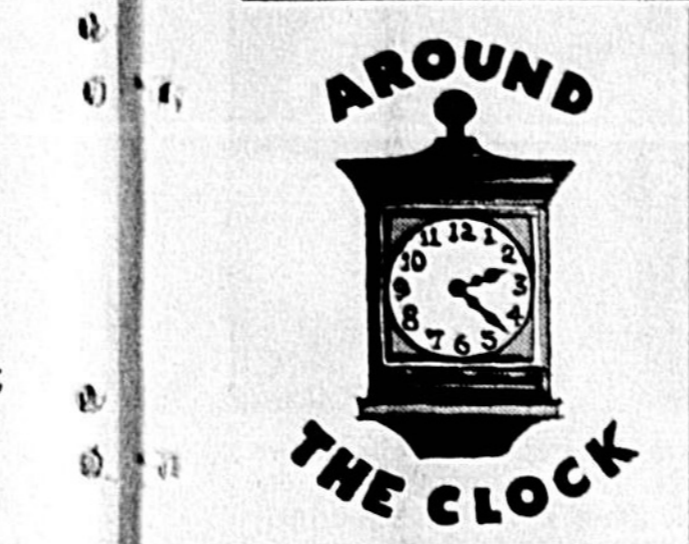

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Fifteen waves of American bombers pounded a major oil depot in North Viet Nam Sunday and touched off 33 fires in the big storage complex... U.S. Air Force jets struck the depot Sunday, dropping 20 tons of bombs...

In South Viet Nam, fighting died down in the combined U.S. Marine-South Vietnamese drive against an estimated 2,000 North Vietnamese army regu- lars eight miles south of the demilitarized zone separating North and South Viet Nam... U.S. headquarters reported two small-scale probing attacks by the North Vietnamese today.

Another Hanoi broadcast quoted the National Liberation Front, the Viet Cong leadership, as saying the guerrillas would intensify their war in the south... U.S. Air Force B-52s softened up the area three times last week, and the big bombers struck again Sunday while a massive force of B-57 bombers carried out the main attack...

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Publicity Chairmen Note! Tips To Report Club News

If you are your club's publicity or public relations chairman, figuratively speaking, you've embarked on a career in bridge building. Your job is to build a bridge of communication between your organization and the public. One of the principal tools of public relations is publicity. Every person and organization has public relations—good and bad. The basis of public relations is good programming. Publicity makes the worthwhile known. Work for a program with built-in public relations power. The program designed to win new members or stimulate renewed interest among present members? Will it prove that you have a healthy organization, strong of character and purposeful? Does it have spark, imagination and vitality? Is it timely? Your local newspaper serves as the media with the largest coverage. An average of 85 per cent of the adult population reads newspapers. Competing for newspaper space is keen. Your copy will vie for space with war, crime and politics as well as news from hundreds of organizations. The Herald carries news of some 350 organizations in Seminole County. It will help you at the beginning of your term to talk with the editor who will handle your newspaper publicity. Write a brief history of your organization, outline your projects for the coming year, giving important dates, if your club does not have a Yearbook. Find out about deadlines and reporting procedure. Short announcements may be phoned in or a photographer, extend your invitation several days in advance and during busy seasons, one week in advance. Provide the photographer with a place to work when she arrives and be on hand to answer questions. Help the photographers by suggesting several picture subjects, but don't insist they follow your lead. Round up the people the photographer wants in the picture, carefully weeding out others. Identify by writing down the names in left to right order, so she can proceed to another assignment as quickly as possible. Remember she has other appointments with other organizations. Since there is more than one newspaper in our community, don't duplicate copy and don't discriminate. Write individual stories for each newspaper and give them the same release date. If a particular release date is desired, get your notices into the Herald office at least two days in advance of date. Don't wait until the day before your club is having its big charity event of the year and expect a miracle. A reminder, look at your competition who has already asked for space well in advance. However, don't delay reporting events that have already happened. When your club would like to report events that have already happened. 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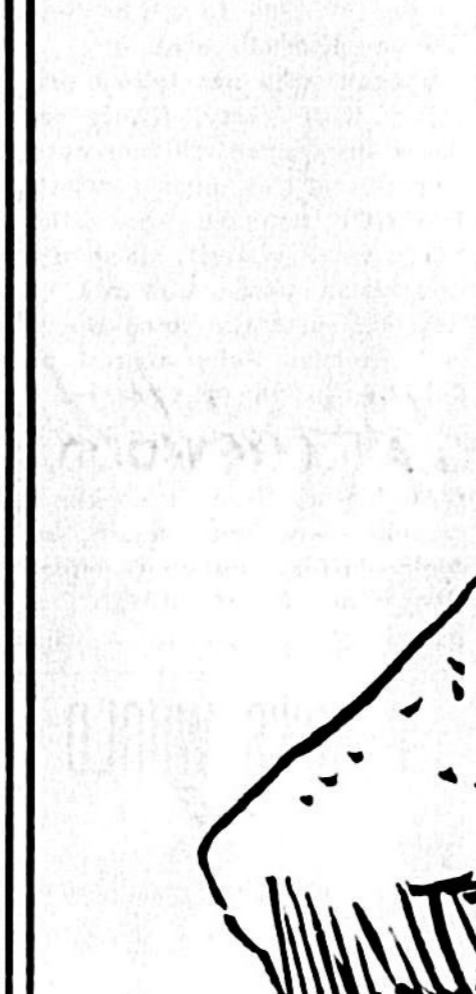

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Confession Rule Hamstrings Police

In recent weeks there has been, among law enforcement agencies, quite a furor over a 1964 Supreme Court decision which cast doubt on the worth of a confession in obtaining a conviction for a committed crime.

In a 4-3 decision in the case of Escobedo vs. Illinois—the Supreme Court held that a confession obtained from a suspect during police interrogation, before he had been accused of a crime, could not be used as evidence, unless the suspect had been warned of his rights and permitted to see his lawyer.

In this case, Danny Escobedo—sentenced to 20 years in prison for slaying his brother-in-law—claimed in his appeal to the high tribunal that he was not allowed to consult with his lawyer, though the attorney was in the police station attempting to see his client.

For several years the Court has been criticized for encroaching on the rights of the State, and the latest basic case

being admissible into evidence.

Fifth, the burden upon the state is such that the law enforcement officers must be prepared to give documented evidence that there was an intelligent and knowing waiver of the constitutional rights to remain silent and to an attorney. If any statement obtained is to be admissible, by any statement is meant anything which might be in the least incriminating, including exculpatory statements or alibis which might be used for impeachment.

In his memo, the state's attorney cautions, "remember the warnings are a ritual, one that must be followed in all cases regardless of knowledge or previous experience of the accused, and some articulated response is called by the defendant, either orally that he knows he has such rights and waives the same or more preferably that such a waiver is made in writing in the defendant's own hand or by his signing a written form."

A factor which perhaps strengthens the police stand against the high tribunal's ruling is that fact FBI reports show 2.7 million "serious crimes" were committed in the U.S. last year, or a 16 percent hike in the last seven years.

Most of these crimes were committed by "repeaters," criminals previously convicted for other serious offenses. The great majority are offenses under state laws or municipal ordinances, not the Federal Code.

The state's attorney ended his memo to the law enforcement officers by saying, "What we may question the reasoning of the majority (of the court) for having assumed an overly idealistic approach, evidencing a lack of understanding of the facts of life in the fight against crime for the protection of the public, we cannot question the integrity of the five justices of the majority as to their belief in the position they have taken."

The conclusion to the memorandum continued, "...it would seem reasonable that since the American people are being subjected to an experiment of living without the protection secured by the law enforcement officers' interrogation of suspects, then some form of statistics should be kept in order that this experiment can be fairly evaluated. The actual use of confessions were not convincing to the Court, and so statistics, exhibiting an up-to-date record for confessions and statements obtained by interrogation, must be kept as a permanent record for the future. These statistics must be such that they can be verified by those who are not involved in law enforcement. This is not an idle request. If the American people are to be the subject of an experiment, they certainly have every right to view the result of this experiment."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Almost anywhere you look at the present political scene the tousled head of Robert F. Kennedy seems to be a part of the picture.

Glancing around: Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon says he is optimistic about Republican prospects in the fall elections because the Democrats are divided.

In New York, hopefuls for the Democratic nomination for governor are wondering what Kennedy, the state's junior senator, may do in relation to the nomination.

He names as one area of division what he calls the rivalry between Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and Kennedy.

In South Carolina, the Republican committee man, figuring there is and Kennedy sentiment among his state's voters, says he thinks his party's chances of beating Ernest F. Hollings, the Democratic nominee for the Senate, are enhanced by the friendship between Hollings and Kennedy.

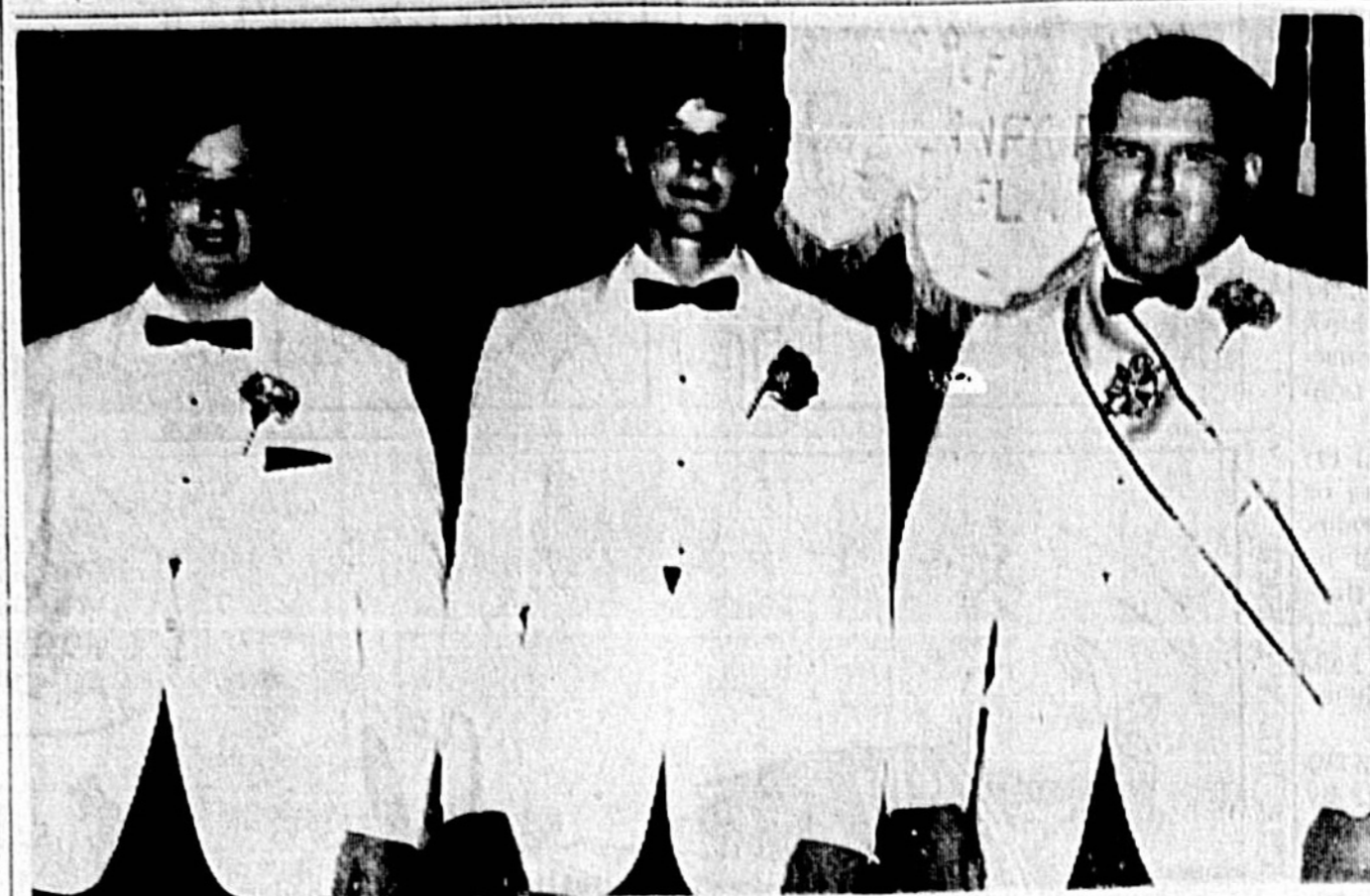

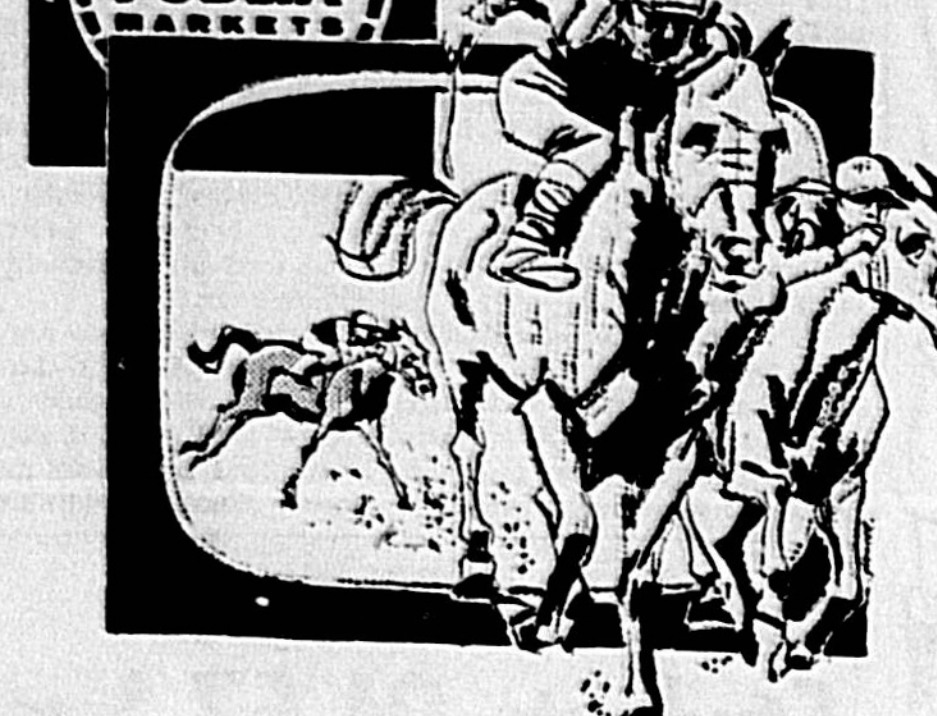

"Don't worry, mom, I have a job to do here, but I feel sure God is close to me."
 These were the words Sgt. Charles A. Gaines, 23, U. S. Army, wrote to his mother, Mrs. Charlie May Gaines, of Castle Brewer Court, Sanford, before he gave his life for his country in the jungles of Viet Nam.

Today Mrs. Gaines received the Purple Heart award posthumously for her soldier son, who suffered a mortal wound in combat on May 21. This was Mrs. Gaines' second Purple Heart. The first one was awarded for her son, Fred, who was wounded in Viet Nam on Sept. 18, 1965, and has since been discharged from the Army and is now working in Sanford. "God could have taken them both but He made His choice," said Mrs. Gaines. "Charlie was always a good boy but he couldn't fall at anything with God on his side. That's the way I tried to raise my children," said Mrs. Gaines. She has two other children, a daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Brown, and a younger son, Willie Perry, 20.

The Purple Heart, one of the nation's highest honors, was awarded to Mrs. Gaines at City Hall ceremonies today by Mayor A. L. Wilson and Maj. R. L. Anderson, of the ROTC at Stetson University.
