63 'Kissin' Kin' Attend Sieg Family Reunion Here

Ever heard that "and your shoes will bring you back to Florida?" What's more, Lake Harney said in your shoes will bring you back to Lake Harney, most perfect when 63 members of the Sieg Family arrived at Fort Lane Park.

The day dawned fair, bright and warming—Willie Lee Sieg, who is undoubtedly the leader within the Sieg family, arrived at Fort Lane Park shortly after 8 a.m. to install the last of the necessary essentials and before 10 o'clock here they came from Geneva, Panama City, Winter Park, Orvieto, Miami, Jacksonville, Palatka, Gainesville, and Orlando, Milwaukee, Wis., Cleveland, Ohio, New Albany, Ind., Savannah, Ga., and Indian Harbor Rocks.

After much greeting, visiting, questioning, responding, laughing and a glow on every happy face for all here were "Kissin' Kin"—Margaret Culppepper Wolcott, of Orvieto, presided at the registration.

How soon one o'clock came! Time for dedication of the Sieg Family Pavilion. Mr. Sieg, related bits of family history and legends and then a moment of quiet meditation was observed for all "who have walked this fair land and have gone on before" in whose memory this pavilion was dedicated. Reference was made to the founder of the Sieg family in America, one Peter Sieg from Holland, who married in Baltimore, Md., a certain Miss Mary White, from Pennsylvania, and during a very fruitful lifetime increased the population in Baltimore by three boys, six girls and then four more boys after moving to Cincinnati. Their descendants are presently scattered throughout the United States and many foreign countries.

Immediately following the telling of these family tales and this very simple ceremony, everyone was invited to share the sumptuous dinner which was catered by members of the Geneva Historical and Genealogical Society, Ernest M. Ward of Winter Park returned thanks.

An old fashioned fish fry with hush puppies, hot coffee, Florida fruit punch, potato salad, cole slaw, baked ham, assorted breads, lemon pie, ambrosia, coconut, chocolate and orange glaze pound cakes are but a few of the goodies which made up the feast of the day, delectable beyond words, a memorable meal, to say the least!

After much feasting, back to the family circle where an overwhelming vote requesting a repeat performance in 1967, same time, same place, same menus—caterers take a bow!

Greetings were read by Rhonda Culppepper Ward from as far away as Rome, Italy; reports were given by Louise Sieg (Mrs. Alvin W.) Sikos, Alms Mary Sieg and Mrs. E. M. Ward.

Reluctantly the group bade their farewells, then off to their various highways, homeward bound, but not until many had stopped at the Geneva Historical and Genealogical Society Museum to admire the collection of mementos assembled and displayed. Last goodbyes were said on the steps of the museum in the glow of a laughing sunset while each "Sieg Family Member" present was gifted with a generous portion of fruits, gift from "Dede" Ward, freshly picked from a nearby grove owned by his company.

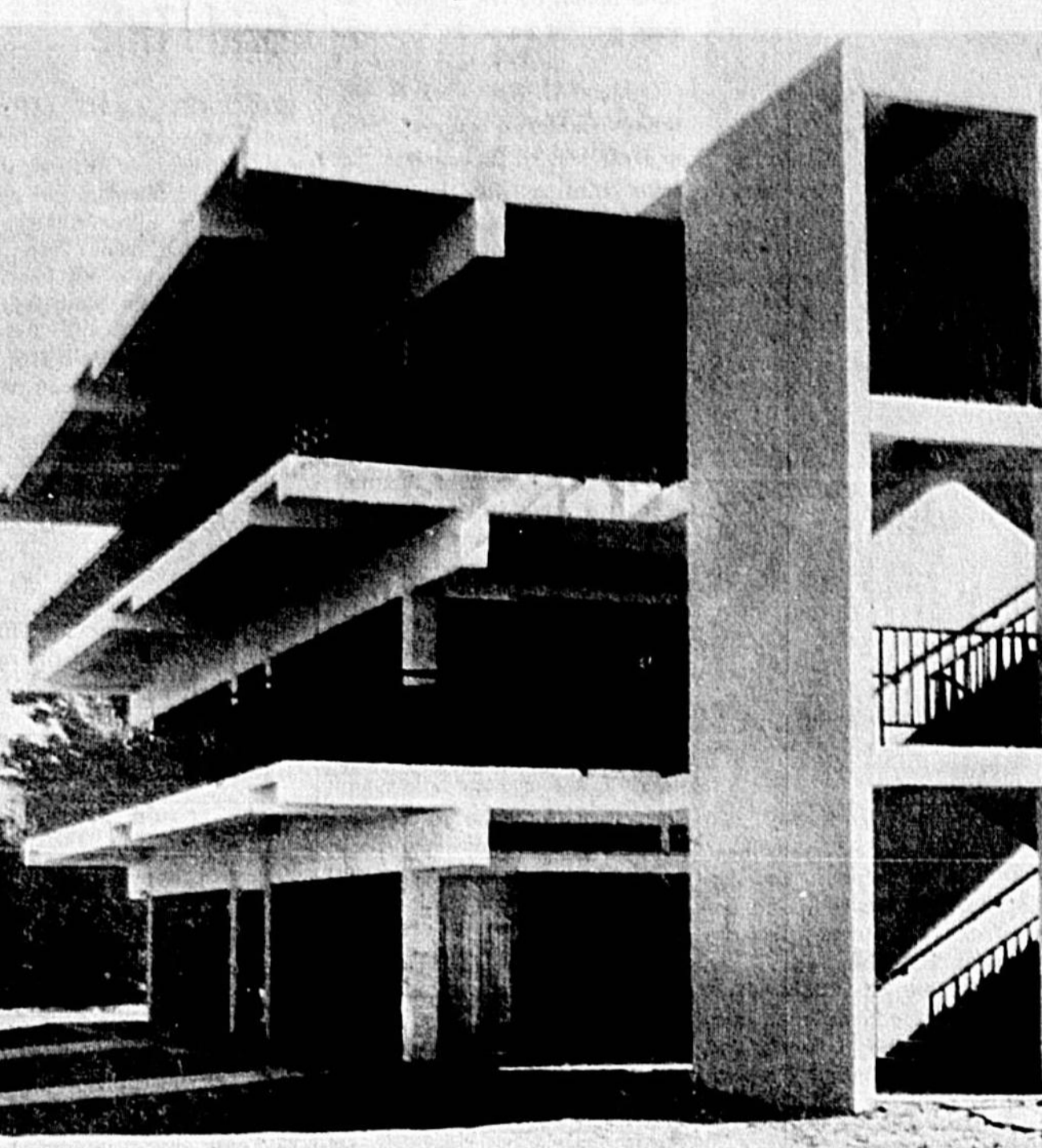

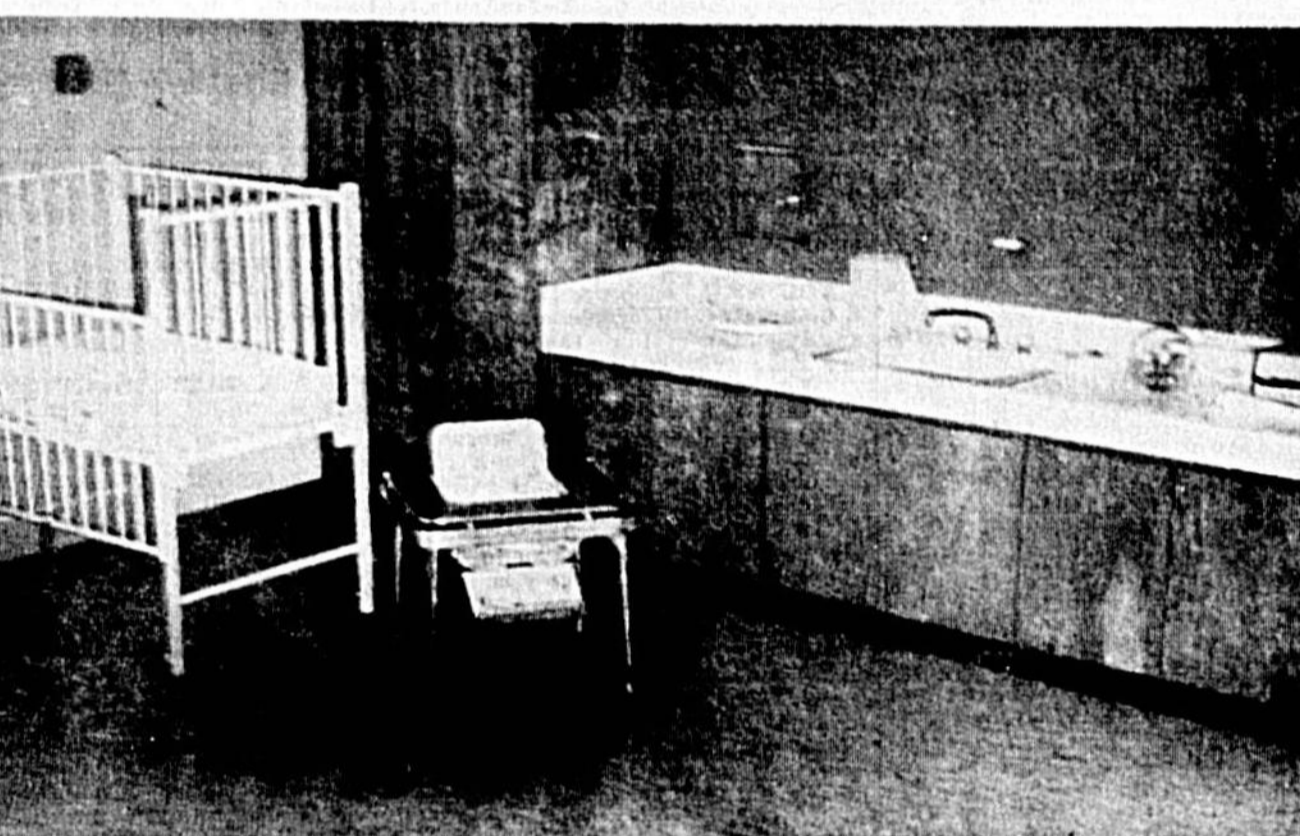

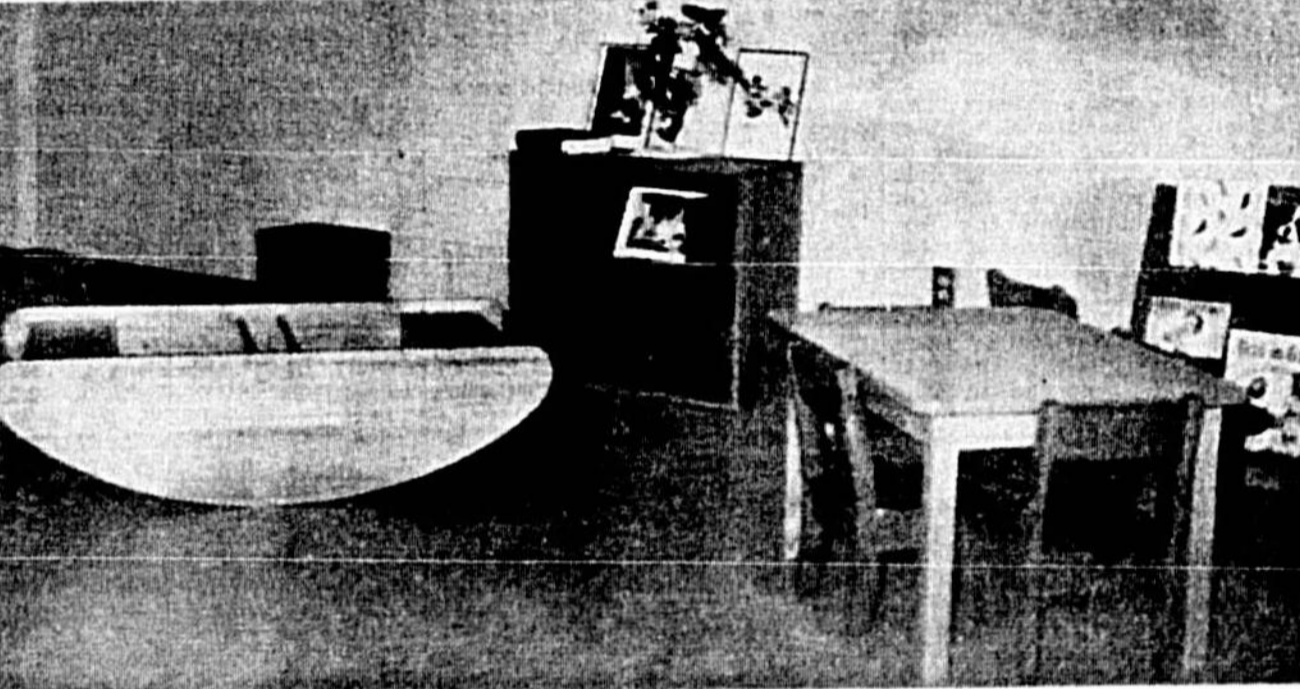
First Baptist Education Building Dedication Set Sunday



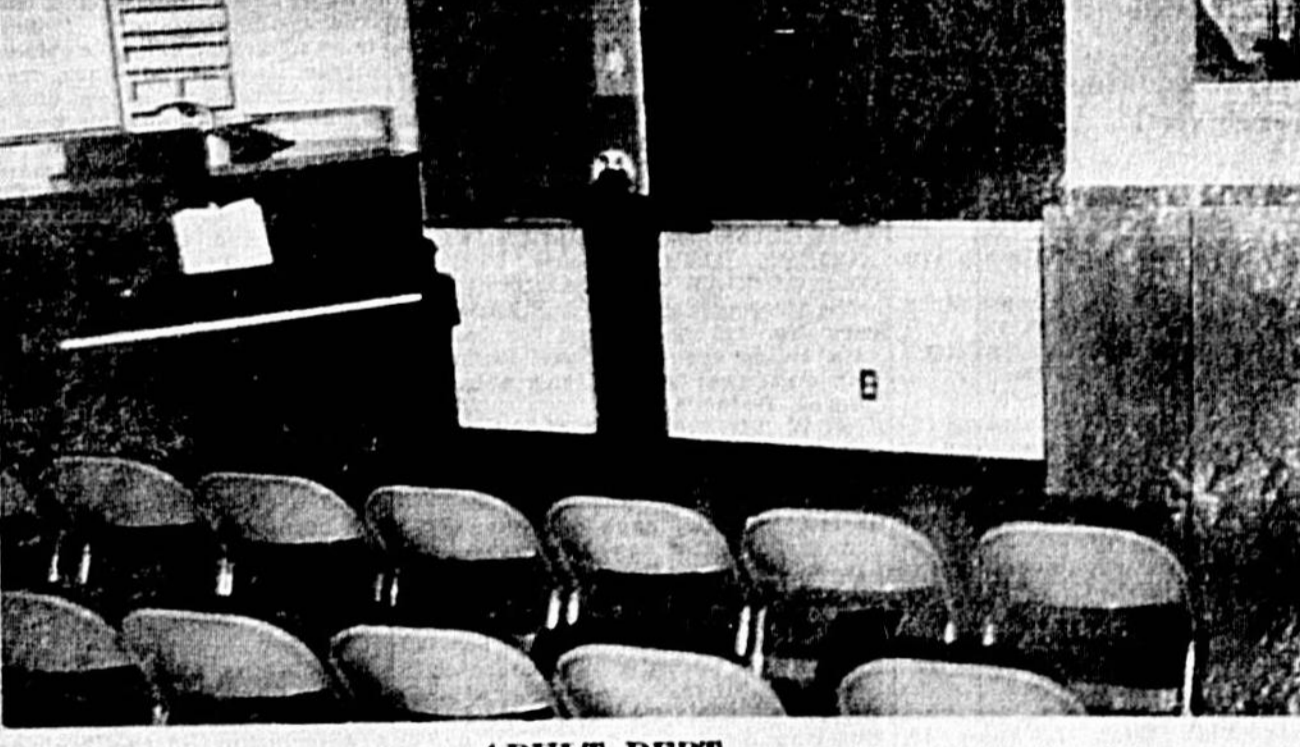
EXTERIOR of new Educational Building.

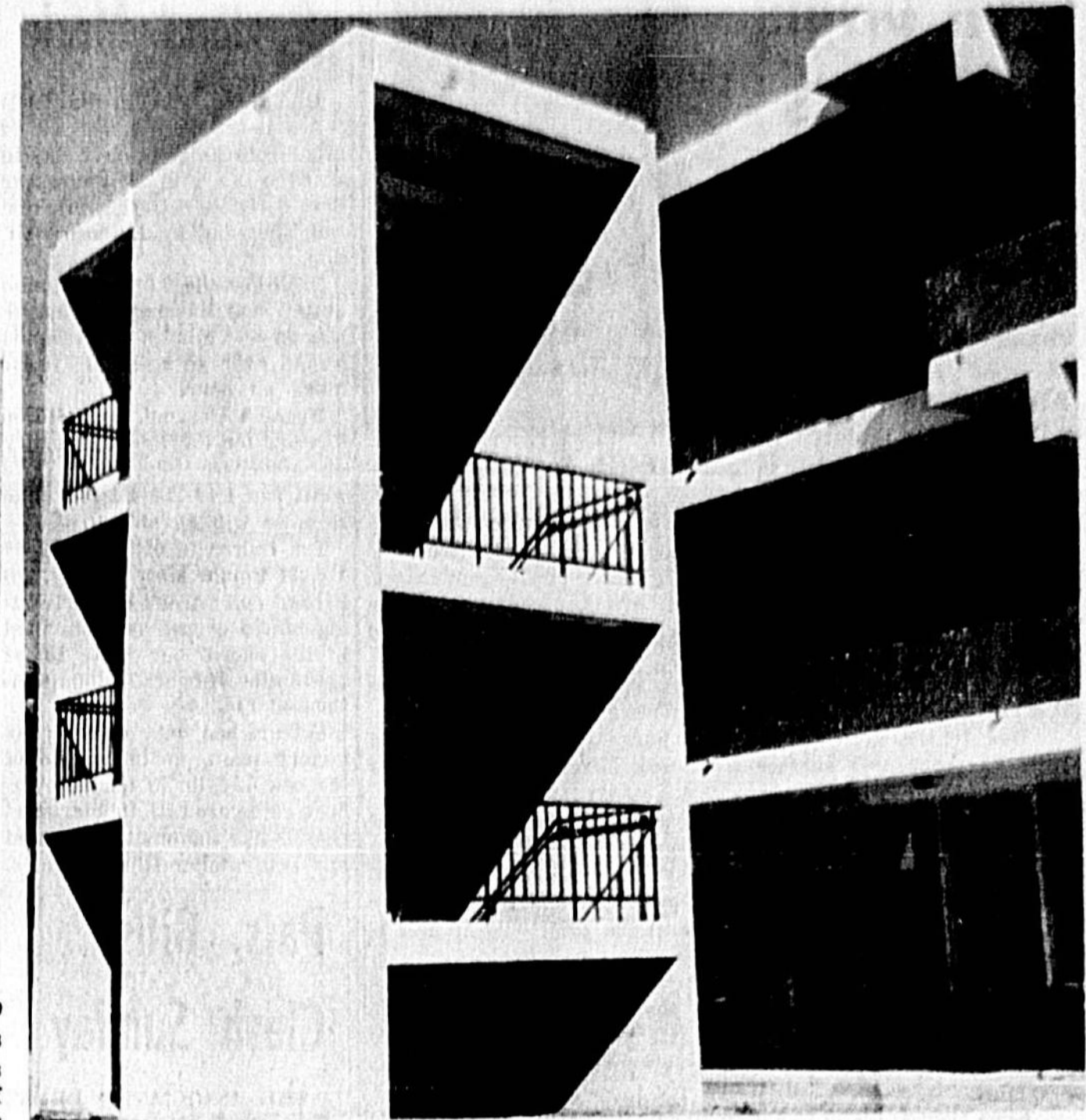

New Educational Building at First Baptist Church, Sanford, which will be dedicated Sunday, is the first of a long-range basic. The architect was Melvin Mcintosh, and Bernardo of Tampa. Thomas and Slater, Inc. of Daytona Beach were low bidders for construction of the building. Sanford Atlantic National Bank has provided banking services, including a loan to cover part of the cost of construction and furnishings. Total cost including architect's fees and furniture will be approximately \$360,000.

It houses administrative offices plus seven nursery departments, four beginner (4.5 yr.) departments, six primary (6, 7, 8, yr.) departments, and one for young people (17-25 yr.). The facilities are designed to be used by these age groups in all the avenues of religious education. Other age groups are provided for in other permanent buildings already in use. The wood-ter frame dwellings that have been used to this point as temporary educational facilities will be removed from the premises. Long-range plans call for other permanent buildings, including a large sanctuary building.

Ray Stetson was general chairman of the building program and Kenneth McIntosh was vice chairman.

Steering committee was made up of Stetson, chairman, and Irving Pryor, E. R. Wood, E. C. Harper Sr. and Lyman Phillips.

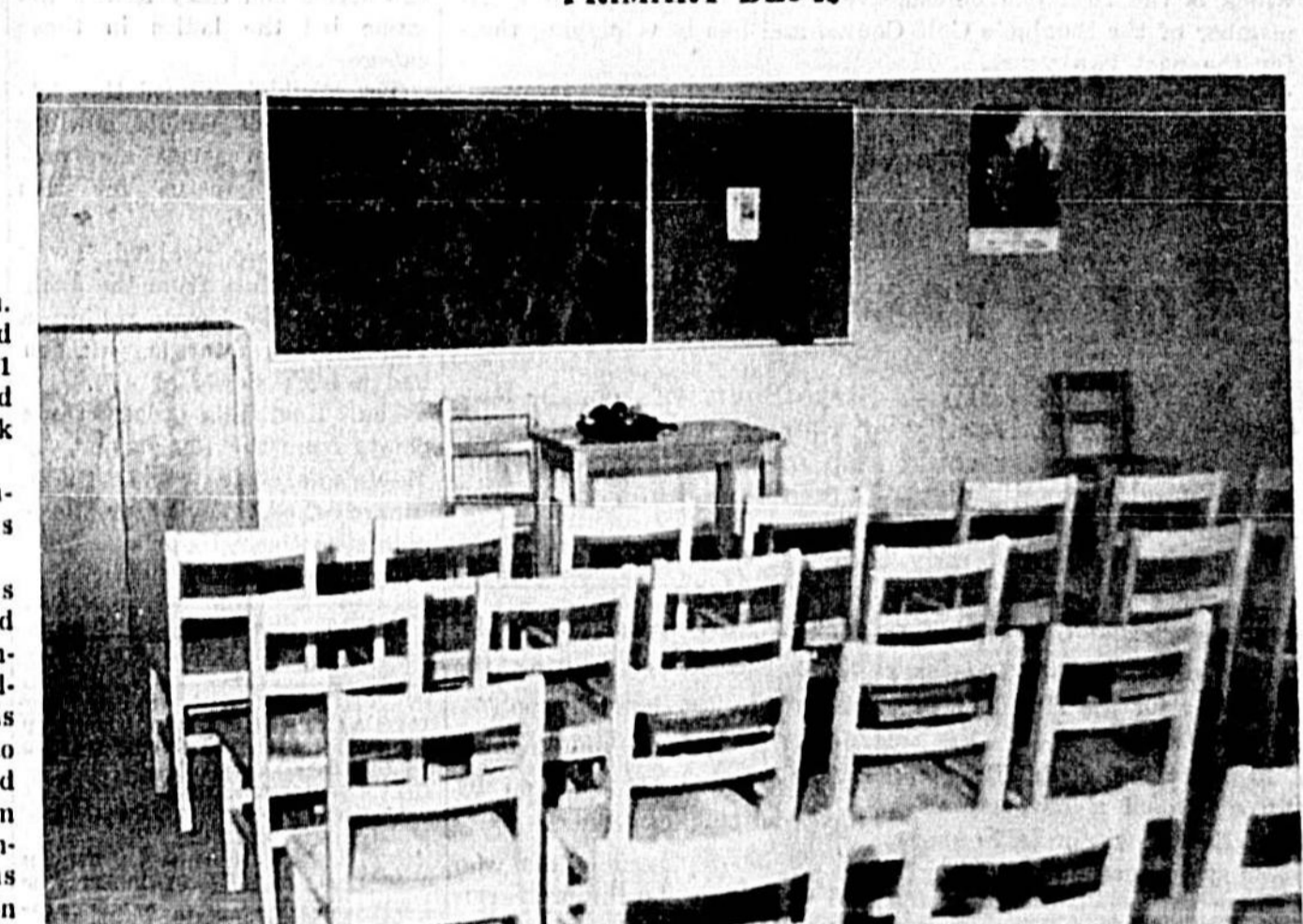
In a recent change in personnel, Warfield was designated as minister of education.
