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The political race is on

Morris turns over 3,300 petitions with minutes to spare

SEMINOLE COUNTY - At precisely 11:11 a.m. Monday, Seminole County Commission Chairman Randy Morris came into the Supervisor of Elections Office with his hands full. He was carrying two boxes of qualifying petitions.

"How many do you have," Sandy Goard asked.

"There are 3,300," he said, "exactly 3,300."

Noon was the deadline for

Morris to qualify by the petition route. He was more than satisfied that he not only had collected a sufficient number of signatures but that during the one-month process he had added 80 more campaign volunteers.

Morris, 42, is taking nothing for granted in his race against Bob West, a political newcomer who is counting on a successful grass-route campaign to dethrone the man who has chaired the county com-

mission for 3 of the past 4 years.

"I take Mr. West very seriously," Morris said Monday. "At the same time I am proud of my performance and extremely pleased that so many important people in government are supporting me and that so many people have volunteered for the campaign."

U.S. Rep. John Mica, Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger, Tax Collector Ray Valdes, Seminole County Clerk of the

Court Maryanne Morse, Property Appraiser Bill Suber and 6 of 7 county majors are supporting Morris.

There is little doubt that Morris has been the key player on the commission the past 4 years. He's been enormously effective creating government/private partnerships and pacts with the 7 cities. He has pushed for economic development, a better transportation system and better roads and

Officials warn: Stay inside if you can

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Fire-weary Florida can't seem to get a break. What little rain that has fallen has been accompanied by lightning strikes that started more than 130 wildfires in the last 4 days.

Historically, June has been the state's rainiest month - the average being 3 to 4 inches each June. But this year there has been only fractions of inches of rain and the conditions have caused wildfires in all but one of Florida's 67 counties. Monroe County in the Florida Keys is the only county to be spared.

Florida Division of Forestry officials estimate that as many as 100,000 acres have been consumed by fire since a series of blazes began in the state nearly a month ago. There have been 776 fires with more than half of them in the past week. About 80 percent of these fires were started by lightning strikes.

Firefighters are getting no rest and citizens are having trouble breathing as the ozone level is reaching dangerous highs. The elderly and very young should be cautious when outdoors. Many residents say they have never experienced smog and foul air as they are

City manager job is officially filled

SANFORD - Anthony M. "Tony" Vanderworp has been officially selected as Sanford's new city manager. Following an extensive series of interviews, he was chosen from what was originally more than 130 applicants.

The last move was an agreement on a

contract between the city and Vanderworp. He agreed to an annual salary of \$98,000, plus \$450 per month as automobile allowance and an additional 10 percent of his salary, in addition to the salary, to be laid aside each year for retirement. The total annual expense involved is \$113,200.

The contract was discussed during Monday afternoon's commission work session. City Attorney Bill Colbert explained that

the contract was closely patterned after the International City Managers' Contract agreements, although there were some minor differences.

The only hesitation came when Commissioner White Eckstein asked Vanderworp if he would be immediately asking the city for a deputy city manager. "In time, I expect to ask for a deputy city manager,"

Longwood man charged with attempted murders of man, ex-girlfriend

SANFORD - A Longwood man was charged with the attempted murders of an ex-girlfriend and a Sanford man on Saturday, June 20.

Louis Schmidt, 55, of 981 First Place, Longwood, allegedly went to the home of James A. Mason, who resides at 3535 South Sipes Avenue, to confront his ex-girlfriend, Patricia Bieger, and Mason.

Around 2:15 p.m., Bieger was at Mason's home. She went to retrieve her purse and lock her car when a black Mercedes pulled into Mason's driveway.

The report, written by Seminole County's Sheriff Investigator Andrea Slaby, said that Schmidt exited his car and started towards Bieger uttering expletives and brandishing a 9 mm, semi-automatic handgun. Schmidt allegedly threatened to kill Bieger when Mason stepped outside to intervene. Shots were fired towards Mason and his home by Schmidt. Mason returned fire with his

.22 caliber revolver which he voluntarily turned over to police.

Schmidt supposedly fired off two rounds which Mason returned with three or four rounds of his own.

According to the report, no one was injured yet casings were recovered around the crime scene.

In a sworn statement given to police, Schmidt said he carried the gun because he thought that Bieger's new boyfriend wanted to kill him.

He later told Investigator Slaby that he was unsure if he had threatened Bieger. He admitted to coming back by the house after fleeing and fired a shot into the air.

Police stopped Schmidt at the corner of 14th Street and 2nd Place.

He was then transported to the John E. Polk Correctional Facility, where he signed a statement waiving his Miranda rights. He then gave his account to deputies.

His car was impounded and towed to the Sheriff's Office.

Fired officer speaks

I would just like to comment about the firing of myself Inv. Terry L. Mullins and Officer Arthur Barnes from the Sanford Police Department.

I was fired back on Feb. 9, 1998 without any pay or insurance pending the final outcome of the appeals process and I am the first and only officer to be treated this way. I have since learned that Arthur Barnes was fired with full pay and his insurance pending his outcome of appeals process.

Both of us have the same amount of time with the Sanford Police Department, 11 years of outstanding service, doing a job we both love and were proud to do.

At a recent commission meeting last Monday evening, I was present and listened to the voice of the people wanting to know from the commissioners and city manager and the mayor, why this has taken so long to be resolved and why has it happened in the first place. Why wasn't it stopped before it went this far. All the

answers were the same to everyone who asked, and all the answers given were just a dance around the real issue. They were all told of how the process has to run its course and it takes time and they the commissioners, mayor and city manager have to let it run its course and at the end they will get a final package explaining the findings.

This is true to some extent, but the fact of the matter is, it does not have to be dragged out over several months of hearings and findings. The police chief is the person who can stop this now. All he has to do is tell city hall he no longer wishes to have this type of punishment implemented against us and its then over. We would be called back to work and be allowed to continue to protect and serve the citizens again as we were hired too.

I was fired over 4 months ago for smoking a cigarette on duty and was asked not to light it and because I did light it anyway, it was called insubordination. Arthur was fired for bad conduct and insubordination. Tell me where is the justice in this type of treatment of veter-

eran officers. This is to say the very least cruel and unusual punishment.

If we had committed a crime or had been bad officers with a history of bad conduct I could see a form of punishment, but this is not the case at all. It is simply a case of us not being one of the good ole' boys and telling those who are what a good job they are doing and how much we admire them.

This is where the whole problem lies. It is because we refuse to kiss up to them and put them on the back and want to be like them. It is because we refuse to do this is why we have become the target of such harsh and cruel punishment. I am talking about Chief Joe Dillard. This is a man who comes to work and makes comments about how he hates it and is only there to collect a pay check.

What kind of leader is this. No wonder the officers have the attitudes they do, when the top man hates being there. This comment can be backed up by several inside the department who can testify to him saying it. So why don't you just go then Joe, and let the police department be taken by a man

who loves doing the job and will treat the men and women right and with respect. The officers do the job because they all have the same idea myself and Arthur have, that is they want to do the right thing to protect and serve the city. Just because you don't want to work Joe, is no reason to fire all of us who do.

I think you should be faced with the stress and heavy heart of being fired. I think it's time you were put in our place, then you will see how it feels. So before you get put into this place why don't you do the right thing and bring Arthur and me back to work and put a stop to this once and for all. You have the power. All it takes is a phone call. Why not be a man and show the people you do care and let 2 good officers return to do our jobs. Remember kindness begets kindness, compassion begets compassion, forgiveness begets forgiveness.

The Summer Olympics in Orlando???

We better think twice about it

SANFORD - What's all this about the Olympics coming to Orlando? There is no way this town can be ready to host an event on that scale, whether it be 16 years or 116 years from now.

In 1998, the transportation system in Central Florida is awful. During rush hour, it's impossible to get from Point A to Point B and during an Olympics, every hour is rush hour.

Standing in lines waiting for transportation while baking in 105 degree temperatures and traveling all over Central Florida to get from venue to venue won't create the best impressions.

Also, remember, cities like Montreal in 1976 have nearly gone bankrupt trying to host the games. Of course you can do what Atlanta did in 1996 and turn itself into a living billboard of corporate sponsorship, but we wouldn't want Florida to look tacky, would we?

People talk about the civic pride it would bring to Orlando, but people are forgetting one thing: nobody is actually from Orlando. Ask 100 people on the streets where they are from and 95 will mention someplace other than here.

Shoot, we don't even play state income tax. The Olympics was a nice idea. Let someone else have the headaches.

Hyperventilation can be scary

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife was taken to the hospital because she felt she couldn't get enough air into her lungs. This caused her to breathe rapidly. Soon thereafter, she became all tingly and numb.

After testing her heart and lungs, the ER physician told her to breathe into a paper bag. What on earth is this all about?

DEAR READER: From your brief description, I conclude that your wife suffered from "hyperventilation syndrome." For some reason (perhaps stress or anxiety), she began to over-breathe. As she expelled more and more carbon dioxide, the normal acidity of her body fluids fell. Her system became too alkaline. This, in turn, resulted in the strange feelings of tingling and numbness. Lightheadedness is also a common sensation.

The treatment for hyperventilation syndrome is easy and cheap. By breathing into a paper bag, the patient recycles carbon dioxide and maintains a normal body acidity.

This syndrome is not harmful, but it can be frightening. If your wife experiences another episode, she should be able to overcome the attack by using a paper bag for a few minutes. This is, believe it or not, standard medical therapy for this condition. And it works.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from a terrible bladder condition called "interstitial cystitis." Nothing my doctors have done relieves my pain. Is there any help for me?

DEAR READER: Interstitial cystitis is a chronic, painful, debilitating inflammation of the bladder wall, leading to extreme discomfort, urgency and frequency. The cause is unknown.

To a degree, the diagnosis is one of exclusion: infection, cancer, endometriosis and a variety of other conditions must first be ruled out by appropriate testing. IC is associated with multiple, punctate hemorrhages of the bladder lining, which are easily seen during cystoscopy.

Until recently, therapy for IC was often ineffective. Now, however, a new drug has been released. Called Elmiron, the pill must be taken every day for several months. Ask your doctor about this breakthrough.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Ten years ago, I had a routine chest X-ray that was reported to show emphysema. I was not a smoker. My doctor ordered pulmonary function tests, which were normal. Two years ago, I had a repeat

In its early forms, emphysema is difficult to diagnose on chest X-ray exams. Some radiologists overread the films if they see evidence that the diaphragm muscles are flat and the lungs appear overexpanded. Remember, these doctors are looking at shadows, and shadows can be misinterpreted.

If you have no history of respiratory symptoms, exposure to industrial pollutants, cigarette smoke, asthma and so forth, you can safely ignore the X-ray readings. Before doing so, however, make certain that your family doctor agrees with my position.

Benefiting from reader comment

Britain's best player, Tony Forrester, writes for The Daily Telegraph. He has put together a collection of his columns. "Vintage Forrester" (Batsford). There is advice on all aspects of the game, with a wide variety of subject matter and complexity level. In particular, Forrester's recommendations are practical. He describes only conventions that he feels are useful. Forrester admits that the articles' quality has been improved by taking advantage of suggestions from readers. Here is one of the easier deals, featuring a defensive play that has been highlighted many times in the literature, but is often missed by players below the expert level.

South's jump to four spades is an overbid, but if he made a game try, North would accept with his near-maximum.

In answer to his partner's opening bid, West leads the heart seven. East wins and playing two more rounds of the suit. When South ruffs the last of these with the spade queen, what should West do?

There is a natural reaction to over-ruff, but it's wrong. South will win whatever West returns, draw trumps and claim. His losers are one spade and two hearts.

Note the difference if West discards at trick three. South's remaining trumps are headed by the ace-jack-nine. Sitting over him, West has the king-10-two. West must collect two trump tricks, to go with East's pair of heart winners.
