## Back to school in Seminole County

**SEMINOLE COUNTY** - Aside from some students arriving home late in the afternoon, the first day of school was smooth sailing, according to school officials.

"It was a very smooth day and it went pretty well," said Richard Wells, executive director for support services for the Seminole County School District.

Of the 56,000 students enrolled, about 53,000 made it to the classrooms in the county's 53 schools. The 5 percent absence rate is normal, Wells said. About 36,000 students were fed in the school cafeterias.

The only problem of the day cropped up in the afternoon when buses transporting students were up to an hour late dropping kids off, Wells said.

Cluster schools, open for the first time this year in the northern part of the county as part of a desegregation plan, require an additional number of buses to transport students.

In addition, an afternoon storm, and the time required to get elementary school students on buses caused the delay, Wells said. To ensure that younger children get on the correct bus, they are supplied with tags identifying the bus number.

"It was a domino effect that affected the middle schools, which dismiss after the elementary schools," he said.

There are about 300 buses transporting students with 20 additional buses on county roads this year to accommo-

date the cluster schools.

Wells said he received calls from parents Monday about late buses, however he expected that today would be smoother.

## Longwood locked in hot debate over candidate's key

**LONGWOOD** - A controversy over whether the keys to the city would be awarded to a political candidate vying for a seat on the Seminole County Commission resulted in heated debate among city commissioners Monday.

Carlton Henley, who is running in District 4 against incumbent Win Adams in the Sept. 1 elections, in a letter delivered to city commissioners, said he was withdrawing his name from consideration "because of alleged misrepresentations to certain commissioners concerning the presentation."

Henley on Tuesday said he was honored by those who signed the petition, but sorry

that some of the commissioners were misled.

"I have no desire to get involved with Longwood politics and that's why I withdrew my name," he said.

Commissioners Annamarte Vacca and Ron Sargent had said that a man identifying himself as Henley's campaign manager had spoken to them saying the timing of the presentation might not be a good idea. By a vote of 3-2, commissioners voted to postpone the event until after the county election.

Jim Daly, a Longwood businessman and former Henley supporter, said he was the man who spoke to commissioners, however he never identified himself as his campaign manager.

## Publix would anchor proposed Lake Mary shopping center

**LAKE MARY** - Pending approvals this Thursday at the Lake Mary City Commission meeting, a new shopping center may be constructed in Lake Mary, near the Sanford city limits. Proposed as a Publix Shopping Center complex, the site is on the west side of U.S. Highway 17-92 at its intersection with Weldon Boulevard.

The two items scheduled for the commission meeting are approval of a conditional use, which is required for shopping centers of less than 75,000 square feet, and approval of the site plans for the 51,669 square-foot center.

The property consists of 7.95 acres, adjacent to Victoria Square shopping center, and Cypress Center which has been approved but not yet constructed. Also nearby is the residential area of Lake Mary Woods. It would be across 17-92 from Bob Dance Dodge.

The matter has previously come before the city's Planning

and Zoning Board. The conditional use was approved at the July 28 meeting. At the same meeting, P&Z approved the site plan, but with four variances and two additional conditions.

The conditions involve truck access which would be one-way, right-turn only from Weldon Boulevard. The developer will also provide clarification of the traffic impact on local roads and nearby residential roads.

In another matter, as part of its review of the proposed shopping center, P&Z reportedly expressed concern that the median on Weldon Boulevard, which had been depicted on the Victoria Square site plan, in 1989, had been constructed but was subsequently removed.

P&Z wants the city to consider the effects of the present median cut and the effects of extending the median so as to delete the circulation between the two shopping centers.

The applicant for the new Publix Shopping Center is Opus South Corporation.

## Organizations in the tri-county area benefit from grant money

**SEMINOLE COUNTY** - A number of grants have been announced for organizations in Seminole County as well as the three-county area including Orange and Osceola counties. Several of the grants awarded were in connection with the needs brought about by the recent tornado disaster.

The Community Foundation of Central Florida is giving \$34,378 to Christian Sharing Center for case management and direct service to disaster victims in the Seminole County area. The money includes \$10,000 for the Oviedo Outreach program, and \$24,378 in disaster relief grants.

Charity Cars, Inc. a grassroots organization formed in 1996, is being awarded \$10,000 to repair and refurbish automobiles to be given to members of the WAQES pro-

gram in Osceola County, also affected by the tornado. The WAQES program is Work and Gain Economic Self-sufficiency, and is a program of the State Department of Labor.

The American Red Cross is being given \$100,000 from the SunTrust fund. Additionally, the NationsBank fund awarded another \$82,500 to six other charities. Funding of discretionary grants is provided by income from the Calkins Fund, the Children and Youth Fund and the Winter Park Community Fund. Each is a permanent endowment fund of the Community Foundation of Central Florida, Inc.

"We are especially pleased that we received contributions from Community Foundations across the U.S. to provide disaster relief," said President Diane Bandquist.

Overall, organizations in the three-county area serving children received \$10,268 or 10

percent of the Community Foundation's grant money. Senior citizens receive \$22,566 or 21 percent of the grant. Women receive \$4,800 or four percent, with the remaining total to assist the general public.

In addition to the foundation's money, which totals \$106,784 for the three-county area, an additional \$225,676 is being awarded to operations in the area through disaster relief grants.

These include \$10,000 to Wyman Fields/Seminole Heart Association, \$20,000 to Catholic Social Services, \$9,000 to Better Living for Seniors, and \$4,800 to We Care.

There two rounds of grants are offered each year. Deadline for applications is Sept. 15, 1998 for projects that begin Feb. 15, 1999 or later. Application forms are available at the Foundation's office by phoning (407) 872-3050.

## Beloved puppeteer Shari Lewis dies

She was a tiny woman - not much bigger than her fluffy puppet, *Lamb Chop*. Her energy and talents were enormous, however. Shari Lewis warmed the hearts of the young and old.

Lewis, who died Sunday night in Los Angeles at age 65, won a dozen Emmys and a Peabody for children's TV programs, wrote more than 50 books and produced 24 home videos. Her work was refreshingly old-fashioned and showed she cared about children.

"A mother came to me and said, 'I want to thank you for keeping our kids kids for a little while longer,'" Lewis said several years ago. "I was thrilled."

It took an extremely talented person to turn a sock

into a superstar as Lewis did when she created the character of *Lamb Chop*.

Lewis said she began working with puppets after she had a dance injury as a 16-year-old. Her doctor told her she should give up dancing for a long time. "I was crushed," Lewis said. "While I was sick in bed, my father, a magician, gave me

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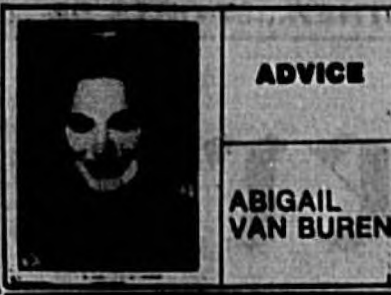

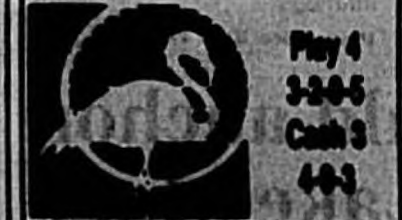

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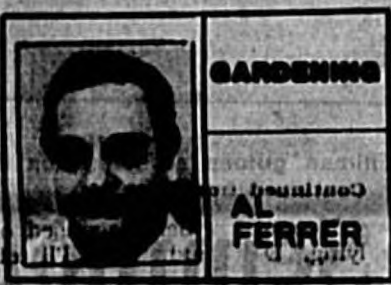
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## Treatment advice for common cat fleas, found on dogs, too

Cat fleas are the most common fleas found on both cats and dogs. Flea eggs and adult fleas fall off the host and accumulate where the pet rests, making these the main source of flea contamination. Flea breeding in these areas can be reduced by establishing the sleeping area for the pet, choosing an area that can be cleaned thoroughly on a regular basis, and using bedding material that can be laundered weekly or thrown away as often. If a human flea allergy is the cause of the complaint, pets should be excluded from areas of the house frequented by the pet(s) afflicted with the allergy.

Vacuuming flea breeding areas is also beneficial, a vacuum could remove 15-27 percent of larvae introduced into a carpet and 39-59 percent of the eggs. In addition to removing the juvenile stages, vacuuming will also remove adult flea feces, the essential food source for the developing larvae.

Pupae appear to be unaffected by vacuuming, as their silk cocoons are tightly bound to carpet fibers. Vacuuming alone will not remove the entire flea population, but will help keep them reduced. The steam-extraction carpet cleaning method should effectively

destroy all stages of fleas present. Bathing a dog with soap, shampoo or a mild detergent can also remove fleas. This method drowns fleas and the oil attracting nature of detergents should have a drying effect on the surviving fleas.

Ultrasonic pest repelling devices have repeatedly been shown to be completely useless. The use of leeches from wampytiles, have been repeatedly recommended for flea control, but tests on packets of dried bayberry leaves have shown no repellent effect on cat fleas.

**Insect Growth Regulators:** IGRs are effective at very low concentrations and have virtually no mammalian toxicity. They mimic insect hormones and act on insects by interfering with their normal development. At least 5 IGRs are marketed, the juvenile hormone analogs methoprene, hydroxy-prene, kinoprene and fenoxycarb, and the chitin inhibitor diflubenzuron. If you can tolerate fleas for the time it takes these compounds to eliminate a flea population, they are the best chemicals to use. Expect to wait 3 weeks before noticeable flea reductions and 1-2 months before complete control can be achieved.

**Conventional Pesticides:** Pyrethrum, an extract of dried chrysanthemum flowers is often used to control fleas. But those with hay fever, especially allergy to ragweed, may show cross reactivity to pyrethrum making it unacceptable. Pyrethrum is known for its rapid knockdown, but fleas often revive and recover in time. Many people perceive boric acid or borax as being non-toxic and it is very effective for treating carpets.

**On-Host Treatments:** It is necessary to treat the pet at the same time as the premises. Flea collars are the most seriously abused method of flea control. The advantage of a flea collar is that it can be placed on an infested pet for a treatment period (optimally less than 6 days) then removed and stored in a sealed glass jar until the next time it is needed. Flea collars should not be kept on pets permanently as a prophylactic measure. Be sure to check for dermatitis under the collar. Dusts are considered safer than sprays or shampoos

since there is no solvent to carry the pesticide through the host's skin. The problems with dusts or powders are that they can't be controlled, easily becoming airborne and they are ingested by cats during grooming. It is recommended that a pet be bathed after being treated with a pyrethrum dust to remove the fleas stupefied by the pyrethrum and reduce the risk of accidental ingestion by the pet. Repellents containing DEET can be used if you are taking your pet into a known flea-infested area. If a flea population exists in the home, use of a repellent on the pet means that the fleas will switch to their second choice for a blood meal-YOU.

**Flealess Treatment:** Carpets can be effectively treated with boric acid or borax, alone or in combination with diatomaceous earth. Boric acid should be applied as a dust to indoor flea breeding areas. Boric acid may eventually cause damage to carpet fabric or upholstery. Boron compounds should not be used outdoors since they act as non-selective herbicides and will kill most plants.

Diatomaceous earth is made up of the fossil shells of single celled algae called diatoms. The shells are chemically and physically like ground-up glass. Diatomaceous earth kills only flea larvae. The larvae are scratched by sharp edges, lose body moisture, and die from desiccation. No matter what product is used, always follow label directions.

some books about ventriloquism."

After experimenting for a number of years, Lewis came up with Lamb Chop. At 19, she was a winner on Arthur Godfrey's talent show in 1952 and five years later she introduced Lamb Chop on the Captain Kangaroo Show for Children. One appearance led to the Shari Lewis Show on NBC.

"With puppets, I deal with whimsy and satire," Lewis said. "More than anything else, I strive for (but don't always achieve, of course) a very strong comedy of a verbal and physical nature."

Lewis said that her puppets reflected her feelings and thoughts and that hand-held puppets such as Lamb Chop have the ability to vibrate with you, and vacillate between emotions in a most human fashion.

"Self esteem," she said, "comes from doing something and accomplishing something. It doesn't come from watching TV. I try to do activities, I try to turn TV into an activity."

"The kind of thing accused of lying," Daly said. "I'll tell the whole story."

Daly said the nomination was a political move. He said he was initially asked by supporter Jimmy Hays to circulate the petition nominating Henley, but he refused because he did not think it was a good idea because of the upcoming election.

"This has become a hot issue because it has been mishandled," Daly said.

Commissioner Steve Miller on Monday said the nomination was not politically motivated and Henley's campaign manager did not make any comments. Miller said Henley was deserving of the keys and the commission had lost the man's campaign by making the keys a political issue.

"We have completely dishonored this man and we should be ashamed of ourselves, Miller said. "I'm embarrassed to death over this and this entire

issue has cast a shadow over the commission."

Henley, who had served as principal of Lyman High School in Longwood for 21 years, was nominated by Commissioner Paul Loveland in June, after a petition was presented to the commission. Miller rescinded the nomination. Henley's name was the only one mentioned for consideration with the key nomination scheduled for Aug. 2.

Loveland said he apologized to Henley for harming his campaign.

Verna said she was not satisfied over the commission's actions because it should not look like a political endorsement.

Sargent said he was ashamed but didn't know that Henley should have been nominated in the first place, all things considered.

# How safe is Lyme disease vaccine?

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I live in a part of the country where Lyme disease is prevalent. Is there a vaccine to prevent this disease?

**DEAR READER:** An advisory committee recently gave its approval, albeit grudgingly, for the Food and Drug Administration to license a vaccine for Lyme disease. I say "grudgingly" because the committee, although unanimous, hedged its vote with a list of concerns about the vaccine's long-term safety.

Called LYMERix, the vaccine is manufactured by SmithKline Beecham Pharmaceuticals. As part of its approval, the committee called for further studies in elderly people and children, in patients with heart conditions and arthritis, and in large groups of individuals who have had previous Lyme disease. For example, preliminary reports indicate that some recipients may actually develop arthritis, cardiac disorders and neurological problems from the vaccine itself; also, patients with previous Lyme disease often suffer adverse side effects when given the vaccine. Finally, neither the appropriate sequence of shots nor their long-term consequences are precisely known.

At present, SmithKline Beecham is testing the vaccine further. Experts predict that it will be approved and available to the public within about a year.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I'd like to know why we need toenails. I'm bothered by ingrown toenails and I wonder why we have to put up with the darned things anyway. What good do they do?

**DEAR READER:** Questions such as yours invariably cause me to wonder why unicellulars do not offer courses in what I call "comparative paleobiology," the study of the purpose of outdated parts of our biological systems. For example, of what use is the appendix? Body hair? Toenails? I'm afraid that we are victims of our genetic heritage. Many of our biological traits are simply leftovers from an earlier, more primitive stage. Therefore, my answer to your question is purely speculative. Toenails were probably a useful adjunct to tree-climbing and fighting among our earliest ancestors. Of course, these ancient hominids didn't wear shoes and they let their toenails grow, so they probably failed to experience

we need toenails? Or testosterone surges? Toenails? Noses and sinuses? Male breasts? The list goes on. The answer is: We're stuck with these things until a biological mutation removes them from our DNA-sequence. Are we, after all, merely civilized animals in the process of continual evolution? Probably, yea.

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## WIN AT BRIDGE

### An interlude in London

On a visit to London last spring, I dropped into the TOR Bridge Club near Marble Arch. I watched a few Chicago wintaz being played for the "small" sum of about \$1.53 a point!

I was surprised at the defenses found on this deal by a world championship silver medalist. Cover the East and South hands. Defending against five spades, you lead the heart ace: three, four, eight. What now?

South's four-spade opening was a reasonable gambit. As a slam was unlikely opposite a passed partner, South hoped to make life difficult for West.

After West's five-heart overall, North had a problem. Could they beat five hearts? (As it happens, yes, by two tricks.) If not, five spades would be a

cheap sacrifice. So, North bid on.

East has either one heart or three. (With a doubleton, he would have started an echo by playing his higher card.) If East began with only one heart, the contract is going down via a heart ruff and the diamond ace. If East has three hearts, though, how will the defense prevail?

A club switch may be necessary, but doesn't work here. The winning play, which looks right to me, is to cash the diamond ace at trick two. South cannot be ruffing since if East had all seven of the missing diamonds, he would have opened three diamonds. And with this layout the defenders eventually come to a club trick for one down.

However, West continued with a second heart at trick two, permitting declarer to ditch his diamond king. Then a spade to the queen saw the contract home.

North and South each won \$733 instead of losing \$81.

## Kudos for adding girls slow pitch softball, but what about the guys?

**SANFORD** - First off, it's great that Seminole County has added girls slow pitch softball to the fall sports menu.

Slow pitch should be just as exciting, if not more, than fast pitch. Runs will add up and all of the teams will be on an even playing field since one pitcher won't be able to dominate the action.

Great idea. But, now, let's look at the reasons for adding slow pitch to the number of sports in Seminole County.

It, like female wrestling and female weightlifting, was done to satisfy Title IX requirements.

Title IX says, basically, that for each male who takes up a slot on a high school sports team, there has to be an opportunity for a female.

That's wonderful except that you have to account for football which takes up at least 100 spots when you factor in varsity, junior varsity and freshman football.

That's why so many girls sports are being added while boys sports remain in a state of neutral.

The only boys sport added in the past several years is soccer which also made it to a girls sport.

Girls, on the other hand, have seen weightlifting, lacrosse, wrestling and slow pitch added to their possibilities.

All of that is great. In fact, as long as the money is available, why not add sports like gymnastics, rhythmic gymnastics, field hockey and flag football?

They are all popular sports in much of the rest of the country and schools would have no problem filling out rosters in Seminole County.

But what about the boys?

Certainly there should be an indoor track program. Can you imagine how much Seminole High alone would benefit from a program like indoor track which is popular in other parts of the country?

For that matter, how about making boys volleyball an FHSAA-sanctioned sport? While the girls have a state Final Four in volleyball, the best the boys can hope for is to win VolleyFest at Lake Mary High School every fall.

Shouldn't the boys have the same chance for state glory as the girls?

Title IX is a wonderful idea, in theory. Much like Communism.

The fact is that, with football in the mix, trying to reach equality has pushed the scales too far on the sides of the girls.

Every sport being offered in Seminole County is an excellent idea, but is girls wrestling more important than boys indoor track or volleyball?

## No slumber this summer

### Volunteer workouts bringing Brantley gridders together

**ALAMONTE SPRINGS** - For most high schoolers, summertime is about sleeping until noon, then relaxing for awhile.

At Lake Brantley, at least for the football team, it meant a 5:30 a.m. alarm, then a mad scramble to make it to the practice field by 6 a.m.

Patriots' coach George Clayton is trying to overcome last year's uncharacteristic 4-5 record. The Patriots got off to a slow start under first-year coach Clayton, but they recovered and finished strong despite injuries to quarterback Brian Criswell and running back Ryan Pagan, both now graduated, until a season-ending blowout loss to Oviedo.

So the Patriots, who traditionally hold early voluntary workouts each summer, made it out in force this year in an attempt to regain their status among the elite of the Seminole Athletic Conference.

Like everyone else in the Seminole Athletic Conference, Lake Brantley is preparing for the start of practice on August 10, the first day allowed by the FHSAA which governs high school athletics.

"We're ready to go," Clayton said. "Right now we're taking care of conditioning and running. Our kids have worked hard all summer and they've been here at 6 every morning."

Clayton said he's been averaging between 45-60 kids each day at the voluntary workouts, but at Lake Brantley, it's about more than just showing up and going through the motions.

"We feel the kids benefit from more than the workouts," he said. "We pride ourselves on being a team and a family. If you can get a kid up for a 6 a.m. practice, the guy playing next to him knows he has commitment and he can be counted on."

Clayton said the morning practices are as much for camaraderie as conditioning. The effort was even more impressive considering that many Lake Brantley students attend summer school and had to go to Lyman while Lake Brantley is being renovated.

This year, there will be no reason for a slow start for the Patriots. Last year, with a new coach in hand, maybe they could have gotten away with it.

Forget it. It's not like the Lake Brantley offense has changed overnight or even in the past 10 years.

The Patriots are known as a team that runs the dinosaur Triple-Option Offense. It's simple. Ninety-nine percent of the time, any defense knows what's coming.

How to stop it? That's what few teams figure out and it's why Lake Brantley is usually playing beyond the regular season.

"The reason we win is that we have a system."

Clayton said. "We have good kids and a system that works. We have kids like Ryan Pagan who work hard despite not being very big. But he was a four-time varsity player and a state champ (weightlifting). The system works and we won't change it."

Regan Russell will be a major beneficiary of the system. He filled in when Criswell was injured last season and will direct the offense. Like any Lake Brantley quarterback, he won't lead the SAC in passing yards, but he'll probably be near the top in rushing.

When he's not carrying the ball, newcomer Arnold Celeste, a transfer from Crooked Academy, has a chance to take Pagan's place.

Lake Brantley is strong defensively coming into the season, led by linebackers Clint Hanson, Quentin Whitaker, safety Mike Jackson and linemen Chris Roth and Bill Fritsch.

Is there a theme to motivate the players on the eve of training camp?

"No, we don't have any particular theme or anything," Clayton said. "We just can't wait to get going. It's all I've thought about and it feels like it will never get here."

Lake Brantley's first two games - against Apopka and district champion Deland - may be the toughest they face all season.

The Herald will preview the preparation of each of Seminole County's seven football teams this week as they get ready to begin practice Aug. 10.

## Lynn making mark in wrestling

**SANFORD** - Extreme Championship Wrestling saved Jerry Lynn's wrestling career.

After having his desire deflated in World Championship Wrestling, he came close to hanging up the tights.

"Of course, you get frustrated with injuries," Lynn said, "but the politics are really what put a damper on the business for me. It doesn't matter how good you are. It's who you know."

Out of the WCW, Lynn received a tryout with the World Wrestling Federation in September, wrestling Tala Michalek. With the WWF pending, he nearly became a stunt man, working in the Orlando area for Universal Studios and any other TV or movie productions.

Then ECW entered the picture. A strong independent group based in Philadelphia, ECW, the transmitters for American pro wrestling in the 80s, breathed new life into Lynn.

Like so many others buried by organizations, ECW has allowed Lynn to display his skills and talents.

"It's not as political in ECW, not politically controlled," said Lynn, a Sanford resident. "You have more freedom. You can get away with a lot more during your matches and stuff."

Lynn's idea to wear a mask and outfit, resembling the Power Rangers, caught the attention of WCW officials a couple of years ago.

"At the time, the Power Rangers were so popular that I thought it could be marketed for the kids," said Lynn, then known as Mr. J.L. "They (WCW) liked it. They said it was what they were looking for."

Unfortunately, two injuries sidelined Lynn before he could really start marketing himself in WCW. He broke his arm against Don Matulis, one of the best technical wrestlers in the biz, and missed three months of action.

A month after his return, Lynn broke his leg on a WCW tour in conjunction with New Japan. Better in his career, in 1980, Lynn started feuding with the Lightning Kid (a.k.a. X-Fac of Dynamite) in the WWF. It turned into an epic 2-year battle which started the ball rolling for Lynn.

Lynn then wrestled a feud in Memphis for the two great titles in Global, before making the move to Global in Dallas for Joe Pedicino. Lynn retained his feud with the Lightning Kid, but this time they
