**Decisions By State Supreme Court**

**TALLHASSEE, Dec. 2.**—The supreme court has handed down the following decisions:

**Affirmed the circuit court for Walton county in denying an injunction to Burruss Cawthon, restraining DeFuniak Springs from paving a street opposite his store lot in a manner in which he contended would make it inconvenient and more expensive to transport goods from the curb to the paved sidewalk at his store doors.** The court took occasion, however, to say that in Florida municipalities are established not to confer arbitrary powers upon officials, but to conserve the rights and interests of the people through government's which operate by means of official acts limited and regulated by law. The opinion was by Judge Whitfield and was concurred in by all other members of the court.

**Reversed judgment of circuit court for Bay county in the case of W. H. Marshall, clerk of circuit court and ex officio clerk of the board of county commissioners, plaintiff in error, vs. State ex rel. C. M. Sartain and others.** The case hinged upon refusal of Mr. Marshall to obey instructions from the county commissioners to sell warrants at 90 cents on the dollar to pay a twelve thousand dollar balance on the new court house.

**Division B by memorandum decision without opinion affirmed judgment of the circuit court for Oklawaha county in the case of Dixie Land and Cattle Company, a Delaware corporation, plaintiffs in error, vs. The Peoples Bank of Oklawaha, a Florida corporation, defendant in error.**

**The same division affirmed by memorandum decision without opinion the circuit court for Osceola county in the case of Lillian Bay Bruns and C. W. Bruns, her husband, et al., appellants, vs. C. P. Whipple, appellee.**

**The court reversed the circuit court for Orange county in the case of S. G. Rugsdale, appellant, vs. Miami Cadillac Company, a corporation, appellee.** Opinion by Judge Whitfield.

**By memorandum decision without opinion Division B of the court affirmed the circuit court of Polk county in the case of Henry Littleton and others, as trustees, doing business as the Commercial Investment Trust, plaintiffs in error, vs. R. H. Hancock, sheriff of Highlands county, Fla., defendant in error.**

the circuit is duly held, such future term is in law not an adjourned term but a special term and should be regarded in proceedings taken during such term. The opinion, per curiam, was handed down upon application for a writ of prohibition against Judge Mallory F. Horne by Minnie H. Reynolds to prevent him from holding a term of circuit court in Taylor county because he had adjourned court from Oct. 2 to Oct. 20 while holding court in Madison county. Such term may be held by the circuit judge at the appointed time even though a regular term of the circuit court in another county of the circuit is being held by a circuit judge temporarily assigned for that purpose by the governor, the supreme court held.

By memorandum decision without opinion, Division B of the supreme court has ruled as follows: Affirmed order of circuit court for Bradford county in case, Board of Public Instruction for Bradford county, vs. Bank of Starke, appellee, affirmed circuit court for Highlands county in two cases each styled J. W. Ingle and Paulino Ingle, his wife, appellants, vs. H. D. Sebring, appellee; affirmed decree of Dade circuit court in case of Olive C. Eden, appellant, vs. Nellie Carlin, appellee, affirmed

Walton circuit court in case of William D. Shaw, appellant, vs. Geneva Mill Co., a corporation, appellee.

The court by memorandum decision without opinion also has affirmed Dade circuit court in the case of Victor Abel, appellant, vs. Mary Etta Abel, appellee.

In the divorce case of John Cornell, appellant, vs. Emily Cornell, appellee, from Palm Beach county, the supreme court holds that the decree granting a divorce on the ground of adultery and awarding alimony was not sustained by sufficient evidence of adultery as alleged, hence the decree was reversed.

In the case of Wm. H. Stubblefield, plaintiff in error, vs. T. O. Wilson, defendant in error, from Dade county, judges of the supreme court, being equally divided in opinion as to whether judgment of the circuit court should be affirmed or reversed, and there being no prospect of a change of judicial opinion, the judgment in the case has been affirmed on the authority of previous decisions of the court.

In an opinion by Judge Whitfield, the court has ordered that in so far as the lower court decree orders cancellation and reconveyance it is reversed in the case of F. C. Brosier and G. D. Brossier, T. V.

Moore, F. M. Hudson and Fidelity Bank and Trust Co., from Dade circuit court, with such decrees as may be warranted by evidence taken under principles of the law set out in the court's opinion.

The court has affirmed circuit court for Washington county in the case of O. E. Latham, plaintiff in error, vs. the State of Florida, defendant in error. The opinion is by Judge West. Latham was convicted upon an indictment charging him as accessory before the fact to the felony of burning personal property insured against loss by fire, with intent to injure the insurer.

### Instructor Gives Out Information On How To Control Spread Of Whitefly

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Dec. 2.—In spraying to control whitefly and scale insects the main object is to completely wet both sides of every leaf and all trunks and branches, according to E. L. Lord, assistant professor of horticulture, Florida College of Agriculture.

Good pressure is necessary. The amount of pressure depends upon the size of the nozzle and the agility of the man handling it. A rapid worker can handle 250 pounds of pressure; a slow man will not handle more than 180 pounds. It is suggested therefore that a power pump of at least 175 pounds pressure should be used.

The amount of spraying material varies with the size of the tree. A very young tree will not require more than half a gallon while an extra large one will take 15 gallons. The average tree of 10 to 12 feet requires about eight gallons.

Spraying should never be done during a rain or when the foliage is dripping wet, as the water on the leaves dilutes the spray solution. Spraying should cease at least ten minutes before a shower and not be resumed until dripping of leaves has stopped.

An extensive spraying outfit and heavy materials should not be

turned over to men who know nothing or care nothing about thoroughness in their work or the proper manner of handling valuable and delicate machinery. Oil sprays should be mixed with soft water or water that has been softened.

Spraying should be done for a reason and not on the hit or miss plan. The best manner in which to judge proper time for this work is to watch the trees, know the different pests to be guarded against, and by the use of a good hand lens be able to tell the approximate moment when spraying will be most effective and economical, say the specialists here. Some people spray periodically, regardless of the presence in large or small numbers. This method it is said will control the pests if done often enough, but will generally prove expensive. Others spray after the insects have become numerous and the damage is done. This is too late. There is still another class who will not spray for any reason whatsoever. It is added.

Spraying in the right manner, with the correct pressure, at the proper time, with suitable materials, will give satisfactory results it is declared.

NEW AIRSHIPS FOR ARMY WILL TRAIN AIRMEN

Six Semi-Rigid Ships Are Now Being Built For Air Service Of This Country In Increase of Two Million

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Six semi-rigid airships are now being built for the air service of the army, and the coming fiscal year will see the addition of other varieties of air vessels.

Three of the semi-rigid are of the TA make, and three of the TC. The former are of 180,000 cubic feet capacity and the latter of 300,000 cubic feet. The TA, short for training airship, is equipped with one-man control and is the next step, after the free balloon, in the training of fliers of lighter-than-air craft. Then comes the TO, short for training coastal, with its two-man controls for teamwork.

Under the present arrangement, the army develops the semi-rigid types, which have only a keel and no supporting framework, while the navy develops the rigid makes, with both keel and ribs. Both branches work with non-rigid, which are exemplified by the balloon, with neither framework supports nor keel.

The new TA's are equipped with 90 horsepower motors, are 162 feet long, and capable of making 50 miles an hour. The TO's have two 150 horse-power engines, are 196 feet long, and will travel 65 miles an hour.

New aircraft acquired by the army air service include 25 Curtiss pursuit planes, six Douglas scout planes, one amphibian for land and water service, and 200 rebuilt surplus DeHavilland planes of the DH4B type.

Palestine Looks Forward To Rail Extensions Soon

JERUSALEM, Dec. 3.—In few ways has the English administration lent itself more to the economic development of the Holy Land than by the development of its railway system. With a standard gauge line from Egypt through Gaza and Lud in the coastal plain to Haifa, at the foot of Mount Carmel, one of the chief seaports, and another from the port at Jaffa, crossing this one at Lud, to Jerusalem, the chief economic centers are well connected with Egypt and the outside world. The Haifa-Damascus road and several short branch lines make most of the country accessible by rail.

A report is now current that negotiations are progressing satisfactorily for the construction of a line from Haifa to Beirut along the coast passing through Acca, Tyre and Sidon. A line is already in operation as far as Acca, and only 100 miles more need to be built to connect by rail one of the largest seaports in the Near East, Beirut, with Cairo, Alexandria and Port Said.

There is also talk of constructing a line across the Syrian desert connecting the Haifa-Damascus Railways with Bagdad.
