CUBA WILL NOT PAY DEBTS TO CHASE BANK

President Grau Terms Loan Illegitimate; U.S. Merchants Are Suffering. Boycott

HAVANA, Dec. 27.—(AP)—President Ramon Grau San Martin today reiterated his government's intention not to pay the Chase National Bank certificates on the \$20,000,000 public works bond issue which matured on Monday.

Grau told the bank's representative that the debts were "illegitimate as the Chase bank deals with former President Machado without the consent of the Cuban people. This government cannot pay its public works debts unless their legitimacy can be properly established."

American business houses became the target of a boycott move in the Cuban capital today. Handbills urging the public to pledge itself not to buy American goods were distributed throughout the city. Sponsors of the movement however are uninvolved.

JONES DECLARES FEDERAL DEFICIT RAILROADS WILL NEED MORE CASH

RFC Chairman Points Out Necessity For Governmental Loans

LONDON, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Aroused by reports its naval strength has been outstripped by the United States and Japan, Great Britain—the belief is growing here—is preparing to launch a large naval building program in 1934.

Already, the government was advanced the 1933 program was reduced to supply larger and more heavily armed cruisers than were originally projected.

Information that six new cruisers are planned has been published in the Sunday Dispatch, owned by Lord Rothermere. Two other newspapers reported five new cruisers are favored by the admiralty, while nearly all agree that an increase in both destroyers and cruisers is in prospect.

"The Daily Mail," in stating that the admiralty is finalizing that the program to be announced next March includes provisions for five and not three new cruisers," added that "provisions for more squadrons can be expected also."

Branson Named Acting Trade Body Treasurer

Arthur Branson, cashier of the Sanford-Atlantic National Bank is the choice of the Executive Committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce for the position of acting treasurer of the trade body, succeeding his former co-worker, Linton E. Mr. Branson was elected yesterday afternoon, and his election will be certified at the January meeting of the Board of Directors of the trade body.

The questionnaire sought information as to the progress of the NRA, the AAA, and other new governmental agencies in this country, and as a whole, a favorable reply was given to each question.

SEERESS SEES ROOSEVELT IS 1934 AS YEAR SAID PLEASED OF PROSPERITY OVER PROGRAM

Woman Who Predicted Date Of Armistice Says Peace Will Be Spread Over World

PARIS, Dec. 27.—Mme. Blanche Paunac, France's seeress extraordinary, came out of her annual Christmas silence yesterday to predict that 1934 will be a year of peace and returned prosperity.

Next September, Mme. de Paunac said, would mark the opening of a new era of prosperity for the United States—an era whose start would spread out from the United States to the whole world.

Great attention is paid to Mme. Paunac by those who pay attention to astrology. She won fame by predicting in midsummer of 1918 that the World War would end with an Armistice Nov. 11.

Rising from her self-induced hypnotic sleep necessary to bring forth accurate prophecies, Mme. Paunac says from her 1918

Simultaneously the government offered the loan of \$1 billion to the gold at \$40 an ounce on the seventh consecutive day.

President Roosevelt adopted no surprise at the latest treasury statement showing a deficit of more than a billion, and it was reported at the White House that the figure would mount even higher as result of the necessary program.

The cost of the new naval program, either through the corporation or some other agency, would have to help finance the security loans that become due during the year. These issues, together with other financial requirements of the railroads are estimated at around \$2,000,000,000. Several railroads already have discussed the matter with the corporation, among them the New York Central, which has a maturity of \$48,000,000 on May 1.

Most of the roads are asking the corporation to advance half of the maturities, planning to pay a portion of the bond issue in cash and the remainder with new bonds.

The question of what agency will help probably will be discussed in Congress at the coming session. There have been indications in some quarters that when the question of extending the life of the reconstruction corporation comes up there might be some stiff opposition.

Jones indicated the administration felt government participation in the financing program should be as small as possible.

Fifty-seven railroads now owe the corporation approximately \$20,000,000. Total loans to railroads during the last two years were \$30,000,000, but some of this has been repaid.

In some government circles the belief was indicated yesterday that banks will be expected to do more of the financing than they have in the last two years.

The reconstruction corporation yesterday held for the government direct stock interests in nearly one-third of the country's banks. Up to Christmas day the corporation had received offers of preferred stock and capital notes from 417 banks and had purchased stock or notes in 267.

The total holdings to that date were \$60,000,000. Chairman

Jones said today it now looks like the total holdings before the purchases stop will run well in excess of a billion dollars. This, it is understood here, would be approximately one-third of the aggregate capital of all the banks in the country.
