vertigo. In patients with vestibular malfunction, the vertigo can be incapacitating. In general, vertigo requires evaluation by an ear-nose and throat specialist.

Although this may seem like a long-winded answer to your question, the distinction between lightheadedness and vertigo is crucial. You probably are suffering from the former, perhaps related to your hypertension and its therapy. Therefore, in your case, I'd start with your family physician. If necessary, he or she can refer you to an otolaryngologist for additional test-

For other patients, I offer the fol-lowing advice. When discussing the problem of "dizziness" with your doc-tor, be sure to define the problem in terms of whether it is lightheadedness or vertigo.
