Private Hospitals Have Higher Rates

County taxpayers pay less for treating its indigent patients at Seminole Memorial Hospital than other hospitals charge for treating the county's poor. This was disclosed after studying records at the court house of amounts county pays to treat Seminole County's indigent in Florida Hospital, Winter Park Memorial, Fort Myers, Murphy Medical Center at Gainesville and Orange Memorial.

If the County Commission sells Seminole Memorial Hospital, the taxpayers will be charged more to send patients to private hospitals. In the event the county hospital is sold, prices are expected to increase by at least \$10 a day just for beds alone, according to figures at nearby private institutions.

All county residents will be required to pay the higher costs under private ownership, not just indigents who receive medical care funded by the county.

According to figures in the clerk of court's office, it was disclosed that Florida Hospital charges an average of \$73.98 for one day for indigent care. Seminole Memorial charges \$58.58 for the same one-day period.

Winter Park Memorial fees for treatment is even higher at \$74.60 for a single day.

Murphy Medical Center at Gainesville charges \$71.20 for one day's care, and Fort Myers medical center bills an average \$72.50 for a day's treatment. Orange Memorial charges are about \$70 a day, according to figures.

A. K. Shoemaker Jr., Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce president and member of the chamber's committee looking into the proposed sale of the Sanford-based hospital to a private investment firm, made this observation at a recent committee meeting. "When private enterprise takes over, the costs either go up or the quality down."

Seminole's School System County's Biggest Business

The Seminole County school system is "big business." The biggest business in Seminole County. With the largest income. The largest payroll.

Anticipated budget for the 1971-72 fiscal year ending this coming June — from all sources of revenue — is \$26,561,932.34. Total number of employees as of this date is 1,850, including 1,135 instructional personnel. Total number of

students on this date is 24,729, up 2,364 this year over 1970-71.

This is compared to like figures a decade ago for the 1971-62 fiscal year, when the total budget was \$5,196,170.33, students numbered 12,368 and employees totaled 800.

Walter A. Teague, associate superintendent of schools, who provided these figures at the request of The Herald, said school growth percentage-wise in 1958-59-60 was almost as fast as 1971-72. And, he added, it is (Cont'd On Pg. 7A Column 4)

Officials Seek Solution

Twin-City Hassle Grows

NORTH ORLANDO—Police Commissioner Charles Rowell and Police Chief Walter Bachelor were instructed to approach Longwood officials again to determine ways to "iron out" a dispute with the Longwood police department, and continue police dispatching service for the village with the neighboring city's police force.

They go to the meeting with advice from Village Attorney Thomas Freeman. Freeman said the additional 1 1/2 calls per hour which the village has added to the Longwood department's workload should not be unduly

overburdening to Longwood and the situation is not a crisis. "It looks like Chief (R. E.) Sweat has someone who wants to go on vacation and he wants to spend North Orlando village moneys to replace him," the attorney said.

The Council discussed in detail a story that appeared in The Sanford Herald Monday reporting remarks of Chief Sweat that his department needs assistance to continue the free dispatch service to North Orlando during the nine weeks when his employees will be vacationing.

Rowell said in a meeting with Longwood Councilman William Klosky and Sweat last week it was indicated if the Village would supply one cadet to the Longwood department during the period it would be sufficient.

The councilman particularly was offended by Sweat's published remark that the village could either supply two cadets, pay a sum sufficient to hire part time personnel or remove its telephone from the Longwood police station.

Bachelor insisted giving Longwood two cadets would destroy the present 24-hour daily service system of his department which only recently went into effect.

Bachelor explained he is

prepared to replace the one cadet with volunteer service from members of the police reserve. Mayor Granville Brown said Longwood's Mayor Kenneth Brown in telephone conference Monday said calls both telephone and radio far exceeded the numbers originally anticipated.

Brown said the police department calls through Monday totaled 96 complaints, 558 telephone and 1,560 radio. Bachelor said he assumed routine administrative radio calls such as an officer reporting off to dinner or giving location would have been

recognized by Longwood as an addition to anticipated 50 calls monthly. He said as well that when the village was receiving the service from Casselberry there had been no complaint about too many calls.

Rowell said he had suggested to Sweat that the village could eliminate the administrative calls, but that also did not meet with Sweat's approval.

Mayor Brown said the fact that the Longwood dogcatcher lives in the village has added somewhat to the numbers of calls and that he instructed the animal control officer to get his own telephone.

Taxes Rears Its Ugly Head

CASSELBERRY — The well worn question of ad valorem taxes for Casselberry reared its head once more at a council work session last night, and it looks like this time ad valorem taxes may have a chance. The city council is expected at its next meeting to authorize a city-wide referendum to determine if citizens are willing to pay an ad valorem tax in order to keep the Land O'Lakes Golf Course

calls for the pledging of the cigarette tax to pay for the course. The proposal raised many questions on the part of the council members and mayor, some of whom feel that the city could not operate if the cigarette tax was pledged in this way. City Manager Ronald Bergman stated his opinion that

Several citizens raised the question of ad valorem taxes to pay for the course, and the council finally began to seriously consider this means of financing. Council Chairman Edith Duerr stated that "this is the only practical solution I have heard." Council will authorize a referendum to seek out the citizens' feelings on this, and the referendum will take at least 45 days to prepare.

In action at last night's regular session, council authorized the preparation and posting of an ordinance annexing the Foxcroft Apartments, Butler Plaza, and the proposed Market Square shopping plaza. Although Butler Plaza did not request annexation, council decided to annex it along with the other two parcels in order to make Foxcroft Apartments contiguous to city property. This is legal since Butler Plaza itself is contiguous.

LET'S GO FISHING
A statement made in the outdoors column of another newspaper Sunday might bring some arguments from anglers who fish the Wekiva River regularly. The remark in question was to the fact that you don't hear much talk about redbreast bream and in most areas they can't be considered really important. It then went on to say that the St. Johns River has some of the largest you will find.

RUSSELL ARNOLD, a visitor from Michigan, shows off a pair of bass caught recently on a purple worm with a red tail. He was fishing out of Camp Seminole when he landed the 2 1/2 and 3 1/2 pound fish. Several other state visitors are taking time to wet a line and many of them are coming back with catches to brag about.

George Cheney, owner of Wekiva Haven, told of a catch of catfish and bream made by George Fowler of Apopka Saturday. Fowler furnished the main course for a fish fry for a dozen friends, and that takes a lot of fish when prepared outdoors on the river bank.

At Camp Seminole, Otis Faulk, owner, told of a catch of 15 panfish (including REDBREAST BREAM) by three couples on a Saturday outing. Bass fishermen found their favorite targets a little bit scattered but still came up with some pretty fair catches. Larry Bricker and Bobby Hall had four nice ones, brothers Ronnie and Terry Lapp managed to find four, while John Hill landed four also in the two to three pound class.

The fishing hole Section of the St. Johns is a HOT SPOT for bream just now. Bob King, manager of the camp, reports large strings of them coming in every day with crickets and mussels the favorite bait. Dick Mower is getting his share of bass on the striking grounds in this area with a lot of them hitting the four pound mark. King mentioned also that they are still hitting very well with roe shad outnumbering the bucks almost two to one. Spotted perch have been slow for a few days, according to King.

Fishing has been a little on the slow side near the Osteen Bridge, but bream and a few speck are being caught in this part of the river by the regular visitors. Paul Johnson, camp operator, says the wind of the past few days has been the big factor, not too many people caring to fish.

Over a Lake Jessup, Lowell Hiley of Hiley's Fish Camp, had pretty much the same luck as the other anglers and a few fish were taken. One of the fish was a large one, which he said Hiley, had to stick to the creeks to find shelter from the wind. Bob Fogle, son Bobby and daughter Randy landed 13 specks and a pair of bluegills in Soldiers Creek. Bertie Slaughter and Dave Hiley tried Howland Creek and landed 15 bream in two hours. Other baits averaged 12 to 15 per day, mostly shellcrackers, with a two pound specimen landed by one lucky angler Sunday.

Shorty Phillips and Bertie Hinson used the Spot plug to good advantage both Wednesday and Thursday, landing eight school bass on each of the two mornings, according to reports received at the Seminole Sports Shop.

Sal Water
Don Smith, who runs the shop, also had news of an outstanding catch made by Buddy Smith. Buddy hooked and landed a 17 pound channel bass on an Abu 170 pound bottom reel and 14 pound test line Thursday. The same fisherman returned to the surf angler Wednesday and came up with 23 bluefish and five more channel bass. Joe Routh connected with 30-32-34 water trout on Wednesday, plugging with a T724 Mirro-lure.

Pete Kelley fished out of Al-Jo's Camp on A1A, south of New Smyrna Saturday. He found the right hole, landing an eight pound trout and three more in the six pound class. Kelley used live shrimp for this beautiful catch. Trout are moving on the flats with the warmer weather and plug casters are using top water lures to get them in the early morning hours. Mirro-lures are still taking their share in the medium deep water (three to four feet) and off the edges of the sandbars.

A break in the weather Saturday saw every boat from Inlet Harbor heading for the outside. The larger bottom fishing boats had fair catches of red snapper, grouper and the usual bunch of black sea bass. An occasional bottom feeding kingfish also lived up to the action. Trilling boats had a heyday with kingfish striking in almost unbelievable numbers! The "Angler," with Captain Fred Langendorf piloting, was top boat of the day with 61 kingfish landing in his fish box. 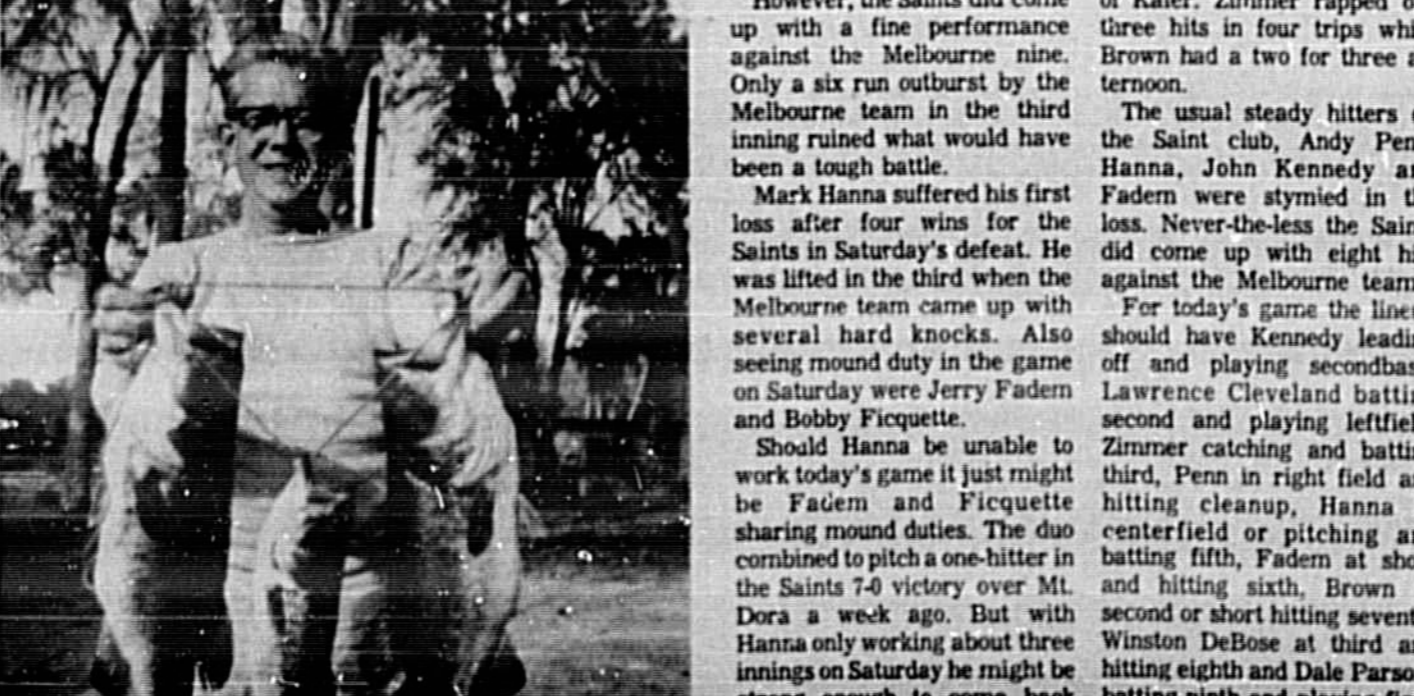

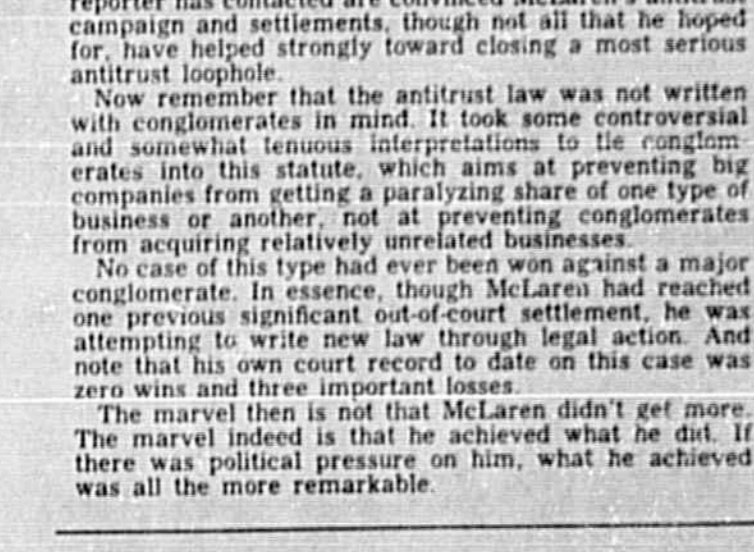
