Funeral services for Mr. John D. Pelets. 13, 8 pative of Sapford, were neid saturda, at the St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Tampa.

He died Thursday after being stricken during the half-time of the Robinson-Lakeland High footbell game.


Mr. Peters was president of Bentley-Gray Dry Goods Co. He heid many civic posts, was former president of the Greater Tampa Chamber of Commerce and was director of the Exchange National Bank. He had served as president and director of the National Dry Goods Assn.

He had gained an outstanding war record during WWII and at the age of 32 had been given the rank of colonel. Working as director of personnel of the Eighth Alr Force, he was under the command of Gen. J. H. (Jimmy) Doolittle. By the end of his active service he had been awarded the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star and the French Croix de Guerre. Mr. Peters remained in the Air Force reserve as a colonel and was active in the American Legion. Born in Sanford on Nov. 13, 1911, he graduated from the University of Florida with a degree in business administration and was elected to the University Hall of Fame. He was employed in 1936 by the Bentley-Gray Dry Goods Co., and worked from stock cierk up to president in 1954. Never



CHICAGO (UPI) - Atomic Energy Commissioner Robert E. Wilson hinted Thursday night that the United States has evidence the Russians may have been conducting underground tests of new kinds of nuclear weapons.

He said the United States, in the absence of a policed test ban agreement, should resume underground testing soon to perfect more powerful warheads for the Polaris and Minuteman missiles and to develop "new and really revolutionary" stomic weapons for use against enemy troops. 
