

America Must Aid In Working Out System To Free World From Slavery

BOSTON, June 8. The great task now confronting a liberated America, which more than three quarters of a century ago fought a four-years war to free the slaves, is to aid in working out the freedom of the whole world from slavery.

Declaring that this would be the sentiment expressed by the Nation's martyred President, Abraham Lincoln, were he here today, the Directors pointed out that "through the ages tyrants have endeavored to govern and control men by engendering fear."

The Directors' statement was the high light of the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, which annually draws thousands of visitors to the Hub City from all parts of the world.

The Directors emphasized the world-wide emergency as presenting a more universal turning to spiritual enlightenment as the pathway to future world peace.

Meeting in their Mother Church under the world-enveloping shadow of what is probably the gravest threat to political and religious freedom since the advent of Christianity, the visitors were reminded in a report by The Christian Science Board of Lectureship that the union of Britain and America was foreseen forty-four years ago by Mary Baker Eddy.

This wedding together of two great democracies, under the impact of an international crisis, said the Lecture Board, is the consummation of the fond hopes of all Christian Scientists.

The Board alluded specifically to a poem written in 1845 by the Leader of this world-wide religious movement, Mrs. Eddy, which reads in part as follows:

"Brave Britain, best America, Unite your battle-planes; Victorious, all live in The Love for God and man."

6 Types Of U. S. Planes Are Being Massed In India

WASHINGTON, June 8.—At least six types of American warplanes are either smashing at the enemy from India or being prepared for forthcoming campaigns in that area.

In addition, U.S.-built transport planes including Douglas DC-3s, diverted hastily from regular air line service in China, have evacuated many thousands of refugees from neighboring Burma.

Among the sky fighters known to be based in India are: Boeing B-17-E (Flying Fortress), four-engine bomber powered with Wright Cyclone aircraft engines.

Consolidated B-24 (Liberator) four-engine bomber with Pratt & Whitney twin Wasps engines.

Lockheed Hudson two-engine reconnaissance bomber powered with either Wright Cyclone or Pratt & Whitney aircraft engines.

Curlew P-40-Y fighter plane powered with Allison liquid-cooled engine.

Douglas C-47 troop transport powered with Pratt & Whitney twin Wasps engines.

All these late model warplanes are operated by U. S. Army Air Forces pilots.

The Flying Fortress and Curtiss P-40s are known already to have struck devastating blows at the Japanese in the Philippines and other bomber types have been reported across the Bay of Bengal especially to destroy scores of enemy aircraft and smash ground installations.

Possible the outstanding achievement of the Curtiss fighters was a bag of over 200 Jap warplanes by pilots of the famed American Volunteer Group (AVG).

Chinese Try Strategy To Ease Jap Pressure In Chekiang Sector

Nips Break Silence On Midway Battle, Claim Three U. S. Warships Are Sunk

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The Navy declined comment today on reports that two United States aircraft carriers and a transport were sunk at Midway. A spokesman indicated that the information regarding the sinking of the carriers was based on the dispatch of the fleet commander similar to this have been made several times before and have proved unfounded.

(By Associated Press) A Chinese column operating beyond Japanese lines today advanced to a point 12 miles west of Nanchang, the Japanese occupied capital of the Kiangsi province. The move is said to be an evident attempt to force the Japanese to withdraw part of their troops now thrusting toward the Chekiang province, thus relieving the pressure in that sector.

Meanwhile, the Japs broke their silence today, claiming three United States warships were sunk and 244 planes downed in the Dutch Harbor and Midway raids. They admitted the loss of an aircraft carrier, with an other damaged and 38 planes. They claimed troop landings on the Aleutian Islands in an unconfirmed report.

Chinese forces still in possession of the walled town of the Japanese in Bata, this morning in three days, taking many casualties to more than 1,000 in Bataan but thus far the Japanese have not been able to capture the town. The Chinese command announced last night that the defenses were making good attack after another.
