 MEEKER, Okla., Jan. 31.—(AP)—It didn't just start with Carl, the baseball pitcher of the New York Giants. All the Hubbells are left-handed.

At the Hubbell farm near Meeker where Carl is rounding into shape for the coming National League season and Brother Merritt is getting ready for the Tulsa Oilers of the Texas League, Carl grinned as his father explained: "The Hubbells just can't help it. They were born that way."

The father, G. O. Hubbell, incidentally, was Carl's first backstopper, a catcher back in the days when they took them with their bare hands—and I had it. The father held aloft his gnarled finger,

jammed and broken by baseball back before the turn of the century, and chuckled over his catching days.

And G. O. Hubbell, like his son, Carl and Merritt, is a southpaw, something unusual among catchers. "My only sister," he added, "is left-handed, too."

Carl, who has been getting in condition for the coming season by shooting first from baseball, snatched away at a pocketful of paper-shielded peaches taken from his own orchard, and blushed becomingly as his father explained: "Carl's in good shape. I've had him clearing out trees back in the timber. I think it's better for him than golf, and he doesn't play very good golf anyway."

Farm Debt Leaders Attend Important Meet At Capital

A plan that special efforts be made at this time to save from foreclosure Florida farms and other property affected by the recent freeze has been made by Governor Deen Shultz, according to Frank T. Kellinger of Daytona Beach, spokesman for the Florida Farm Debt Adjustment Commission in 33 counties on the East Coast who called on local members of the organization in Sanford today.

The plan was framed during a meeting of leaders in farm debt relief work held Monday and Tuesday in the office of the Florida body in Tallahassee, which Mr. Kellinger attended as representative of the federal land banks in refinancing farm debts were explained by Henry Johnson, a member of the senior loan committee of the Columbia, S. C., land bank at this conference.

E. A. T. Airlines To Break N. Y.-New Orleans Trial

Speedy Planes Will Cover 1303 Mile Route In 8 Hours, 17 Minutes Starting Jan. 25

NEW YORK CITY, Feb. 2.—Speedy five hours from the present eight-hour flight, passenger and express schedules and carrying a 1,200,000 square mile territory to 25,000 square miles, or an area the size of Pennsylvania in less than a week, whirling propellers of Eastern Air Lines Douglas Airways will break a new trail over the 1303-mile route between New York and New Orleans on Friday, Jan. 25.

The Douglas planes will fly a long night schedule, replacing the slower Comber planes which will be switched to the day flight. This will give New York and New Orleans, as well as the 12 intervening cities, two round trip schedules each day daily instead of once.

The present 11-hour flight from the District of Columbia to the Gulf will be reduced by the Douglas planes to 8 hours and 17 minutes, including 1 hour and 19 minutes for the 12 intermediate stops. These high speed airplanes will make only two stops, at Washington and New Orleans, and the 12 intermediate stops will be made at 15-minute intervals along the route.

The night Douglas plane will leave New York at 12:00 A. M. (EST), arriving at Washington at 1:00 A. M. for a 15-minute stop, arriving at Atlanta at 1:55 A. M.

Congress Extends R. F. C. For Two Years

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Congress put on an old-fashioned melodrama Thursday, acting just in the nick of time to save the Reconstruction Finance Corporation from death in Fisher Tamm's majority in midnight.

Rep. Ruffalo introduced a conference committee report which would extend the corporation's life for two years, and the Senate majority was rushed to the White House where President Roosevelt signed a bill extending the corporation's life for two years, until Feb. 1, 1937.

The RFC was created by Mr. Hoover to handle banks, insurance companies and railroads, and it was expanded to take over public works and relief work when Mr. Roosevelt took office and created the Public Works Administration, some of the RFC's functions were taken away, and it was to be done in the nick of time.

Detailed Report Is Given On Vegetables

Because a number of inquiries concerning the harvesting of vegetable sprouts have been received at the office of the County Agent, C. E. Dawson, of the United States Department of Agriculture, a detailed report on this subject.

John M. Dawson, submitting the following report from Mr. Thompson: "The first picking should be made when the outer leaves of the lowest sprouts turn yellow. The sprouts leave the stem easily when ready to pick but before this time they hold on tenaciously. A knife should be used for removing the sprouts from the plant stem, leaving as much of the stem attached to the sprout as possible. Pulling of the sprouts causes the stem, preventing the development of a later crop."

The crop is usually planted in two or four quart containers. The small beans are frequently packed in crates of various sizes. The 16 quart crate is the most popular size. A yield of 2,000 to 2,500 quarts per acre is considered a good yield, although as high as 3,000 quarts have been harvested from an acre."

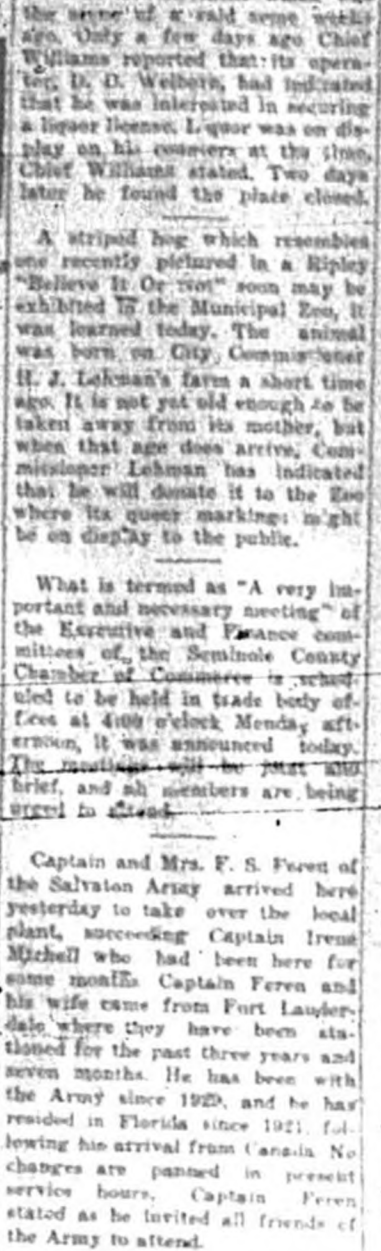
