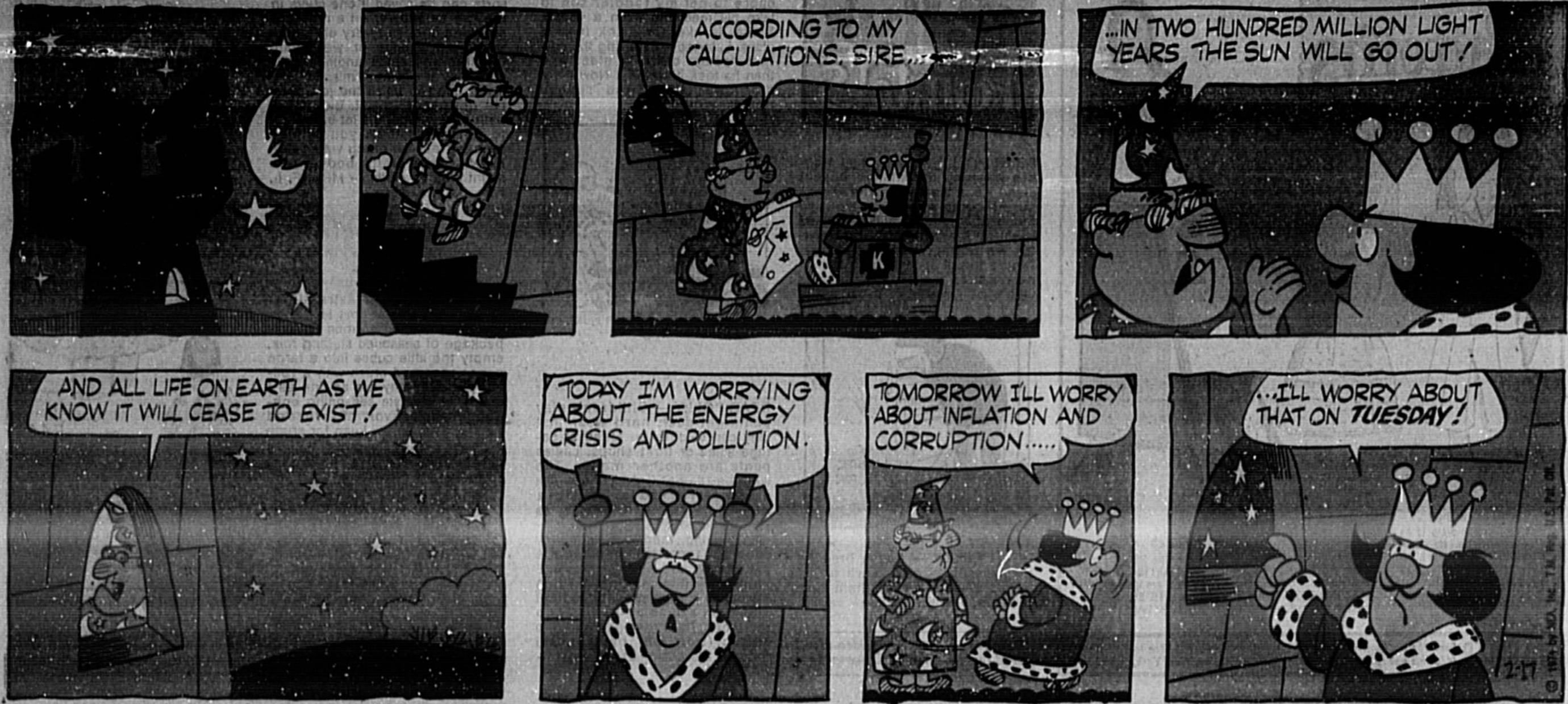

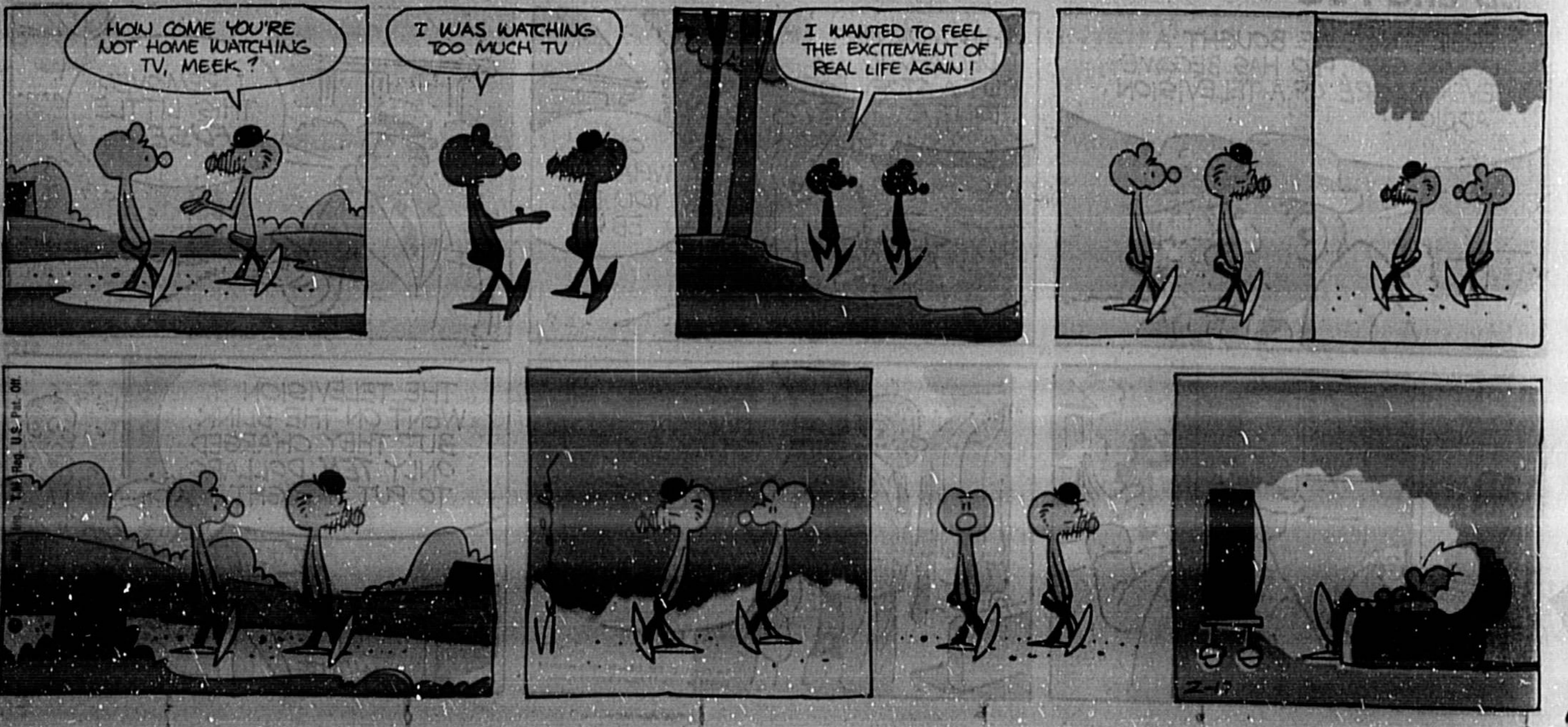

Sanford Gas Stations Closed; Statewide Protest Threatened

A threatened lockup of gasoline pumps in Florida to protest federal energy policies failed to materialize today, a survey shows, and while almost all service stations in the Sanford area are closed, it is for different reasons.

While some of the stations in and around Sanford may have closed in observance of the George Washington holiday, most cannot open because they are out of gasoline as large signs on their pumps proclaim to the frustrated motorist searching for gasoline.

Like dealers throughout Central Florida, Sanford dealers want the right to sell to preferred customers and want to hike prices a penny a gallon for every allocation reduction of 10 per cent. Most Sanford dealers contracted, however, said they did not favor a complete shutdown or "pump out."

Jim Miller, president of the Florida Allied Retailers Association, said Sunday that at least 50 per cent of the dealers in Miami, Fort Lauderdale, Sarasota, Jacksonville and Orlando would shut down.

But checks of service station operators in the cities showed that the majority of stations that had gas were remaining open.

Mel Dekle closed his Gulf station on French Avenue in Sanford at 10 a.m. today. "I've sold my quota for the day - in fact, I've run 500 gallons over the 2,000 gallon quota I've set for each day," he commented.

Dekle said he favors the idea of giving his regular customers preferential treatment, but hasn't stopped other customers from entering his station.

He said the one-cent per gallon increase on an allocation reduction of 15 per cent or more approved under a new Federal Energy Office order is "too little, too late," and most operators couldn't come out on a 15 per cent reduction. However, Dekle said he will not shut down while he still has a quota of gasoline to sell each day.

Paul Hunter at Highway Oil Co. on French Avenue is pumping today - "and I'll probably pump till 10 o'clock tonight," he said. "After that I'll probably be out until the first of next month."

Hunter said he favors the "pump out" policy. "How can you ration customers when they need enough to get them to the Gulf and back, or to Disney?" he asked. "You've got to give them as much as they need for as long as you've got it."

At least three other stations at the SR 4614 interchange were pumping some gasoline, including Standard, Gulf and Sunoco. Owner of the Sunoco station, George Burger, said he generally tries to pick the time of day when tourists are heaviest of the interstate to open his station. "That's about noon to five in the afternoon," said Burger. "Even then, I'm rationing them to 10 gallons per customer."

In reply to the question whether he favored a move to give regular customers preferential treatment, Burger commented, "Who kept me in business before? Who do I have to depend on to keep me in business again after this thing is over? That should answer your question."

For Oregon, Washington Regular Customers OK'd

Service stations in Oregon and Washington ended a threat to close down after regional energy officials tentatively approved a plan allowing them to give preferential treatment to regular customers.

The 60-day experimental plan for stations in those states was included in an eight-point agreement reached in Seattle Sunday night. Organized stations in the two states had threatened to pump all their gas and then close to protest the ban on preferential treatment ordered last week by the Federal Energy Office.

Station operators in some other states, however, continued to consider a "pump-out" protest against the ban.

In Seattle, a joint statement issued after 10 hours of bargaining by negotiators for two dealer groups and regional FEO officials said dealers getting at least 20,000 gallons a month would be required to offer only 70 per cent of their gasoline for sale to the general public.

The remaining 30 per cent could be set aside for "special users," including regular customers and those who have priority under federal regulations.

Stations with less than 20,000 gallons a month would be exempt from the 70 per cent restriction.

"The plan cannot go into effect until approved by national FEO officials in Washington, D.C., where a meeting on the matter is scheduled for Wednesday.

Meanwhile, Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., said he plans to meet today with an aide to FEO chief William E. Simon to present demands of 46 Greenwich, Conn., and Port Chester, N.Y., service station operators that the ban on preferential treatment be lifted.

In a meeting Sunday with Eckardt C. Beck, Connecticut energy administrator, the Greenwich area service station operators asked that 10 to 25 per cent of their gasoline supplies be reserved for regular customers and doctors.

Some New York State station operators continued to consider a pump-out to protest the preference ban.

Peter Conway, president of the Gasoline Retailers Association of Northeastern New York, said sentiment for such action "is very flexible for the moment."

And Robert Jacobs, secretary-treasurer of the Illinois Gasoline Dealers Association, warned that some Chicago-area station operators might stage a pump-out to protest the ban on discriminatory sales, limits on prices at the pumps and the general lack of gasoline.

Auto-Ferry Could Float In May

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — An auto-ferry service between Louisville and Central Florida, initially scheduled to start June 1, may start a month early, according to an official of the Seaboard Coast Line Railroad.

Richard D. Sanborn, a Seaboard vice president, said problems that had threatened the start of the service have been resolved, putting the carrier ahead of schedule.

The auto-ferry service would enable passengers to ride in lounge cars while their autos are carried on the same train.

Sanborn noted that Amtrak has withdrawn its objections to the ferry service. He said also that the Auto-Train Corp., which has been running a similar auto-ferry along the East Coast for more than two years, has released Seaboard Coast Line from its legal obligation to serve the private company exclusively.

Auto-Train and Seaboard Coast Line signed an agreement last summer for use of L&N and Seaboard tracks between Louisville and Sanford, Fla. Early this year Amtrak announced plans to run an auto ferry between Indianapolis and a terminal proposed for Central Florida and asked to use the sametracks contracted by the Auto-Train Corp. Auto-Train officials at first balked, but have since agreed to the arrangement.

Civil Service Review Panel Upholds Firing Of Deputy

Former Seminole Sheriff's Sgt. John Wright today lost his fight to gain re-instatement pending judicial settlement of charges he stole a shotgun from Sheriff John Polk's custody.

Scheduled arraignment in circuit court on felony charges in the matter, the Sheriff's department civil service review board unanimously denied Wright's petition for re-instatement and upheld Polk's Dec. 19 firing of the department's former highest ranking black deputy.

Today's setback was the second since a Feb. 12 ruling by Circuit Court Judge David Strawn that the criminal charges against Wright should go to trial.

After two days of testimony, Strawn ruled that sufficient evidence exists and also denied a writ of habeas corpus granted Wright on Christmas Day that resulted in the preliminary hearing.

Today Civil Service Board chairman William Giffert, an attorney with a firm that represents Polk, said he felt Polk did not violate the spirit or the letter of the state law allowing summary firing of full-time deputies.

Wright's lawyer, T. David Burns of Bartow, said he will launch a judicial appeal of the decision.

Mother, Child Killed In Wreck

A Sanford woman, injured in a three-car accident Saturday that took the lives of her daughter and grandson, was listed in critical condition today at Florida Hospital at Orlando.

Police said Mrs. Eunice Wall Wiggins, 59, 2009 Jefferson Avenue, was a passenger in a car driven by her daughter, Mrs. Sandra W. Forrest.

Mrs. Forrest, 27, and her two-year-old son Burnie A. Forrest, also of 2009 Jefferson Avenue, were killed in the collision at 20th Street and Sanford Avenue.

Patrolman H.J. Shea Jr. charged Harold D. Highsmith, 40, 405 Mattie Street, with driving under the influence of alcohol and reckless driving. Highsmith, driver of a van involved in the crash, was admitted to Seminole Memorial hospital and 11 parked cars, and later released.

Police reports listed Ralph L. McClain, of 708 Elm Avenue, as driver of a pickup truck also involved in the accident. Officers said McClain was being thrown under a pursuing police car after his motorcycle struck a curb and then hit a light pole. The motorcycle was being chased because of a speeding violation, officers said.

Troopers said David Brown, 17, of Deerfield Beach and Gregory Morella, 17, of Pompano Beach, died Saturday when their car was involved in a collision with another vehicle and a bus.

Officers said the Pompano Beach accident occurred when a car traveling the wrong way on a one-way street hit the bus, forcing it to swerve into another vehicle and 11 parked cars.

Troopers gave the following details of other fatal accidents: Chester Sheets, 30, of Vero Beach was killed Saturday when he was thrown under a pursuing police car after his motorcycle struck a curb and then hit a light pole. James Aultman, 19, died Saturday on State Road 566, near his hometown of Indian Rocks Beach. His vehicle reportedly rolled over three times after failing to make a curve in the road.

Barbara Shorter, 38, of Eaton Park was killed near Lakeland Saturday when her car was hit by a train.

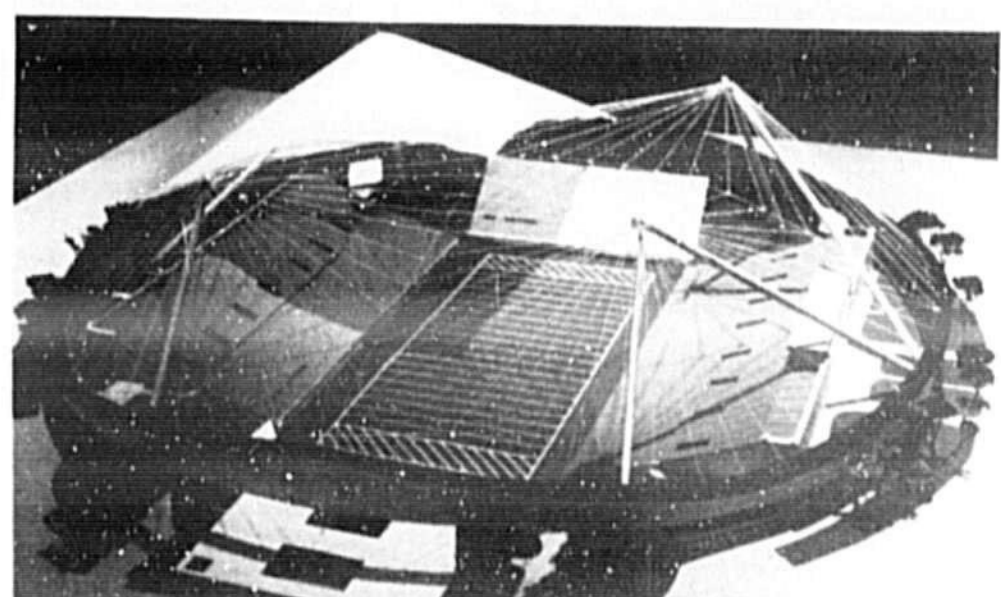
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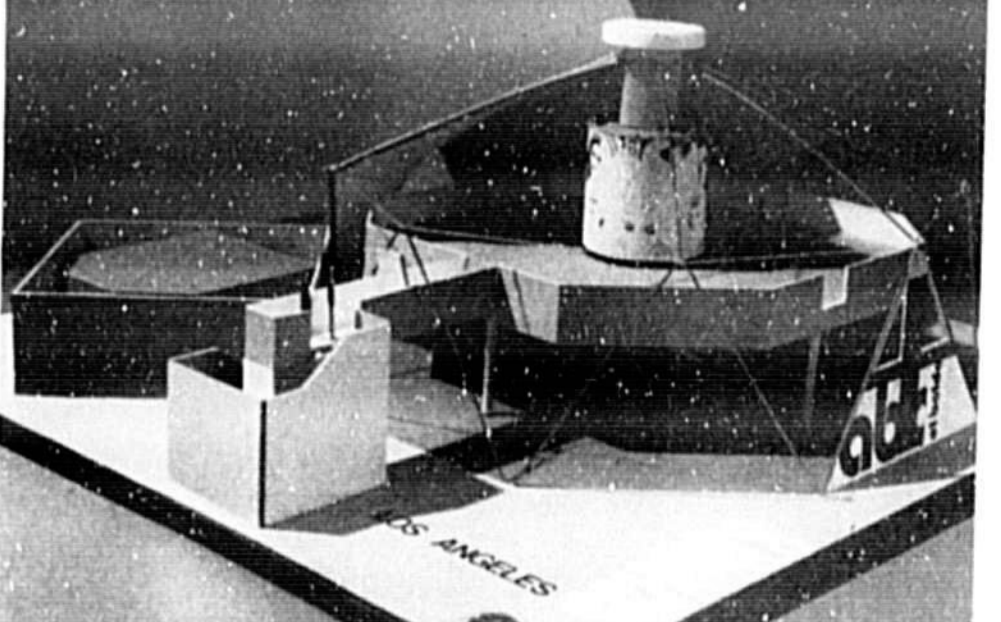
