## Will 10,000 names stop nude dancing?

**SANFORD** - A group known as the Seminole County Citizens for Decency want no more nude dancing in the county and stiff penalties for

those who do not comply.

Their latest effort to cover up Seminole is in the form of a proposed ordinance to be reviewed by the Board of County Commissioners.

The group intends to collect 10,000 signatures of eligible voters. Within 60 days after the requi-

site number of names is verified by the Supervisor of Elections and reported to the board, the BCC would have to hold a public meeting and vote.

If the Board failed to enact the proposed ordinance, it shall, by resolution, call a referendum

on the question of the adoption of the proposed ordinance to be held at the next general election. Getting the issue to the voters would be a victory in itself, say members of the Seminole County

## Cop official implicated, coach resigns in scandal

**ORLANDO** - A former Seminole County Sheriff's official has been implicated in a scandal involving the illegal use of cellular telephones which led to the resignation Tuesday of University of Central Florida football coach Gene McDowell.

David Smith, the former director of the sheriff's juvenile crime division, as part of a felony plea agreement is expected to plead guilty for his role during a federal investigation of cellular phone misuse among members of the Golden Knights football team.

Smith, 46, is the father of UCF player Maurice Smith and former UCF player Marquette Smith. He resigned earlier this month from his post at the sheriff's office citing personal reasons.

"It's an unfortunate situation," said Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger. "He had a stellar career and this is an unfortunate way to end it."

The plea agreement is simi-

lar to the one McDowell entered prior to his resignation. McDowell and Smith face penalties ranging from probation to prison for leaking out information about a federal probe and a locker room raid by U.S. Secret Service agents Oct. 28, 1997. During that raid, agents seized four cellular phones. Former UCF football player, Patrick Brinson was subse-

quently arrested and charged for selling the phones. At the time, Brinson worked as an AT&T technician.

Upon further questioning, court records show that McDowell and Smith lied during the investigation and that Smith, who often travels with the team, told the coach that players could be under investi-

## A grandfather of all dilemmas

**CASSELBERRY** - Grandfathering. Expect to hear a lot about this term - grandfathering - the next month or two as the Board of Seminole County Commissioners wrestle with a devilish decision on the adult entertainment industry.

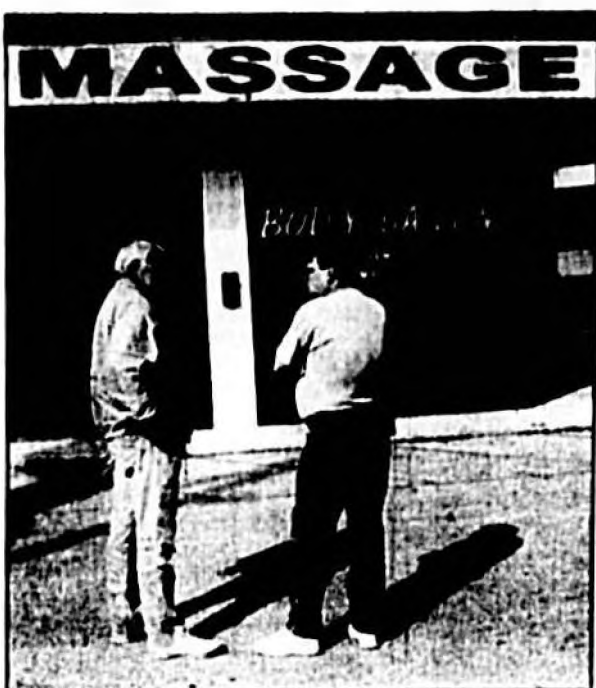
The residents of the southern end of the county say they've suffered long enough, that it is time to move the adult clubs somewhere else - like Sanford.

Three of the five county commissioners favor grandfathering - or allowing the present clubs to stay where they are. Club owners have been cooperating with the county to make significant changes, and an ordinance for grandfathering is being drawn up.

Assistant County Attorney Lonnie Groot said an initial draft of the ordinance will be ready this week.

The ordinance and scheduling of two public meetings would have to be advertised before the commission would vote. If that vote were today, three of the five commissioners would vote for grandfathering.

That leaves time for citizens groups to take action, groups which may have some say before the actual grandfathering vote is



taken.

Some of the more annoyed residents in the Casselberry/Fern Park area have scheduled a town hall meeting 7 p.m. tonight at the Casselberry Library. They've invited commissioners Win Adams and Randy Morris to attend. Bob West, who is challenging Morris in this year's election, also is expected to attend.

**SANFORD** - School bus drivers from Seminole County will be navigating a different route during the 15th annual Safety and Skills Competition on Feb. 28.

There will be 50 bus drivers from public schools participating in 11 events. More than 40 counties in Florida will hold similar competitions to determine the team that will represent its school district.

Events included in the written and driving skills tests are student load (ability to execute safe student pick-up); railroad

"We want reasonable results," says Ralph Foulds, President of the Lake of the Woods Homeowners Association. "If it isn't possible to sweep these clubs out, at least keep them from expanding."

Foulds is concerned that new clubs such as Sassy Merlot and VIP Gold, which have challenged the county in court, may also attempt to be grandfathered with the older clubs. Legal fees have cost the county \$190,000.

"I'm afraid of what's going to happen if they grandfather the old clubs," says Stan Bessmer of English Estates, English

Woods. "Those horses may go up again at Circus Circus and there will be neon signs up and down 17-92."

Bessmer, 75, is a community activist who is not the least bit shy about investigating the adult entertainment scene along 17-72. On Tuesday, he visited with Bob Waldorf who manages Gentle Touch Massage at 9202 South Hwy. 17-92.

Gentle Touch is the new name for Syn-Sations, a body scrub business that has turned over a new leaf. Everything at Gentle Touch, Waldorf said, is above board. Customers come in for a session in a hot tub or to receive a massage from a li-

censed therapist. The place opens at 10 a.m. and stays open to 2 a.m.

There's a sign that reads: "Men's Full Service Salon. You Need Us. We Knead You. Gentle Touch Massage is written in big letters.

"We're not breaking any laws, and business has been good," said Waldorf. "The Sheriff's Office has been in a couple of times. We're OK. We're not an adult entertainment business. We are licensed therapists."

Lt. Sammy Gibson from the Sheriff's Office said the Gentle Touch Massage salon has complied to county rules. There would be further checks, of course.

Waldorf said that he was the original owner of House of Babes, which is one of the adult clubs which could be grandfathered by the county.

"I've heard the talk about grandfathering. I've heard what people think if they don't grandfather. Would all these businesses go somewhere else? And would that be Sanford?"

"These businesses are always going to be around. If not here, then Sanford or somewhere else. It makes no difference where they go, they'll go and there will be people who go to them. That's a gimme. Guys will search and find these places no matter where they are."

Citizens for Decency. The petition request to Sandra Gourd, Supervisor of Elections, was submitted by pastor Mark George of the Community United Methodist Church in Casselberry.

"The idea is for the citizens to show they do not agree with the 'Anything Goes' attitude shared by three of the county commissioners," Commissioner Grant Maloy said today. "They believe there should be certain standards of decency in business or public places."

"Most people I know can't understand why the dancers in this county shouldn't wear G-strings as they do in Orange County," Maloy said.

Maloy and others trying to eliminate total nudity say they have been harassed by backers of the adult entertainment industry. The petition is a way

## Taxes aren't quite so high!

DEAR READERS: Recently, I answered a letter from a reader in Nebraska about the viability of renting her land. In the letter, through my error, her taxes were reported as \$21,000 a year, with an extra zero inadvertently added. The taxes were \$2,100, which is a far more reasonable number. Many of you wrote in to ask how in the world anyone could pay \$21,000 in real-estate taxes on a \$200,000 farm. You were absolutely correct, and I do apologize.

DEAR BRUCE: My wife and I are considering selling our present home and buying another. Our combined yearly salary is between \$85,000 and \$90,000. The home we are looking at will cost between \$350,000 and \$400,000. I know that in some parts of the country, this would seem like a lot of money - but in a ski resort area outside of Vail, Colo., this amount is the norm for modest homes.

At first glance, it looks out of reach; however, we have equity in excess of \$200,000 in our current home. I would like to invest the \$200,000 and borrow the money on the mortgage. My wife insists that we put the entire proceeds of this home into the house we are buying, to reduce our mortgage. If you were in our position, what would you do? I should note that we are moving because our family has grown. - D.C., Vail, Colo.

DEAR D.C.: You are being realistic; if there weren't a lot of equity in your present home, there is no way you could afford a home at \$350,000 to \$400,000, with the income cited. In theory, I would put as little money down as I could. You will have to come up with at least \$70,000 on a \$350,000 home (20 percent). I would be much more inclined to invest the remaining \$130,000 in the marketplace. It may be, however, that the lender will want you to make a larger down payment - thereby lowering your monthly obligation to a number that could be handled with your earned income, not your investment income.

DEAR BRUCE: I have read that you went back to college after an Air Force stint and your marriage, and that you worked full time and went to school full time. I find this difficult to believe.

# Magda and the challenge of the disabled

WASHINGTON--Years ago when I lived in Detroit, my friend Magda's mom occasionally called her "a living doll." Cute and bubbly, Magda would hear the compliment, laugh and keep moving. A self-described "blur before your eyes," she was a sometime model who chatted up strangers at parties, danced every record and looked great in anything.

Recently, I saw her for the first time in a decade. She looked just the same, except for the wheelchair.

Now that Magda, 36, has multiple sclerosis--the progressive disease that can rob young adults of their vision, speech and/or mobility--the living doll description is ironic.

She had phoned to ask if I had heard rumors that Barbie's wheelchair-using doll pal, Becky, can't fit into Barbie's dream house. "That's how my life feels," she said with a laugh. "People always say, 'Yeah, (your wheelchair) can get in' someplace, but often, (it) can't. They don't even notice it.'"

Not so long ago, she admits, "I didn't." Actually, Becky--a hit since Mattel introduced her last May--can get into all three current dream house versions. The nightmare is getting her pink and purple wheelchair on the house's elevator. It won't fit.

Mattel is "taking steps" toward making all Barbie products accessible, says spokeswoman Lisa McKendall. Becky

wasn't targeted to the disabled, McKendall continues. "We were trying to show a doll with disabilities as reflective of the real world."

Ironically, Mattel succeeded. In the real world, folks in wheelchairs often find elevators and doors too narrow. Magda, a communications director for a labor union who moved here from Detroit 11 years ago, has had to ride kitchen elevators in hotels and, once, even in the White House.

In the real world, she knows, you can go from being someone stared at longingly to being someone who makes others "face their fears, just looking at you."

Visiting the Arlington, Va., co-op, where she had moved before her illness, I saw that Magda is still luckier than many: Her co-owners opted to pay for lobby ramps

and railings.

But seeing a metal chair contain a force like Magda--whose disease progressed from brief blindness in her right eye to awakening one day to find that her legs didn't work--forced me to think:

Of how I'd barely examined the hardships affecting millions of my disabled neighbors. Of how inaccessible restrooms, churches and my own home are. Of how effervescent, how graceful, someone in a wheelchair can be.

"Humor," Magda begins describing a typical day, "is necessary." Awakening to her nurse's key in the door, she:

Uses her upper body and a pulley to hoist herself onto her bedside commode. Pulls herself onto her wheelchair and rolls to the bathroom, with its too-narrow doorway. Launches herself onto an adjacent, armless chair and is pushed to the shower. Slides over onto her shower chair. Turns on the water "which I love, sitting or standing," and sings a hymn--which is much more fun than the daily sobbing that preceded her realization that "I don't want to stay in a place of tears."

Finally, she says, "I'm all cleaned up and happy."

"I had to stop wishing for it to be the way it was," Magda continues. "I believe--or I'm leaning toward that--that I am enough just the way I am. That this moment is a marvel."

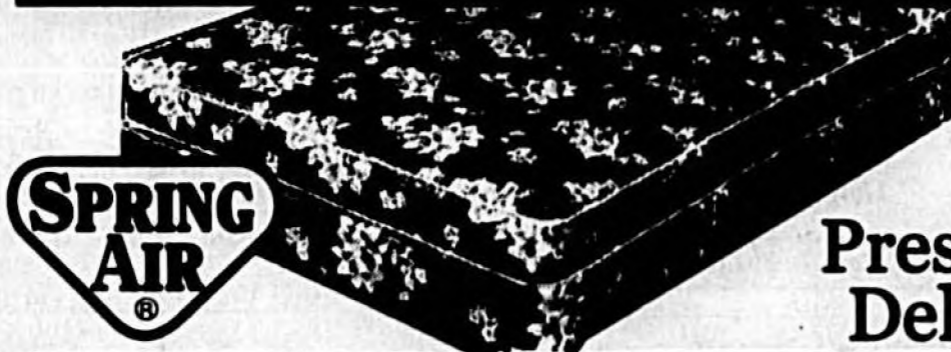

LAKE MARY - Every time Lake Mary takes the softball field, volleyball court or basketball court, she is there.

Usually, she is not alone, but is accompanied by a little follower or two.

Truth is, even if Virginia Gaudreau didn't take one or more of her grandchildren to the games, she would continue to attend, just as she has for over 20 years.

"I keep all of the team's schedules on my refrigerator so I can make sure I know when all of the games are being played," Gaudreau explained. "Now that I'm a little older, I make sure I get out to all of the county games, but don't get to travel as much to the games that are farther away. It's harder to travel that far when I have the little ones, anyway."

The little ones she refers to are her grandchildren, who accompany Gaudreau to most of her games.

In 1965, Gaudreau and her husband, who have now been married for 41 years, moved to Sanford because of her husband's job with the Navy. They had met in Washington DC, but once in Sanford, decided to make the small town their permanent home.

Gaudreau has worked at Croom's Academy for 19 years in the food services department and liked the fact that her schedule allowed her the flexibility to be at home with her children when they weren't in school.

From the beginning, Gaudreau's children were involved in sports. That's probably because of their parents, who were also very athletic.

Bob Gaudreau was very active in both track and tennis and excelled in both.

"I was always a tom-boy," Gaudreau explained. "I went to Catholic school, however, and at that time there were not athletics in those schools for girls. I was always outside after school and on the weekends, though. I loved sports and still do."

Gaudreau's oldest daughter, Marcy, was a cheerleader at Seminole High School and is now an audiologist at Florida Hospital. Marcy has three children, Scott (20), Josh (17) and Tyler (2).

Both Scott and Josh have inherited the athletic abilities common in the family. Scott plays basketball and baseball while Josh plays baseball on the Lake Mary High School team.

Scott is now attending Seminole Community College and Josh is thinking about attending Georgia Tech when he graduates next year.

Cathy is the youngest of the three and lives the furthest away. She is only a short ride from her family, but Gaudreau admits that as a mother and grandmother, any distance is too far. The dental assistant has one child, Destiny (2) and gets to spend a lot of time with her grandmother.

The main reason for Gaudreau's attendance at Lake Mary's games, however, is her middle child, Mike.

and defensively and brings a lot of enthusiasm to the program. He puts the kids first."

Gaines was also pleased with the move.

"I was very impressed with what he brings in terms of experience and what he can bring to the Lake Mary community," Gaines said. "He should be a good fit at Lake Mary. He has an aura that we need at this point."

It wasn't sure exactly when Stanton would take on his new role but he is expected to be in the area this weekend looking for a home and Karns said he was hoping Stanton could start as soon as possible.

Last season, the Rams floundered despite a glut of talent and have some solid players back next season including quarterback Cory Cooper and defensive standouts Mike Stephenson and Justin Wright.

"I really don't mind doing it because I get to do two things that I enjoy... spending time with my grandchildren and watching Mike and Kym's games. And my kids are so appreciative and dependable about picking them up on time and such. It's really no trouble at all."

Gaudreau said that whether she had the children or not, she would still attend the games because she likes it so much.

"I get to know the kids over the season and know a lot of their parents either through work or going to the games," Gaudreau said. "I cheer the kids on and try to lift them up when they don't do very well."

Because her kids and older grandchildren have always been involved in sports, Gaudreau knows the importance of keeping kids busy with good activities. She never had a bit of trouble with any of her children and attributes part of that to their involvement with sports.

As long as she can, Gaudreau fully intends to continue her role as Lake Mary's number one fan. Chances are, as the family continues to grow older, she may have to add a few other schools to that list.

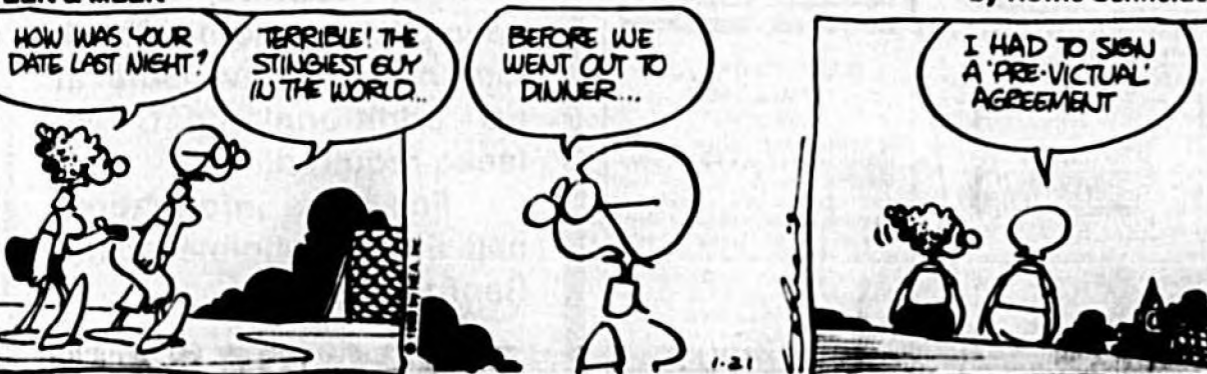

Can asthmatics safely take aspirin?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have asthma. Can I take aspirin? I need the drug because I have a history of blood clots in my legs. However, I certainly don't want to risk worsening my asthma.

DEAR READER: The precise cause of asthma is unknown, but asthma attacks can certainly be caused by allergies. If an asthma-prone patient breathes pollen-laden air, eats food to which he is allergic, or takes medicine to which he is sensitive, an acute asthma attack can appear with very little warning.

Aspirin allergies are relatively common. Therefore, asthmatics with such a sensitivity should certainly avoid aspirin. However, for the majority of asthmatics, aspirin is safe.

In your case, the drug is needed to retard clotting and prevent dangerous consequences. Therefore, I believe that the benefits outweigh the potential risks. Ask your doctor about this, but I'm confident that he will agree with my analysis.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've noticed that you address impotence on a fairly regular basis. Why don't you give equal time to premature ejaculation?

DEAR READER: For three reasons. First, impotence is far more common than premature ejaculation (the inability of the male to postpone orgasm). Millions of men suffer from erectile dysfunction, which is generally related to the aging process. Thus, this affliction is of more interest to my readers, and I get more letters inquiring about its treatment.

Second, impotence usually has a physical cause, notably poor circulation (from arteriosclerosis) and alcohol abuse. Moreover, it is a common side effect of many drugs that are used to treat a wide variety of illnesses, most of which — in their own right — can cause impotence.

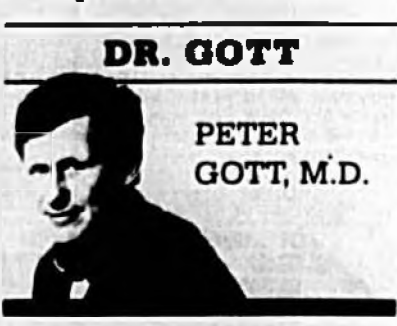
Third, premature ejaculation almost always has a psychological basis. Therefore, the problem — which is quite obvious to its victims — is traditionally treated with counseling. There is really very little to say about premature ejaculation. If you have it, you should seek help from a mental health professional.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Because of a back injury, I saw several doctors. I subsequently obtained copies of my medical records. What a comedy of errors! According to these records, I have bilateral club feet, was born four years before my father and seven years after my son, was injured either two years before or after my actual

injury, sought medical care six months before the injury, and had X-rays of my ankle. How can these people continue to practice medicine?

DEAR READER: Sounds like a real hodgepodge to me. Someone desperately needs a lesson in how to take a valid medical history. I can understand a little confusion in anyone's records, but the systematic foul-up in yours must take first prize.

I suggest that you pack up your medical records, find a doctor you trust, tell him or her exactly what happened, and let the healer get the right story down on paper. In addition, you should make an official complaint, in



writing, to your state medical society. Sooner or later, those original doctors are going to make a gargantuan mistake. The medical society should be able to shape them up.

In the final, they beat Kathie Welsender, Juanita Chambers, Stasha Cohen, Lynn Deas and Beth Palmer. This deal from the final presented a defensive dilemma for the two Wests, and a declarer-play difficulty for one North. At the other table, four spades was declared by North because South passed initially, then artificially showed a major two-suiter. Montin (East) led a diamond, Meyers (West) winning with the queen and switching to the club 10. Now Chambers (North) had the key decision to make. Fearing the club 10 was a singleton, she won

with her ace. Then Chambers played a trump to dummy's jack. However, West won with the ace and led a club to partner's king; another club from East sealed declarer's fate. If she ruffed high in the dummy (South), East would score a trump trick. But when declarer discarded from the dummy, West ruffed. As you can see, if North had played a low club at trick two, she would have got home.

In this room, North's three-diamond cue-bid showed a high-card spade raise. Palmer (West) led the diamond ace. Not sure who had the missing diamonds, Palmer continued with the diamond king. Now the contract was safe. Breed (South) ruffed and led the spade queen. After winning with the ace, West forced South with another diamond, but with both majors splitting favorably, Breed had no trouble in winning 10 tricks: four spades, five hearts and the club ace.
