

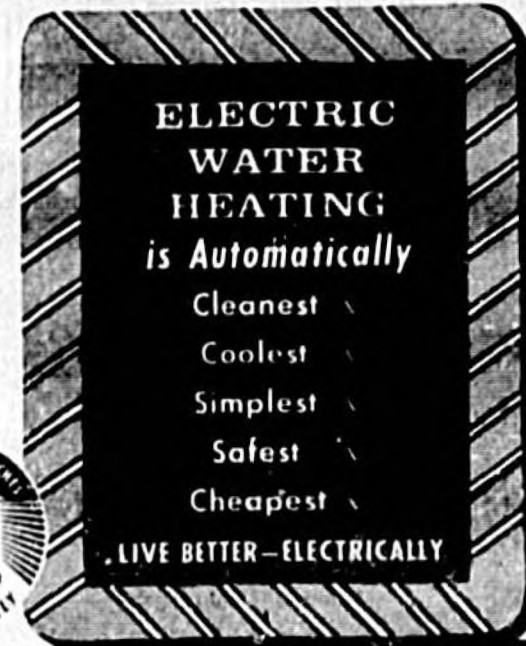

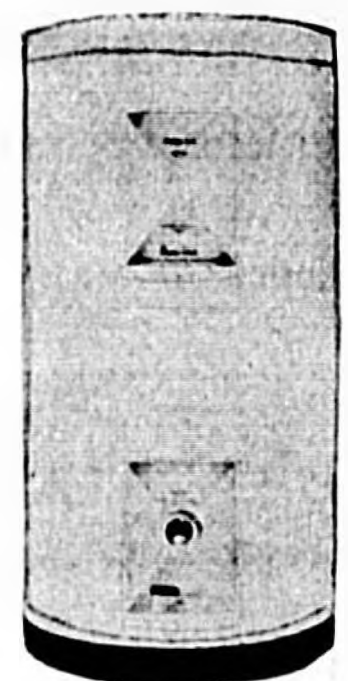

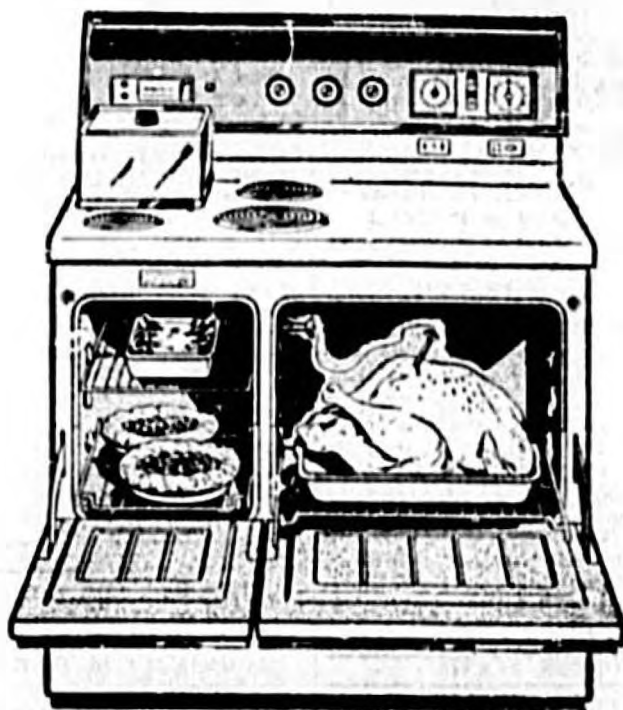

Vernon W. Dunn, Democratic nominee for the District 4 seat on the County Commission, spent six hours in Seminole County jail early today on charges of driving while intoxicated.

Dulles Says Reds Don't Want Peace, Seek World Rule

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said today that the Chinese Communists apparently want to keep the fighting going in the Far East and are not interested in sincere efforts to promote peace.

Dulles said the Nationalists, on the other hand, have renounced the use of force to carry out their avowed mission "to bring about the restoration of freedom to the people on the mainland."

He said the Reds seemed to have broken their own cease-fire proclamation because they want "to throw roadblocks in the way of stabilized tranquility."

Propaganda Firing
He added that "it is possible that the thing is more for psychological than for military purposes."

Dulles said the American nation can be thankful for the Nationalist government because "it resists those forces whose central purpose is world rule and, to that end, the encirclement and ultimate defeat of the United States."

"The Communists seem to believe that they can best achieve domination of the Western Pacific if they perpetuate confusion and uncertainty and if they alternately give hopes for peace and fears of war," Dulles said in his statement.

They accompany their erratic action with intensive propaganda to the effect that if the people of Asia would unitedly expel the United States from the Western Pacific, then all would be well.

Weeks resigned effective not later than Nov. 10. Strauss had stepped down as AEC chairman June 30. He has been serving as special assistant to the President on atom-for-peace matters.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The tussle between President Eisenhower and former President Truman over responsibility for the disgraceful devaluation of the U. S. dollar and for spending the nation into almost unmanageable debt is one of those "who struck John?" disputes.

"Who struck John?" was slang; World War II idiocy of any dispute in which the disputants just went "round and round" without arriving anywhere.

This fiscal "who struck John?" dispute relating to the shambles in which the fiscal affairs of the nation have fallen can be exposed, however, to certain mathematical checks and measurements. So exposed, the dispute between the President and the former President just about adds up to a draw bet. They are both wrong or, more precisely, each is about half right. Take spending for example.

Science, Religion Travel Same Road

Science and religion are "remarkably similar" in their approach to truth.

That is the conclusion of Dr. William G. Pollard, one of the few men in the world who qualifies as a professional in both fields.

Pollard is a distinguished atomic physicist who serves, on weekdays, as executive director of the Institute of Nuclear Studies at Oak Ridge, Tenn. Since 1954 he has also been an ordained Episcopal minister, serving as priest-in-charge of St. Francis Church at Norris, Tenn.

His dual experience has made Pollard acutely aware of a contrast in popular attitudes toward science and religion.

"People think of science as an objective body of knowledge that can be 'demonstrated' to be true," he said in an interview. "They think of religion as a private, subjective experience that has to be 'taken on faith'."

The Same Way

To Pollard, this reflects the "special prejudices of our contemporary culture" rather than any inherent difference in the "fundamental characteristics" of scientific and religious truth.

"It is difficult to 'demonstrate' to a non-scientist even the elementary principles of physics," he said. "If a person really wants to prove to himself the truth of the whole structure of physics, there is only one way to do it. He must take the long, hard, disciplined route of becoming a physicist. Otherwise, he is simply taking on faith the validity of the insights that are shared by those on the inside of the community of physics."

"It's precisely the same way with Christianity. The only way to prove its truth is to become a Christian — a full Christian, deeply involved in the church, under its discipline, sharing its life. Then the truth of it breathes through."

Ebbing Rapidly

Pollard knows that many people who would unhesitatingly accept his findings as a physicist will be skeptical of his findings as a Christian.

"This is part of the mindset of our age," he said. "We have been conditioned for nearly two centuries to accept uncritically the idea that science has a more reliable access to reality than religion."

Pollard believes this prejudice against religion which has dominated intellectual circles since the 19th Century has been ebbing rapidly.

"Everywhere I go," he said, "I run into scientists and university professors who have followed the same path I did into the Christian faith — not because of any cataclysmic personal crisis, but simply because they have found in it the ultimate answers to man's deepest questions."

Open House Set Sunday By North Orlando Homes

One of the largest land development and home building projects in Florida, North Orlando—will present the first of a series of model homes with a grand opening, 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. Sunday. "Our goal is 8,000 homes in addition to planned sites for shopping centers, churches, schools and recreation parks," it was announced yesterday by E. Raymond Moss, president of the North Orlando Company and Arnold P. Rosen, president of Masterbuilders Corp., exclusive builders of North Orlando Homes. According to Moss and Rosen, both of Miami, an estimated \$100 million expenditure is planned for completion of the project, located on a 3,400-acre tract in Seminole County, about midway between Orlando and Sanford, just east of U. S. Highway 17-92. Skirting the Longwood-Orlando Road, the property is high, rolling land with picturesque wooded areas. "We believe Central Florida offers the greatest new growth potential in all of Florida and we selected this location for our new city because of its natural beauty, advantages and nearness to centers of activity in Orlando, Winter Park and Sanford," Moss stated. Proposed areas that will make up this vast city project will include 650 acres, in the first section, for the residential area and a larger section for ranch homes with two, five and ten-acre plots. More than 76 acres have been allocated for centralized shopping centers and commercial property; 15 acres for school sites and 15 acres for church sites; 43 acres for apartment buildings and six acres for municipal and public buildings. Plans have been drawn for a 57-acre recreation park that would offer North Orlando families healthful outdoor activities such as swimming (plans call for an Olympic-size pool with cabanas), picnic outings, archery, tennis, shuffleboard, softball and a chip and putt course for golfers. "Our new city has been carefully planned by expert city planners and designers; we have attempted to combine all features that make for pleasant Florida living and desirable conveniences," Moss explained. "North Orlando will have its own water system and sewage disposal (no septic tanks)."

NEW YORK (UPI)—Last season CBS-TV folded a rather plodding drama series called "Climax" and Wednesday night CBS-TV unveiled something that looked suspiciously like "The Son of Climax."

It was a taped thriller series called "Persuit" and like most of the Climax shows, it featured away an hour on a heavy-footed script. Like Climax, it was uninteresting in its chase of cliches. Like Climax, its acting and direction were mechanical.

It's too bad that this should be so because there is a need on TV for a solid adventure or thriller series — the sort of thing Alfred Hitchcock used to do so superbly for movies.

Wednesday night's Persuit starred MacDonald Carey, Stu Erwin, Carol Lynley and Vivian Nathan and all of them seemed rather listless. It also starred Sal Mineo, a young actor whose carefully pomaded hair drips down his forehead in a cloying ringlets. I found it difficult under such circumstances to feel any rapport with him.

CBS-TV's "U.S. Steel Hour" dumped Edward Andrews and Faye Emerson Wednesday night

into a gummy aspic, "Secret in the Family." It was billed as a comedy and it did have a few crackly lines, but somehow, it all hardly seemed worth the trouble.

Over at NBC-TV, Milton Berle (Herald Carl Sandburg) in a short season of songs and reading Wednesday night. Yes, I said Milton Berle and Carl Sandburg. I don't want to get into a discussion of Sandburg. To anyone interested in poetry, his defects are obvious. His most genuine gifts lie in the banal, his lack of precision, his limited intellectual range.

However, it's interesting to watch even a poet of peripheral importance on something like the Berle show. Berle treated Sandburg as if he were some national hero. He read E. E. Cummings and Robert Lowell and Richard Wilbur.

The channel swim: The brains behind NBC-TV's "Brains and Brawn" deny it but there are persistent reports the quiz is headed for the beyond. "Stars of Jazz" will return to ABC-TV on Nov. 9 when "Encounter" folds.

"The Invisible Man," a half-hour series filmed in England, will be dropped into the Tuesday CBS-TV spot now held by "Keep Talking." CBS-TV hopes to find another niche for "Keep Talking," possibly Sunday night. Ring Crosby will guest on NBC-TV's special one-hour "Dean Martin Show" Nov. 22.

ABC-TV's "The Rifleman" out-trended the debut of NBC-TV's "George Burns Show," 38.8 to 35.6 — CBS-TV's Arthur Godfrey ran a poor third with a 9.7. There's a good possibility that ABC-TV may replace "Confessions" with another series, "One Step Beyond."

The oil company which combed on Nat Hiken's proposed series, "Man of the Hour," now is warming up to the show again. Jack Webb of NBC-TV's "Dragnet" is the author of a book, "The Badge," which will be published next Monday.

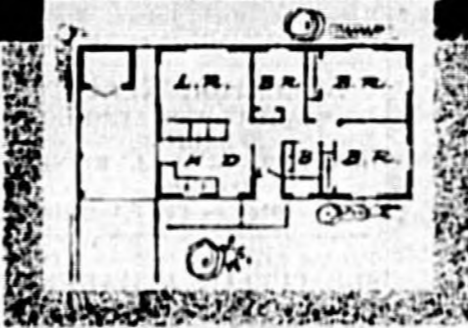

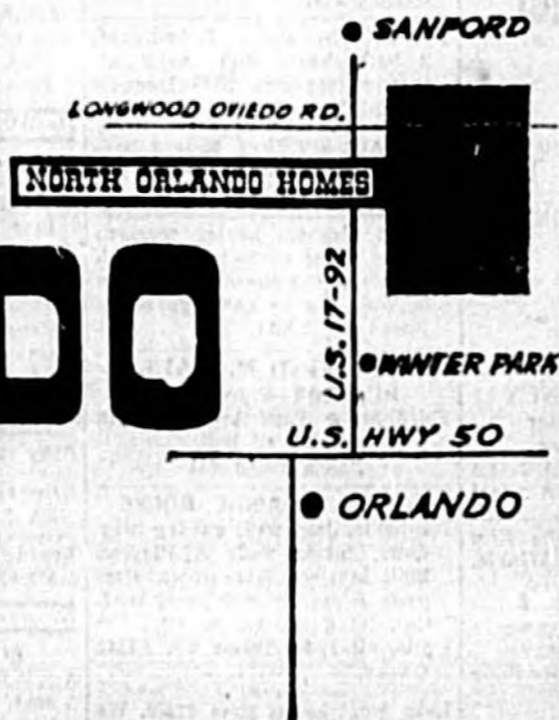
