Tonight will mark the last performance of "Peer Gynt," a production of the pupils of room eight of the Sanford Grammar School.

The play is being presented to raise funds for a German refugee girl sponsored by the young group. It was written from the original Ibsen book and little of the famous story has been left out, according to a class spokesman.

The city today is working in conjunction with Seminole County's Boy Scout organization in an attempt to work out a program whereby the Scouts may use the City pool for swimming and safety classes. Clifford McKibbin, a Sanford Scoutmaster, is responsible for the negotiations, according to Warren Knowles, City manager.

F. E. (Gene) Roumillat, skipper of the "Skylark," which made the trip to Lemon Bluff Wednesday when the Rotary Club held its outing, has returned home from the Orange Memorial Hospital, Orlando, after being confined with a broken collar bone which he suffered in a fall during the outing. The S. H. S. Band has a very full schedule planned for this weekend. First, they march in the Armed Forces Day parade Saturday morning. With this parade, they introduce their summer uniforms which they wear because of the hot weather. This will be the first time that they will have performed their famous "Seven Lonely Days Dance" in a Sanford parade. They introduced it in New Orleans.

There will be a concert following the parade. This concert will give their last in a series of park concerts in the Fifth Street Park. This will be identical to the received concert presented last week in Daytona. The concert will begin at 4 p. m. Monday, the Sanford Lions Club is sending them to Orlando to march in the State Lions Club Parade.

**Sewer Extension Work Is Begun**  
Sidney Richard, superintendent of City Sewers, today announced that the city had begun work in extending 135 feet of sewer line from Bellville to Bernange Ave.

The superintendent stated that the city was using eight-inch cast iron pipe and that the job would provide average facilities for approximately nine homes.

Costs of the project are being held to a minimum by using materials already owned by the city and using City prisoners on the work gang. Estimated cost is \$150 for the project.

**Gar Wood's 'Unsinkable' Ship Founders In Bahama Islands**  
MIAMI, Fla. — The "Unsinkable" twin-hulled yacht Venturi lay in her watery grave off Great Inland Key today. The 75-year-old speedboat racer and builder, and eight others were safe.

The 180-foot Venturi broke up in heavy seas while returning to Miami from a round trip to Nassau yesterday. Wood, his secretary, nine Negro housekeeper, and six crew members were rescued.

## Prepare Material For Wage Hearing

TAMPA, Fla. — Parties to a federal wage hearing on overtime pay for citrus workers are preparing charts and graphs to support oral testimony given during a three-day hearing here.

The hearing ended yesterday after both sides agreed further oral testimony would only duplicate facts and figures already presented.

Harris Weiss, in charge of the hearing, allowed 30 days to furnish the charts and other data, and a further 30 days to file briefs arguing the case. Weiss is assistant administrator of the wage and hour division of the U. S. Department of Labor.

The hearing was held on petition of the Florida Council of Citrus Unions (ACLU), which contended that citrus shipping and processing operations have grown to the point where they are no longer seasonal because the industry is now rated seasonal, employers are not required to pay overtime after 40 hours a week, although some Florida processing plants do.

The petition was opposed by several large citrus agencies, including Florida Citrus Mutual, Growers and Shippers League of Florida, and the Florida Cannery Assn.

**NEW CITY MOWER IS IN OPERATION**  
The City's new power lawn mower which was purchased this week to be attached to the City's Ford tractor went into its first trial operation today on the city's parkways.

City Manager Warren Knowles stated that the mower had been purchased from the Britt Tractor Co. of Sanford. The firm submitted a low bid of \$250.

The new power mower is gas-powered and operated hydraulically. The city manager commented on the new mower's performance as "excellent and much better than the city has ever before had."

## Two Senators Relate Visits From Counselor

Both Agree Adams Poured Out Story Of Pressure From McCarthy Group

WASHINGTON (AP)—An Eisenhower administration bar today shut off any detailed testimony about high-level conferences on the McCarthy-Army row. But two senators related behind-the-scenes Army approaches to them—visits Sen. McCarthy calls "blackmail" attempts.

In dramatic moments, Sens. Dirksen (R-III) and Mundt (R-SD) stepped from their roles on the bench of the McCarthy-Army hearings to testify about visits they received last January from Army counselor John G. Adams.

Both agreed that Adams poured out a story of pressure from the McCarthy subcommittee, and particularly from Fess M. Cohn, its general counsel, in behalf of Pvt. G. David Schime, drafted former consultant to the subcommittee.

Both Dirksen and Mundt said that their first reaction was that if the charges were true Cohn must be fired, and that when they discussed the matter with Sen. McCarthy he declared he would not submit to "blackmail."

The committee recessed at 12:30 p. m. Dirksen touched off the round of senatorial testimony by dramatically asking and receiving permission to be sworn as a witness. His request came in the midst of a row over the propriety of employing publicly the role of top White House aide and Army spokesman in a Justice Department conference last Jan. 21.

Adams was in the witness chair for his third day and last half at a hearing who said what at the conference—a meeting he first mentioned on Wednesday. The Army's special counsel, Joseph N. Welch, said Adams was barred from answering such questions by orders from "the executive department."

## The FBI Position

For more than half his life John Edgar Hoover has served as Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. His dedication to duty, his personal integrity and his keen understanding of the requirements and limits of his job have shaped that organization into one of the proudest and most able arms of our government.

In a recent interview with Don Whitehead of the Associated Press he answered a number of questions about his experiences and about the philosophy of life which has served him in such good stead.

He has always insisted that the FBI be divorced from politics. Under his direction the bureau has attracted some of the country's finest men and they have been assigned and promoted strictly on their merits. He sees no danger that the FBI will ever adopt partisan tactics as long as it is staffed with men of character, and public opinion remains alert and informed.

There has never been a scandal in which the FBI was involved. His insistence on the highest moral and ethical standards on the part of the men of the FBI has won the respect of the American people. He has refused to allow the great prestige the FBI enjoys to be used for political purposes.

There has been criticism of Hoover and the FBI. But the critics have never managed to dislodge him from the place he rightfully holds in the esteem of the country which owes him so great a debt. His career has served to define the position that a federal police organization can hold in a democracy.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The French are like Samson cutting his own hair. Although they don't have as much strength as they'd like to believe, they still throw it away by thinking as individuals instead of as a nation.

French troops are heroic as ever, as they showed in their hopeless stand against the Communist-led Vietminh at Dien Bien Phu in Indochina.

But at home the politicians and the people are so confused and divided they have had 18 cabinets since their liberation in 1944.

No longer the great empire of the past, they try to act like one. Yet they could not have led Indochina this long without American aid.

In 1940 their Maginot Line was overwhelmed by the Germans with a new kind of war, a blitz of planes and tanks for which the French were unready.

Yesterday Premier Laniel told the Assembly that now, 14 years

## County Agent's Column

### Way Down South In Sanford, Florida

By C. R. DAWSON, ISA, MSA.  
**IRON DEFICIENT SOIL** — Most Florida soil is deficient in iron, copper, cobalt, and some other minerals. A symptom of the lack of iron is the dark green leaf veins with lighter areas between the leaves. As the deficiency becomes more pronounced, the areas between the veins become increasingly lighter, then yellow, and finally fade to an ivory color. Unless iron is supplied to the plant, it will die.

Dr. Phillip J. Westgate of the Central Florida Experiment Station reports the following plants responding to soil applications of iron chelates: Chinese cabbage, mustard greens, cucumbers, hibiscus, beans, okra, sweet corn, azaleas, hydrangea, ixora, carnations, camellias, chrysanthemum, gardenias, ligustrum, roses, snapdragon, spinach, gladiolus and grasses — including St. Augustine, Centipede, Pangola and Bermuda.

Be sure not to apply this material on the basis "that if some is good, more must be better" because an overdose will injure your plants. Use the stuff right and your plants will "green up" in about a week.

Asked if he would actively support a governor a state-long turnpike, Collins said he always has supported the full-length tollpike since he previously had said only that if the Legislature passed a bill for the state-long turnpike he would not veto it, said "there is no question about" his supporting the all-the-way turnpike.

On reappointment, Collins said he agreed "that the more populous counties are entitled to more representation." Johns said he would follow the Florida Constitution and the Legislature to reappointment the state in 1955, and when pressed by Baggs on whether the bigger counties should have more representation, he said "I feel like they're entitled to it."

Questioned as to his stand on a lieutenant governor, Collins said he advocates constitutional revision which would provide for a lieutenant governor who would preside over the Senate and succeed to the governorship in emergency.

## When Shopping For New Potatoes Follow These Hints

Myrtle Wilson, Home Demonstration Agent, says "Be Wise When You Buy New Potatoes".

Yum! Yum! What tastes better than new potatoes? To get the most potatoes for your money, you want to know what makes new potatoes different. Variety may be the same as potatoes found later on the market as "old" potatoes. New or early potatoes are dug before they are fully mature and are marketed as soon as dug. They cannot stand rough handling as they are more subject to injury because of the immaturity and the warm weather at time of digging and shipping. Skins are easily broken and they present a discolored and leathery appearance.

Buy quality select potatoes that are round, smooth, shallow-eyed and reasonably clean; have skin that is reasonably tough, hard to rub off and of good color; some potatoes are dyed or colored for "eye appeal" but dye does not affect the quality or flavor; are of size and shape most suitable for purpose to be used; medium size are usually more desirable for general use; symmetrical shape, not knobby, pointed or crooked, have less waste; small size sell at lower price and when cheaper are a good buy if desirable in all other ways; cook in skin to save preparation time and food value; have same cooking qualities—of varieties are mixed. Some potatoes cook more quickly than others. Before buying large quantities, it is wise to buy a small quantity first and cook them to determine the characteristics of the cooked potato.

Avoid potatoes that are wilted, leathery, discolored; green colored skin is sunburnt; it is usually caused by long exposure to light when dug or in storage; sunburned potatoes usually have a bitter taste; have surface defects, cuts, growth cracks, mechanical injuries, worm holes. These cause waste in preparation and decay when stored. Hollow heart and blackheart are defects that can be detected only by cutting.

Selling unit—potatoes are sold by pound, peck (about 15 pounds), bushel, or 50 or 100 pound sack. In bulk to be selected by the consumer or prepackaged. By grade in some areas. Three or four potatoes of medium size weigh one pound and measure about 2 cups pared and cut into cubes.

It is not necessary to turn fish fillets when you are broiling them. If the skin is still on the fillets, place the fish skin-side down on the broiling pan.

## Sports Roundup

NEW YORK (AP)—Roger Hammer, the four-minute miler, must feel like his famous countryman Alice did when she tumbled down the rabbit hole.

And Roger isn't the only one. There must be literally millions of red-blooded Americans and Britons, both, who are wondering that happened, and why, after the latest miracle runner landed here a couple of mornings ago thinking he was going to appear on a number of television programs.

The average, lightly formed impression probably is that Hammer was warped of the project, which was purely a patriotic one on his part, because it might endanger his amateur standing and render him ineligible to run in the 1956 Olympics at Melbourne.

It is true that our own amateur athletic officials, being extremely conscientious about such matters, did slip the word to their opposite numbers in Britain that it was against the rules for Hammer to appear on a program which was commercially sponsored—with certain reservations. It also is true that our British cousins took the hint and advised their flying object to watch himself. But that's about as far as the mixed-up affair Hammer makes sense.

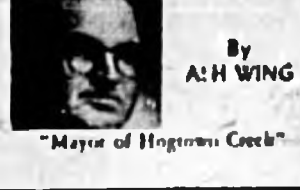

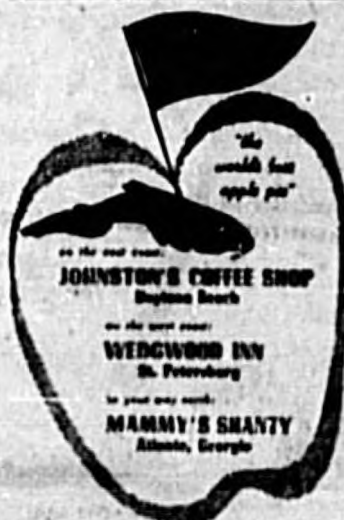

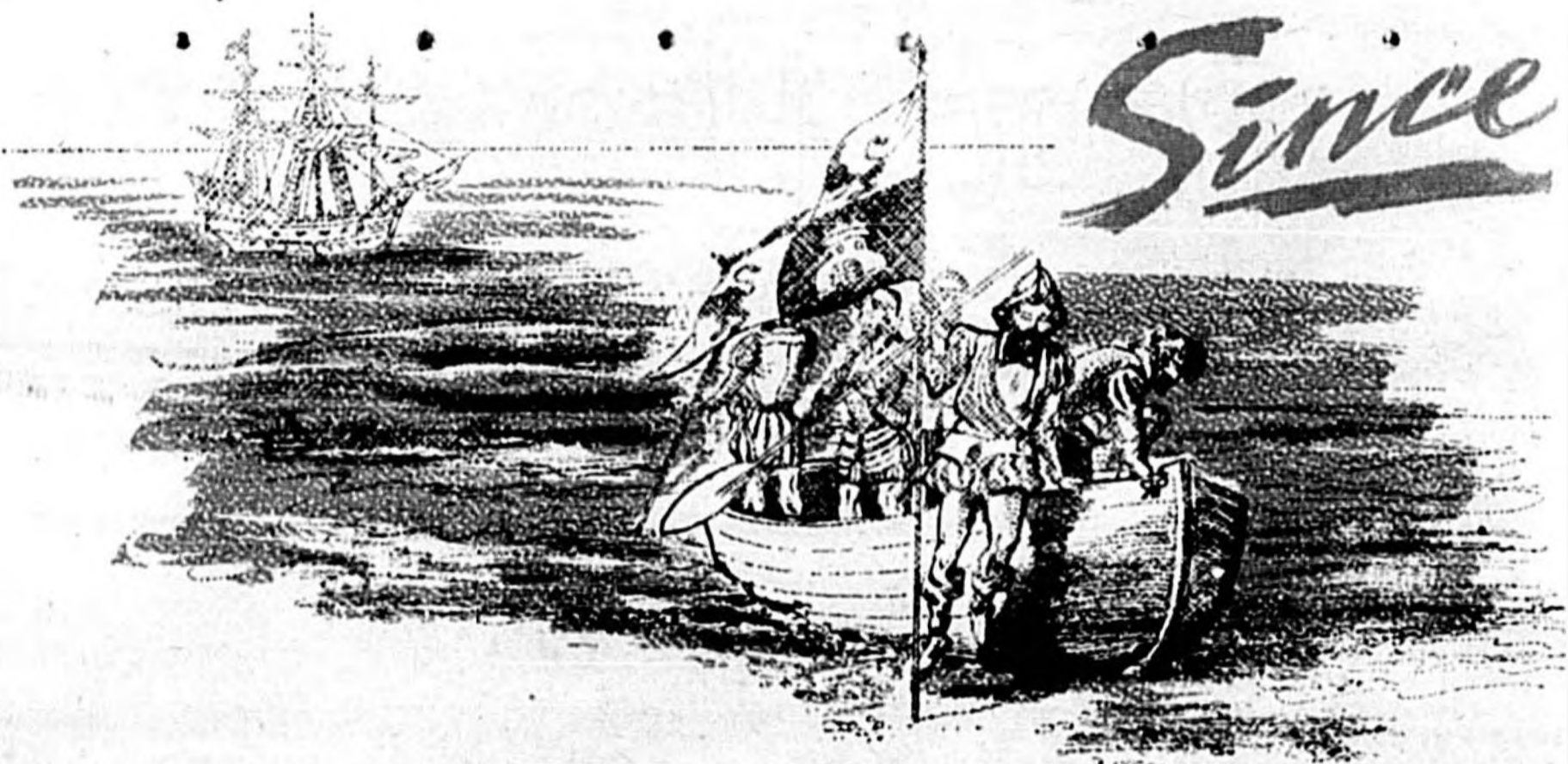

# THOSE BOATMEN ARRIVED from SPAIN...

Four hundred and forty-one years ago a bearded admiral stepped ashore on Florida soil, poked the staff of a red and gold banner into the sand, and announced that henceforth this "island" belonged to Ferdinand V of Spain. Since that day in 1513, when Ponce de Leon's galleons first nosed their way into the mouth of the Matanzas River, every conceivable type of craft has plowed Florida's waters.

It's a long way from the conquistador's galleon to the modern steel freighter cutting the waters of our great seaports, from the armed sloop of by-gone pirate days to the trim ketch plying Biscayne Bay in periodic yacht races, or the trim cruiser speeding up the Intercoastal Waterway.

Truly, our state is Nature's gift to the boatman. Nowhere else in the country can he find such a favorable combination of things that make "Florida" and "boats" practically synonymous.

Look at our weather. We have temperatures conducive to sailing and cruising from January to December, and in parts of the state it's an oddity when the sun doesn't shine some part of every day.

And talk about harbors! Why, you'll swear each one is finer than the last! There's not a spot on our coastline more than a few miles from one of the best.

Other states have their annual boat shows, and we have one, too—the Miami International Boat Show each February. But we have something more important—a 365-day-a-year boat show! If you don't believe it, take a look at the Intercoastal Waterway, any time, in the vicinity of Ft. Lauderdale.

Lots of our folks like to fish

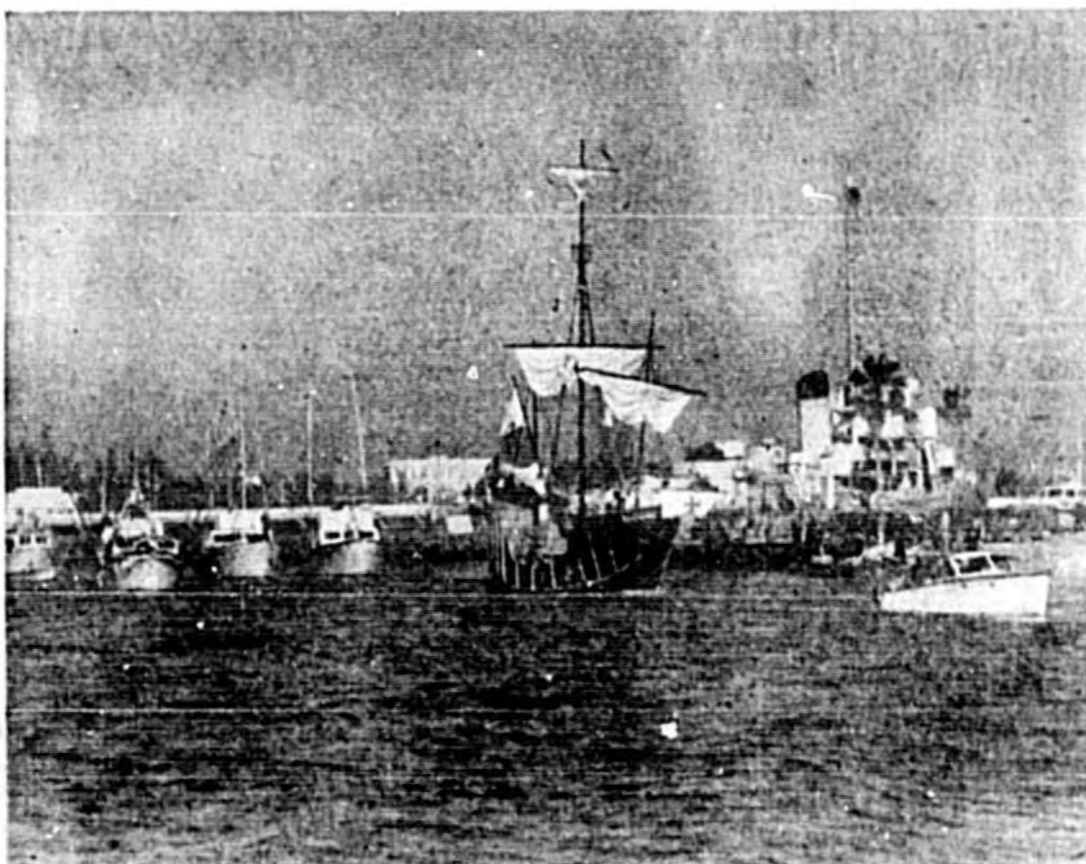

Look at the wonderful, relaxing cruises Nature has provided: the hundreds of miles of coastline, dotted with thousands of islands, dozens and dozens of navigable rivers, 30,000 lakes, and countless streams and creeks. Where else can the part-time sailor find so much water that, in his lifetime, he can't see it all?

And Man has been fast to capitalize on Nature's nautical gifts. Today countless municipal piers dot the coasts, dozens of marinas and yacht clubs provide facilities for members and guests from all over the world. And many of these clubs have regular races to keep members sharp for the big events.

Pelican Harbor—home, probably, of more powerful inboard racing boats than any other place in Florida—is the scene of monthly powerboat races. For the devotees of wind, spray, and canvas, South Florida, particularly, provides a variety of events. Several major yacht clubs conduct invitational regattas, in addition to monthly races. Deep

What'll yours be? Sailboat, cruiser, or power yacht? You'll find it in Florida—where even the boats get sand in their shoes!

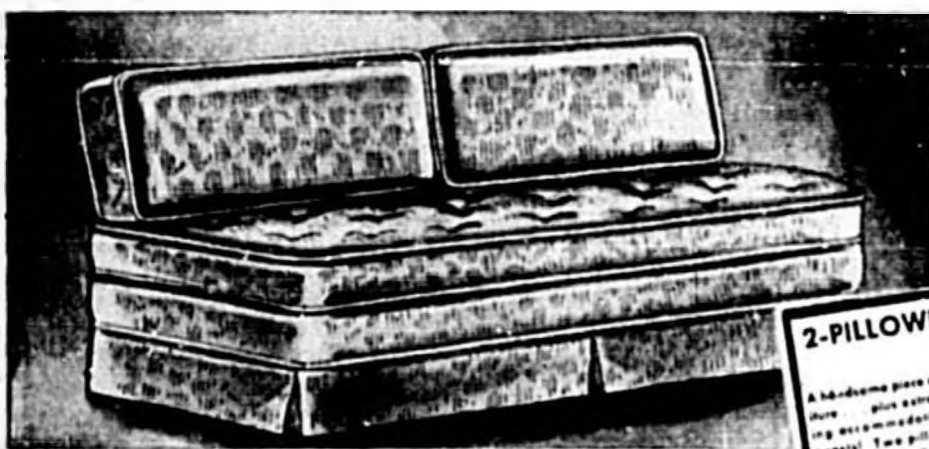

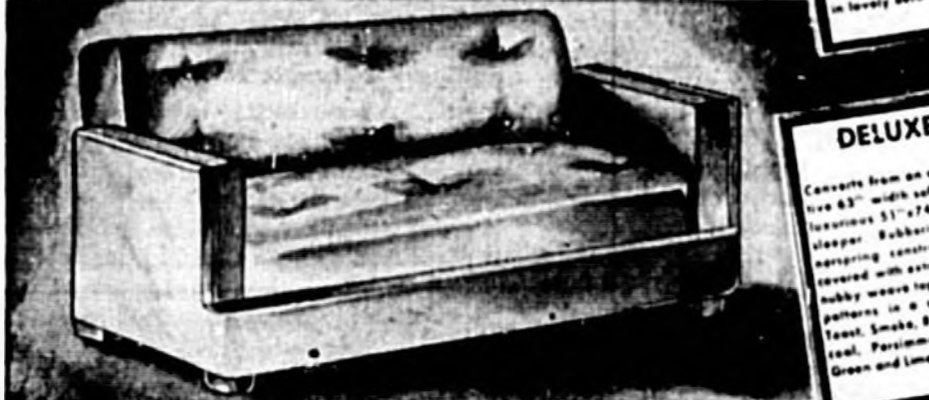

# BUILD THIS DINGHY yourself

This versatile dinghy—inexpensive and easy to build—carries three or four passengers, rows easily, handles well under outboard motor or sail, and can be carried on top of your car.

Begin by "lofting"—drawing full-size paper plans of mould frames, stem, and transom. Mark and saw these parts to shape—the transom from 1/4-inch plywood fastened to 1/4-inch frame with glue and 1-inch screws—the others from 1x4 tough lumber. Moulds are temporary, so don't fasten anything to them.

Notch moulds and transom for chimes, clamp, and keel. Saw form to shape, mount on legs for convenience, then mount these parts on form and brace well.

Inner keel is attached to stem notch and transom frame with 1 1/4-inch screws, beveling to fit stem. Fasten clamp with 1-inch screws, also beveling to fit stem. Trim and fair so planking will lie flat.

Start planking on bottom. Lay plywood along keel, mark and cut to shape, use first piece as a pattern for opposite side. Glue all touching surfaces, then fasten with 1-inch screws, spaced at 2-inch intervals.

Soften plywood with hot water if bending trouble is encountered.

Plank sides, trimming evenly at chimes and transom. Glue and screw-fasten, as before. Use 1 1/4-inch screws along the clamp. Trim all joints evenly. Cover exposed plywood edges at the stem with 1 1/4-inch by 1/4-inch plywood, screw-fastened.

Screw-fasten 1 1/4-inch skag to keel aft. Remove boat from frame, and insert ribs from keel to chine, using 1 1/4-inch galvanized shingle nails. Nail from outside, clinch inside.

Form transom knees and breast hook. Screw-fasten into place. Remove moulded frames. Insert seat risers, screwing from the outside. Seats, cut from 1/4-inch-by-4-inch stock, are screwed into place. Cut seat knees and mouldings, fasten into place. Screw 1/4-inch plywood strips to ribs for flooring.

Putty screw heads. Prime-coat hull with a filler (equal parts of turpentine and linseed oil). Paint or varnish hull to suit your own taste. When it's dry you'll be all set to join Florida's nautical parade **WITH YOUR OWN BOAT!**

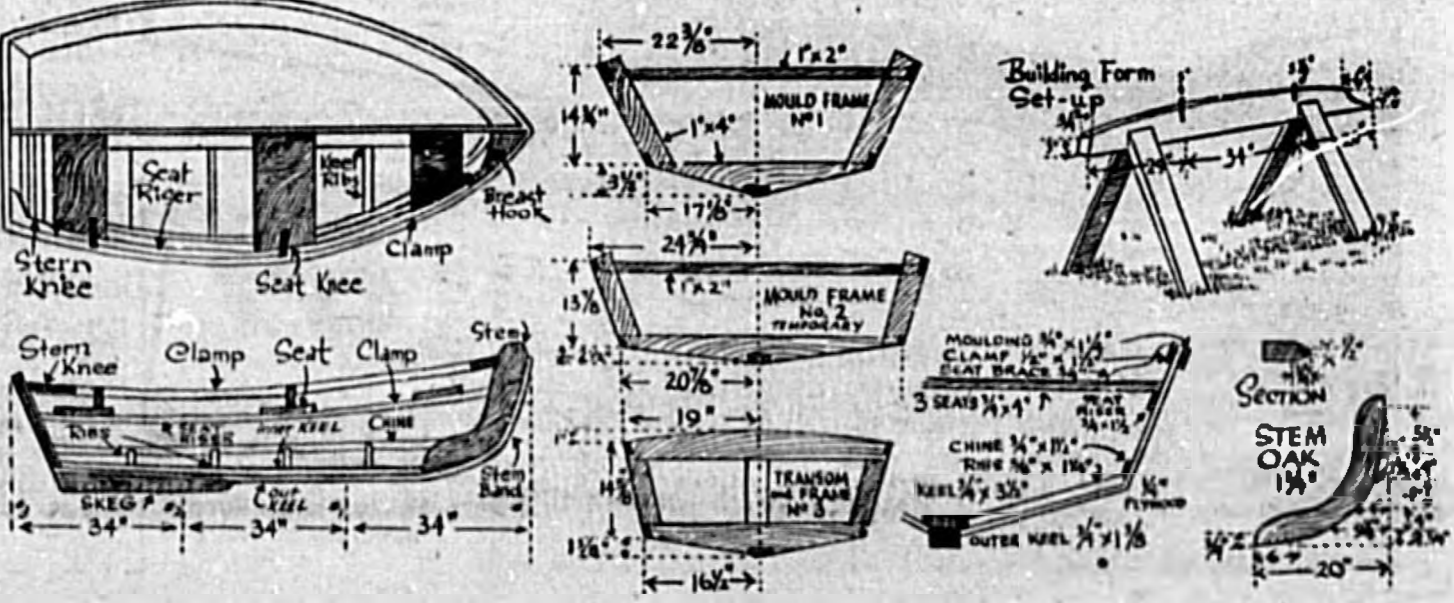

# Give Your Home a NAUTICAL TOUCH

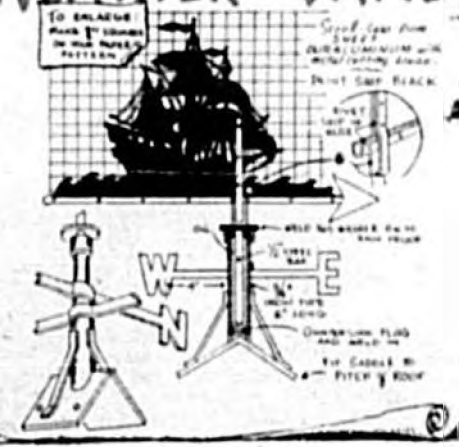
## Ponce de Leon SHIP WEATHER VANE

The silhouette of a Spanish galleon, the type in which Ponce de Leon sailed to Florida shores, makes an attractive weather vane—one the handyman can make himself, with an assist from a local welder.

Draw one-inch squares, lay out the pattern, then scroll-saw the design from a sheet of duraluminum. If you don't have access to a scroll saw, cut it out with a sharp chisel, then smooth the edges with a fine file. Paint the ship black, using outdoor enamel.

A piece of metal channel and two iron straps, the latter welded to the axis, hold the silhouette with rivets, as shown in the diagram.

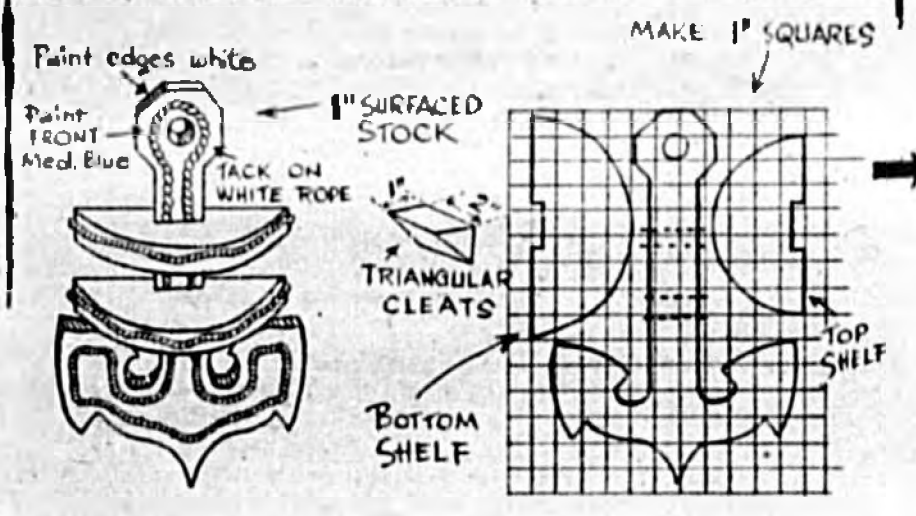
A plug, countersunk and welded into the pipe support, provides a pivot for the pointed end of the axis. The pipe is welded to a saddle support designed for the roof's pitch.



Fill with oil, but weld a washer to the axis, as shown at the right, to keep out water.

The directional cross-pieces are welded to the pipe, as indicated in the lower drawings.

## ANCHOR Knickknack SHELF



All pieces for this attractive item are cut from one-inch surfaced wood. Mark off one-inch squares, lay out the diagram, then cut.

The top shelf is a semi-circle with a four-inch radius, the lower shelf, 4 1/2 inch. Each has a 2-inch-by-25/32-inch notch in the back to allow it to fit around the anchor section, and each is supported by a 1x2 triangular cleat, nailed below the shelf in front of the anchor section.

Edge the entire assembly with white, the other surfaces with a medium blue. Tack on plain, new, white rope—more or less irregularly—as shown in the diagram, and give the whole thing a coat of clear shellac.

Tack picture-frame hangers on the reverse side for hanging.

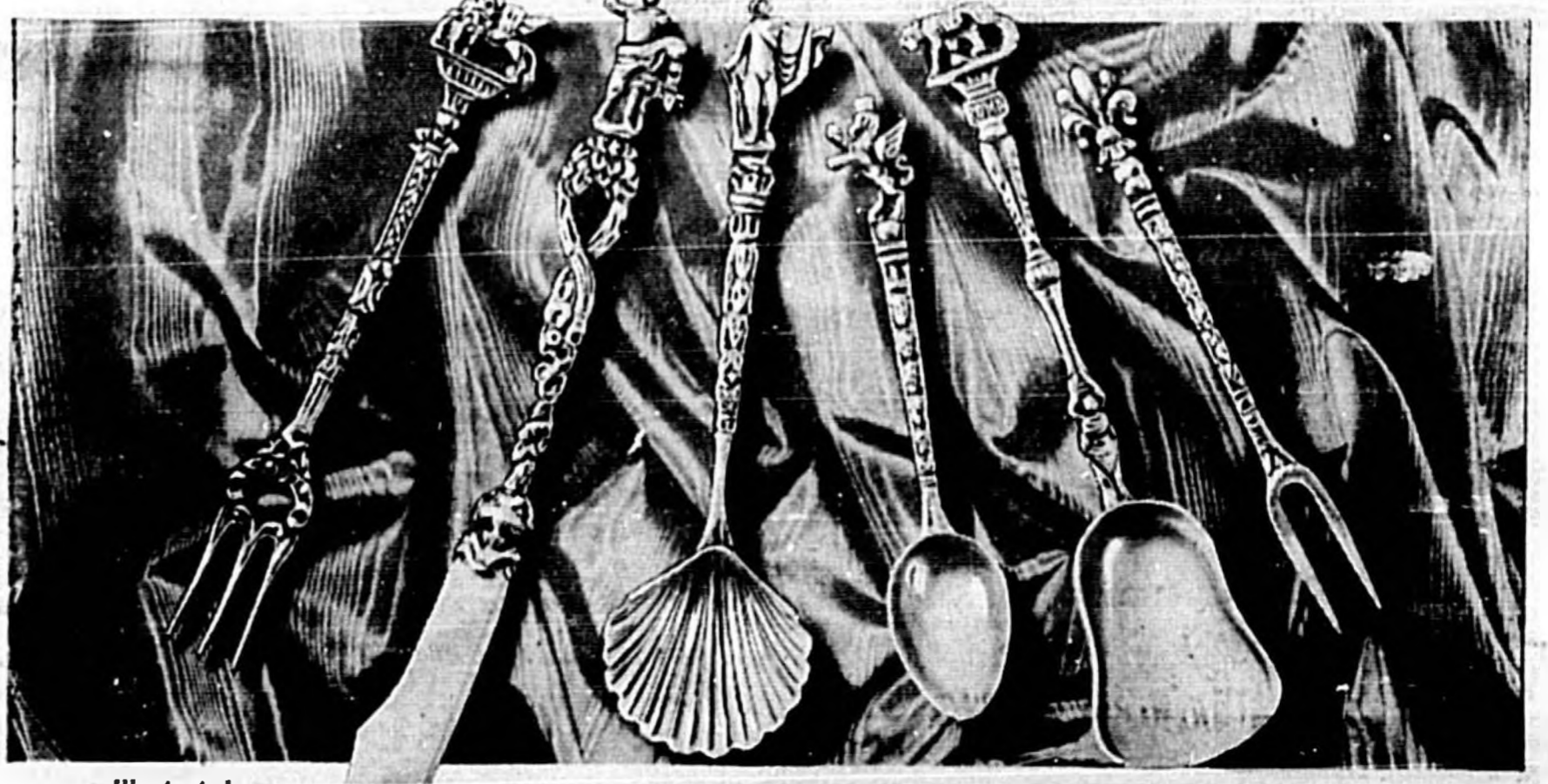
