

# Girl Scouts Hear Formosa Native

Mrs. B. H. Williams, a native of Formosa, was special guest speaker at last Thursday afternoon's meeting of Intermediate Girl Scout Troop 85 held in the auditorium of the Lake Mary Elementary School.

Mrs. Thomas A. Best, troop leader, was in charge of the program arranged as an advanced preparation of National Girl Scout Week which Troop 85 along with all Girl Scout and Brownie Troops will celebrate next week.

Mrs. Williams is the sister-in-law of Mrs. Best. She graduated from the University at Taipei, the capital of Formosa, and then came to America as an exchange student to further her education at Duke University in North Carolina. That is where she met Capt. Williams, whom she married. They now live in New York, where he is stationed at Stewart Air Force Base on the Hudson River not far from West Point.

Speaking a few sentences in Chinese and then translating them, Mrs. Williams, whose name is Liliu, also wrote some Chinese sentences, so the girls could hear and see the difference in the languages. Very attractive and sturdily dressed in a scarlet wool suit with a black fur collar, Mrs. Williams made a striking appearance and proved that the Chinese girls of today are very up-to-date in the latest styles. She also wore a native black brocade satin coat, cut very straight.

Her brother-in-law is a merchant in Hong Kong. The old Chinese traditional dress is fast fading out of the picture and Western dress is accepted now, she explained.

Mrs. Williams was also a Girl Scout when she was younger. She related the differences in the life of girls here and in her homeland. There they all wear uniforms to school and carry their lunch, through the third grade. Then from the third grade through the sixth grade they buy sandwiches and their drink in a kind of cafeteria; but no hot lunches are served.

## 'Bozo The Clown' Vacations In Area

The word "clown" may mean many things to many people... excitement, excitement, color. The magic name of the original "Bozo the Clown" means even more to the thousands of people remembering the inimitable clown that rode around in his midsize automobile bringing laughter and gaiety to the circus.

Bozo the Clown in real life is Stephen G. Brenner who through the years has entertained in about every medium of the entertainment world. He just recently left for Lakeland before going north after spending some six weeks vacation in Bear Lake Manor with his son, Gerald Brenner and his family.

Now in his 60th year, Brenner is still playing an active part in his beloved role as clown, bringing many a smile to the under-privileged and crippled children in hospitals and institutions. A smile from lips that understand too little, but enough to show the power of laughter, works a special magic all its own.

Brenner, a native of Baltimore, began his career at the age of eleven when he ran away from home to join the circus. He was duly returned, only to run away again as the magic of circus life beckoned.

He started learning first the walking the slack and then the tight rope high wire. From circus life he went on to bit parts in burlesque and worked in vaudeville as a black-faced comedian and became famous for his rendition of "Shaky Eyes". In 1914 he again joined a circus. This time the Barnum and Bailey outfit as a clown and thus began the colorful career of "Bozo the Clown."

From 1918-1919 Bozo joined the traveling troupe of William F. Cody the famous "Buffalo Bill" road show. From here he traveled with the Miller Brothers 1001 Ranch Wild West Show touring the USA.

In 1943, after clowning with various shows, Bozo joined Ringling Brothers for the one season and then left circus life.

Today the one and only, the original Bozo, concentrates his mimicry magic entertaining young and old in hospitals all over the USA. Dressed in one of his fifteen clown costumes and using one of his seven voices in one of his ten dialects, Bozo thrills all children with the classic favorite "Punch and Judy" show.

He recently captured the rapt attention of the Bear Lake Elementary School children entertaining them with a magic show featuring Bozo as "The World's Worst Magician." Anything can happen and usually does. Bozo encourages audience participation in performing his numerous and varied magical mysteries adding much more to the enjoyment.

### Urgent Need Cited

Assurance that improvements to State Road 415 will receive No. 1 priority was given by Max Brewer, state road board member, to a Seminole County delegation Thursday afternoon at a road budget hearing in Deland.

The assurance came when Gen. J. C. Hutchison, chairman of the Seminole County Commission, presented a resolution setting forth primary and secondary road improvement requests for the next fiscal year starting July 1.

Emphasis for the need of improving SR 415 was given when Hutchison asked that the project be completed with state primary funds but, if necessary, with county secondary funds.

Brewer promised the "No. 1 request" will be given top priority in either the primary or secondary budget.

Queried by Mack N. Cleveland Jr., attorney, whether the improvement can be completed in this fiscal year, ending June 30, Brewer replied that "the most that can be done this year is to start the planning."

General Hutchison, pointing to the map of SR 415, said there were 27 traffic accidents, including two fatalities, on this highway in the last year.

The county's resolution requested improvements to SR 415 from the city limits to the Osteen Bridge, with secondary funds if necessary.

Following through with a City of Sanford request, the resolution also asked for paving SR 415 (Celery Avenue) in the city from French Avenue to the city limits.

The county's resolution also presented many other road improvement requests, such as four-laning 25th Street between French and Mellonville Avenues; completing improvements to Highway 426 and Highway 427, an interchange on Interstate 4 with Lake Mary Boulevard, and others.

Dick Judy, SHD comptroller, informed the Seminole delegation the county's road funds held by the state include \$2,438 remaining in one bond fund and \$245,726 in a second bond fund, plus a net balance of \$497,000 in the current fiscal year and an estimated \$342,000 for 1963-64 for a total of \$839,000 in the secondary fund.

Included in the Seminole County delegation, attending the road budget hearing were members of the County Commission, General Hutchison, James Avery, Lee Gary, John Alexander and John Fitzpatrick; State Rep. S. J. Davis Jr.; Cleveland, Democratic nominee for State Senator; Gordon Frederick, Democratic nominee for State Representative; Jan Fortune, Republican nominee for State Representative; Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce long range planning committee for roads; John Krider, Chamber manager, and Vernon Dunn, former county commissioner.

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## Up-grading Of Teachers' Salaries Outlined Here

Multi-million dollar up-grading of Florida's space-age teacher's salaries to bring them up to the "12th-in-the-nation" status they held in 1957 was outlined for Seminole County legislators, Thursday.

Bob Jones of Ocala, chairman of the Program Action Committee of the Florida Education Assn., explained the committee's proposals to Reps. S. J. Davis and Gordon Frederick, the county school board, and several hundred members of the Seminole County Education Assn. (Rep. Mack Cleveland Jr. and Republican candidate Jan Fortune were unable to attend.)

School board members J. Dan Wright, Dr. A. W. Epps, John Evans and James Birkenmyer heard Jones comment that Florida, fastest growing state in the nation, cradle of tremendous scientific technical expansion, has dropped to 29th in the nation in the amount of salary offered to teachers.

These children of today, who will be taking their places as citizens in 1984 are being taught in 1911 buildings and their training before this fast-paced, highly technical civilization came to Florida and the nation.

The Program Action Committee is also asking for an increase from \$325 to \$475 per teaching unit for instructional aids, new materials, classroom equipment and school maintenance to bring into line with increased expenses, the supply of new and modern teaching equipment and materials that are needed.

Jones said that the committee fully realizes that tax revenue will have to be found to support these tremendous increases, and charged legislators they must be ready to back support and pay the resulting tax burden.

The committee's program will be set forth at the state convention of the FEA next weekend at Jacksonville for discussion and approval and then presented to the state legislature when it meets in April.

A meeting to discuss the program in detail has been set to take place after the convention, when local legislators will meet with Ernest Cowley and George Dabbs, SCEA legislative co-chairmen; SCEA president Floyd Richards, CEA president Fred Ganas and CEA legislative representative Sid Manfre.

## Herlong Junks Eligible List

Guy Allen has won a reprieve, it was learned today, and will continue as Sanford's acting postmaster for at least another two months.

Congressman A. S. Herlong Jr., in a telephone conversation from Washington with The Herald this morning, confirmed a report that the three-name eligible list submitted to him by the U. S. Civil Service has been "junked" and a new list will be compiled.

"It will be at least two months," the Congressman said, "before the new list will be submitted to me by the Civil Service."

The Civil Service had submitted a list of two Democrats and a Republican as "eligible" to the lawmaker. These include Allen, the Republican, and Julian Whigham and Stephen Ballint, the Democrats.

Herlong, in turn, submitted the eligible names to Warren Goodrich, Bradenton, State Democratic Committee chairman, who was to have passed the list through channels to the Seminole County Democratic Committee for recommendation.

Robert Billhimer, County Democratic Committee chairman, repeated this morning he has never received the list from Goodrich. "And he never will receive that list," Congressman Herlong said.

Herlong explained today that after he had submitted the list to Goodrich he was visited by a Seminole County delegation "voicing opposition to one of the three candidates." He would not elaborate "because I do not want to smear all three with one brush."

He added he questioned Civil Service how they had selected the three names and was told they had merely examined their application papers. "I told them," Herlong said, "that's one helluva way to run a railroad."

Kennedy sent the House and Senate a draft of legislation which he said would "diminish the role which poverty plays in our federal system of criminal justice."

The President said the bill would "assure effective legal representation for every man whose limited means would otherwise deprive him of an adequate defense against criminal charges."

"Whenever the lack of money prevents a defendant from securing an experienced lawyer, trained investigator or technical expert, an unjust conviction may follow," the President said.

Prior to the SCEA meeting, a meeting of the Classroom Teachers Assn. under the guidance of President Fred Ganas, met to take up routine matters of business.

## N. Y. Newspaper Strike Settled

NEW YORK (UPI)—Publishers and the striking printers' union agreed today on terms put forth by Mayor Robert F. Wagner for settlement of the 91-day-old New York newspaper strike.

The settlement—reached three months to the day the strike and shutdown started—must be ratified by the local membership of the International Typographical Union, expected to be only a formality.

Also to be resolved were several other issues, including strikes by the stereotype and mailers unions. Thus, it was not believed the papers could resume publication before next mid-week at the earliest.

Meanwhile, the newspaper strike in Cleveland entered its 14th week with the key printers union and the Cleveland Press and Plain Dealer still locked in a stalemate. Money remains the chief point of contention in that dispute.

The New York settlement, providing a two-year contract effective with a return to work, brought a variety of changes involving money and automation:

- A \$12.27 money package—\$6.51 the first year and \$5.76 the second, including a \$1 wage increase each year.
- A common expiration date for all of the newspapers' union contracts, providing all unions agree. This would be about the second week in March and avert threats of strikes during the ad-heavy Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons.
- A 35-hour work week in the second year of the contract, compared to the present 36½ hours.
- Introduction of outside tape automated operation of line-casting machines with the union to get a share of savings from increased productivity.

## Area Chamber Okays Contest

The Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce Thursday night voted to sponsor a road name changing contest to clear up confusion resulting from the number of thoroughfares in and to the community resulting from the "Lake Mary" title.

Details of the contest will be drawn up by the Board of Directors for presentation at the next regular business session in April.

Richard Keogh, president, reported that indications are that Lake Mary Blvd. will be extended on out to Interstate 4 in the hopes that it will later be accepted and established as an interchange to the super highway.

Plans are to go ahead at the present time with locating and building the extension even if it is given only a clay surface. After it is established a car count will be made by the government to determine its use as an interchange.

### \$365 Stolen From Parked Car

Police today are investigating the theft of \$365 from a parked car on Park Ave. early this morning, Chief Roy Williams said.

The car was owned by James Markham who told police he had the money in the compartment of his vehicle.

The car was parked at 100 S. Park Ave. by the Sanford Atlantic Bank when the theft occurred.

### Reds Removing Cuba Troops

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk said today that some Russian troops are being removed from Cuba and that more Soviet ships are on the way to the island.

But Rusk said he would make no "assessment" now of whether the Kremlin is meeting its promise to remove "several thousand" forces from Cuba by next Friday.

The secretary told a news conference that Russian ships have been moving into Cuba during the past two weeks and more are on the way. He said the available ships are enough to carry out the troop removal.

## Nursing Home Bids To Be Re-submitted

Three out of the five contractors submitting bids on Retirement Life, Inc., were so close that a re-bidding will have to be made, Architect James G. Chapman said today.

The three low bidders, who submitted figures that were within \$3,000 of each other were Carroll Daniels Construction Co. of Sanford; Doyle Risinger Construction Co. of Daytona Beach and R. C. Stevens Construction Co. of Orlando.

These three companies will be invited to re-bid on the altered specifications for the administration wing.

Chapman said that the alterations would be worked out quickly and would delay beginning of construction only about two weeks.

### Where Is Ty Cobb?

People who like baseball usually know much of the history of the great sport and the athletes who helped make it great. Often we read of the outstanding achievements that one of these people made and we marvel at their records, but then we are left in the dark as to their life after the playing days are passed. One of the men of whom I have often thought was Ty Cobb who was considered by many to be the greatest all-around baseball player who ever lived. My father was one of those admirers, so naturally, I wondered how Cobb was living after his retirement from baseball.

Some time ago Mr. C. C. Howard told me that he had known him personally. He recalled a hunting experience

with Mr. Cobb during which a very fine dog was snake bitten and died. Mr. Howard had advised that there was little likelihood that the dog would be bitten, yet it was only a matter of a short time until the "impossible" happened. "What took place then?" I asked. "He was very nice about it," was the reply.

Ty Cobb had been known as one of the "old timers" who played baseball "for keeps". He was supposed to use language that would put a longshoreman to shame and there was little indication, as he ran the bases, that he would apologize for "throwing" spikes. Of course, he did have many good qualities in those days, but the general opinion was that he was not a Christian. This would cause one to hope that he was reached for Christ before his death.

The answer to his spiritual state before his death was given in an article of a church paper. The article reminded one of the peerless baseball record, but what was really thrilling was the account of his religious experience in which God used the Reverend J. R. Richardson and the Reverend Charles W. Outlaw so wonderfully.

Approximately two months before his death Cobb entered Emory University Hospital of Atlanta, Georgia. He was suffering from cancer and other ailments. The ministers visited him several times during which they read Scripture, prayed, and helped Cobb understand God gave His Son to die for all who would accept Him by faith.

Mr. Cobb accepted Christ as his personal Saviour and thereafter liked to tell them of the comfort that this new understanding and spiritual state meant to him. On their last visit he said, "I feel the strong arms of God underneath me. It is wonderful to be able to pray. I want you to tell others that they should not wait until a crisis comes to learn to pray."

Dr. Richardson wrote, "Since Ty's death a number of people have called me to ask if he did not talk about some of his baseball experiences. The truth is he never once mentioned baseball, dear as it was to him. He became wholly occupied with the God who made him and redeemed him through His Son."

has held similar meetings all over the state as well as in Nassau and Bermuda. He has just completed two campaigns in Nassau.

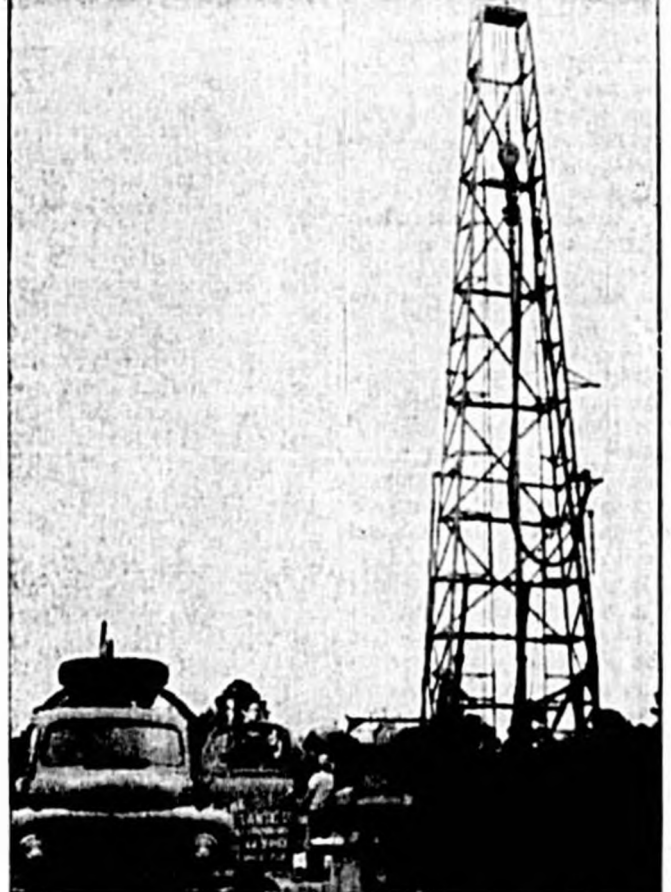

## Drilling Crews Reach Limerock At 60 Feet

Drilling crews, working in conjunction with the Florida Gas Transmission Company engineer, Earl Kirkpatrick in an area west of Sanford reached limestone at 60 feet depth, 20 feet above sea level, Thursday.

Taking samples of the drilling crew's findings was Floyd Snow, Chief Explorer for Snow Associates, who is prospecting in the area.

Snow said that mineral deposits of limonite, iron, monazite and rutile were found to run from surface to a depth of about 15 feet.

Below that, from 20 to 40 feet is clay, and below that sandstone and phosphate.

"This neither condemns nor proves the present explorations in which we are interested," Snow said. "This area drilled by this crew is only about a ten acre square of the 5,000 acre area which we will search."

Snow and his crew plan to put a dredge in the Wekiva River, to test the bed of the river for the deposits underneath, and make many other tests in the area between the Wekiva and Blackwater Creek.

Earl Kirkpatrick, engineer for the Florida Gas Company explained that his company was searching for the clay deposits, which will conduct electricity.

He noted that chemical electricity is used to prevent and control corrosion of the gas pipelines.

A small silver box near the site of the drilling controls the protection of the pipeline all the way to Daytona Beach, Kirkpatrick said.

## 'Underground' Riches May Be Brought To Life

Seminole County's underground riches may be brought to light soon if present prospecting operations west of Sanford by Floyd Snow Chief of Exploration and his associates find what airborne radioactivity surveys have indicated.

Swamplands such as the one located along the Wekiva River may contain a low concentrate of uranium such as occurs in certain types of limestone and phosphate rock.

Snow said that the uranium is actually a secondary product of the possible limestone mining, as the formations are very low grade and offer "formidable extraction problems."

"But the limestone, rock, and rutile, limonite and monazite minerals offer lucrative mining possibilities for the area," Snow said.

Florida ranks first in the nation in the production of zircon and second in titanium concentrates. Other minerals and rocks which are found extensively in the state include lime, gem stones, oyster shell lime, cement, peat, and various kinds of industrial sands.

These materials, used extensively for industrial and commercial work are mined all over the state and shipped mainly by barge.

"Ore mined in Seminole County has a natural shipping access to all points right up the St. Johns River," Snow pointed out.

A paper prepared by the Atomic Energy Commission states that the highest concentration of uranium in phosphates occurs in deposits in the Pliocene Bone Valley formation in Florida.

It is found in certain types of marine sediments, particularly phosphorites and black shale. The deposits are found under the location of vanished lakes and were formed millions of years ago.

Results of surveys indicate that the phosphate deposits of Florida contain sufficient uranium to be detected by airborne radioactivity detection equipment, provided there is some surface expression of the deposits.

"But the significance of these indications cannot be ascertained until adequate exploration work is undertaken," Snow said.

Celery prices were unchanged with crates of 2 dozen selling for 1.65, 2½ and 3 dozen 2.00, dozen 2.50 and 6 to 8 dozen 3.00.

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Not Buried: Bored

It is astonishing how often the word "boredom" pops up in efforts to get at the ills of our scientific-industrial society.

Educators... the school drop-outs are bored.

Specialists say boredom is a big factor in juveniles' search for "kicks," a quest that sometimes leads them into crime so vicious that it staggers veteran criminologists.

Scholar Erich Fromm comes along now and says it may be that 20th-century man has helped to construct a civilization whose crucial elements largely bore him to tears.

Countless factory and office workers find little interest in their work, which often is so beautifully organized and routinized that the juices are squeezed out of it.

Untold numbers of Americans are dulled, if not irritated, by tedious hours of commuting by rail, bus or bumper-to-bumper private car.

All this is not a new problem, except perhaps in magnitude. Many people feel they make no personal imprint on life. They are engulfed, bowled along like chips in a mill-race. There is little they can conquer.

The experts on life adjustment tell them, and their youngsters, to get busy beyond the school ground or the office. Develop a hobby, take a trip, engage in some enterprise, create something.

For some people this works. But for many it does not. They cannot

It is no wonder some of the sturdier and more energetic plunge into politics. There a man conquers, gets a grip on something solid — power. He can make an imprint. Reward is personal.

The question is big. Have we gone far toward removing the drudgery from scratching a living on this earth, only to leave man without the hard stimulus, the test of soul, which that effort provided? Have we mechanized and automated ourselves in to a condition of physical and mental freedom that we don't know how to use?

We'd better turn up some answers. The hobbies and vacation spins are not enough. It is work, with the hands and the brain, that must be creative — and fully challenging. Today too little of it.

# Exhibition Play Slated Saturday

Major league baseball's exhibition season begins Saturday and among the notable absentees from the action will be Orlando Cepeda and Juan Marichal of the San Francisco Giants and Johnny Podres of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The Giants, who meet the Cleveland Indians at Tucson, Ariz., are still waiting to hear from Cepeda, their slugging first baseman, and Marichal, an 18-game winner last year for the National League champions. Cepeda is holding out for a better contract in Puerto Rico while Marichal refuses to budge from his home in the Dominican Republic unless a more substantial contract is offered.

Money isn't the factor in Podres' case, it's his aching back. The veteran left-hander "popped" his back while making the final pitch in batting practice Thursday. Trainer Wayne Anderson, however, said the injury is not serious and Podres will miss only two or three days of work.

Anderson said, "his body alignment was out. I popped it back and we applied ice packs to freeze it. It's the same thing that seems to happen to him every spring."

Meanwhile, the Dodgers' 25-game winner Don Drysdale tuned up for Saturday's starting assignment against the Senators at Vero Beach, Fla., by allowing only one hit and facing 11 men in three scoreless innings. Manager Mickey Vernon of the Senators said southpaw Claude Osteen would start against the Dodgers and Dave Stenhouse and rookie

Jim Duckworth would finish up. In other Saturday games, the Cincinnati Reds play the Chicago White Sox at Sarasota, Fla.; the Milwaukee Braves engage the Kansas City Athletics at West Palm Beach, Fla.; the New York Mets and the St. Louis Cardinals tangle at St. Petersburg, Fla.; the Philadelphia Phillies and the Pittsburgh Pirates meet at Clearwater, Fla.; the Houston Colts play the Los Angeles Angels at Palm Springs, Calif.; Baltimore and the New York Yankees play at Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.; and the Minnesota Twins meet the Detroit Tigers at Orlando, Fla.
