Woman, Who Killed Seven, Held Insane

ST. PAUL, Neb., April 20.—Mrs. Della Sorenson, 23, who confessed yesterday to killing by poison seven persons, including two of her own children and husband, probably will be placed in the insane asylum, according to County Attorney Dahrey, following an investigation. He said she was mentally unbalanced. The series of deaths extended over seven years. The woman related how she killed her baby, Deloris, and three-year old daughter, Minnie, the former because her "crying fretting" and the latter because she was afflicted with the St. Vitus' dance. She poisoned her husband, she said, after a quarrel. She confessed to killing four other persons.

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OFFICE BUILDING FOR BUREAU OF STATE PROPOSED

Measure Is Introduced In Legislature to Provide Additional Room Needed for Many Officials

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 18.—Passage of the bill proposed by Representatives Williams and Davis, of Leon county, and Senator W. C. Hodges, of the eighth district to provide funds for erection of an administrative office building for state departments will make it possible for a greater concentration of state departments, it is believed here. The present quarters provided in the Capitol long ago became inadequate to take care of every branch of the government work centered in the capital city, and remodeling of the Capitol, which was completed about the time the last legislature met failed to provide the necessary room.

As things now stand, the State Road Department is located in rented quarters four blocks away from the Capitol, and the automobile license tax department, or a large part of it is occupying two floors of an office building recently erected across the grounds from the Capitol building. This, it has frequently been pointed out, causes annoyance to people of the state who come to Tallahassee on business.

Should the bill pass both houses, the new building probably would be erected on one of the four squares laid out by those who planned the original layout of grounds for capital city purposes. One of these squares now is occupied by the state supreme court building, another by the Leon county court house, a third by a city tennis court and parkway, while the fourth is used by farmers and others who come to town with their products for sale at the curb.

The bill proposing the appropriation for the building reads as follows:

"Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Florida: Section 1. That the sum of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for the erection and furnishing of a state public building on one of the public squares owned by the state of Florida in the City of Tallahassee, to be chosen by the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions, such building to be used by officers of the state administrative departments. Such building shall be built of materials that will make it as nearly fire-proof as possible.

"Section 2. The erection of such building shall be under the supervision of the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions, who shall have the same erected by contract to be let with the usual terms to the lowest responsible bidder according to plans and specifications to be chosen by such board.

"Section 3. This Act shall take effect upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or upon its becoming a law without his approval."

Lake Wales Claims Biggest Growth of Any City In State

LAKE WALES, Apr. 18.—This little city is claiming the largest percentage of growth in population of any city in the state since the census of 1920, with a record of 245 per cent.

The number of permanent residents on which the official state census is based total 2,717, whereas in 1920 there was a population of 796. This number included only those living within the two square miles in the city limits and did not include a number of suburbs, residents of which work get their mail and count themselves as belonging to Lake Wales. It is claimed there are more than 500 people in the Sherman mill colony just over the line of the city limits, whose children attend the Lake Wales school.

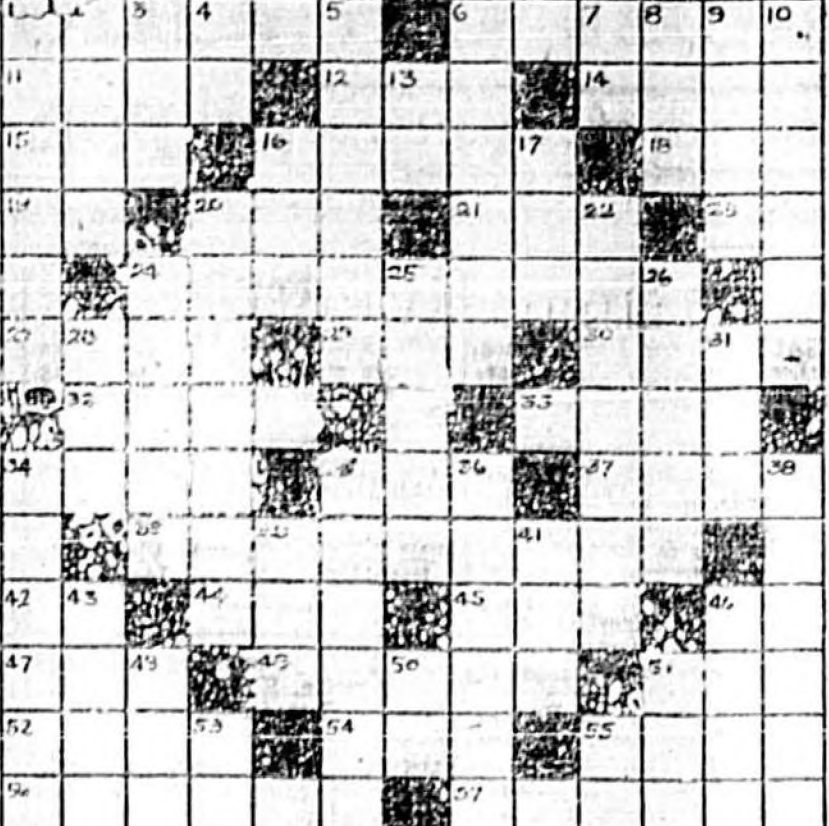
Taking into consideration some other developments nearby—Highland Park, West Lake Wales, Templeton, Hesperides, Mountain Lake, Mammoth Grove, in all of which places there are several hundred permanent residents, there is a population in the city and nearby territory of around 4,000, it is claimed.

In this connection it is pointed out that a number of unincorporated towns near Lake Wales, residents of which do their shopping here, attend the local churches and otherwise have close connection with the business and social life of Lake Wales.

We, the undersigned, hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of becoming incorporated and forming a corporation under and by virtue of the laws and Constitution of the state of Florida and under the following proposed charter:

PROPOSED CHARTER
OSTEEN LAND COMPANY
Article I.
The name of this corporation shall be **OSTEEN LAND COMPANY**, and its principal place of business shall be in the City of Sanford, Florida, with branch places of business at such other points in the State of Florida, and in the United States and foreign countries as the Board of Directors may from time to time designate.

Article II.
The general nature of the business to be conducted by this corporation shall be to buy, lease, own, sell, convey and mortgage, or otherwise encumber real estate, and to improve the same by erecting buildings thereon for sale or rent, to that and subordinate real estate, and construct and maintain streets and sidewalks thereon, and otherwise improve the same; to buy and sell real estate for others on commission; to act as general real estate agent for owners of real estate; to buy, own, sell all personal property necessary or incidental to the conduct of any business in which the corporation may engage; to purchase, construct or reconstruct a pier or wharf, or to buy, lease, own, sell, convey and mortgage, or otherwise encumber any lands, buildings, offices, stores, warehouses, mills, shops, factories, plants, and houses, machinery, rights, franchises, permits, licenses, franchises and licenses and all other things which may at any time be necessary or convenient in the judgment

of the Board of Directors, for the purpose of the carrying on of a restaurant, cafe, tavern, refreshment room and lodging house, and to carry on the business of hotels, restaurants, public amusements, generally, coach, cab, garage andivery stands, keepers, farmers, dairymen, bee merchants, importers and brokers of all descriptions, tobacco and cigar merchants, agents for railroads and shipping companies and carriers, theatrical and opera box office proprietors, and any other business which can be conveniently carried on in connection therewith.

Article III.
The amount of capital stock of this corporation shall be Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars, to be divided into one hundred and fifty (150) shares of common stock, of the par value of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each, all of which may be paid for in cash, or in property, labor or services, or in property, labor or services, to be determined by the incorporators or Board of Directors, at a meeting to be called and held for such purposes.

Article IV.
The term for which this corporation is organized shall be ninety-nine (99) years.

Article V.
The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and a Board of Directors.

Article VI.
Any two officers, other than that of a President, may be held by one and the same person.

Article VII.
The Board of Directors shall consist of a board of not less than three members, the number to be determined by the stockholders at each annual meeting. The Board of Directors shall be elected by the stockholders at their annual meeting, which shall be held on the First Monday in February of each year, beginning with the year 1925. The other officers of this corporation shall be elected by the Board of Directors.

Article VIII.
At the first annual meeting of the stockholders and at all their successors be duly elected and qualified the business of this corporation shall be conducted by the following officers: T. L. Long, as President; H. S. Long, as Vice-President and Treasurer; and M. A. Long, as Secretary; and T. L. Long, H. S. Long, M. A. Long and Lillian Long as the Board of Directors.

Article IX.
Any resolution or action of the Board of Directors or of the stockholders of the Company may be had by resolution or agreement in writing, signed by all of the directors, or all of the stockholders, or the majority of them, and no meeting of the stockholders of the Company, without formal call, and any such resolution or agreement shall have the same force and effect as if it had been adopted at a formal meeting of such Board of Directors or stockholders called as required by law.

Article X.
The highest indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall be subject at any time shall not exceed the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars.

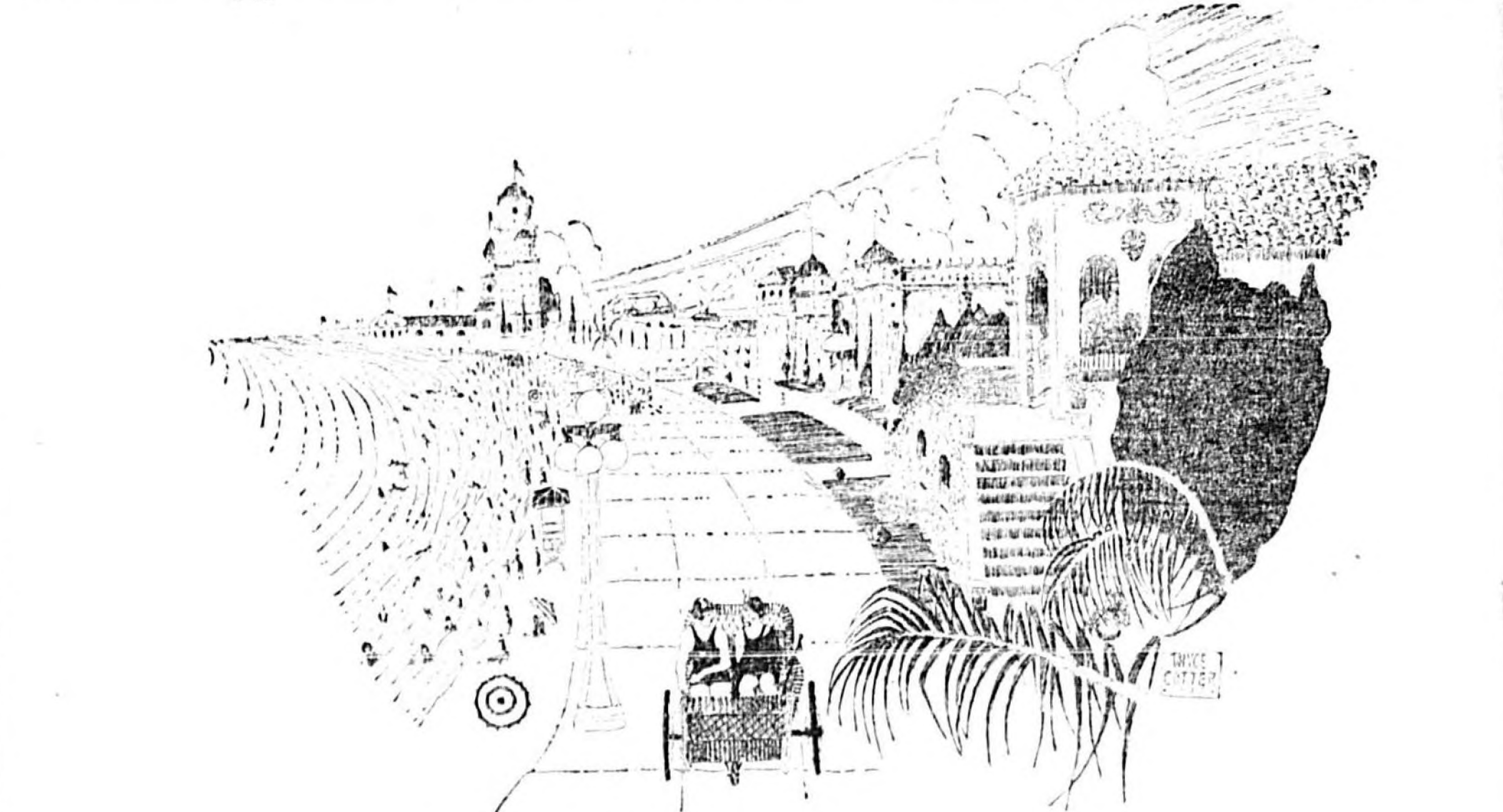

135 ASKING LAW EXAMINATION BY SUPREME COURT

As Average Will Go To Tallahassee Tuesday For Questioning By High Judges

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 20.—The largest class in the history of the Florida Supreme court will assemble here next Tuesday to take the late bar examination. The clerk of the court has received and listed 135 applications, and all of those who have applied are expected to be on hand, with the possible exception of two or three, who are expected to be absent.

This class represents a number that is four times as large as the average class that took the examination prior to a year or so ago, it is stated. Up until that time the average ran around 35. Among the applicants who will begin the three days' grind Tuesday morning that will end late Thursday evening, are four women, which is also a record. The examinations are all written, involving about one hundred questions and answers. Each justice prepares a list of twenty questions, which must be answered by each of the applicants, the answers to be written with pen. As the students assemble on Tuesday morning the entire court will be on the bench, but after the preliminaries have been finished, the justice whose questions are to be answered on the first day will be left alone on the bench to preside on the first day. Then the other justices will take turns in looking after the examinees as their respective questions are being answered.

Should any of the applicants run across questions the intent of which are not thoroughly understood, they are privileged to ask the presiding justice for enlightenment, but of course, the reply in no way indicates what they answer should be.

The appellate business of the court will be practically at a standstill until the examinations are finished and all the papers graded and the lists of those who passed are made public. It is expected that close to a month of the court's time will be taken up in this way with the unusually large class this time.

The court is finding difficulty in providing sufficient space for the large class, the court room having a seating capacity for only about one hundred persons.

Most of the applicants are Floridians.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, deems it advisable, as a necessary public improvement, to pave, re-pave, hard surface and re-hard surface with sheet asphalt on a 6 inch rock base, Plumosa Drive from Sanford Avenue East 1060 feet, a width of 32 feet; that all of said paving, re-paving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of Plumosa Drive, as aforesaid, shall be done in strict compliance with the plans, specifications, profiles and estimates therefor, now on file in the office of the City Manager of the City of Sanford, Florida, which said plans, specifications, profiles and

estimates have been heretofore approved by the City Commission and constitute the plans and specifications for said proposed improvement of Plumosa Drive from Sanford Avenue East 1060 feet, a width of 32 feet, and this Commission hereby declares the necessity for the paving, re-paving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of said portion of Plumosa Drive as aforesaid, as a necessary public improvement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a total expenditure not exceeding Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred Thirty One and 42-100 (\$13,531.42) Dollars, is hereby authorized to cover the cost of paving, re-paving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing Plumosa Drive from Sanford Avenue East 1060 feet, a width of 32 feet, which said sum of Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred Thirty One and 42-100 (\$13,531.42) Dollars is the total estimated cost of said improvement; that the entire cost of the improvement aforesaid, shall be assessed against all property abutting and fronting upon that portion of Plumosa Drive from Sanford Avenue East 1060 feet, to be so improved by the paving, re-paving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of said portion of Plumosa Drive a width of 32 feet, and against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous, or bounding and abutting upon said improvement; that Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred Thirty One and 42-100 (\$13,531.42) Dollars, is the total estimated cost of said contemplated improvement in the paving, re-paving, hard surfacing and re-hard surfacing of said portion of Plumosa Drive to be specially assessed against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon said improvement; that the sum of \$6.86 is the estimated cost per front foot for said improvement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That it is the determination of this Commission that all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon Plumosa Drive from Sanford Avenue East 1060 feet, will be benefited by the improvement provided for by this resolution, and that the special assessments to be made and entered against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such contemplated improvement shall be made upon a foot frontage basis; that is to say, that in the preparation of the special assessment roll covering the contemplated improvement, such special assessments shall be determined and prorated according to the foot frontage of the respective properties specially benefited by said improvement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Tax Assessor and the City Clerk of the City of Sanford, Florida, in accordance with the provisions of Section 101 and 102 of the Charter of the City of Sanford, Florida, shall proceed without delay to make a special assessment roll, assessing the special benefits to be received as the result of the improvement contemplated against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such improvement, and upon the completion of said assessment roll, to cause a copy thereof to be published two times consecutively, once each week, in a newspaper published in Sanford, Florida, attaching to said special assessment roll so published, a notice directed to all property owners interested in said special assessments, stating in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Sanford, Florida, a definite time and place where complaints will be heard and when said special assessment roll will be finally confirmed by the City Commission sitting as an Equalizing Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the special assessments provided for by this resolution to be made and entered against the property bounding and abutting upon said improvement shall be payable at the option of the property owners owning property bounding and abutting upon such improvement as follows: either in full within thirty days after said assessments shall stand equalized, approved and confirmed, or in ten equal annual installments with interest at the rate of eight per cent per annum upon all deferred payments from and after the time said special assessments shall be and stand finally equalized, approved and confirmed, and,

The Northwest Quarter (NW¼) of the Northeast Quarter (NE¼) of Section 1, Township 20, South of Range 30 East, and also

The Northwest Quarter (NW¼) of Section 1, Township 20, South of Range 30 East, less the portion in Lake Jennie and less a strip of land 20 feet wide around this portion of Lake Jennie with the inside boundary described as follows, to-wit: Beginning 165 feet North of the Southwest Corner of the Northwest Quarter (NW¼) of said Section 1, run North 82 degrees 40 minutes East 337.6 feet; thence due East 150 feet; thence

South 58 degrees 14 minutes East 247 feet; thence South 87 degrees 32 minutes East 359.5 feet; thence South 35 degrees 27 minutes East 160 feet more or less to the South boundary of said Northwest Quarter (NW¼) of said Section 1.

Section Two. That this ordinance shall be published once a week for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper published in the City of Sanford, Florida.

Section Three. That this ordinance shall be and become effective immediately upon its passage and adoption.

"We will want a sunny nursery," Patri continues quoting, "and a couple of rooms for little children. We will want a place where they can play in severe weather and we must plan the garden so they can have a place in it for play and work. You can leave a space in the attic, too, unfinished you know. We want them to rummage there and play among the trunks and old books and maybe listen to the rain on the roof. Please build the house about the children, so they will have a real home."

Patri, of course, had in mind the building of a permanent home. He does not live in Florida. He does not know that it is the fashion here to build a home for selling purposes. Everywhere is that spirit of money-making, everywhere that on-the-crest-of-the-wave living, with its restless exciting wait for the next plunge to the top of a higher wave.

The grown people think it is better to buy and sell on money-making terms, but it must be working strange kinks into the nature of a child never to have his very own home, his very own garden, his very own den in which he rules supreme. Children deserve to have real homes.

So in this very building of houses to sell, why not some planning for the children? Just what has come into the hearts of people who build houses for show, and for sale, and never give a thought to provisions for the children whom Patri wants to believe will be "the most important function of the home for the next twenty years?"

IF WISCONSIN carries out too thoroughly a scheme that would drive industries and employers to other states there will be plenty of applications for the unemployment allowance, and that allowance won't be as good as regular wages.

TWO MORE of the biggest concerns in Wisconsin now plan to move out. If employers move, of course the workers will follow, for they can't live forever on the unemployment allowance.

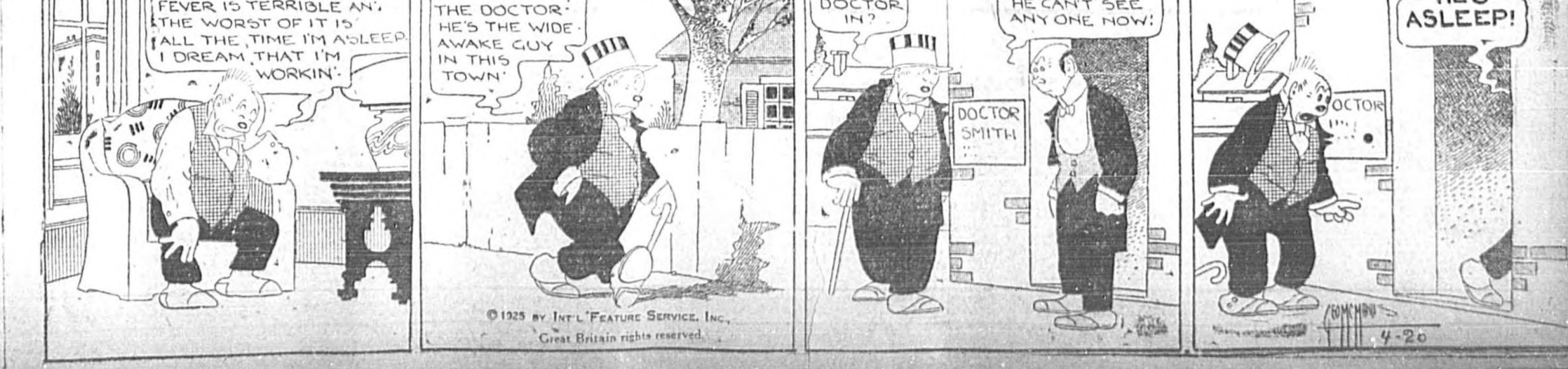

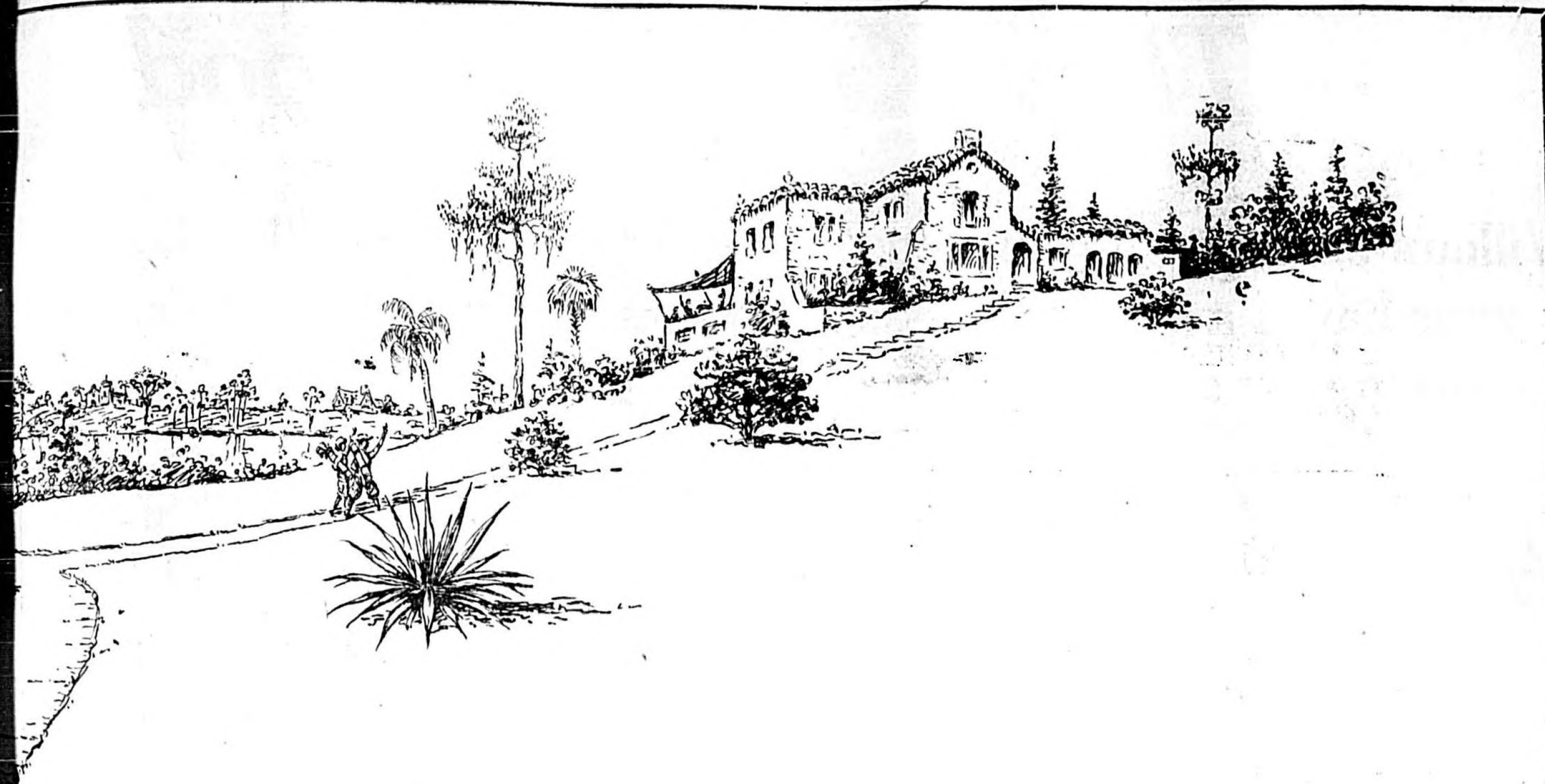
