Local judges lauded by state

Last week's mail brought accolades in the form of wall plaques for twenty-four Florida jurista who were recognized by the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

The recognition was for working toward safe and respectful proceedings in domestic violence cases and for striving in their own communities to raise awareness of domestic violence issues.

The awards marked the end of the first year and the beginning of the second year for the Coalition's legal clearinghouse, which consists of lawyers who are representing indigent victims of domestic violence in civil proceedings statewide.

The 131 attorneys involved in the project have appeared before a total of 248 judges. The compilation of their experiences and observations will result in a report that is due to be released by June 1. During the first 13 months of the project, the attorneys conducted 95 in-service trainings for 633 employees of Florida's 38 certified domestic violence centers and made 172 group presentations for 976 victims on the legal ramifications of domestic violence.

Meanwhile, 3904 victims received individual consultation. Of those victims who received consultation:

*833 received only information and advice, no referral; *304 were referred to attorneys who were not part of

the project; *197 were referred to a non-attorney or a nonattorney entity (such as the Department of Children and Family Services:

*And 2570 were assigned to project attorneys for legal representation.






Responsible teen resents parents' nightly curfew

Seeding easiest and most economical method of planting grasses

Turfgrass can be established by two methods, seeding, and regetative propagation. Vegetative propagation includes sodding, sprigging and plugging. Seeding is usually the easiest and most economical method of planting grasses, but requires a longer period of time to achieve a mature turf. Not all turfgrasses are established from seed, and while planting sprigs or plugs is more laborious than seeding, rapid ground cover can be expected since most of our Florida turfgrasses grow quickly, Regardless of the method of planting, it is essential that a proper seedbed be prepared before planting. A healthy, attractive, long-lived lawn can be established only if you select high quality seed or planting material and select turfgrasses that are well adapted to the soil and cli-

Seeding: Seeding is the easiest and most economical way of establishing a lawn. Success depends on seed quality, proper seeding time,



rate, and method of seeding. Successful establishment from seed depends on purchasing top quality seed. Law requires that each container of seed have a tag listing turfgrass species and cultivar, purity, percent germination and weed content. The best time to seed is during the spring and summer months from April through July, since this permits a full growing season before cold weather. Seed may be planted as late as September or early October, but establishment is much slower because of cooler

seeding also takes advantage of Florida's rainy season and may greatly reduce trrigation requirements.

Sprigs: Sprigging is the cheapest vegetative planting method. A sprig is an individual stem or piece of stem grass without any adhering soil. Sprigs are also called runners, rhizomes, or stolons. Regardless of what a sprig is called, if it has at least one node or joint, it has the potential of developing into a grass plant. Sprigging is simply the planting of individual grass stems at spaced intervals. A suitable sprig should have two to four nodes from which roots can develop. Sprigs can be bought by the bushel, but more commonly sod is used and cut or pulled apart into sprigs. There are several methods of planting sprigs. One method is to cut shallow furrows in the prepared planting area by using a push-plow or the edge of a hoe. Place the sprigs end to end or every 6 to 12 inches along the

weather. Spring and summer row and cover a part of each sprig with soil and firm by rolling or stepping on the firrow. The closer together the sprigs are planted, the faster the grass will cover the soil. Rows should be placed no more than 6 to 8 inches apart.

> Plugging is the planting of 2 to 4 inch circular or block-shaped pieces of sod at regular intervals. Three to ten times as much planting material is necessary for plugging as sprigging. Several turigrasses are currently available commercially as plugs in trays. Square plugs can be cut from sod with a shovel, axe, or machete, while round plugs are cut with special steel pluggers similar to a bulb planter. The plugs are then placed in corresponding-sized holes made in the soil. These should be planted on 6 to 12 inch centers. Wider spacing prolongs the establishment phase. They must be tamped or rolled to minimize ending up with a tufted appearance. Plugs do

not dry out as rapidly as sprigs, and therefore water is not as critical. However, rate of roverage is slower than if the grass was sprigged or stolonized. Mulching will help improve moisture retention and prevent crosion of the soil between plugs.

Post Planting Care: As previously mentioned, proper water management the first several weeks after planting is cructal. For newly planted arcas, keep the soil continuously moist with light frequent sprinklings several times daily. Avoid too much water, as this can cause seed movement and soil erosion. As the seedlings or planting material take root and grow, decrease watering frequency and increase the amount applied each time. Fertilize the grass approximately 4 to 5 weeks after planting or after the second mowing. Apply a complete (NPK) turf-type, slow release nitrogen fertilizer such as 16-4-8 so as to provide 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet. Begin nowing as soon as the grass reaches 30% over the destred height. Do not mow when grass

Ex-coach: Watts not a menace to society

Jack Blanton says that Jason Watts Thas been thrown to the wolves," - that a Kentucky judge erred in sentencing Watts to 10-years In prison.

Watts is the University of Kentucky football player who pleaded guilty to two counts of eckless homicide for an accident that killed two of his friends in November. Watts was driving a black pickup truck that slid off the road and crashed.

For several hours, Watts and his pals were celebrating Kentucky's romp over Vanderbilt at Commonwealth Stadium in Lexington, Drunk and on a pre-dawn hunting excursion, the young men were flung from the truck. None were seat belts.

Last week, the day after his 22nd birthday, Watts was sentenced to 10 years in prison - the maximum sentence after his attorney plea bargained the term down from 20 years.

Blanton, who coached Jason Watts at Oviedo High School, said Monday that he thought Judge Daniel Venters' sentence was too severe.

"Something has to be done drinking is wrong, two young men are dead and Jason admits the car crash was his fault," Blanton said. "He knew he had to "face the music." He is truly sorry for what happened - he is scarred for

Blanton said he believes Watts can do much for others if he is allowed another chance - that he will be a mentor not a menace. Keeping him behind bars is not the right answer.

Frequently, Blanton slips a video tape into a television to

see Watts as he talked about the crash and about the dangers caused by drinking to a class of young people at a Kentucky school. The tape was made this month.

Last week the judge said he was skeptical about Watts's talking to the students - implying that obtaining a lighter sentence might have been an ulterior motive - but said that if some good was done, good.

There was damaging evidence from a bartender who told the court that Watts, a 270-pounder, had once downed 11 cans of beer in 40 minutes. University of Kentucky Athletic Director C.M. Newton said Watts was "a good, bright young man but a risk taker who is an alcoholic."

Newton said he persuaded Watts to attend Alcoholics Anonymous meetings.

Jack Blanton, who coached and befriended hundreds of athletes in a 29-year career, prefers to remember "a good kid who was nice to everyone. Jason never posed any problems when he was at Oviedo High School," Blanton said. "He always said, 'yes sir,' or 'no sir.' He was well liked by all his teachers. He wasn't on the honor roll but he made B's.

"He have a big smile until he put on his football helmet," Blanton said.. "Then, it was a different kid. He was the best offensive lineman 1 ever coached. Good enough to start three straight years at Kentucky.

"Tve had calls from the Oakland Raiders, the Miami Dolphins and the Tennessee Titans about Jason," Blanton said, "They're interested. They believe he can play in the National Football League. So do L."

These are Blanton's final days teaching at Oviedo High School. He stepped down as football coach two years ago and now he is retiring from the classroom. He said he finds himself thinking more and more about Jason Watts being locked in prison.

"This isn't right," he said.



Andre Miller leads All-America team

NEW YORK (NEA) - Andre Miller is a master of all trades.

No wonder the 6-foot-2 senior point guard for the University of Utah

became the leading player this season in college basketball. "He's what I call the queen on the chess board," says ESPN TV sports

analyst Len Elmore about Miller. "He does so many things to help his team win — making the plays, scoring, rebounding, playing defense."

Because of his contributions, Miller is the choice of Newspaper Enterprise Association to lead its 1999 All-America men's healthall learn. ica men's basketball team.

Miller sparked the Utes to a 27-4 record and an NCAA tournament

His average statistics per game rere 15.9 points, 5.8 assists, 5.5 rebounds and 2.5 steals. But the real

story goes beyond the numbers.

"Andre Miller is the focal point," Elmara says. "He does so much on the floor that he literally raises the level of his team's play. And he's a lockdown defensive player. He really shuts down the other mays."

Joining Miller on NEA's All-Ameri-

ca men's team: Elton Brand, a 6-foot-8 sephomore

center at Dub Richard Hamilton, a 6 foot 6 junior

guard at Connecticut.

Wally Saczerbiak, a 6-foot-8 senior forward at Mismi of Ohio.

Tim James, 6-foot-7 senior forward Mismi of Florida.

These NEA selections were syndi-ated to over 800 U.S. daily newspa-

pers.

Miller stood out as the nation's best because of his leadership during a season in which the most hotly con-

tested position was point guard.

"The key to Miller is he makes the ays," notes Elmore. "It's more than just getting assists. It's not only moving the ball to the guy who can make a jump shot. I'm talking about drawing defenders and finding the open men - making his teammates better players."
For coach of the year, Rick Majerus

of Utah was the choice of Newspaper Enterprise Association. Majerus once again guided his team farther than expected. After a slow start, the Utes became notable winners, riding all the way to the title in the Western Athletic

Conference tournament.
Selected for NEA's All-America second learn: guards Jason Terry, a 6-2 senior at Arizona, and Steve Fran-

cis, a 6-foot-3 junior at Maryland; center Evan Eschmeyer, a 8-loot-11 senior at Northwestern; and forwards Chris Porter, a 8-foot-7 junior at Auburn, and Jamel Thomas, a 6-foota senior at Providence.

The popular presenson pick for player of the year was Brand. In only his second season, the 300-pound pivot man led top-ranked Duke to a 32-1 record, the first-ever unbeaten mark (16-0) during the regular season in the Atlantic Coast Confer-

ence and its tournament crown.

"There's just not a better post player in the country than Elton Brand," according to Elmore. "He's as dominant

as they come." Brand scored 17.8 points per game, grabbed 9.9 rebounds per game and blocked 2.2 shots per game. His fieldgoal percentage: \$1.6.

Elmora, who was a three-time All-ACC star at Maryland in the early 1970s, says Brand's greatness was overshadowed by the success of the Blue Devila

"He's also a better defender than you would think," Elmore adds. For another highly rated team — the University of Connecticut, which sailed

into the NCAA tournament at 28-2 — Richard Hamilton was the "go-to" star. "He's a pretty darn good choice at shooting guard," Elmore says. "If you look at what he's been able to bring to the table at UConn, you'd have to say that he brings everything: mobility, range, quickness. I don't see so many guys out there at that position who have done what he's been able to do."

Hamilton's averaged 21.3 points per game and 4.8 rebounds per game. At the free throw line, he made 84.2 percent of his shots.

"For a couple of weeks his game suf-fered," says Elmore of Hamilton. "But overall he's been consistent."

So has Szczerbiak, otherwise known as "Wally World."

Secretiak led Mismi of Ohio to a 237 mark and an at-large bid from the Mid American Conference in the NCAA tournament. There he wowed

esketball fans with his ability to acore. "Obviously, he can shoot the ball," Elmore notes. "He's a surprisingly decent rebounder (8.7 per game) for a shooter. His problem is putting the ball on the floor. He's fortunate that at 6-

8 he shoots over most guys."
At 241 pounds, Secerbiak's strength

is another big plus.
Tim James was also a strong figure for Miami of Florida.

He helped the Hurricanes of the Big East to a 22-6 record.






