Recent news reports indicate that former Mayor Jimmy Walker is coming back from Europe and is going to run against Mayor McKee for re-election in November. Further. more Walker will have the unqualified support of Tammany Hall and from all indications will be elected. Incredible as this may seem, in view of McKee's program to lop \$100,_ 000,000 off the annual tax bill, its probability is nevertheless evident in view of the existence of a condition which should be of more or less interest in all parts of the coun.

Mr. Walker is recognized everywhere as the very epitome of extravagant administration. He has increased the annual budget requirements of New York City to approxi-mately \$700,000,000, about one-fifth that of the federal rovernment. He has increased the bend obligations of the city until 29 percent of its revenues must be applied to debt service. He has, in short, countenanced such extravagances in departmental management that it was possible for his successor in three short weeks to cut \$100,000,000 from the

Then why is it that Mr. Walker would have the unmitirated gall to return to New York and run for the same office again? And how could any organization, even Tam_ many Hall, have the temerity to announce that it would support him? What possible chance would a man, who was shown to increase his personal fortune by something around a million dollars by special favors to a few at the sacrifice of all taxpayers, have in a general election?
