Pier Pirates Running Rampant Along New York's Waterfront

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—On a Manhattan pier a burly, domineering longshoreman drops a box of costly watches. The carton breaks open. Watches vanish...
A big truck lurches off a dock. The gate checker nods: "empty." A wary customs man peers inside—
These are the work of pier thieves who, swarming over this, the world's greatest port, like hordes of wharf rats, are stripping docks and cargoes of loot which ship line officials say will total millions of dollars this year.
Since the war's end, pilferage along New York harbor's 771 dingy, seething miles of waterfront has increased staggeringly—
—so much, some pier people figure, as 100 percent over any past year.
Whole Cargoes Stolen
Entire shipments of liquor, lumber, meat and textiles have been stolen, trucked off the piers,

or floated away in small boats.
But such hauls are what the waterfront respectfully refers to as "the big stuff." It is the dis-solving mountain of little stuff—canned goods, candy, beer, pen-cilities that the thieves can use themselves or sell easily—that is harder to stop, harder to trace.
Either way, the pattern of pilferage is much the same. Goods simply disappear, smoke-like. Or else boxes are dragged—or split with the heavy, ugly cargo hooks that longshoremen wear in their belts—and the goods trickles slowly away.
The men on whom most of the thievery is blamed are those who work on the docks, the brawny and clan-silent longshoremen, sailors and truckers.
Some is inevitable
Shipping lines agree that some stealing on the piers is inevitable. But they say the situation is worse than it was in 1919-20 when the harbor reached "a state of open piracy."
No one has tallied the port's total losses to pilferers, because most stevedoring companies refuse to disclose their individual losses.
One line's claim agent, though, says that 10 years ago he received about \$3,500 a year in claims. In the past 10 months he's had \$250,000.
In a move to crush the evil, waterfront interests—ship lines, stevedoring companies, railroads, tug operators, watching services, insurance organizations—are reviv-ing the Bureau for the Suppression of Theft and Pilferage they formed just after World War I.
Members have, so far, blamed the biggest of the thefts on organized gangs. Strikingly few pilferers have been jailed. Evidence is difficult to obtain.
Shipping firms are reluctant to file complaints against workers because of (1) fear of retaliation work stoppages, say—by other employees, and (2) fear of suit for false arrest.
Along the Hudson River 2,144 cases of scarce Scotch whiskey, out of a load of 75,000 cases, disappeared off the freighter Empire Balfour.
Some of the loot was found

packed around motors of trucks chugging off the dock. Some supposedly was sailed away in small craft. On the dock itself were 700 scattered, empty cases.
So goes the pilfering... a forlorn in Swiss watches off the S.S. Yaka... \$500 worth of bulky lumber off an army dock... office machines... leather goods...
A barometer of the growing theft could be the capture of pier thieves by the Customs Service's short port patrolmen. In August, 1946, they included in their addition to customs violators, last August they held 153.
Even this year the figures have soared: 58 in January, 98 in March, 126 in May, 149 in July.
Charged with skimming the tide of thieves is the city police's waterfront squad of "detectives." It has a stark, colorful death, Lt. Johnny Gades.
Aras Gads, Tough
If the pier thieves are under the thumb of the law anywhere it is at the Army's sprawling port of embarkation on a Brooklyn pier. Any casual investigator from Department 44 plain clothesmen who dress as dock workers and mingle with the peering, lanky men loading the ships.
Probably on no other docks in the harbor is pilferage so rampant. Yet in one recent month alone 226 cases were investigated on the pier of wharves, 100 arrests followed.
A CIO agent who sniffs upon a longshoreman's breath surmises he must have stolen it. He trails the suspect, snarls the stop a nearby stack of crates to watch him take note. The pilferer is called as he prepares to leave the pier. The CIO detachment recovered a truck tire, a complete radio transmitter, stolen truck motor oil, liquor and assorted foodstuffs and other items.
And still last somehow scraps out of the base, past the high fences and the armed guards.

U.S. Attacks Russia's Plan For Disarming

Senator Connally Declares Russia Bans Atom Bomb But Retains Other Arms

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 2.—(AP)—The United States today attacked the disarmament program which Russia has proposed for the United Nations.

Senator Tom Connally, speaking for the United States, said today the idea of the Russian program seems to be to get rid of the atom bomb and then place all other arms questions under the Security Council where they would be subject to what he called the "atom bomb of the veto."

The Soviet proposal, said Connally, is "too narrow and too circumscribed."

The Texas Senator said the Russian program, while emphasizing that the A-bomb must be outlawed, makes no mention of jet-propelled weapons or poison gas.

"We think a man dead of poison gas is just as dead as if he were struck by an atomic bomb."

Connally said Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov had accepted the principles of international inspection and control. He then asked:

"How can there be international control if any member of the Security Council can rise in his seat and veto inspection?"

"That is not international control," said the Texas Senator. "That is individual control. We insist that the veto must not apply on inspection and control."

Connally said the United States insists that measures of control must be "effective," and pointing the table he added, "that means effective."

Grand Jury To Probe Slaying Of 4 Negroes

Evidence Uncovered May Be Given To State For Action

United States District Judge P. Hoyt Davis made his charge to a 24 man grand jury called this morning in Georgia to investigate the slaying of four negroes near Monroe, Ga., last July 25. The jury, composed predominantly of farmers with two negro members, heard Judge Davis make only indirect reference to the massacre at Apalachee Bridge in calling on them to probe for violation of federal laws.

Judge Davis pointed out "the federal court has no jurisdiction over the offense of murder unless the crime is committed on a federal reservation, or on the high seas or in certain situations where federal officers are killed in line of duty."

He did commit the jury, if it found evidence of violation of law that does not fall under federal jurisdiction, to furnish evidence to state officials.

Judge Davis reminded the jury that in considering the case it must determine whether the major violation might fall within jurisdiction of the state courts there still might be violation of certain United States criminal statutes. This is the closest he came to making reference to violation of federal laws which must be the basis of federal prosecution in lynching.

Some 100 witnesses have been subpoenaed by the government to appear before the grand jury. Central figure in the case is 60-year-old J. Garrison, planter and one-time wholesaler, who reported that a mob of about 20 armed men stopped him at a bridge east of Monroe at dusk on July 25 and took two negroes and their wives from the car. One of the victims, Roger Malcolm, had been released that day in Garrison's custody pending trial for stabbing a white man.

Utmost secrecy shrouds the government's case which has been four months in preparation. The instance of President Truman, it is assumed that evidence gathered by a score of special FBI investigators in questioning 2500 witnesses will be made available to the jury.

Garrison said the names of several of the mob members are known, but added that it was difficult to get evidence necessary for conviction.

He is survived by the widow, Mrs. J. W. Newell of Sanford; one sister, Mrs. Joseph Hearden of Ft. Pierce; one brother, Eugene Newell of Birmingham, Ala.; one nephew, John W. Hland of Vineland and several other nieces and nephews. Funeral arrangements, in charge of the Erickson Funeral Home, will be announced later.

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Goldsborough Holds News Reel Quoting Mine Chief Is Not Legal As Evidence

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough announced this afternoon that the court itself will present evidence tomorrow in the contempt trial of Mine Workers' Chief John L. Lewis. Goldsborough said that the evidence would tend to show that the United Mine Workers' leader did not obey a restraining order in the soft coal dispute.

Goldsborough said that if the testimony establishes that fact, it would tend to leave Lewis and the Mine Workers' Union "in the technical position of a contempt of court."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough refused this afternoon to admit a news reel record in the contempt trial of Mine Workers' Chief John L. Lewis. In the news reel Lewis purportedly said that last Spring's coal argument would last as long as the government operated the soft coal mines.

Judge Goldsborough ruled, however, that the statement may be admitted in the trial if he finds that the government attempted to raise the news reel recording as evidence in the Lewis trial.

The chief government attorney, John Sumner, explained to the court he wished to enter the news reel as proof of what he termed "willfulness" by Lewis in declaring the contract terminated last month.

Meanwhile, Interior Secretary Bruce advised that within the next few days the government will move natural gas through the West all out of the country.

He told the House Sub-Committee that within the next 45 days gas can be moving at the rate of 150-million cubic feet a day over the war built lines which stretch 1500 miles from the southwest to the eastern seaboard.

That the gas will amount only to the real equivalent of 6,000 tons of coal while normal daily coal production exceeds 20 million tons.

However, on the labor front, contract negotiations began to move between the CIO United Mine Workers and the way Allied Chemicals of America. The union has served notice that it will demand substantial pay increases for 1947 and also a guaranteed annual wage.

The vice president of the Steel Workers, James Thimmes, said that besides a fat wage boost and a substantial annual payback, the union will press an improved vacation plan, a death and survivors fund and a speed shop agreement.

MIAMI BEACH, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The president of the National Association of Broadcasters, Justin Miller, declared yesterday that the new action prohibiting radio stations from editorializing is in direct conflict with the freedom of speech provisions of the Constitution.

Miller said in a speech at the semi-annual meeting of the Florida Association of Broadcasters that the Federal Communications Commission forbids editorializing but sanctions news commentaries who, Miller said, sometimes expound too freely the doctrines of the Left and the Right.

The president of the broadcasters also urged clarification of the rights of the FCC in granting licenses; automatic renewal of radio station licenses instead of new applications as at present; court trials when licenses are revoked; and legislation exempting radio stations from liability for libel. Miller also advocated enlarging the scope of judicial review of the Federal Communications Commission and urged that the FCC be prohibited from limiting the program content of radio stations.

Another speaker at the meeting, Editor Sol Tishoff of Broadcasting Magazine, described the FCC Blue Book as a threat to freedom of speech. Tishoff said a seven-man commission cannot dictate the listening tastes of 140,000,000 Americans.
