Housing project OK'd

\$40 million development will be located between S.R. 46 and Upsala Road

SANFORD - A zoning request for a \$40 million housing development received unanimous planning and zoning approval last night.

Russell Sepielli, a Hollywood developer, made a request to rezone a 157-acre tract between State Road 46A and Upsala Road from agricultural use to parcels of single family and multi-family residential uses. Sepielli amended the request to zone more than one-half of the parcel adjacent to Upsala Road as planned development rather than multi-family.

Planned development zoning requires site plan review by planning and zoning commission and the city commission. Planned development also

allows for mixed use of land, including single family homes and apartment complexes.

The commission voted to approve the request after a crowd of residents from the Upsala Road area voiced concerns about increasing the traffic on State Road 46A and flooding the school

system with growth.

Many residents expressed concern about the number of units to be developed within an area.

Although multi-family use allows as many as eight units per acre, Sepielli said he expects to build an average of six homes per acre.

In the parcel adjacent to Oregon Avenue, rezoned for single family residential use, Sepielli said he expects to build less than 100 homes in the range of \$135,000. He estimated his limited partnership will break ground in July for the single family parcel, the first of a three-phase

Septelli said about 500 homes will be built in the planned development parcel during the second and third phases.

LAKE MARY - A motion to approve the first reading of an ordinance to ban billboards and off-premise signs in the city passed unanimously last night.

That means that about two dozen signs in Lake Mary will be affected. according to City Planner Matt West.

About three of those are on Highway 17-92, 17 are along I-4, two on Lake Mary Boulevard, and one on Rinehart Road.

The ordinance states that billboards will be non-conforming signs, whereby their present use is protected. However, new signs cannot be erected and existing signs cannot be maintained or repaired. In addition, any sign that is not otherwise regulated by the federal Highway Beautification Act, as are must come down after seven years. according to City Attorney Ned N.

Julian Jr. West said that all the billboards in Lake Mary have been there for longer than seven years.

Wekiva tracts placed on 'high-priority' list

Protection of the Wekiva River from overdevelopment was boosted Thursday as Gov. Bob Martinez and the state Cabinet listed two large tracts of land in the Wekiva area among their highest purchase priorities.

The two tracts, Seminole Springs and the B.M.K. Ranch, both largely located in Lake County, were placed second and third on the 30-item state Conservation and Recreation Lands

The high ranking on the list almost assures their purchase, Items on the list are ranked according to priority. State CARL acquisition staff and dollars are concentrated on only the upper-most projects.

The CARL program is expected to have about \$45 million to spend this year.

The two tracts of land encompass a major tributary of the Wekiva, Black Water Creek in Lake County. A small portion of the B.M.K. Ranch extends into Orange County.

Conservationists have sought protection of the Wekiva River, which tranverses Orange, Seminole, Lake and Volusia Counties, and its tributaries for several years. They scored a major victory last year when the Legislature passed building restrictions in the lands bordering the

Wekiva activists say the waters of the rivers are still in a pristine condition and need state protection before development polluts them.

Several tributaries were given state protection late last year, including Black Water Creek. The CARL list includes a total of 60 items, but

the second 30 are worked on only if Martinez and the Cabinet approve.

Sanford police chief going to FBI academy

SANFORD - Police Chief Steven Harriett is slated to be the first Sanford city policeman to attend the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Va.

Harriett, 35, who has been chief four years, said he has waited two years for acceptance to the academy, which draws law en-forcement officers from around the world.

It is a privilidge, Harriett said, to be chosen for such prestigious. high-caliber training. "The experts in the business lead the course," he said.

Harriett said his FBI training will focus on management and adminstrative skills. He will also receive training in other areas.

such as firearms and physical training.

Harriett's FBI training is scheduled to begin July 9. All expenses, other than his salary and \$300 in incidental expenses including uniforms, will be paid by the federal government, he said.

Only two people from our region are accepted for each of four annual academy session, he said. Eight hundred to 1,000 law enforcement managers from all over the world attend this management course each year.

The investment of 11 weeks of Harriett's time for academy study, he said, will "long be a benefit to the city and the police department. It's a level of training you can't get elsewhere."

The FBI National Academy was established in 1935.

Confiscated Cadillac makes patrol car

PENSACOLA - Deputies in northwest Florida unveiled their latest squad car Thursday - a 1983 Cadillac Sedan DeVille

complete with flashing blue lights and a siren.

Escambia County Sheriff's Department Unit 426 is painted in the white and green colors of other patrol cars and looks the part, save for the words "Compliments of Escambia County Drug Dealers" emblazoned on the side.

"It's big and heavy enough, if we have to come up with a battering ram somewhere for some drug dealers, we'll have to utilize one of their vehicles," Sheriff Charlie Johnson joked.

Johnson said the Cadillac was confiscated in a drug bust a month ago. He said authorities searched the car and found both drugs and money in hidden compartments.

The car will be used for routine patrols - with a special emphasis placed on working it in areas with suspected drug-related activities. Johnson said deputies will take turns driving the Caddy, which has a plush blue interior and 60,000 miles on the odometer.

Deputies also have a Mercedes that was confiscated, but Johnson said it would not be turned into a patrol car and instead would be used for undercover operations.

A local Cadillac dealer said that in 1983, the car would have sold for some \$17,000. Today it is worth about \$7,000. The sheriff's department spent \$165 to outfit the car as a police

County blamed for parkway distractions

CLEARWATER - Kenneth A. Larrison says it is not his fault he rear-ended another car on Park Boulevard in Pinellas Park Dec. 10 and has asked the Pinellas County Commission to come up with the \$1,900.55 needed to repair the vehicles.

Larrison told county officials in a letter earlier this month his insurance did not cover the damages and said it was the county's duty to keep the parkway median free of nuisances such as those he blames for the accident.

The nuisances he complained about were two young women wearing hot pants and tight T-shirts, one holding a sign promoting a tire store, the other performing with a hula-hoop. Larrison, 27, said the accident occurred because other

drivers slowed to ogle the women. Darrel Chaicraft, manager of the tire store, said the women eventually left the median strip at the suggestion of a Florida

Highway Patrol trooper. County attorney Susan Churuti said Wednesday the county has six months in which to investigate Larrison's complaint and decide whether to offer a settlement. She said if the county doesn't respond Larrison can opt to file suit.

Martinez signs death warrants

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Bob Martinez on Thursday signed death warrants for convicted child killer Phillip Alexander Atkins and condemned murderer Marvin Edwin Johnson.

Corrections officials scheduled Johnson's execution for 7 a.m. on Thursday, March 16. Atkins is scheduled to die in the electric chair at 7 a.m. on Tuesday, April 18.

Atkins was sentenced to death for the September 1981 kidnapping and murder of six-year-old Antonio Castilio in Polk County. According to court records, Atkins performed two sexual acts with Castillo and then beat him to death when the

child threatened to tell his parents.

An autopsy showed Atkins hit Castillo 30 times, mostly in the head and neck, with his fists and a steel pipe. Castillo was still alive when he was found, but died shortly thereafter.

The death warrant is Atkins' first. Johnson was sentenced to death for the June 1978 murder of Pensacola pharmacist. Court records show Johnson shot and licu-56-year-old Woodrow Moulton during an-attempted robbery of Moulton's pharmacy.

The death warrant is the third signed for Johnson.

Florida escapee captured in Illinois

MOUNT VERNON, Ill. - A man who escaped a federal prison in Florida almost a year ago while serving a 27-year sentence for counterfeiting and conspiracy to distribute drugs has been captured in Southern Illinois, authorities said Thursday.

Jefferson County Sheriff Bob Pitchford said Phillip Norman. 49, was arrested about 6:30 p.m. Wednesday without incident in a residential area of Mount Vernon and was being held in the county jail for federal authorities.

Deputy U.S. Marshal Harold Puckett at Benton said Norman would be formally charged with escape and arraigned before U.S. Magistrate Gerald Cohn in U.S. District Court at East St. Louis at 1 p.m. CST Thursday.

The U.S. Marshal's Service had received confidential information that Norman was in the Mount Vernon area. Puckett declined further comment about what led to the suspect's arrest

Pitchford said Norman was serving a 27-year sentence on convictions of counterfeiting and conspriacy to distribute cocaine and marijuana when he escaped from a federal correctional center at Tallahassee in March 1988.

TALLAHASSEE - Sen. Connie Mack said Thursday he will introduce "fair share" legislation to require federal agencies to use up-to-date census figures when allocating grants to state and local governments.

"Florida is being cheated out of millions of dollars by a burdensome bureaucracy that hasn't kept pace with a changing America," Mack said.

"While we are the top growth state since 1980, we are at the very bottom in receiving these grants," Mack said.

TAMPA - Tarpon Springs adventurer and importer Michael J. Tsalickis was sentenced Thursday to 27 years and four months in federal prison for trying to smuggle 7,300 pounds of Colombian cocaine into Florida last year.

Tsalickis, 61, was convicted Nov. 2 of two counts of smuggling and two counts of trafficking

The cocaine, the second largest seizure in the United States. was found hidden inside hollowed-out planks of Brazilian cedar brought to St. Petersburg April 19 aboard a freighter owned and operated by Tsalickis in his international import busi-

The cocaine was found after the boards were transported from St. Petersburg to a warehouse owned by Tsalickis in Tarpon Springs.

Tsalickis conjended he ar-

for three acquaintances, unaware the boards contained packages of cocaine. He maintained he was only the purchasing and shipping agent for Pedro Narvaez, 35, who he said told him he wanted the lumber to start a furnituremaking business.

Eastern hit by work slowdown

MIAMI - Eastern Airlines Inc. has had to park 17 airpianes, or 8 percent of its regular fleet. because of a deliberate work slowdown staged by the International Association of Machinists, the airline charged Thursday.

"In recent weeks, the situation has become simply untenable," Eastern vice president D. Roger Ferguson said in papers filed in U.S. District Court.

Eastern, in response to an IAM lawsuit filed Tuesday, said the loss of productivity forced it to hire subcontractors to do the work. "As a result of the slowdowns, a small portion

of the work that employees have refused to complete has been sent out to contractors for completion," the company said. "The subcontracting is expensive but absolutely neces-

The IAM sued Eastern to stop what it described as illegal subcontracting. A federal judge scheduled a hearing for today.

Eastern and its largest union are poised for a March 4 strike showdown over Eastern's demand for lower labor costs. Currently, the two sides are observing a 30-day cooling off period in their 16-month-old contract dispute.

The IAM has accused Eastern of violating the federally mandated cooling off period by farming out work on two airplanes and ten engines. Eastern responded by accusing the IAM of engaging in a partial strike.

Hundreds of IAM workers walked off the job Feb. 7 in a protest concerning overtime. The company said the disruption continues although workers are back on the job.

"The IAM has now abandoned overt, illegal acts of industrial warfare and commenced a covert campaign which is equally illegal and potentially ruinous." Eastern said.
"IAM has embarked on a slowdown campaign

including a concerted refusal of overtime and a sickout," the company said. "Even when IAM employees are physically reporting to work, they are refusing to work productively.

Ferguson said seven airpianes are parked in Miami awaiting federally mandated service checks. Another 10 airplanes are in Atlanta, he

Boy's scalding under investigation

Cocaine use by firefighters investigated

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS -The state attorneys office has closed a criminal investigation of off-duty cocaine use by three firefighters, according to local police officials.

Altamonte Springs Police Chief William Liquori said Wednesday that he has turned the case over to the Altamonte Springs Fire Department for an administrative investigation because a state attorney review of the case had determined a lack of prosecuteable evidence.

Altamonte Springs firefighters John Rogers and Arthur Burgess were suspended the week of Jan. 16 after police received an anonymous complaint that the two used cocaine during off-duty hours, Altamonte Springs fire chief Thomas Siegfried said. Steve Garver, Altamonte Springs police commander, said a third firefighter, Ed Broadway, had been suspended in connection with the allegations of cocaine

Garver said the three men admitted to cocaine use during the police investigation.

will not return to work until the administrative investigation is complete. The investigation will determine if drugs were used or sold by firefighters, frequency of any use and the possible effect of any drug use on job perfor-mance, Siegfried said.

We may prescribe treatment, discipline or dismissal,' Siegfried said.

Thanks, Japan; we needed that

Last spring, a former U.S. trade negotiator in the Reagan administration named Clyde Prestowitz was touting his new book. Called "Trading Places: How We Allowed Japan to Take the Lead." the Prestowitz book described in vivid detail how the effectiveness of Japan's industrial policies and this nation's ineffectual response to those policies threatened our status as world leader — not just economically, but militarily and diplomatically as well.

The Japanese were building what Prestowitz called "an industrial establishment of unparalleled efficiency." This country, on the other hand, was running its economy "primarly for the short term benefit of the consumer and to stimulate the economic benefit of its allies with little heed for the relationship of economic power to national security.

By 1987, Prestowitz asserts, the world's Industrial, economic and financial leader had "traded places" with Japan. Only as a military power was the United States still on

If Prestowitz is right, perhaps it was appropriate that President Bush's first White House meeting with a foreign leader was with Japanese Prime Minister Noboru Takeshita. And, perhaps it should not have been a surprise that Takeshita, when he met with the president and congressional leaders, insisted on being treated like a heavyweight.

Takeshita told Bush, for example, that

Japan wants to be more closely consulted as the United States seeks to normalize relations with the Soviet Union. He insisted that the United States do more than it has done so far to reduce its federal budget deficit; Japan has asserted for some time that the deficit sows contusion in the world economy.

So who does this assertive fellow think he



Takeshita represents a nation that posted a record trade surplus of \$10.932 billion in December: we're running a \$50 billion-plus trade deficit with Japan. Japan's busily humming economy averaged a 2.5 percent unemployment rate last year. The other day, Japan announced plans to expand its foreign aid; by fiscal 1990, Japan will be the world's largest provider of economic aid to developing

Prestowitz offers other statistics that take the measure of Takeshifa and the country he represents. In 1986, he points out in "Trading Places," \$6 billion of Japanese money went into American real estate, including the Exxon, the ABC and the Tiffany buildings in Manhattan. By 1987, nearly half the office space in downtown Los Angeles was in Japanese hands. Also in 1987, \$10 billion in Japanese money helped to keep Wall Street cooking.

Japan's net foreign assets, \$11.5 billion in 1980, are expected to climb to \$853 billion in 1995. Most of that investment will come to the United States.

Japan is our friend and ally, as the president and the prime minister reiterated the other day. We should remember that. For the challenge this friend offers, we should say: "Thanks, we needed that."

Reading Marxism between the lines

Ever since the 1954 censure of Joe McCarthy, it has been substantially impossible in this country to argue that there is such a thing as a "secret communist": A dedicated supporter of the communist cause who conceals his true allegiance but quietly promotes communist ends nevertheless. To suspect that such people exist is regarded as clinical evidence of paranoia, to be laughed at or, if it proves troublesome, denounced savagely.

So I have always been grateful for the occasional communist who, for whatever reason of his own, decides to come out of the closet. A few years ago, for example, John Womack, chairman of the history department at Harvard. casually mentioned that he is a communist in the course of a short autobiographical contribution to the 25th reunion volume published by his own Harvard class. There was nothing anybody could do about this, though, since, of course, Womack enjoys academic tenure; and the disclosure generated minimum excitement anyway, suggesting that Womack hadn't really told the world anything it didn't already suspect about the situation at Harvard.

But A. Kent MacDougail made a considerably bigger splash recently when he too strode out of the closet and acknowledged his own lifetime

"communism." but it is impossible to believe he would be very outraged by its application to him he has written, pseudonymously, for The

Worker.) For MacDougall, you see, is a lifelong pro-fessional journalist who spent 10 years with The Wall Street Journal and 10 more with the Los Angeles Times before accepting a professorship of journalism at Berkeley — from which vantage-point, like Professor Womack, he can safely 'fess up.'

We are indebted to MacDougail for two confessional articles he wrote in the November and December 1988 issues of an obscure Marxist

publication called Monthly Review. In them, MacDougall brags with considerable justification

about how he planted subtly Marxist analyses of all sorts of "capitalist" misdeeds in these two pillars of the bourgeois establishment.

At the Journal, for example, he states that the paper's staunchly conservative editorial page 'helped me gain cooperation and candor from corporate executives who assumed — wrongly in most cases — that Journal reporters were as soft on big business as the paper's editorial writers.... I learned how to disarm sources and extract damaging admissions from them...."

Moving on to the Los Angeles Times, MacDougall says he took advantage of the desire of young Otis Chandler, who had inherited the paper, to rid it of its stuffy, conservative image. "Of the first dozen stories I wrote for the Los Angeles Times," he asserts, "one profiled the leftist magazine Mother Jones and Sweets of profiled Marxist economists Paul Sweezy of Monthly Review and John Gurley of Stanford University."

Why, do you suppose, did MacDougali choose this particular time to "tell ali"? Vanity, no doubt, played a part; and perhaps also a need to release the tensions of two decades of deception. But he may also sense that it simply no longer matters very much. His Marxist god has failed for good, and they probably know it even at

Dealing with the deficit

WASHINGTON — A delightful joke stopped being delightful when it became national policy. The joke was: Two politicians fall into a deep ravine with steep, sheer sides. "We're trapped!" cries one. "No." says the other, "We'll just assume a ladder."

Imaginative assuming, once a cottage industry in Washington, is now, because of Gramm-Rudman-Hollings deficit-reduction requirements, a sacrament. President Bush is assuming more rapid economic growth than most economists assume, more rapid increases in productivity than have usually been achieved in the postwar era, and interest rates plunging enough to produce seven percent

Sen. Fritz Hollings (D-S.C.) is so fed up with the fudging of figures and cooking of books provoked by Gramm-Rudman-Hollings that he proposes, in effect, blowing it up. He would remove the Social Security trust fund surplus from the budget. That would turn the entire Congress' hair as white as Hollings'.

In the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, the advertised deficit was \$155 billion. However, the real deficit for all government activities other than Social Security (which had a \$39 billion surplus) was \$194 billion. Take Social Security (the surplus is growing \$72,000 a minute) and other trust funds (highways, airports) out of the budget and suddenly the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings deficit target (\$150 billion) is about \$135 billion more distant.

To attack the true deficit of \$285 billion. Hollings proposes freezing all spending (exempting COLAs and new entitlement beneficiaries) and enacting a five percent value-added tax to fill a Deficit Reduction Trust Fund. You are thinking: He can't be serious. He is. But popular government will not permit that.

This is the kind of crisis democracies deal with poorly. The cost of living off seed corn is slowly cumulative anemia, quiet and virtually invisible. Of course, a recession would get everyone's attention. Would? Will.

The current expansion was 74 months old on inauguration Day. If it lasts until the next inauguration, it will be 122 months old. It has already run 42 months longer than the average of the 30 cyclical expansions since the middle of the 19th century.

Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan is in charge of keeping the expansion going without allowing inflation to get going. The Fed is one of the few federal institutions that can achieve what it intends. Its intentions pertain to interest rates. Greenspan is a serious inflation-fighter, but his room for maneuver with rising rates is severely limited because a recession has never been riskier than one would be now.

In a recession, the decline in government

revenues would produce soaring deficits and leave the government without the option of

countercyclical spending. Even if you assume (perhaps imaginatively) that the problem of insolvent savings and loans has been solved, recession or rising interest rates could produce a huge new problem from today's marginally solvent savings and loans. The servicing of Third World debts. and hence the health of important U.S. banks, depends on Third World exports to a growing U.S. economy. Leveraged buyouts, and borrowing by corpora-tions resisting hostile takeovers, have produced debts and cannot be serviced

unless the economy is growing.

For a perspective on our current vulnerability, consider this: The Carter budget submitted in January, 1980, proposed a deficit of \$15.6 billion. The interest cost on the debt this year will be \$130 billion more than in 1980. That is, as Hollings says, like a new \$130 billion spending program. It redistributes revenues regressively to buyers of government bonds.

Much of the federal budget is a mechanism administering a huge and regressive in-tergenerational transfer of wealth. The 12 percent of Americans over 65 receive 27 percent of federal spending and are, as a group, better off than the rest of the

population. Forbes magazine calculates that the federal government spends more than ten times as much per capita on the elderly as on children. Sen. Pay Moynihan (D-N.Y.) notes that ours is the first society in history in which the poorest group is children, not the elderly. Twelve percent of the elderly are in poverty. Twenty percent of children are. Guess which group votes at a higher rate than the rest of the population, and which group does not vote at

We are spending less per capita to enhance the productivity (and thus to enlarge the income) for our children than our parents spent on us. Here is a question for the fellow who says he wants to be "the education President:" Do you want to increase spending

Cosmetics could be very unhealthy

WASHINGTON — It is painful to listen when Dana Colla speaks. Her words come through the telephone like a scratched record. She says her job took away her voice.

While Colla worked as a manicurist in Arizona beauty schools and salons, she gradually lost her voice. Today, she cannot speak above a raspy whisper. She has trouble swallowing and even sleeping. Her doctors say she suffered what appears to be perma-

nent neurological damage from the tools of her trade chemicals used to create beautiful fingernails.

We recently reported on the potential danger of ingredients in makeup, sculpted nails and other beauty products. Our report brought silent sufferers forward. They spoke of ailments ranging from allergic reactions, such as headaches and rashes, to memory loss and breathing problems.

The reactions to



beauty products are not universal. Some stem from unique allergies to a product, others may result from misuse or prolonged exposure and still others may be the result of toxicity.

Colla told us she began working as a cosmetologist six years ago. Every day she worked with numerous chemicals when she created and applied artificial fingernails for her clients. Her speech problem was random at first. Then she started choking on hard food and suffering from headaches and insomnia.

Colla made the rounds of neurologists, speech therapists and other doctors. At one point, her problem was diagnosed as stress, and she was put on anti-depressant drugs. But two doctors, in separate examinations, finally reached a surprise conclusion constant exposure to the chemicals in nail glue and other substances on the job robbed Colla of her voice. "I believe it's a medical certainty that there is a causal link between the exposure and these symptoms," said Dr. Michael Gray, an occupational health specialist who examined Colla last year.

She has sued the companies that manufactured and distributed the products. Attorneys for the companies declined comment on the sult.

Colla atruggled to voice her pain in a conversation with our associate Scott Sleek. But in a letter, she had no trouble describing her anger. "I have been left handicapped, and someone is getting rich selling these products that are not properly labeled. It doesn't seem fair," she said.

The lax labeling issue is at the heart of the cosmetics debate. Retail products frequently carry ingredient labels, but wholesale containers do not. Men and women working in beauty salons are at the highest risk because of constant exposure to chemicals and because they may not know what is in the products they use.

Some chemicals found in cosmetics and hair products have been linked to cancer. birth defects and nervous system disorders. Those ingredients are rarely banned. The Food and Drug Administration has no authority to test cosmetics for safety before they are put on store shelves for sale. It can only investigate a product after someone complains.

Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore, is waging a campaign to tighten regulation of the coametics industry. Wyden found one tragic case in which a woman wearing hair gloss ignited her head when she lit a cigarette. She was permanently scarred.

Cosmetic companies can voluntarily register their products with the Food and Drug Administration, but less than half do.

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

Wreckage of Air Force Jet found

MANILA, Philippines — Searchers found the wreckage of a U.S. Air Force F-16C fighter jet in a mountainous region Friday three days after it crashed on a training flight, but the pilot's fate remained unknown, a military spokeswoman said.

The aircraft, with 1st Lt. Josh Levin, 30, of Beverly Hills, Calif., aboard, disappeared Tuesday during the war exercise "Cope Thunder" at the Air Force training area at Crow Valley. next to Clark Air Base.

Searchers spotted the wreckage of the F-16C in a mountainous area 9 miles west of the air base, said Clark spokeswoman Capt. Donna Eggleston.

"The pilot's fate is unknown at this time," said Eggleston, who added that ground teams were expected to reach the crash

"Until this morning, search efforts had been hampered by

low cloud cover," she said.

The cause of the crash was under investigation.

Gangs kill four in midweek shootings

LOS ANGELES — Four people, including a teenage boy, were killed and a 14-year-old boy was critically wounded in four separate shootings in a midweek spate of gang violence, police said Thursday.

in the latest Los Angeles area gang attack, reputed gang member Bryant Glasgow, 21, was found shot to death about 7:30 a.m. Thursday behind a building in Carson by employees arriving for work at a nearby business, sheriff's Deputy Bill Wehner said.

Detectives believe Glasgow was killed in a "possible gang and narcotics incident," Wehner said. It was not immediately known how long his body had been there.

In a separate shooting about 3:15 p.m. Wednesday, Johnny Kinslow, 15, and Johnny Lucien, 14, were walking along a Compton street when a car was driven up and a gunman opened fire with a semiautomatic gun, police Sgt. John Faber

The two boys were taken to Martin Luther King Jr.-Drew Medical Center, where Kinslow died and Lucien was listed in critical condition Thursday, Faber said.

About three hours later, Harold Kenneth, 18, was walking from a South Central Los Angeles bus stop with his girlfriend when a passing car stopped and a man inside asked whether a nearby liquor store sold a certain brand of wine, detective Loren Zimmerman said.

When Kenneth approached to answer the question, the man inside told Kenneth he was going to kill a member of the Bloods, one of the city's two major black gangs and then fired several shots from a handgun.

Kenneth, struck by one bullet in the upper body, ran down the street and collapsed. He was pronounced dead at a local hospital. His girlflend was not wounded.

An hour later in Echo Park, shots fired by a gunman inside a stolen car killed Jorge Ricky Hernandez, 18, as he walked down the sidewalk with friends, Lt. Rob Watters said. Hernandez died at Good Samaritan Hospital.

L.A. police alter homeless policy

LOS ANGELES - After a meeting with city officials Thursday, police agreed to abandon their recently adopted policy of herding homeless people to a small segment of Skid Row near soup kitchens and missions.

In the wake of the announcement, a group of charity workers ended a sit-in at the mayor's office that started Thursday morning. The protesters, who work for private agencies that help Skid Row's homeless population, had vowed to remain until the city altered its policy of dealing with street people.

In recent weeks, police had stepped up enforcement of city

laws prohibiting obstruction of the sidewalks and city workers began sweeping Skid Row sidewalks every weekday, instead of

Homeless people claimed city employees at times took their belongings and that police tried to move street people out of the 60-square block Skid Row area and into a concentrated neighborhood near the homeless missions.

After the meeting between police, city attorney officials and county social service workers, Deputy Mayor Mike Gage told the protesters of the change in policy and they left shortly before 5 p.m.

In addition to stopping the practice of confining homeless people to the streets around the Union Rescue Mission and the other shelters, the city will return to a thrice-weekly sidewalk cleaning policy for Skid Row, Gage said.

Although he refused to criticize the Police Department for its aggressive enforcement of the sidewalk obstruction law, Gage said street people would not be routinely rousted from the outlying Skid Row area unless they are blocking doorways or committing crimes such as selling drugs or burglary.

Leo Durocher injured in traffic accident

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. - Former baseball great Leo Durocher was in serious but stable condition early Friday recovering from injuries he suffered in a traffic accident, authorities said.

Durocher, 83, was injured in a traffic accident about 9 a.m. Wednesday in the desert resort 100 miles east of Los Angeles when his 1989 Cadillac collided with another car at the intersection of Sunrise Way and Arenas Road, Palm Springs police Sgt. Joe Zingg said.

Durocher injured his head in the accident, but "he was conscious at the time. He gave a statement," Zingg said. Durocher was listed in serious but stable condition at Desert Hospital, a nursing supervisor said. She declined to describe

his injuries. The other driver suffered minor injuries in the collision, Zingg said. No citations were issued.

A former major-league player, Durocher managed four teams to a total of 2,010 victories during a 24-year managerial career to rank sixth on the all-time list of victories.

Chairman of Navajo council ousted

WINDOW ROCK, Ariz. - The chairman of the nation's largest Indian tribe said Thursday night he was taking a leave of absence, making the announcement shortly before the Navajo Tribal Council voted to suspend him.

The action against Peter MacDonald came in the wake of allegations he accepted thousands of dollars in kickbacks and bribes.

MacDonald announced he would take administrative leave and walked out of the council meeting when it became obvious opponents had enough votes to force his suspension.

After MacDonald left, the council voted 47-32 to suspend

The action came at the end of three days of heated debate and after numerous procedural votes showed a scheduled vote to suspend MacDonald would succeed.

Pressure to oust MacDonald, already facing a recall effort. grew dramatically last week after witnesses testifled to a Senate investigative committee that MacDonald has accepted tens of thousands of dollars in gilts and cash from contractors hoping to work with the tribe.

The testimony included allegations that MacDonald eventually was to pocket one-third of the \$7 million in profits received by the speculator who sold the tribe the Big Boquillas ranch in Arizona.

MacDonald's suspension will last until the accusations against him are resolved.

Bush to press for action

Administration caught off guard by Central American peace plan

WASHINGTON - President Bush said the United States will press the parties to a surprise Central American peace plan to go beyond "fluffy promises" and put "some teeth" into the pledges of democratic reform in Nicaragua.

Commenting for the first time on an agreement that caught his administration off guard and raised doubts about the fate of the U.S.-backed Contra rebels, Bush said Thursday there were "positive" as well as "troublesome elements" to the plan.

While sidestepping questions about further aid for the Contras, the president suggested the five-nation accord gives the United States time to try to influence the course of political events in a region where its efforts have been stymied.

The presidents of Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador announced a unified effort Tuesday to disband the U.S.-backed Contra force in return for a commitment to democratic reform by Nicaragua's Sandinista re-

The Central American accord dictates that plans be drawn up within 90 days for "demobilization, relocation or voluntary repatriation" of the estimated 11,000 Contras, mostly camped along the Nicaraguan border in

For his part, Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega, whose Marxist-led Sandinista regime has battled the Contras for eight years, pledged to implement political reforms and hold national elections before Feb. 25,

support or disapproval for the agreement, Bush emphasized that the United States must "be wary" of commitments by Ortega, because "claims like this have been made at one time, only to see those claims repudiated: Promises made, promises broken."

As the agreement reached Tuesday is translated into a formal plan of action, Bush said the United States will "work in the next 90 days with the leaders to see that there's not just fluffy promises out there, but that there's some teeth in the promise of democratization" in Nicaragua.

"That is what has to be done," he said. "It's fine to spell these things out in generalities, but now let's get down to how to proceed. What does a 'free and fair election' mean? I want to see some certification of the election process."

The agreement, which followed a two-day summit of the five leaders at a seaside resort in El Salvador, came as Secretary of State James Baker was barnstorming Europe and in the midst of a Bush-ordered reassessment of U.S. policy in Central America and elsewhere.

The vaccuum created by that review has been exacerbated by delays in filling key jobs in the State Department and Pentagon. preventing the administration from forcefully moving forward in national security affairs.

"We object to the word 'surprised," White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said of the way the administration was blindsided by the Central American announcement, "but on the other hand, you never know in In withholding either outright advance what they're going to

Bush, Reagan take stand against KKK Republican

METAIRIE, La. - President Ronald Reagan have jumped into Louisiana politics, endorsing GOP businessman John Treen in his race with former national Ku Klux Klan leader David Duke for a seat in the Legislature.

polled Treen by a 2-1 ratio in a primary election last month, taking 33 percent of the vote to lead a field of seven candidates in the mostly white House District 81 adjacent to New Orleans. His primary win shocked local

political leaders and generated a growing storm of opposition from around the country. including threats from a militant Jewish organization to disrupt Saturday's runoff.

Local Democrats reluctantly endorsed Treen, but the campaign to prevent Duke from winning reached its peak Thursday with Bush and Reagan throwing their weight behind the brother of former Gov. Dave Treen.

Reagan's message, paid for by the John Treen Campaign Committee, was carried on several stations Thursday and Bush made his pitch in a letter mailed to registered voters in the Louisiana House District 81.

'I can't help but tell you of the high regard I have for one candidate in the race for your Treen," Reagan said. "John has

always worked for the traditional values and principles which you and I cherish. John Treen cares Bush and former President about the people he will represent. I know that John Treen will be an outstanding representative and because of his good reputation will be able to work effectively for you in the Louisiana Legislature.

Bush's letter cites Treen's Duke, who registered as a "strong sense of compassion for others and an abiding faith in the future of America."

Duke complained the endorsements were "absolutely unethical."

"I got more Republican votes than any candidate in the primary," he said.

Treen said the endorsements point out "at the highest levels of government, there is a genu-Ine concern about someone that harbors such a foreign ideology."

At a news conference in Baton Rouge, La., Gov. Buddy Roemer, a Democrat, reiterated his support for Treen.

"I'm for John Treen, and you know why." Roemer told reporters. "I can't be for somebody who has spent all of his life organizing hate. That's a personal statement. But there's nothing I can do at this point but make that observation. At a time when we're trying to improve Louisiana's image — give me a

The national political interest in the race stems solely from Duke's background, said Renext representative. John publican National Committee spokeswoman Leslie Goodman.

Kentucky braces for more rain, flooding

The worst flooding in a decade was expected to continue through the weekend in Kentucky, the National Weather Service said Friday, while rain spread to parts of Texas, Oklahoma, North Carolina and the Pacific Northwest.

The flooding chased thousands of people from their homes in central Kentucky as the governor declared a state of emergency and National Guardsmen were dispatched into areas swamped by rain-swollen rivers.

An earthen dam burst on the rain-swollen Obion River in Tennessee and sent five feet of water pouring into two towns, forcing 377 people in Rives and Obion to flee their flooded homes in boats, officials said. Fifty homes and two churches were flooded, the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency reported.

The rains that dumped 10 inches of water on parts of Kentucky and more than six inches in Tennessee since Sunday night let up somewhat Thursday and changed to snow in some higher clevations. But the National Weather Service said the worst flooding was yet to come as runoff from the rains was expected to continue through the weekend.

Gov. Wallace Wilkinson declared a state of emergency and about 100 Kentucky National Guard troops were put on active duty to help with evacuations and 200 others were on standby alert.

The Kentucky River in the state capital, Frankfort, rose to 44.8 feet — nearly 14 feet above flood stage — by Thursday evening, and an estimated 2,000 famílies had fled their homes to seek shelter on higher ground, said Larry Hodge, city fire chief and the head of local disaster emergency services.

The storms that began Sunday night were blamed for at least five deaths - four in Kentucky and one in Tennessee. Two Kentucky deaths were caused by a car crash on a rain-slicked road. Two other people in Kentucky and one in Lebanon, Tenn., drowned.

Elsewhere Thursday. flooding was reported in parts of Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois and West Virginia. A number of West Virginia school districts closed down or started classes late Thursday.

Meanwhile, rainshowers and a few isolated thunderstorms dotted the skies across parts of Texas early Friday, while colder air to the north caused freezing rain in southwest Oklahoma.

Explosion, fire aboard ship kills 10

TOKYO - An explosion on a docked Indian cargo ship ignited a fire that raged for nearly 18 hours until it was contained Friday, authorities said. Ten workers were killed and 12 others were injured.

The 13,392-ton freighter Jag Doot was under routine repairs at the dockyard of NKK, a Japanese shipbuilding firm, in Yokohama Port, about 15 miles southwest of Tokyo, when an explosion occurred, apparently in the engine room, about 3:20 p.m. Thursday, maritime and fire department officials said.

A contingent of 20 fire engines, fire-fighting boats and a helicopter fought the blaze, which was brought under control about 9 a.m. Friday, Yokohama Fire Department officials said. Rescuers recovered all 10 Japanese workers who were killed

in the explosion and blaze, firefighters said, Of the 12 who were injured, three were reported in serious condition with burns at a hospital in Yokohama, the officials

Soviets conduct year's third nuclear test

MOSCOW - The Soviet Union conducted a low-yield underground nuclear test Friday of up to 20 kilotons at its main military testing area at Semipalatinsk, in Soviet Cental Asia, the official Tass news agency said.

The test, which took place at 7:01 a.m. Moscow time [11:01 p.m. EST Thursday) was the third this year and the second in six davs.

"The explosion with a yield of up to 20 kilotons was conducted to check results of research in nuclear explosion physics," Tass said.

Both the United States and the Soviet Union are abiding by a pair of unratified protocols from 1974 and 1976 that limit the yield of a nuclear blast to 150 kilotons. There is no limit on the number of tests carried out underground.

Twenty kilotons is the equivalent to 20,000 tons of TNT.

The U.S. bomb dropped on Hiroshima in World War II had a vield of 13 kilotons.

Trans-Pacific balloonist reports problems

YOKOHAMA, Japan - A Japanese adventurer reported Friday his attempt to make the world's first solo trans-Pacific crossing in a balloon was in danger because of problems with altitude control.

"I have difficulty in controlling the balloon's altitudes now, but will try to continue on," balloonist Fumio Mina was quoted as saying in a radio message to a group of project supporters Friday morning.

"I dropped sand used as ballast last night to bring the balloon back on the right course as it veered south, but the sand was frozen and stuck on the gondola's body," Niwa

He said his balloon was flying at an altitude of about 4.6 miles about 190 miles southeast of Minami-Torishima (Marcus Island) in the Pacific.

Niwa, 38, a former computer company worker, said he may

be forced to land near Wake Island early Saturday. His helium-filled balloon, 56 feet in diameter with a 6-foot-wide floatable, plastic gondola, lifted off from the port

city of Yokohama, near Tokyo, early Wednesday. The balloon, Toss Pacific, was to ride 124 mph jet stream

winds over the Pacific. Niwa planned to land in San Diego, Yokohama's sister city,

after completing a 4.970-mile trip in about four days. A four-member team consisting of Japanese adventurer Rocky Aoki and three American teammates successfully completed a similar trans-Pacific crossing in November 1981.

israeli-Palestinian talks criticized

JERUSALEM - Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's office Friday criticized recent meetings between Israeli politicians and Palestinians as useless talks that could block government efforts to achieve peace.

The latest meeting involving Israelis from the center-left Labor Party, which is a member of the ruling government coalition, and two left-wing parties occurred Thursday night in Jerusalem. Faisal Husseini, a prominent PLO supporter recently released from six months in jail without charge, met with the Israelis.

In the occupied territories Friday, a 25-year-old Palestinian died of gunshot wounds he received a day earlier during a clash with soldiers in the West Bank town of Nablus, Palestinian sources said. Issam Mohammad Mahmoud el Bulbul was shot in the chest Thursday evening and died at a Nablus hospital early Friday.

Palestinians declared a day of mourning in Nablus and kept their shops closed in the largest West Bank town. At least 366 Palestinians and 12 Israelis have died during the 14-month-old Palestinian uprising against Israeli occupation.

Israel's Likud-Labor coalition government rejects negotiations with the Palestine Liberation Organization to solve the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, but has said it would talk with non-PLO member Palestinians in the occupied territories.

A Shamir spokesman said the aim of the PLO and their supporters in the territories was to "mislead the whole world. innocent people and people in Israeli politics."

Burma announces election timetable

RANGOON, Burma - Burma's election commission announced a detailed, 14-month timetable leading to the country's first multi-party elections in more than 30 years.

Consultations with the ruling military junta on a new election law are set to be completed by Feb. 24 to provide for "holding free and fair multi-party democratic general elections. as wanted by the people," the election commission said in an announcement broadcast late Thursday by government radio. Burma's military rulers seized power last Sept. 18.

The announcement said the 14-month timetable would begin once the consultations ended, with voting expected in April or May, 1990. No firm date for the election was given.

The United States and several other nations have said the holding of fair elections was the main condition for the resumption of much-needed foreign aid to Burma.

Japan, the largest donor, reacted to the announcement of the election timetable by saying it was prepared to resume aid "at an appropriate time.

The election commission said the draft election law would be published for comments by the political parties and people before being passed by the People's Assembly, which was selected under the former one-party government of Gen. Ne

Rebel rockets kill six in Kabul

KABUL, Afghanistan -Moslem guerrillas fired six rockets into Kabul, killing six people, shortly after the government announced a curfew to prevent panic and sabotage in the besieged capital.

The attack Thursday came one day after the withdrawal of the last Soviet soldier from Afghanistan and may signal the end of a full in rebel assaults on major population centers.

The guerrillas largely had refrained from launching major attacks on Kabul and other cities since November to allow Moscow's troops to leave unhindered. The last of the 103,000-member Soviet garrison departed the country Wednesday under the terms of the U.N.-mediated Geneva Accords

signed last April 14. State-run Kabul television said

The guerrillas already control between 80 and 95 percent of Afghanistan's territory, but have been unable to capture major cities, partly because of fear of Soviet air retaliation.

Aviation group adopts new security measures

MONTREAL - The International Civil Aviation Organization has adopted stricter security measures for international air travel, including development of equipment that will detect the type of plastic explosive that blew up a Pan Am Jumbo Jet over Scotland.

A resolution containing new security proposals put forward by the United States and Britain was unantmously endorsed

Thursday by representatives of 33 countries that make up ICAO's governing body.

"I think it's important that the action taken here today will assure all of us that our travels will be safer in the future," said Samuel Skinner, U.S. Sceretary of Transportation.

The special meeting at ICAO's Montreal headquarters was called to examine ways to combat terrorism after the Dec. 21 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 over Lockerbic, Scotland. The

explosion killed all 259 people aboard and 11 people on the ground.

In Lockerbie Thursday, investigators said the bomb that blew up the plane was hidden in a radio-cassette player and apparently originated in baggage

from Frankfurt, West Germany. The investigators would not say what type of explosive had been used, but British Transport Sceretary Paul Channon said previously the bomb was made from a high-performance plastic

explosive, most likely Czechmade Semtex, which is held by terrorists in many countries step. It is something that may have to be considered, Channon said, "Civilized society will have to decide pretty soon whether it is fair to allow these

things on the plane." Skinner and Channon both said their governmeives and detonation devices to make detection of these articles easier.

Other measures approved include more thorough screening.



OVIEDO - Up With People. The name may conjures up the image of "goody-two-shoes" sappiness, but that isn't at all what the group is about,

"I guess we're pretty wholesome and clean-cut," acknowledged group member Steve Kehrli, who is in town for a Saturday evening show at Oviedo High School. "But we're non-religious and apolitical. We're just out having a good

The cast's new show, "Time for the Music," features diverse talents of a multinational cast in Up With People's well-known style of contagious energy and excitement.

Annually, 720 students, ages 18 to 25, are accepted into the program. Each pays a fee of \$9,200 for the opportunity to travel around the world to cities as varied as Moscow and Ovledo.

"We have representatives from 17 countries and nearly half the United States," Kehrli said. "We learn about other cultures from each other as well as from the places we visit."

Students accepted into the program are divided into five casts (three of 120 and two of 180) and sent to the Up With People International headquarters in Tuscon, Ariz., for five and a half weeks of intensive training. While on the 11-month tour, each student has the opportunity to be a part of the "advance team" that travels to the next city to make preparations for the rest of the group. The advance team does all the publicity, arranges for lodging with host families and acts as a liaison with the sponsoring organization.

The Oviedo/East Orange Optimist Club invited the group to do the Feb. 18 show.

"We only go where we are invited," Kehrli said.

For every two hours the group performs on stage, they perform four hours of community service. Sometimes that service is done in conjunction with an opportunity for the cast to relax or learn something themselves.

During their Central Florida stay the cast will visit Epcot Center, where they will perform and enjoy the Disney magic. They'll also go to the Naval Training Center in Orlando, While the singers get a tour of Brothers' "Shout."





Bishop's sermon indicates her future

Harris reveals a

BOSTON - Bishop Barbara Harris's first sermon since becoming a prelate of the Anglican faith reflected the progressive style that propelled her into history and provided insight into the kind of leader she will

A capacity crowd at St. Paul's Cathedral heard Harris, 58, deliver the sermon Sunday as a suffragan, or assistant, bishop of the Massachusetts Episcopal diocese, the largest in the nation with 96,000 members.

The temptation we all face is to play it safe; don't take risks; don't make waves," said Harris, who became the first woman bishop in the 450-year history of the worldwide church. "If Jesus had played it safe we would not

"If the diocese of Massachusetts had played it safe, I would not be standing here today clothed in rochet and chimer and wearing a pectoral cross," Harris told the congregation, which interrupted her several times with applause and at one point gave her a standing ovation.

Her elevation has angered some traditionalists who believe the idea of women in the ministry is the greatest contradiction to the order of Christian leadership dating back 2,000 years.

Others believe that Harris's lack of experience, nontraditional training and her liberal views on such contemporary issues as gay rights are not suitable credentials for the ministry and the episcopate.

Harris, who was not ordained a priest until 1980, said that

Methodists debate issue of homosexuality

WASHINGTON - For more than a decade, the United Methodist Church has been riven by questions of how to deal with homosexuality, and a new three-year study promises more of the same, church officials said Wednesday.

General Conference, its highest legislative body. It is to be conducted by a 26-person panel, but the group has already divided over whether to add an "openly gay" man to the group.

And no matter how that question is resolved, committee members said it is unlikely the panel will come to a consensus on the issue. The church, said the Rev. Tex Sample of

The new study was ordered last year by Ministries appointed the 26-member panel in September but did not include an admittedly homosexual man, saying it was unable to find one who would agree to serve. The issue surfaced again at the panel's

first meeting in early February in Dallas, church officials said, with some committee members arguing that to study an issue without including a person from the group most affected would be unthinkable, if not unethical.

But others said the committee is large enough already and it includes a leabian and others who could represent the point of view of the homosexual community.

Affirmation, the church's caucus related to homosexual concerns, has also asked that gay be added while Good News, a conservative group has asked for inclusion of an "ex-gay" as well as an "orthodox" Bible scholar.

Composition of the study panel has been

put on the docket of the Council of Ministries executive committee meeting. scheduled for Dayton, Ohio, Feb. 20-21.

While dividing over how their committee should be formed, members at the Dalias meeting did agree to a statement of purpose for the study: to assist the church to filseern "God's purpose for the church's relationship with homosexual persons."

The issue came to the forefront of church attention in the late 1970s when the Rev. Paul Abels, a Methodist pastor in New York City, announced he was a homosexual.

Abels' appointment as a pastor was challenged by conservatives but upheld by the New York Conference - the Methodist equivalent of a diocese - and when he retired in 1984, the conference voted to send a letter of appreciation for his ministry with homosexuals

Since the Abels' case, there have been such announcements by others as well, sparking intense and sometimes bitter debate and a gradual tightening of the denomination's views on the issue.

At the Dallas meeting, Duke University ethicist Stanley Hauerwas said the committee could help the church gain a "foothold" on the issue so it can "start thinking about this matter well rather than



The people who are successful with this philosophy realize that expecting the best is something like expecting a baby. The expectant mother doesn't have a baby simply by expecting it. She does something about having a baby and only then does she become an expectant mother.

Pope, U.S. Bishops to meet in Rome

WASHINGTON - A summit meeting between Pope John Paul II and U.S. bishops will focus on the role of bishops as protectors of the faith against dissent, according to an agenda released Monday by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops.

The meeting, set for March 8-11 in Rome. will include 12 hours of discussion between Vatican officials and U.S. prelates, to be presided over by the pontiff. Church officials said the closed meeting will feature a frank discussion between the pope and the bishops.

It comes at a time of strained, if not tense, relations between the Vatican and the American church. Some Vatican officials feel the U.S. church has become unruly and rambunctious and over which the bishops have lost control.

Only two similar summits have occurred in recent years - with the hierarchies of the Dutch and Brazilian churches, both under fleree Vatican attack for their liberal departures from conservative orthodoxy.

The official title of the unusual meeting obscured the real reason for the meeting. The session was entitled. "Evangelization in the Context of the Culture and Society of the United States of America with Particular Emphasis on the Role of the Bishop as Teacher

Behind the unwieldly title, however, is the pope's ambivalent feelings about the United States and its church - his admiration for its energy and the enormous set of social institutions created by the church but his distante for its consumer culture and a religious voluntarism of "cafeteria Catholics" who pick and choose among doctrines.

During his 1987 visit to the United States. John Paul admonished the American hierarchy to get its house in order by cracking down on dissent, telling the bishops to "address this situation courageously" and reminding them "dissent from church doctrine remains what it is, dissent."

"As such," he said at the time, "it may not be proposed or received on an equal footing with the church's authentic teaching.

The schedule agreed to by the Vatican and the U.S. bishops will include nine 10-minute presentations on a variety of topics and a 15-minute presentation on "the bishop as teacher of the faith." Each presentation is to be followed by "free-flowing discussion" between Vatican officials and the 35-member U.S. delegation.

Underscoring the importance of the issue of the bishop were its two key speakers -Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, head of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the the Faith, and Cardinal John O'Connor of New York.

Ratzinger is considered a hardline conservative in the Vatican and one of the chief critics of the U.S church and its alleged softness on dissenters.

Nearly all of the topics to be discussed touch on sore points between Rome and the church in the United States.

One issue. "The pastoral responsibility of the bishops relative to religious life in the United States," calls to mind a longstanding dispute between two dozen American nuns and the Vatican over abortion and the Vatican's threat to dismiss the dissenters from their religious orders if they did not recant.

Another, on the liturgy and the sacraments, underscores the Vatican's unhappiness with the American church's widespread use of a liberal understanding of the sacrament of reconciliation, or pennance, under which many churches have virtually done away with private confession in favor of collective statements of sin during the mass.

Tokyo gears up for Hirohito's funeral

TONYO - Tokyo may resemble a city under martial law Feb. 24 when the largest police force ever mobilized in modern Japan takes up positions to protect President Bush and representatives of 150 other foreign countries against possible terrorist attacks during the funeral of Emperor Hirohito.

"This is the biggest funeral of all time," said a high-ranking official of the Foreign Ministry Friday, adding that more countries will be represented than for the 1980 funeral of Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito or that of President John

Already, advance security teams from the United States, France and Indonesia have arrived in the capital to ensure the safety of their leaders in the face of threats by leftist Japanese radicals to disrupt the ceremonies.

The government will spend \$18.5 million on security for the funeral of Hirohito, who died Jan. 7 of intestinal cancer at age 87.

A leader of the ultra-leftist group, the Middle Core Faction, or Chukaku-ha, has warned his group may try to fire homemade rockets into the funeral grounds at Shinjiku Imperial Gardens where the foreign leaders will gather.

In 1986, the group tried to disrupt the Tokyo Economic Summit of industrialized nations by launching crude missiles that overshot the guest house where former President Ronald Reagan and other leaders were staying.

'If Bush becomes a victim of our attack, it will not be our responsibility because he has been warned," said Yoshihisa Fujiwara, a leader of the group that is aiming at the overthrow of the Japanese monarchy.

Police, taking the warning seriously, have declared areas within a 3-mile radius around the Imperial Gardens and the Musashi Mausoleum where the emperor will be buried as security buffer zones against possible attacks.

Police have rounded up some 50 radicals from several groups that have threatened to disrupt the funeral and questioned thousands of residents in door-to-door searches in a bid to uncover terrorist

Authorities also are gearing up for possible street battles with radicals following scuffles that broke out with leftlists in the capital last weekend.

A security force of 32,000 — the largest number deployed for an event since World War II - will be stationed primarily along the 35-mile procession route where an estimated 860,000 people are expected to gather. Ten thousand Japanese and foreign dignitaries will attend the rites at the Imperial Gardens.

Police will patrol from the skies in planes, helicopters and blimps as well as from the sea in 75 boats around Tokyo Bay to prevent sabotage at nearby Haneda Airport, where a steady stream of foreign dignitaries will begin arriving Sunday.

Elephant protection sought

WASHINGTON -Wildlife groups asked the government to declare the African elephant an endangered president of the Animal species and han typry Welfare Institute. species and ban ivory imports, saying poach- The value of elephant the world's largest land mammal to extinction.

In a petition Thursday to the Interior Department, the Humane Society of the United States and 24 other animal welfare organizations said the soaring price of ivory has led to wholesale massacre of elephants throughout Africa, virtually wiping out herda in many regions.

"As recently as 1981, there were estimated to be 1.2 million elephants in Africa," said the petition.

"(The) number dwindled to less than 800,000 in 1987 and recent reports place the number at just under 400,000 today," It added.

The African elephant "is already extinct in many portions of its range and in severe danger of extinction in a significant portion of its remaining range," the petition said, urging that the animals be granted endangered status to effectively ban ivory imports. .

Among the grimmest trends, the groups said, is the shrinking size of tusks now being traded. They said the decline in average tusk size shows that the large mature elephants have already been exterminated and the lvory hunters are killing off young elephants before they can reproduce.

"The price of Ivory is so high that baby elephants - elephants that are 2 and 3 years old — are being killed," said Christine Stevens.

ving ivory has skyrocketed in recent years, from about \$4 a pound in 1970 to \$80 a pound today

While Interior Department officials said only that they would give the petition "due consideration," the wildlife groups said President Bush had partisan reasons to take a special interest in the elephant.

"The symbol of the Republican Party is going extinct," said Craig Van Note, executive vice president of a group called Monitor. "I would think that would

get his attention." Not all wildlife groups signed the petition, including the World Wildlife Fund.

E.U. Curtis Bohlen, senior vice president of that group, said un-ilateral U.S. action would not be effective and probably would.

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Tokyo gears up for Hirohito's funeral

United Press International

TOKYO - Tokyo may resemble a city under martial law Feb. 24 when the largest police force ever mobilized in modern Japan takes up positions to protect President Bush and representatives of 150 other foreign countries against possible terrorist attacks during the funeral of Emperor Hirohito.

This is the biggest funeral of all time," said a high-ranking official of the Foreign Ministry Friday, adding that more countries will be represented than for the 1980 funeral of Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito or that of President John Kennedy in 1963.

Already, advance security teams from the United States, France and Indonesia have arrived in the capital to ensure the safety of their leaders in the face of threats by leftist Japanese radicals to disrupt the ceremonies.

The government will spend \$18.5 million on security for the funeral of Hirohito, who died Jan. 7

of intestinal cancer at age 87.

A leader of the ultra-leftist group, the Middle Core Faction, or Chukaku-ha, has warned his group may try to fire homemade rockets into the funeral grounds at Shinjiku Imperial Gardens where the foreign leaders will gather.

in 1986, the group tried to disrupt the Tokyo Economic Summit of industrialized nations by launching crude missiles that overshot the guest house where former President Ronald Reagan and other leaders were staying.

"If Bush becomes a victim of our attack, it will not be our responsibility because he has been warned," said Yoshihisa Fujiwara, a leader of the group that is aiming at the overthrow of the Japanese monarchy.

Police, taking the warning seriously, have declared areas within a 3-mile radius around the Imperial Gardens and the Musashi Mausoleum where the emperor will be buried as security buffer zones against possible attacks.

Police have rounded up some 50 radicals from several groups that have threatened to disrupt the funeral and questioned thousands of residents in door-to-door searches in a bid to uncover terrorist

Authorities also are gearing up for possible street battles with radicals following scuffles that broke out with leftlists in the capital last weekend.

A security force of 32,000 — the largest number deployed for an event since World War II - will be stationed primarily along the 35-mile procession route where an estimated 860,000 people are expected to gather. Ten thousand Japanese and foreign dignitaries will attend the rites at the Imperial Gardens.

Police will patrol from the sides in planes, helicopters and bitmps as well as from the sea in 75 boats around Tokyo Bay to prevent sabotage at nearby Haneda Airport, where a steady stream of foreign dignitaries will begin arriving Sunday.

In a petition Thursday to the Interior Department, the Humane Society of the United States and 24 other animal welfare organizations said the soaring price of ivory has led to wholesale massacre of clephants throughout Africa, virtually wiping out herds in many regions.

"As recently as 1981, there were estimated to be 1.2 million elephants in Africa," said the petition.

"(The) number dwindled to less than 800,000 in 1987 and recent reports place the number at just under 400,000 today," It added.

The African elephant "is already extinct in many portions of its range and in severe danger of extinction in a significant portion of its remaining range." the petition said, urging that the animals be granted endangered status to effectively ban ivory imports. .

Among the grimmest trends, the groups said, is the shrinking size of tusks now being traded. They said the decline in average tusk size shows that the large mature elephants have already been exterminated and the Ivory hunters are killing off young elephants before they can reproduce.

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
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
