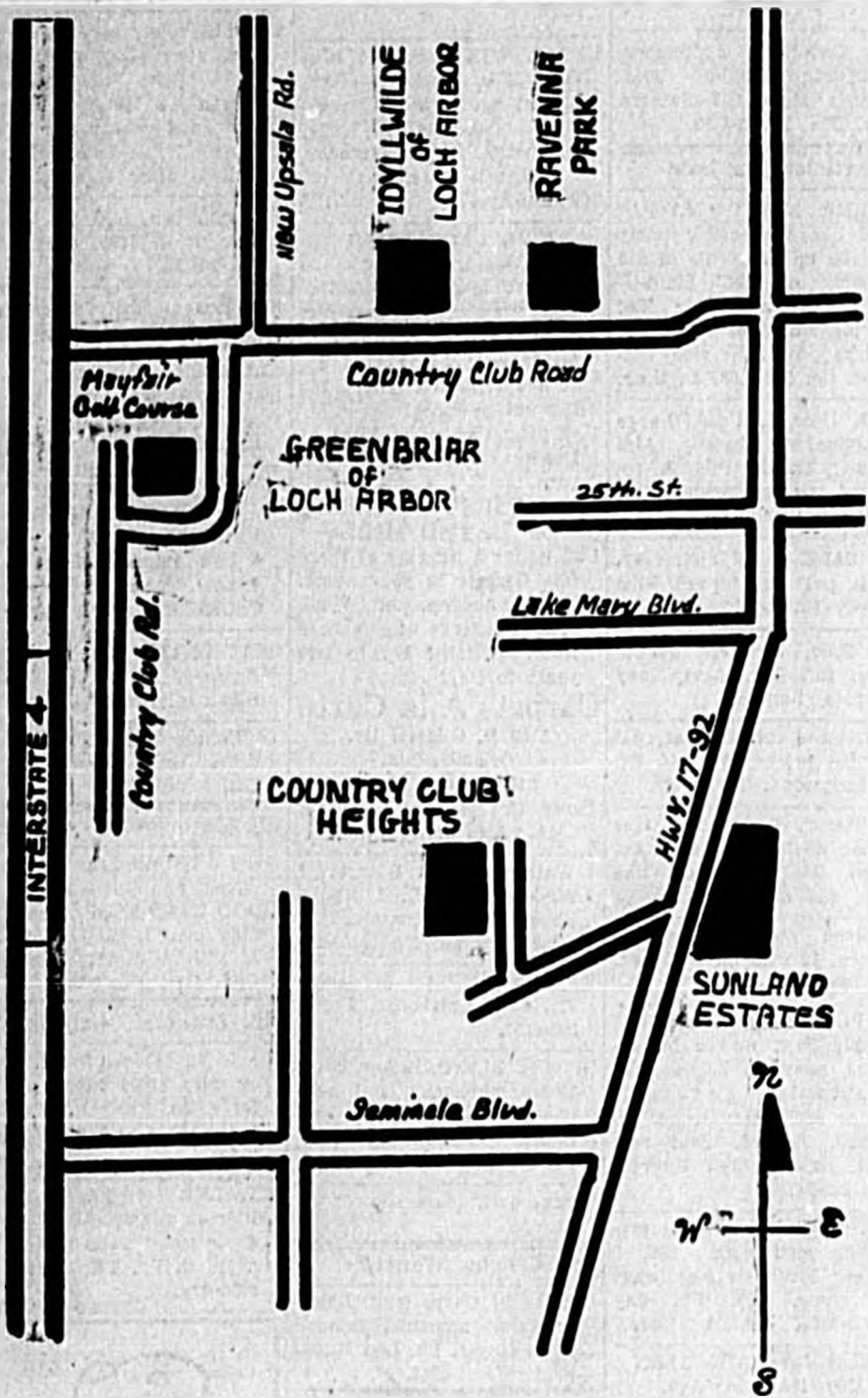

One new home was sold during the last week in Greenbriar.



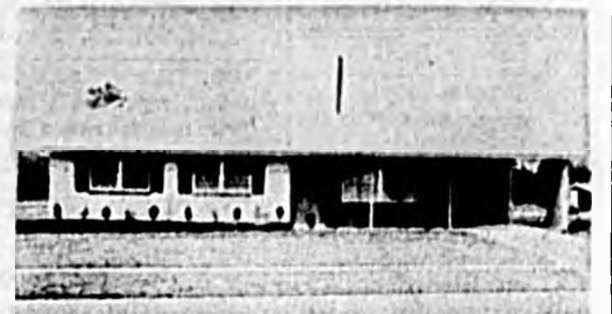

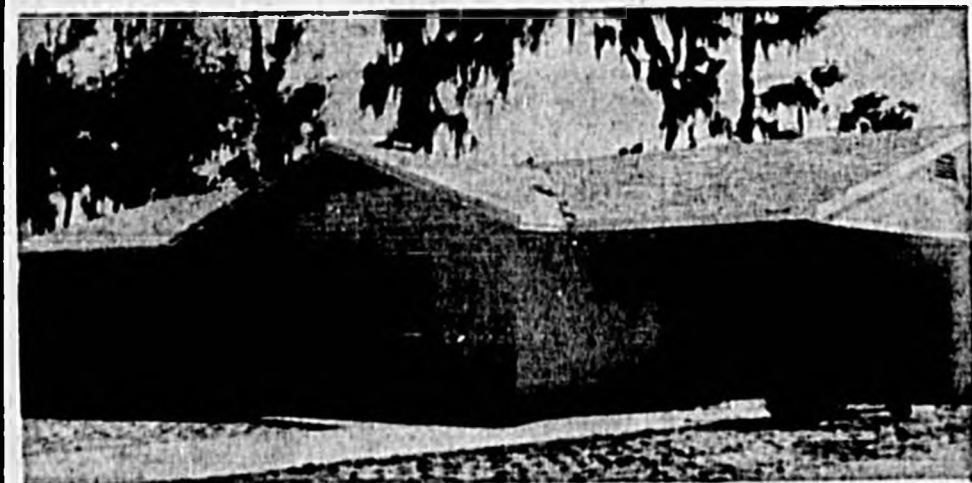

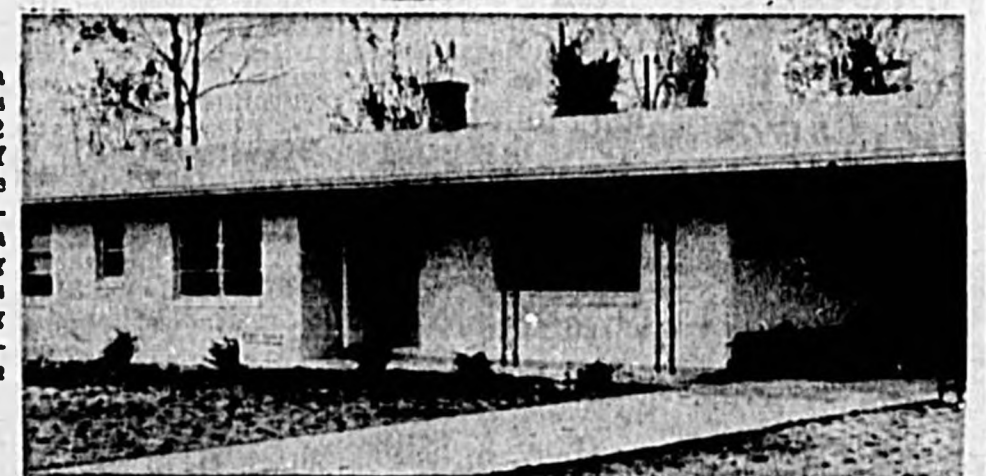

9 Passengers Pilot Trapped In Flames

GAINESVILLE (UPI) — All 10 persons aboard were killed today when a shuttle airliner crashed and burned on take-off from the Gainesville municipal airport.

The Federal Aviation Agency said the pilot and nine passengers of the twin-engine Beechcraft were trapped in the flaming wreckage of South Central Airlines' Flight 510 when it crashed moments after taking off for Jacksonville.

Witnesses said the plane reached an altitude of about 200 feet, veered sharply to the left, and plunged back to the runway.

The dead were not immediately identified. Authorities roped off the area and kept newsmen away until federal officials could get to the scene.

"It just took a second for it to fall down," said Mrs. Joe Anne Howell, an airport employee.

"It looked like it stalled, like maybe the pilot tried to take too steep of an angle. As soon as it hit, the gasoline started spilling and the flames shot up."

Mrs. Howell and several others rushed to the plane in a limousine and tried to aid the trapped victims but it was too late.

"We tried to open the door but it was locked from the inside," she said. "We saw two men, one at the door, both bodies were burning."

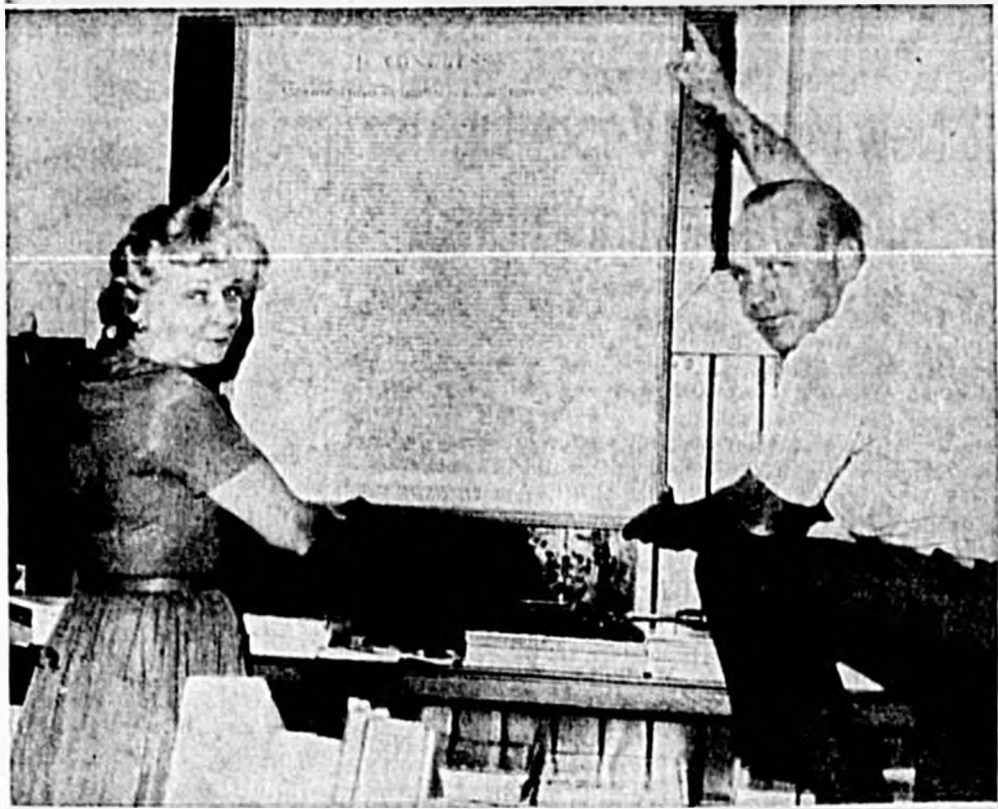
South Central, headquartered at Ocala, flies about 13 planes out of Gainesville daily.

Police Lt. Courtney Roberts said flames engulfed the entire plane before rescue units could get to it. Only one wingtip and the tail were left unscathed, he said.

Roberts said that radio operators in the tower heard a voice call out seconds before the crash:

"Don't do that or it will stall."

He said the voice apparently came from the doomed aircraft.

Spears Funeral Set Tuesday

JUPITER (UPI) — Memorial services will be held Tuesday (2:30 p. m.) for the man who used to knock holes in opposing football lines for the great Jim Thorpe. Dr. Clarence W. Spears, 69, one of the first All-Americans, died Saturday.

Spears, a famed football coach for 26 years and later a physician and surgeon, was stricken with a fatal heart attack in the front yard of his retirement home at nearby Jupiter Island Cremation will follow the services at the Presbyterian church here.

February Designated U. S. History Month

With the United States this month celebrating the birthdays of two American patriots and two presidents, George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, the Daughters of the American Revolution is sponsoring February as "American History Month."

Mayor A. L. Wilson, in keeping with the DAR's observance, issued a proclamation today calling on "all organizations of whatever kind, and on the public, parochial and private schools to emphasize the study of American history during this designated month, and by stressing the great spiritual strength and wisdom our forefathers displayed and learning more about the carefully worded documents on which our freedom is based, we contribute to a greater American scope for future generations."

Fleet Reserve Association, Sanford Branch 147, also today announced its annual "Meaning of Americanism" composition contest for all county high school seniors.

Hurshel E. Taffor, president, said a certificate and key will be presented to the senior in each Seminole County high school who submits the best composition. One overall winner for the county will receive an engraved trophy. The awards will be presented at commencement exercises or assemblies as determined by the individual schools.

Cuban Boats In Tow To Key West

MIAMI (UPI) — Four Cuban fishing boats, flanked by U. S. Coast Guard cutters, headed for Key West today where a battery of federal agents waited to question the crews about what they were doing in U. S. waters.

Guarded by three swift cutters, the Cuban boats began the six-hour voyage shortly after 6 a. m.

Agents from several federal branches waited at Key West to question the Cubans. The Coast Guard here said it received no reports on whether the boats were armed, but added they submitted to boarding without trouble.

The Cuban boats, which had been under surveillance since Saturday, were boarded Sunday near the Dry Tortugas when they passed into U. S. territorial waters some 50 miles west of Key West.

The Coast Guard cutters Arlaine, Cape Starr and Cape Knox detained the craft through the night until they were ordered to proceed to Key West.

Lee Announces For District 4 Constable

Tossing his hat into the political ring for the first time, J. U. Lee, of West First Street, today announced his candidacy for constable, District 4, in the May primary.

A native of Sanford, Lee has been employed for 19 years as a fireman-engineer by Atlantic Coast Line Railroad and for the last 10 years has doubled his employment as a special investigator for Sheriff J. L. Hobby.

Lee is married and has four children and one grandchild. "My experience as a special investigator for Sheriff Hobby will be of tremendous value if I am elected constable," Lee said. "Also, I am willing to cooperate with all other law enforcement agencies and I am a firm believer in justice tempered with mercy."

"I will do everything in my power to restore justice and principles to the office of constable of District 4."

Youth Held

The Sanford Police Department reported this morning that officers had apprehended a 14-year-old youth who was observed inhaling fumes from a cloth soaked in "tester's glue." The youth was seen sucking and sniffing the cloth while in the Hits Theatre. Police investigated and placed the youngster in detention. They said the inhalation of the glue put the youth in a "toxic" condition.

Erhard Security Chief Kills Self

BONN, Germany (UPI) — Ewald Peters, chief of Chancellor Ludwig Erhard's security guards who was arrested as an alleged war criminal, hanged himself in his jail cell today.

Peters was arrested last week for alleged participation in the wartime killings of Jews in German-occupied Russia.

He had just returned from Rome, where he had managed the security arrangements for Erhard's official visit.

He had also taken care of security for Erhard's trip to Texas in December to confer with President Johnson.

Peters, 49, committed suicide by knotting together bed sheets and hanging himself in his cell in the Bonn county jail, official sources said.

Big-Time Still

NEWPORT, Tenn. (UPI) — Revenue agents Sunday smashed an underground still capable of producing 7,000 gallons of illegal whiskey a day. The agents estimated the stills would have cost the government up to \$1,000 per day in tax losses.

Dickinson Names Gen. Hutchison As Chairman

Fred O. Dickinson, West Palm Beach gubernatorial candidate, today announced the appointment of Gen. J. C. Hutchison as honorary chairman of the Seminole County Dickinson-for-Governor Committee.

Dickinson said, "I am certainly pleased to have a man of General Hutchison's stature on our team. His reputation as a distinguished soldier and citizen extends throughout Florida. His support encourages me to do my best, not only to win, but to give the State responsible administration."

General Hutchison is a member of the Board of County Commissioners of Seminole County and has just completed three years as chairman of the board. He holds the rank of lieutenant general, Florida National Guard, retired. He and Mrs. Hutchison are long-time residents of Seminole County. They have two daughters, Mrs. T. E. Tucker and Mrs. Robert Cornell, both residents of Sanford.

General Hutchison stated, "I believe Senator Dickinson will make Florida a fine Governor. He has a good record, and I am proud to support him. We will soon open a Dickinson-for-Governor county headquarters, and I hope every citizen interested in Senator Dickinson's campaign will come by and let us know. We welcome the support of all our citizens."

Longwood Man 64's 3rd Traffic Fatality

Funeral services were conducted this afternoon for Forrest Letroy Lay, 30, of R. R. 1, Longwood, Seminole County's third traffic fatality of 1964.

Services were conducted by Rev. William Brackman, Minister, at the Niblack Funeral Home, Casselberry. Burial was in Longwood Cemetery.

Trooper Bill Stringfield said Lay was dead on arrival at Seminole Memorial Hospital at about 2 a. m. Saturday after his car overturned on Highway 17-92, near SR 434, and skidded across the highway.

His wife, Alma Jean Lay, 26, and James P. Williams, Lockhart, riding with Lay, suffered only minor injuries.

Coroner Hugh Duncan ruled Lay's death was due to his own negligence.

Survivors include the wife, four children, Randall, Dale, Rhonda and Rita Lay; his mother, Mrs. Catherine Lay, of North Carolina; four brothers and three sisters.

Trooper Stringfield also reported two drivers were arrested and three motorists injured in a series of weekend traffic accidents.

Harold C. Stillwell, Longwood, was charged with reckless driving when his car hit a railroad sign at Longwood at 1 a. m. Sunday. He also was charged with failing to report an accident. His car was damaged to the extent of \$50.

Automobile of Lawton Bryant, Orlando, his fishing tackle and an outboard motor were destroyed by fire at 5:30 a. m. Sunday on Tuskuwaha Road, Stringfield said Bryant was enroute to fish when the rear of his car broke into flames. Loss was estimated at \$650.

Lucy R. Kern, of Rolling Hills, suffered broken ribs when she lost control of her car and hit a tree on Palm Springs Drive at 6:15 a. m. Sunday.

Carolyn H. Waldrep, of Orlando, was charged with improperly changing lanes following a collision with a car driven by Walter F. Jeffers, Orlando, at 2 p. m. Sunday on Highway 17-92 at Casselberry. The Waldrep car damage was estimated at \$50 and the Jeffers car at \$200.

Two Sanford Naval Air Station sailors were hospitalized when their car overturned on Highway 427 early Saturday. The driver, Ernest D. Hosenleiner, 21, is confined at the SVAAS hospital and John J. Jaggers, 19, at Orlando AFB hospital. Stringfield said Hosenleiner lost control and the car overturned, skidding 200 feet.

500,000 Skip School, Boycott Leaders Say

NEW YORK (UPI) — School boycott leaders claimed that more than 50 per cent of the city's 500,000 Negro and Puerto Rican public school students stayed home today in a massive protest against racial segregation in the nation's largest school system.

Bayard Rustin, one of the boycott organizers and chairman of the freedom march on Washington, said: "We said we could consider this demonstration a success if we got 50 per cent of the Negro and Puerto Rican students to participate, and we have exceeded that number."

The boycott appeared to be most effective in schools with heavy Negro and Puerto Rican enrollment, especially in Harlem and the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn. Many white children also stayed away from their school desks and some parents said they kept their children home because they feared trouble.

"Sheriff J. L. Hobby and the Florida Highway Patrol have agreed that we must 'crack down' on these drinking drivers in an effort to curb accidents. In other words, we are going to concentrate more than we have in the past to halt driving drinkers."

Twenty-eight teen-agers participated in the driving contests. Prizes were \$25, \$15, \$10 and a radio.

Conducting Saturday's Road-E-O for the Jaycees were Sheriff's Deputies Charles Fox and Charles Fagan and Police Officers Donald Brumley, Ben Butler and Tom Deppen.

Winners in the district meet at Orlando will compete in the state contest April 25 at Ocala. State winners will compete in the national contest at Washington, D. C. First prize in the National contest will be a \$2,000 scholarship and a new car. Second prize will be a \$1,500 scholarship and third a \$1,000 scholarship.

Harriett will succeed Sgt. Richard Cosgrove and Hardy will succeed Capt. Arnold Williams. Estelle Jennings was re-elected secretary-treasurer of the group. Cosgrove, retiring president, was elected to a three-year term on the association's board of trustees.

4 Sanford Tots Eat Poisonous Castor Berries

The berries of the castor bush, a decorative plant quite prevalent in this area, are "highly poisonous."

This was brought out this morning when it was learned that four four-year-old boys are in Seminole Memorial Hospital after eating some of the berries last Friday.

Their physician said this morning the boys will recover but, he added, "from four to six of these berries could be fatal to a four-year-old."

Persons having castor plants on their properties should be careful that children do not eat these berries, the physician said.

Although a complete engineering survey must be made to determine economic feasibility of the project, preliminary reports indicate the residents already contacted are 100 per cent in favor of the program.

Ranger Camera Failure 'Incredible'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — More than 100 persons had gathered at the Washington headquarters of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to follow the progress of Ranger-6's flight. They were linked by direct wire with the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., control center for the flight, where more than 200 persons were on hand for the historic occasion.

A mid-course correction maneuver, executed at 3:37 a.m. EST Friday had put the spacecraft in a near-perfect trajectory. No further course correction would be necessary.

In the final phase of Ranger's plunge to the moon, everything still was working perfectly. They were supposed to go into a five-minute warmup period 19 and 16 minutes before impact and, in the final 10 minutes and the last 900 miles of the mission, take 3,000 photographs of the moon's surface.

The loudspeaker voice from Pasadena said indications were that the cameras went into the warmup phase all right.

But at impact minus 12 minutes (4:12 a.m. EST) the voice reported "no indication" that the cameras had gone from warmup to picture taking.

When impact time was only a few tenths of a second off the calculated moment there was "still no video."

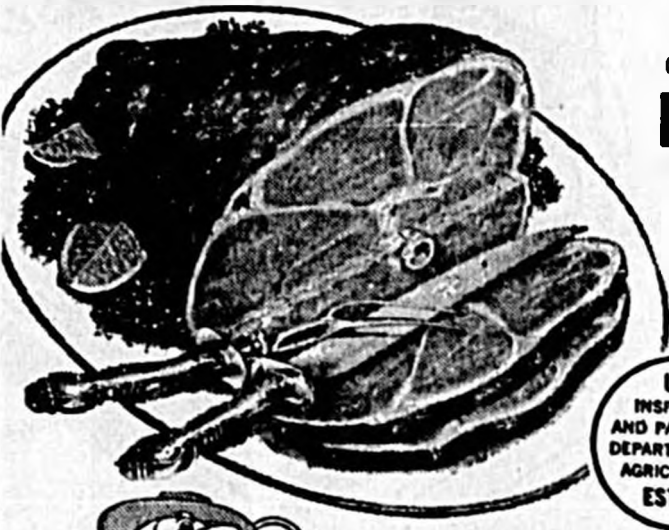
By then, what happened seem almost incredible. At the climax two separate camera banks, each with two

separate turn-on systems, had at least one of the television failed simultaneously. There systems would work. Neither were four chances that at did.

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Up To Congress

You may argue whether the national pastime is still baseball or whether professional football has displaced it, but the real sport of the proletariat is neither of these. It's knocking Congress.

Seldom in history has that body been under such attack. It's not the United States Congress any more; it's the Do-Nothing Congress, whether one is referring to the 87th or 88th or any other.

The sad thing is that so many people these days take it for granted that the constitutional purpose of Congress is mainly to criticize the President (whoever he may be) and keep him from grabbing too much power, and to pass only those laws which one side is able to jam through with main force or slip by on the grease sopped over from the ever-normal pork barrel.

Aside from this basic function, the popular impression goes, congressmen divide their time between endless hearings on gangsters and other seamy citizens and holding interviews with reporters in which they discuss what legislation is going to be considered in the current session, when it will go through, how it will be gotten through, how it will be changed before it gets through, how it will be changed before it gets through, or why it won't go through at all.

True, a romantic picture of congressmen still survives among the young — a picture of white-maned, floppy-tied solons debating hotly in

the aisles of Senate or House. Actually, most speeches printed in the Congressional Record were never delivered. Those that were, were read during an off-hour when page boys outnumbered the congressmen present.

Just about everyone has a grievance against Congress. However, those who jump on it because it didn't immediately rush through the administration's foreign aid or Medicare or civil rights bills are on just as shaky ground as those who maintain the fiction that Congress is simply deliberating.

Would that it were, for this is its function, and is the best guarantee of wise legislation. Unfortunately, the majority of congressmen never get a chance to vote on these bills, let alone deliberate on them. For an excess of checks and balances in the congressional machinery allows them to be bottled up in perpetuity through the will of certain key committee heads.

Can anyone truly say that the great issues (or if you prefer, pseudo issues) of our times, such as Medicare, have really been debated and weighed and considered by the people's representatives?

This is the trouble with Congress, and only Congress itself can provide the remedy which will enable it to regain its lost prestige.

The alternative is an increasing alienation from the people and a growing cynicism on their part that could be fatal to the Republic.

Death From Afar

Four United States presidents have been shot to death: Lincoln, Garfield, McKinley and now Kennedy. There have been attempts against others that failed.

It is worth noting that in every case but the last, the foul deeds were perpetrated at close range.

Though hand weapons capable of killing men at ranges up to hundreds of yards have existed since at least the days of the Kentucky long rifle, John F. Kennedy was the first president to be so assassinated — indeed, was probably the first outstanding leader in all history to be murdered at a distance.

It is ominously significant that it should occur at this time in history, when this nation — and all nations — are openly vulnerable to long-range destruction.

U.S. Baughman, former head of the Secret Service, wrote in his memoirs that his men could provide sure protection for the presidents under their charge in almost all circumstances.

He had only one great worry during his years in the service, and that was precisely what befell President Kennedy: the unseen rifle, telescopically equipped, protruding from one of the thousands of windows along a crowded city street.

Short of containing the president in a bulletproof cocoon, or employing hundreds of men to search and patrol every building along a given route, there was no way the Secret Service could guarantee the president's safety against a determined rifleman.

In the days before the atomic

bomb and intercontinental missiles, the military chiefs of a nation could offer reasonable guarantees for their country's safety. Policies could be based upon the ability to resist possible armed attack.

Today, when hydrogen weapons make possible the assassination of entire nations, for the first time in history we are all as defenseless as a bareheaded man in an open car.

The word "defense" today really means "retaliation," for that is the only means men have so far devised, short of worldwide disarmament, for keeping the dogs of war at bay.

In the long run, it may be that this very weakness will be the source of our greatest security.

For just as the only protection against an unbalanced assassin is to devise a society in which mental instability is treated in childhood (which almost happened with Lee Oswald) and in which the seeds of hate and extremism are never allowed to take root, so the only real protection against an ICBM is to build a world where such weapons do not exist because they are unthinkable.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The move by Republican governors to install Oregon's Gov. Mark Hatfield as permanent chairman of the GOP national convention is approaching a probably immovable object — House minority leader Charles Halleck.

Halleck had the job in 1960. Right now he will not comment — even privately — on

whether he wants it again. But the odds are heavy that he does, and such a wish is likely to be decisive with a good many influential Republicans.

The veteran leader is proud that the 1960 convention was an orderly affair.

He is extremely conscious, too, that as the prime "congressional candidate" for the chairmanship, he represents 211 Republicans, 178 in the House and 33 in the Senate, who carry a big part of the year-long partisan assault on the majority Democrats.

The party's 10 governors, scattered thinly across the nation, understand this full well. But they nevertheless want greater influence in party affairs than they now have. Putting Hatfield up for the chairmanship reflects this objective.

It indicates something more — a desire to plant a young, trim, handsome, vote-catching figure before the country's television screens during the convention period. Hatfield has the specifications.

As for Halleck, the attitude of some GOP governors was reflected by one who said: "I won't be a party to putting the 'Ev and Charlie Show' on television four days running."

Another Goldwater man, James Wood, Arizona GOP national committeeman, was skeptical at first. Then he watched Hatfield perform impartially and competently as host at a Eugene, Ore., meeting of western Republicans.

Both Goldwater and New York's Gov. Nelson Rockefeller were featured guests. Now Wood is for Hatfield as chairman.

Halleck has one handicap. Sometimes known as "everybody's candidate for vice president," he might benefit more from the television "showcase" than some party men would care to see.

His own people thought the missionary work done for the governor at a recent party meeting in Washington advanced his cause.

But the wise old party heads are doubtful he'll make it. A fairly steady tradition has given the chairmanship to the top House Republican for a good span of time. Halleck has had it only once, but he is not a man to be pushed aside lightly.

For Nancy feels she is now on the shelf. Her womb was removed by surgery because of fibroids.

So she imagines she is below par, sexually. "I can't possibly be attractive to my husband any more," is the futile thought of millions of women who reach the menopause.

Sissie (as she is affectionately known) Houston continues to do additional sewing at home, she makes small

gowns for the pediatric ward from old and worn surgical gowns. She has a friend in Daytona who drives over to sew with the local ladies on the fourth Mondays.

Fellowship Hall is used for the sewing bee but the circle is not church-sponsored and anyone interested is invited to sew with them. A knowledge of sewing isn't even necessary, just a desire to help, for there's cutting to be done and always the stacks of completed pieces to be folded. Mrs. Bob Besserer, co-chairman, says they average 150 to 200 articles at each session.

At 9:30 a.m. the sewing, basting, cutting and pinning begins but Sissie Houston and her husband have been out long before that picking up the portable machines from Garrett's Department Store and delivering them to the sewing room. She averages 30 hours work a month just getting things ready; trips back and forth to the hospital and putting everything in readiness so no time is lost when sewing time arrives. It has been estimated she totals 700 hours a year, about two each day, on this project.

The coffee pot is kept full and hot all day and the sewers take a sandwich for the mid-day break. There's a group who go in just to set up the luncheon table and clean up afterward so the others may utilize the 9:30-2:30 hours to advantage.

Hospital articles made by this circle include surgical

boots, small and large surgical drapes, small robes, towels, laundry bags, gowns, hot water bottle covers, Mayo packs, small pajamas, bassinet covers, pillow cases, bed-instrument covers for autoclaving and pads ranging in size from nine by nine inches to 34" x 74". An unusual item is the large red stocking trimmed in white. Babies born during the Christmas holidays are taken in to the mothers in these stockings and each one keeps the stocking (to hang for Santa!).

Service Circle is not a part of the Hospital Auxiliary but "Pink Ladies" sewing with this circle may count the hours toward their accumulated total for the year. Hospital Administrator Bob Besserer is lavish in his praise for the astounding amount of sewing accomplished by these circle members and what it means to the hospital.

This past week the circle had an anniversary; they have been meeting and sewing for two years. Do you have a few hours to give on the fourth Monday of each month? Call Mrs. Houston, Mrs. Besserer or just go down to the educational building of the Presbyterian Church at 9:30 a.m. It doesn't even matter if you don't know anyone there, they're such a friendly hive of busy bees you'll be warmly welcomed . . . and if you just happen to have a portable sewing machine, take it along . . .

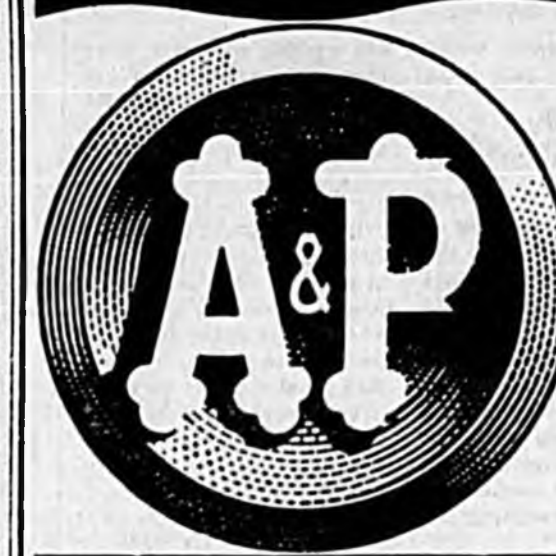

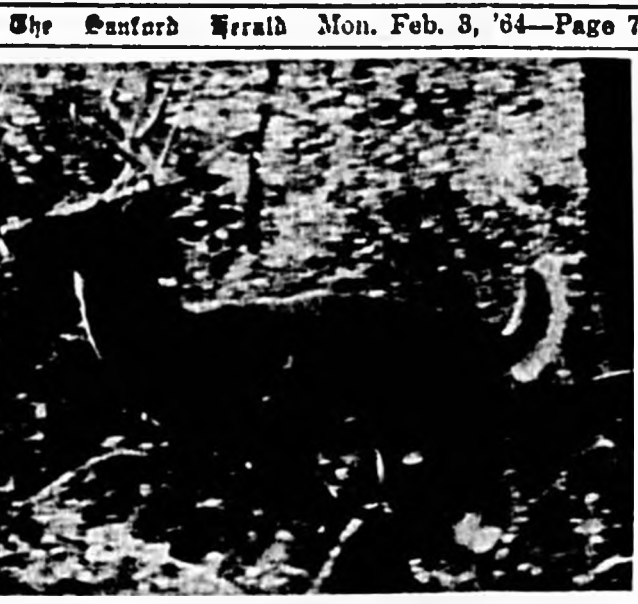

UN Organizes Aid For Congo Town Cut Off By Reds

LEOPOLDVILLE (UPI) — United Nations officials today organized help for the small Congolese town of Gungu, which is besieged by Communist-led terrorists and running low on food and ammunition.

Gungu, about 280 miles southeast of the capital, is in Kwilu Province, where guerrilla bands have attacked towns and mission stations in the past month. But no missionaries were believed to be in the besieged town.

The last American missionary working in an area endangered by the terrorist bands, Miss Mae Clark, 55, of Myerdale, Pa., was rescued by UN helicopter Saturday.

Miss Clark had refused to leave her orphanage at Kalanganda unless the 19 African orphans in her care could be rescued, too. But the terrorists refused to allow the children to leave the area and officials finally persuaded Miss Clark to go.

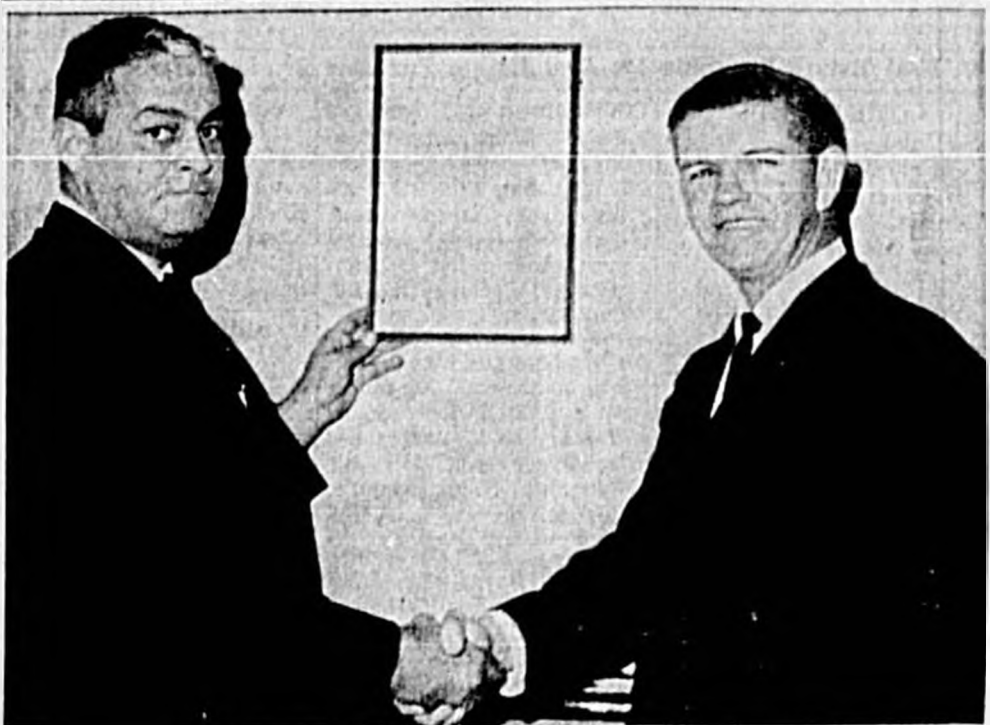
The orphanage is just north of Gungu, one of the centers of terrorist activity. The guerrillas, led by Peking-trained Pierre Mulele, a former Congolese cabinet minister, have sought to drive all white missionaries from the area they control.

One American missionary, Miss Irene Ferrel, 42, of Jerome, Idaho, was killed by the terrorists last month.

Miss Clark reported an elderly Swiss missionary couple was being held by the terrorists. They were identified as Mr. and Mrs. August Eicher, Miss Clark said villagers told her of their capture.

The United Nations hoped to airlift supplies to Gungu to enable it to hold out against the terrorists, who attacked in force Sunday, killing several Congolese soldiers of the town's garrison.

Idiots, 30 miles north of Gungu, is holding out against the guerrillas with the aid of a UN airlift. Sunday, UN planes began leaving with the wives and children of the Congolese troops defending Idiots.

"I certainly approve wholeheartedly the decision of the State Cabinet this morning," said James P. Avery Jr., chairman of the Seminole County Commission. "It was the only decision left open to them. The Board of County Commissioners is in contact with the State Board of Control and State Board of Education and await their pleasure for a conference to make their job easier and to determine in what manner we can co-operate."

(Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce university site committee, said that "zoning will be no problem since we have a county-wide zoning law.")

The Board read but did not discuss a last-minute plea from State Rep. James Pruitt, of Brevard County, that the university be located closer to Cape Kennedy.

State Treasurer J. Edwin Larson, Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner and Comptroller Ray Green were not in town to vote for the university site, but the unanimous votes of Gov. The worst storm of the winter panned the Southwest today with wind-driven snow, thunderstorms and a tornado.

A tornado slammed to the ground this morning at Rosenberg, Tex., and damaged about a dozen homes. Golf-ball size hail pelted Rosenberg and Richmond but no injuries were reported.

Blowing snow closed roads out of Tucuman, N. M., where up to 14 inches fell during the night. Police set up roadblocks and advised motorists to seek refuge.

Graders were called out to clear the highways but got stuck in the snow.

Highway travel was restricted to trucks within a 100-mile radius of Amarillo, Tex., where nine inches of snow fell and stiff northerly winds whipped up five-foot drifts. All schools in Amarillo were ordered closed.

Wind gusting at 50 miles an hour brewed five-foot snow drifts at Dalhart, Tex., and reduced visibility to zero. Two buses were bogged in the snow near Amarillo but state police escorted the passengers to safety.

Heavy snow warnings continued in effect today for Southwestern Kansas, Western Kansas, Western Oklahoma and from the Texas Panhandle southward to the Pecos River Valley. Hazardous driving warnings extended from New Mexico to Western Kansas.
