

U. S. Seen As Sole Democracy Capable Of Military Strength

Britain's drastic decision to reduce its global military commitments, in a further effort to cripple the economic crisis gripping the country, is a reminder that the United States is the last of the great democratic countries still capable of fully manning a war machine and that this can be a mighty blessing to the world.

Many are thinking of the time in World War I when it was plodding across a field in Flanders Field to reach the front line and get caught in the middle of a terrific German barrage. I wasn't exactly lonesome; but I had a feeling for the company of those who knew bargains and could have a sympathetic understanding.

Which is by way of saying that, after all, England has been America's staunch ally in two world conflicts, and remains the chief ally of Western Europe for the defense of democracy. It's tough to see her striking-power reduced even temporarily in these emergency days.

This reduction of military commitments was one of the concessions Prime Minister Attlee announced yesterday in a secret cabinet meeting to listen with critical attention to an accounting of his stewardship. He has been under heavy fire, not only from his conservative opposition but from many of his own followers, because of dissatisfaction with the government's progress in dealing with the economic upaval.

The Prime Minister defended his position with determination, as this column yesterday said he likely would do. The result was that he won a virtual vote of confidence from his caucus.

The Prime Minister is reported not only to have promised to cut down military commitments in Greece, Italy and Germany, but to reduce the number of men under arms and send them back into the ranks of labor to meet the demand for work.

Thus he got over one of the high hurdles.

But that wasn't his only promise. It is said that he will call on Britain's coal miners to work an extra hour daily in order to get the production which is so badly needed to stimulate badly lagging industry. Lack of coal is the crux of the economic crisis. It is suggested that the miners get time and a half pay for this overtime.

Advocates of this plan say it would increase the coal output some 300,000 tons a week, to swell the present production of about 2,700,000 tons. The government's target for the year is 32,000,000 tons.

The vote of confidence means that the question of Attlee's resignation is a thing of the past. There has been a demand in some quarters that he step down to other leadership, and Foreign Minister Ernest Bevin was mentioned as a possible successor.

However, a high government source says that Attlee may make changes in his cabinet soon. In this connection the London Daily Mail said yesterday, prior to the vote, that the only concession the Prime Minister was prepared to make would be the formation of a sort of emergency battle group of five senior ministers to tackle the economic problems. The big five would be Attlee himself, Foreign Minister Bevin, Chancellor of the Exchequer Dalton, Deputy Prime Minister Morrison and President of the Board of Trade Sir Stafford Cripps.

Mr. Attlee's government would seem to have weathered a nasty hurricane. The storm signs aren't yet down yet, though, and won't be until there is marked improvement in the economic situation, a matter of concern not only to the people of Britain but to the world at large, especially America.

Boats Destroyed By \$500,000 Florida Fire

SAFONIA, Fla., July 31.—(AP)—About 50 boats, many of them newly appointed cabin cruisers, were destroyed today by a fire which caused an estimated \$500,000 damage.

The flames swept through a wood-and-iron storage shed and marina way belonging to the World of Marine Ways, in Safonia, near the boundary of Lake Worth.

Chief E. K. Braun of Lake Worth estimated the damage and said the fire was so intense that some boats, like flames and sunlight, were a distance away from the shed.

A nearby resident discovered flames, which spread swiftly, and called the fire department. It took three hours to bring it under control.

One man was reported injured.

Sentence Appealed By "Paul Revere"

BOSTON, July 31. (AP)— Counsel for Douglas Chandler today prepared an appeal for the 68-year-old Chicago-born writer sentenced to life imprisonment and fined \$10,000 for serving as a Nazi mouthpiece during the war.

The gray-haired Chandler, branded a "snob" by the presiding judge, made an aggressive last-minute personal plea reasserting statements he made over Berlin radio when he was lauding Hitler and denouncing the Jews.

Federal Judge Francis J. W. Ford, commenting he was satisfied the sentence would act as a "deterrent" for any future would-be traitors, took under advisement a defense motion for a stay of execution.

Red Suspects Freed From Greek Camp

ATHENS, July 31. (AP)— The Ministry of Public Order announced today it had directed the release of 279 concentration camp inmates who had voluntarily signed statements "condemning the Communist rebellion and disavowing KKE (the Greek Communist Party) methods."

Those released had been arrested in a recent roundup of suspected Communist sympathizers and were scheduled for deportation.

Press dispatches from Salonika reported that Greek guerrillas in the area had attacked the town of Alexandropolis in western Thrace, but said the garrison was standing them off.

Another Salonika dispatch said 40 guerrillas had been slain in an engagement with government troops north of Xanthi, close to the Greek-Bulgarian frontier. The dispatch said the guerrillas removed their killed and wounded across the frontier into Bulgaria.

Police Question 3 Bargemen In Slaying

BALTIMORE, July 31. (AP)— Police today questioned three young bargemen in the slaying of Doris O'Brien, 40, whose trussed body floated to the surface of the Baltimore harbor nine days ago.

Henry J. Kris, captain of detectives, said his investigators had concluded the woman had been beaten and thrown overboard Sunday, July 13, from a barge which plies between Baltimore and Norfolk, Va.

One of the seamen was arrested aboard the barge. The other two were returned here last night after being arrested in Norfolk.

Police said they had learned the woman left a tavern late Saturday night and went aboard the barge some time after it arrived here from Norfolk with a load of iron ingots.

In Hebrew, telling of the arrest of the man, their "trial, conviction and execution in the name of the Jewish struggle for a homeland."

The inscriptions told how pleas for clemency were rejected at the "military trial."

The killings, the inscription said, were carried out as "a military execution by the Jewish resistance to the enemies of our homeland."

The contorted features of the two sergeants indicated that their deaths had been caused by strangulation by crudely fashioned nooses. The ropes were looped around limbs close to the trunks of the trees. The men's hands had been tied behind their backs and their feet had been wired together. The sergeants' shirts had been used to blindfold them. Their underclothing and army trousers were stained with blood which poured from the gashes cut into their necks by the half-inch ropes.

The booby trap exploded as a grenadier guardman attempted to cut down Martin's body. The blast echoed throughout the historic forest of Sharon, scene of many battles of Biblical times.

Natanya's mayor, Oved Ben Ami, who had received information from the moderate underground, Hagana, that the bodies were in the area, was on the scene when the blast occurred.

The West, which looms as the major 1948 battleground, also is beckoning to others.

In Washington, Senator Claude A. Pepper, Florida Democrat, announced he plans a cross-country speaking tour in the fall in an effort to "keep our democratic party liberal."

Perhaps tipping off what he intends to tell the voters, Pepper said in an interview that the record of the G.O.P. Congress has buried "any hope or idea that the Republican Party might become the people's party, or liberal."

Taft has said he intends to discuss Congress' record and all issues, domestic and foreign, on his trip. He has called on other G.O.P. leaders to speak out.

It caused the armed forces concern to the point that it was discussed by the joint chiefs of staff," Lovett testified.

The original Hughes-Kaiser contract for three flying boats was later cut down to one, which has not yet been completed. Kaiser subsequently withdrew from the project, which Hughes is now carrying on.

The Patterson letter, read by Lovett, cited the need for "maximum production of combat planes" and said that none of the existing facilities should be diverted to the manufacture of cargo planes.

It added: "It is very evident that any large increase in cargo plane production can be accomplished only if the production of combat airplanes is reduced, and any such reduction is inadmissible in the existing situation."

Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) wanted to know whether the Army ever encountered any reports of labor pirating by the Kaiser-Hughes interests.

"Pirating" was a term applied during the war when one firm hired away another's employees.

"Yes, sir," said Lovett.

He said some months after award of the flying boat contract he had reports from a Boeing Aircraft subsidiary in Wichita, Kan., that "there had been hiving squads trying to pick up labor at the gates."

In reply to another question, he said they represented the Kaiser management.

Before today's committee session began, Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) said an aircraft expert's appraisal of Hughes' P-11 photo-reconnaissance plane as a "hot war" plane indicated Elliott Roosevelt had grounds for purportedly pushing wartime construction of the ship.

Jewish Refugees May Be Sent To Germany

LONDON, July 31.—(AP)— An authoritative source said today Britain would send the 4,500 Jewish refugees of the R. S. Exodus of 1947 expedition to Germany, and perhaps later to Africa, if they persisted in refusing to disembark at Fort-De-Bouc, France.

The source said Prime Minister Attlee and his cabinet took that decision at a meeting in which the entire Palestine situation was considered.

Under the plan, the Exodus of 1947 refugees would remain temporarily in the British zone of Germany while the British cabinet picked a place for them in some other British-controlled area of the world, notably an African colony, the source said.

U. S. Correspondents Kept From Red Zone

VIENNA, July 31. (AP)— American sources said today that for almost a month Russian authorities had refused to grant clearance papers for American newspaper correspondents seeking to cross the Soviet occupation zone en route to Budapest, Bucharest or Prague.

It also remarked, "I have no doubt that it will be shown that Elliott Roosevelt accepted entertainment from representatives of Hughes."

"On the facts as you state them," Senator Pepper, Lovett said, "a decision of that kind would call for a very careful exercise of judgment."

He added that the President had not consulted him on the decision.

Howard Hughes and his globe-trotting publicity man, John Meyer, will take the stand side by side tomorrow in the senatorial investigation of Hughes' wartime plane contracts. Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) announced today that arrangements have been made for the joint appearance of the Hollywood millionaire and the man who said he spent lavish sums to entertain government officials in Hughes' behalf.

Ferguson's announcement was made after a session in which the Senate War Investigating committee heard testimony that top military leaders turned down a mass flying boat program in July,

BERLIN, July 31. (AP)— Russian authorities announced today that 266,023 German war prisoners and civilian internees had been repatriated from the Soviet Union in the past 12 months.

Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav Molotov told the foreign ministers council at Moscow last spring that the Russians still held approximately 900,000 German war prisoners.

Truman And Whitney

The most important recent development in politics is the announcement of A. F. Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, that in 1948 he will support President Truman over any Republican candidate at all likely to be nominated. This reverses his sharp threat a year ago when the President broke the railroad strike, to have his organization spend \$2,000,000 if necessary, to defeat Mr. Truman for re-election. Now Whitney has cooled, and thinks that labor might easily have a more friendly President. Obviously it is the Taft-Hartley law and President Truman's veto of it, which has changed his thinking.

Gallup And The Plan

By the findings of the poll, about half the voters have heard or read about the plan, and the majority of them are in favor of its support. They also approve of the idea of giving large credits to European countries to spend in this country for their every day needs. Voters agree with our decision to go ahead without Russian co-operation. With all this favorable sentiment, one check is noted. No one wants taxes raised to support any European program.
