Celery Feds Change Name To Warriors; Daytona Buccaneers Win Friday Game

Changing their name from Celery Feds to Warriors and smearing their faces with rouge failed to save the Sanford football squad from a 35 to 0 defeat by the Daytona Buccaneers, Friday night at Seminoles High School Field.

The warriors however, lived up to their name and put up a game defense fight all the way only to have their line repeatedly torn to shreds by the fast stepping Bucs with their famous formation.

During the latter part of the game however, Assistant Coach Dick McLaulin sent in Buck Hale from Kentucky to bolster up the backline of the Warriors. Buck immediately began to open up an aerial attack with a series of cannon ball passes. One of these to Danicle was good for 25 yards. However, a number of Cens were muffed, being apparently too hard to handle. Westberry threatened to score several times, but flizzed out at the last moment.

The Bucs started the fireworks in the first quarter by a 10 yard plunge by Marsh through the Sanford center. Then quarter back Ted Pollitt threw a 35 pass clear over to Wayne Leonard at left end. Pete Westberry then crashed through center for the first Daytona touchdown. Pollitt kicked for the extra point.

At the beginning of the second quarter, with the Bucs in the shadow of the Sanford goal, Hal receiving the ball behind his goal was tackled by Leonard, and the Bucs were awarded two more points.

On the next Sanford kickoff Westberry took the ball for a 30 yard gain. Followed by a 10 yard gain by Ted Pollitt, and then Westberry smashed through center for another Bucs touchdown. No goal was kicked however.

Westberry started another score with a 35 yard run. Ted Pollitt then started more plunging gains and finally scoured his way through the middle of the Sanford team for another touchdown through center for the extra point.

Westberry again reeled off a 25 yard gain on the kickoff. Bill Ford then went around the Sanford left end for a 55 yard touchdown.

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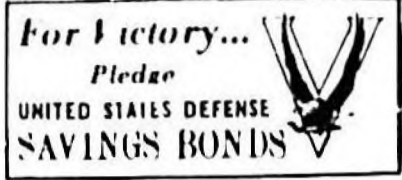

Navy Announces Destruction Of 3 U. S. Cruisers

Marines Reported Enlarging Positions On Guadalcanal In Solomon Islands

WASHINGTON—The Navy announced today that the United States Navy has succeeded in enlarging its positions on Guadalcanal in the Solomon Islands during the past 24 hours. The Japanese had many casualties. An announcement was also made of the destruction of 18 Japanese transport ships during the past 24 hours and the loss of two United States planes in action on Oct. 9-11.

Loss of the U. S. heavy cruisers Quincy, Astoria and Chester during a fierce three-day night battle in the opening phase of the Solomon Islands invasion last August was revealed last night by the Navy which said a majority of the personnel were saved but that "there were many casualties." It was the largest single blow suffered by the fleet since the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor Dec. 7 and five warships to the Navy said the sinkings had been withheld until now for reasons of military security.

The battle was the same which occurred in the sinking of the American cruiser Chester, announced previously from Australia.

"The loss of these four cruisers," the Navy said, "has been a heavy blow to the American fleet. The American cruiser Chester, announced previously from Australia. The Navy said it was surprised to discover the extent of Japanese activity by the enemy. But since the nation launched their offensive against the Solomon Islands the Navy has announced that the Japanese have probably sunk 25 destroyers.

As long ago as Aug. 10, Admiral Ernest J. King, commander-in-chief of the American fleet, had proposed the plan for the land-sea operation which is essential to the attainment of the "island-hopping" results.

As things turned out tonight that statement was based on reports by 24 losses after the Quincy, Astoria and Chester—and the Chester—went down under a night air attack from the Japanese.

General Farrell, who returned from Australia in August, said at his first press conference here that few Japanese planes were reported to have been shot down by the American fighters.

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Red Caucasus Army Throws Back Nazis

Enemy Renews Attack In Voiga Area To Break Three-Day Lull In Fighting

(By Associated Press) Russia's Caucasian armies are officially reported today to have thrown back the Germans in a critical struggle for the Grosny oil fields while in the 50-day-old lull.

A Stalingrad Nazi infantry regiment led by 50 tanks advanced slightly in a costly renewal drive toward the Voiga. Breaking the three-day lull and the Germans launched a series of attacks amid the shattering ruins of Stalingrad, but the Russians declared their defense lines held firm and frustrated a Nazi attempt to smash into the northwest factory district.

"Frasda" news sheet said the Reds still held the Stalin Tank Plant, where repaired tanks were progressing with German shells screaming overhead.

From the central Caucasus, Soviet dispatches reported the Germans have moved fresh divisions and tank columns into the battle but Soviet counterattacks scored gains in a number of areas.

Fighting broke out anew inside the city of Stalingrad yesterday after a lull of several days. The Russians announced in their mid-night communique today that Nazi troops gained slightly in one block of the ruined city.

"A regiment of enemy troops, supported by 50 tanks three times attacked our positions," the communique said of the Stalingrad fight. "All the attacks were beaten off. Only in one block our detachments were somewhat pressed back by the enemy."

"As a result of this fighting 20 tanks were disabled or set on fire and about two battalions of German infantry wiped out."

The momentary lull in the costly battle led to the belief that the Germans intended to try to break through to the Caspian in the Mordok area of the mid-Caucasus, far to the south of Stalingrad.

If that is the German intention, the enemy was not making any further progress there, the Russians said. The mid-night communique said a counter-attack by the Red Army on a number of occasions made some advance in the Mordok region which protects the Grosny oil fields 40 or 50 miles to the east.
