



Federal Court Orders Lewis To Stand Trial For Contempt

Mayor Gut Proclaims Week of Courtesy

Goldsborough Main-
tains Right To Use
Injunction Against
United Mine Union

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29
—John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers today received a double setback in federal court.

Judge T. Alton Goldsborough ordered Lewis to stand trial for contempt. At the same time the judge upheld the court's right to enjoin a walkout in the soft coal mines despite federal anti-injunction laws.

In other ruling, Lewis' motion for desegregation of the contempt action brought by the government was rejected.



Pier Pirates Running Rampant Along New York's Waterfront

NEW YORK, Nov. 21—On a Manhattan pier, burly, denominated longshoremen drops a box of costly watches. The cartons open. Watches vanish...

A big truck lumbered off a dock. The gate checker nods: "empty."

A wary customs man peers inside—at five cases of cloth...

These are the work of pier thieves who, swarming over this, the world's greatest port, like hordes of wharf rats, are strip pliers docks and cargoes of loot which ship line officials say will total million of dollars this year.

Since the war end, pilferage along New York harbor's 771 dallying, seething miles of waterfront has increased staggeringly—as much, some pier people figure, as 100 percent over any past year.

Whole Cargoes Stolen

Entire shipments of liquor,

lumber, meat and textiles have been stolen, trucked off the piers,

"piracy."

No one has failed the port's total losses to pilferers, because most steamship companies refuse to disclose their individual losses.

One line's claim agent, though, says that 10 years ago he received about \$3,000 a year in claims.

In the past 10 months he's had \$250,000.

In a move to crush the evil, waterfront interests—ship lines, stevedoring companies, railroads, tug operators, watching services, insurance organizations—are reviving the Bureau for the Suppression of Theft and Pilferage they formed just after World War I.

Members have, so far, blamed the biggest of the thefts on organized gangs. Strikingly few pilferers have been jailed. Evidence is difficult to obtain.

Shipping firms are reluctant to file complaints against workers because of (1) fear of retaliation—work stoppages, say—by other employees, and (2) fear of suit for false arrest.

The men on whom most of the thievery is blamed are those who work on the docks, the brawny and clam-silent longshoremen, sailors and truckers.

Some Is Inevitable

Shipping lines agree that some stealing on the piers is inevitable. But they say the situation is worse than it was in 1939-40 when the harbor reached "a state of open

lawlessness."

Some of the loot was found

packed around motors of trucks chugging off the dock. Some supposedly were sailed away in small craft. On the dock itself were 700 scattered, empty cases.

So goes the pilfering... a foray in Swiss watches off the S.S. Yaka, \$500 worth of bulky lumber off Canadian dock office machines... leather goods...

A barometer of the growing theft could be the capture of four thieves by the Customs Service's alert port patrolmen. In August, 1946, they nabbed 10 (in addition to customs violators). In August they held 13.

Even this year the figures have mounted: 25 in January, 36 in March, 426 in May, 149 in July.

Charged with stemming the tide of thievery is the city police's waterfront squad of 100 Detectives in a crack, colorful outfit. Lt. Johnny Gordes

Armed, tough

If the port thieves are under the thumb of the law anywhere it is at the Army's sprawling port of embarkation in Brooklyn's giant base, Bayonne, Atlantic. It is the secret basket for Europe's occupation troops. From its three ports millions of dollars worth of commodities are piped overseas.

There the walls virtually have ears. Uniformed guards supplement Army Criminal Investigations Department agents. GI plainclothesmen who dress as dock workers and handle with the perfunctory handiwork binding the ships.

Primarily on other docks in the harbor is pilferage general. Yet in one recent month alone 220 cases were investigated on the basis of wharfies, 220 arrests followed.

A CID agent who smells loaves on a longshoreman's breath suspicious he must have stolen it. He takes the suspect, surrounds him atop a nearby stack of crates to watch him take more. The pilferer is nailed as he prepares to leave the base.

In one week the CID department recovered a truck tire, a complete radio transmitter, kitchen ink, motor oil, liquor, cash, assorted foodstuffs and 444

items. And still loot somehow seeps out of the base, past the high fences and the armed guards.

In 1921 the Jacksonville Beaches boasted a "permitted" population of 250 persons. In 1946 the Jacksonville Beaches, subject to the country's fastest growing permanent developments, has 10,000 permanent residents.

U.S. Attacks Russia's Plan For Disarming

Senator Connally De-
clares Russia Bans
Atom Bomb But Re-
tains Other Arms

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 2.—(P)—The United States today attacked the dis-armament program which Russia has proposed for the United Nations.

Senator Tom Connally, speaking for the United States, said today the idea of the Russian program seems to be to get rid of the atom bomb and then place all other arms questions under the Security Council where they would be subject to what he called the "atom bomb of the veto."

The Soviet proposal, said Connally, is too narrow and too circumscribed.

The Texas Senator said the Russian program while emphasizing that the A-bomb must be outlawed makes no mention of jet-propelled weapons or poison gas.

Connally said: "We think a man dead of poison gas is just as dead as if he were struck by an atomic bomb."

Connally said Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov had accepted the principle of international inspection and control. He then asked:

"How can there be international control if any member of the Security Council can rise in his seat and veto inspection?"

"That is not international control," said the Texas Senator. "That is individual control. We insist that the veto must not apply on inspection and control."

Connally said the United States insists that measures of control must be effective, and pounding the table he added, "that means effective."

Grand Jury To Probe Slaying Of 4 Negroes

Evidence Uncovered May Be Given To State For Action

United States District Judge P. Hoyt Davis made his charge to a 28 man grand jury called this morning in Georgia to investigate the slaying of four negroes near Monroe, Ga., last July 26. The jury, composed predominantly of farmers with two negro members, heard Judge Davis make only indirect reference to the massacre at Apalachee Bridge in calling on them to probe for violation of federal laws.

Judge Davis pointed out "the federal court has no jurisdiction over the offense of murder unless the crime is committed on a federal reservation, or on the high seas, or in certain situations where federal officers are killed in line of duty."

He did commit the jury, if it found evidence of violation of law that does not fall under federal jurisdiction, to furnish evidence to state officials. Judge Davis reminded the jury that "in commission of an offense where the major violation might fall within jurisdiction of the state courts there still might be violation of certain United States criminal statutes. This is the closest he came to making reference to violation of civil rights which must be the basis of federal prosecution in trying

some 100 witnesses have been subpoenaed by the government to appear before the grand jury. Central figure in the case is 50 year old Loy Garrison, planter and one-time wholesaler, who reported that a mob of about 20 armed men stopped him at a bridge east of Monroe at dusk on July 25 and took two negro men and their wives from the car. One of the victims, Roger Malcolm, had been released that day in Garrison's custody pending trial for stabbing a white man.

Utmost secrecy shrouds the government's case which has been four months in preparation at the instance of President Truman. It is assumed that the violence gathered by a score of special FBI investigators in questioning 2500 witnesses will be made available to the jury.
