



### Mr. John D. Peters, Native Of Sanford, Dies At Tampa

Funeral services for Mr. John D. Peters, 53, a native of Sanford, were held Saturday at the St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Tampa.

He died Thursday after being stricken during the half-time of the Robinson-Lakeland High football game.

Mr. Peters was president of Bentley-Gray Dry Goods Co. He held many civic posts, was former president of the Greater Tampa Chamber of Commerce and was director of the Exchange National Bank. He had served as president and director of the National Dry Goods Assn.

He had gained an outstanding war record during WWII and at the age of 32 had been given the rank of colonel. Working as director of personnel of the Eighth Air Force, he was under the command of Gen. J. H. (Jimmy) Doolittle.

By the end of his active service he had been awarded the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star and the French Croix de Guerre. Mr. Peters remained in the Air Force reserve as a colonel and was active in the American Legion.

Born in Sanford on Nov. 13, 1911, he graduated from the University of Florida with a degree in business administration and was elected to the University Hall of Fame. He was employed in 1938 by the Bentley-Gray Dry Goods Co., and worked from stock clerk up to president in 1954.

Besides his work with the Greater Tampa Chamber of Commerce, as director and later president, he served as president of the Tampa Rotary Club, director of the Hillsborough Taxpayers Assn. and director of personnel of Hillsborough County Civilian Defense. The survivors include his wife, Mrs. Eleanor May Peters; a daughter, Anne Peters; a son, John Charles Peters, all of Tampa; his mother, Mrs. T. L. O'Connor, Lake Mary; and a sister, Mrs. Margaret Wheelchel, Miami. Burial was in Myrtle Hills Cemetery, Tampa, on Saturday.

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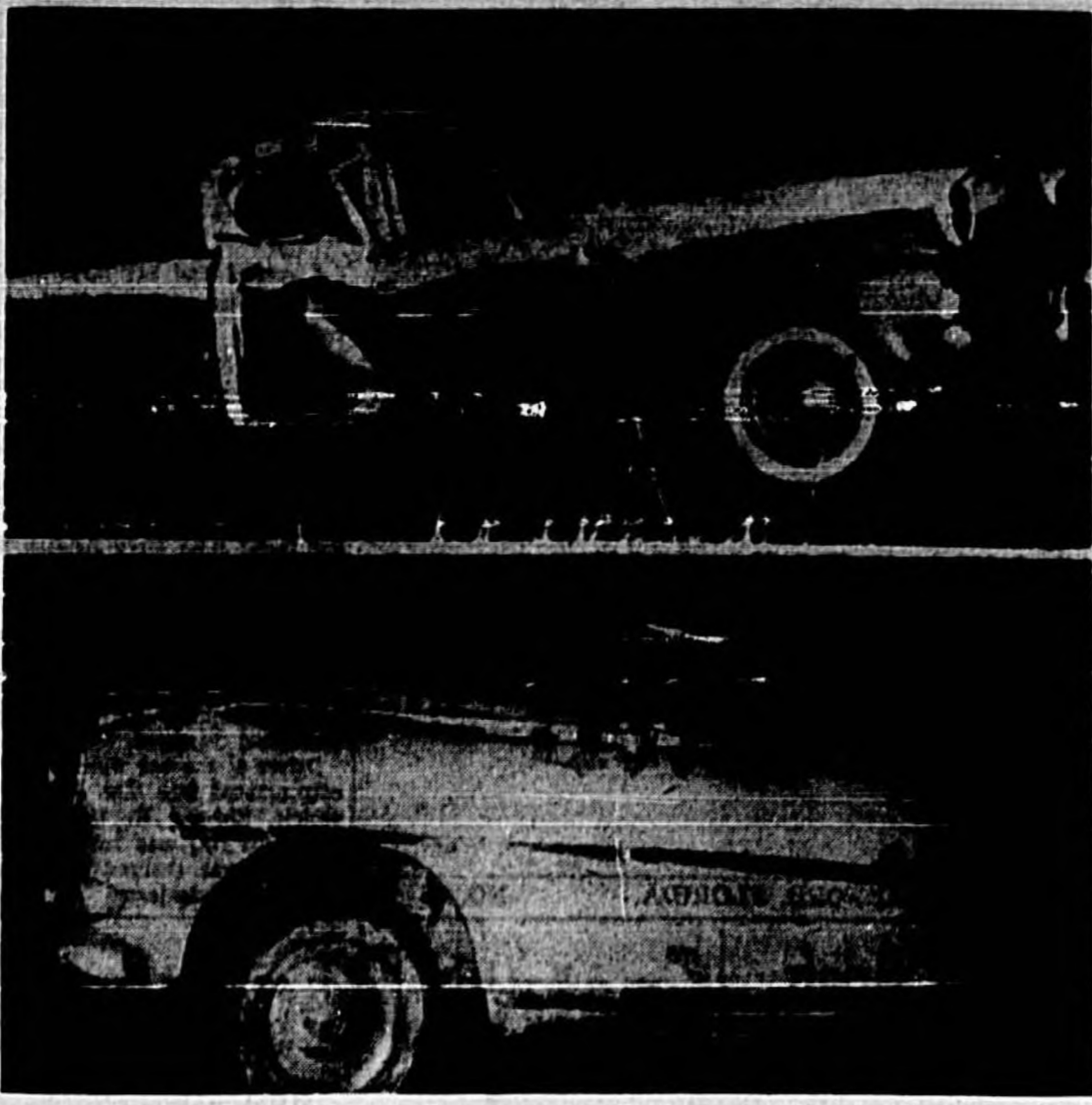


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Two Cars Damaged, Drivers Hospitalized

### United Nations Has 15th Anniversary

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — The United Nations celebrated its 15th birthday today embroiled in bitter East-West scraps over disarmament and the very makeup of the world organization.

British Minister of State David Ormsby-Gore was scheduled to take the floor in the General Assembly's Main Political Committee to start a new round in the disarmament debate that shows no signs of solution.

The Russians have threatened to lead a Communist walkout if the committee does not act favorably and quickly on Soviet disarmament proposals.

Poland was reported reading a demand that the General Assembly meet in special session next spring if the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union do not work out a nuclear test ban agreement in Geneva by then.

Ormsby-Gore is a specialist in this subject. He has spent much of the past two years as the British negotiator in Geneva.

The world organization takes a breather this afternoon to hear the Philadelphia Orchestra play Beethoven's Ninth "Choral" Symphony in the great General Assembly hall in honor of U. N. Day.

President Eisenhower and the governors of 49 states proclaimed today as "United Nations Day."

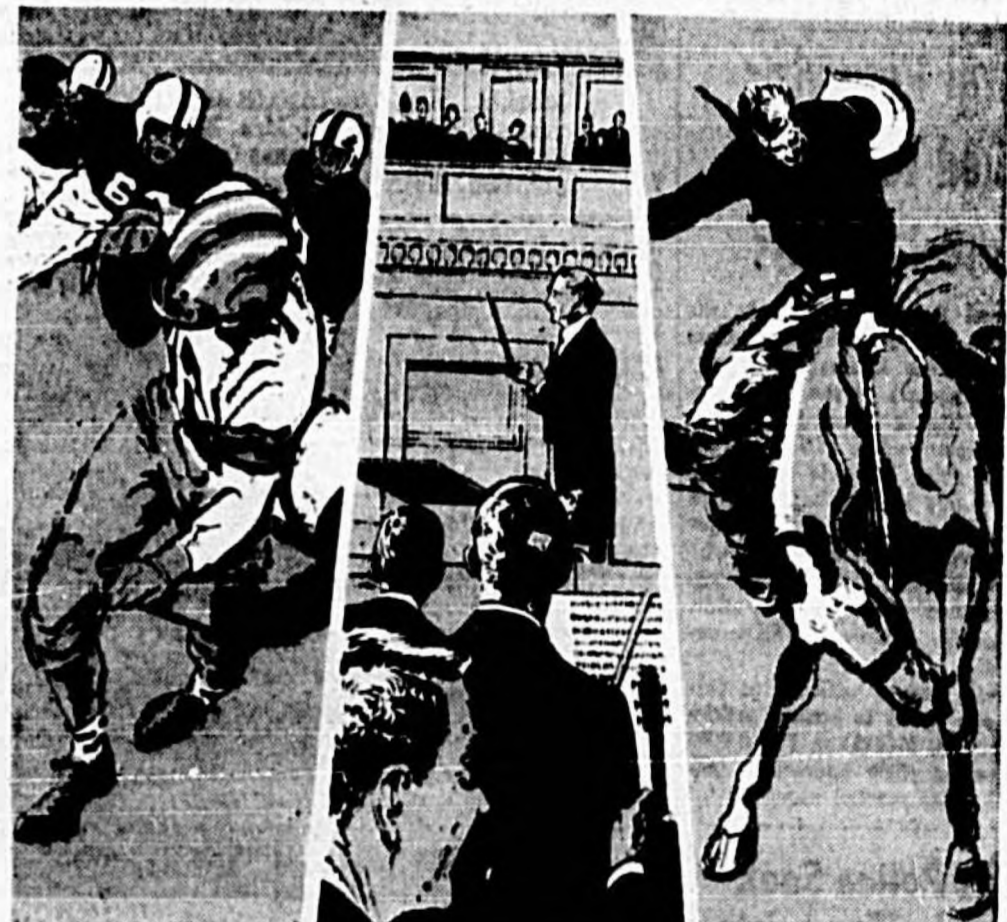

**JACKSONVILLE (UPI)** — A report by the State Chamber of Commerce shows that Florida's Fourth Congressional District, Dade and Monroe counties, is the nation's second most populous district with a population of 866,251 and a gain of 44 per cent in the past decade.

**LAKELAND (UPI)** — More than half of Florida's 160 fresh fruit packing houses are now in operation, according to Florida Citrus Mutual.

Executive Vice President Robert L. Rutledge said Saturday packers are shipping all varieties of grapefruit and limited quantities of oranges, which he said are unusually late in maturing this season.

Rutledge said shippers this week should send out about 800 cars of grapefruit and 100 cars of oranges. Volume shipments are about two weeks away, he said.

A 50-pound male rhinoceros came into the world at the Highland Park Zoo Sunday to become the first rhino born in the United States in 20 years, according to Acting Zoo Superintendent Howard Hais.

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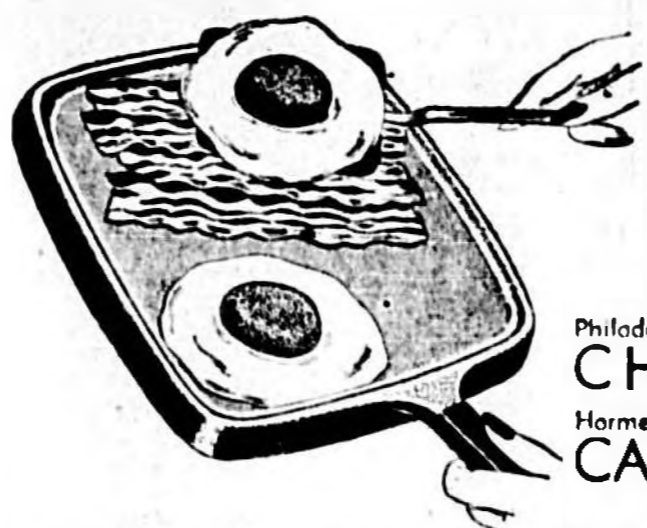
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# Ethel Root Circle Plans Projects At Monthly Meeting

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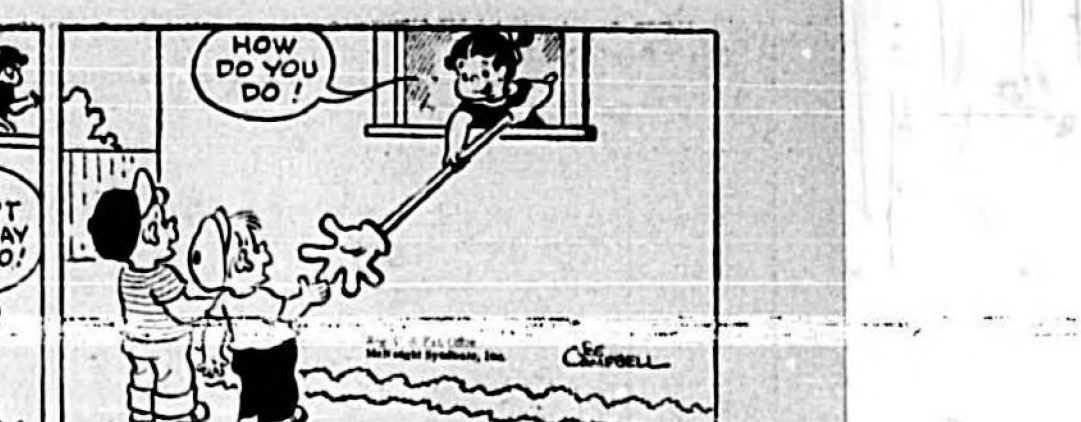

### New Program Series Labeled 'Pearl In Daytime Oyster'

NEW YORK (UPI) — The age-old daytime soap opera has a new wrinkle. And this one is well come.

After watching four of the first five offerings in ABC-TV's new afternoon series, "Road to Reality," I've concluded that the program represents a major improvement over what afternoon soaps have been good to.

The format makes use of material taken from tape recordings of actual group therapy sessions, one of the new approaches to psychoanalysis. Actors portray the patients who, practicing in a hospital setting, pop into the therapist's office en masse.

By discussing their fears and their troubles, guided by a trained psychiatrist, they gain insight into their make-up. John Hall portrays Dr. Paul Lewis, a doctor who specializes in this abbreviated, no-charge "Open End" session. The rest of the people on camera are mostly first names, which further distinguishes the program from the usual soap. But the major difference is that the "Road to Reality" deals with the stuff of real life.

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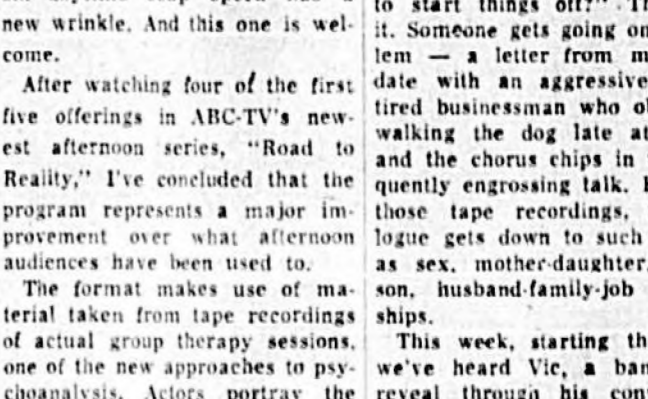

Do you know why certain salt-water animals such as the manatee, blue crab and stingray are able to live some 170 miles up the St. Johns from its outlet to the ocean? The abnormally high con-

centration of salt in the St. Johns River has proven to be the answer. This exists for two reasons:

During dry season the St. Johns River has little current. This allows salt water intrusion into normally fresh water areas. Secondly, certain springs such as Salt Springs, which flows in the St. Johns, are nearly as salty as the ocean. Also, in the St. Johns River north of Lake Harney, there are several salt springs which have a higher salt content than the ocean.

So, don't go and get confused if you see stingrays in the ocean and then catch one on your trotline.

# City Urges Quick Action On Water Control Plan

Sanford's City commissioners have voted a resolution to the Central and South Florida Flood Control District urging that the district "diligently pursue" with U. S. engineers and others a review of a proposed Upper St. Johns Basin water conservation plan.

The commission resolution also asks the district to pursue the review with Florida's congressional delegation and state legislators "in order that such a plan might be implemented in time for 1963 budget requests to the state and federal governments." The resolution reads:

Whereas, for many years there have existed from time to time flood problems in the upper St. Johns River Basin more particularly affecting the counties of Seminole, Orange, Broward, Osceola and Indian River, and

Whereas, the aforesaid counties are presently within an area of the most rapid growth in the State of Florida and such growth and the continuation thereof has the effect of materially altering and increasing the drainage and flood problems heretofore existing and which will continue to exist in the future, acting as a material obstacle in the continued growth of such area, and

Whereas, for many years the aforesaid area has made tax contributions into the Central and South Florida Flood Control District with virtually no expenditures of funds materially easing the drainage and flood problems in the upper St. Johns River Basin, and

Whereas, without prompt and immediate action directed to the approval of a plan for the storage of water in the upper St. Johns River Basin with attendant outlets therefrom to the East Coast of Florida it is felt that the future of Central Florida will suffer irreparable damage.

Now therefore, be it resolved, by the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida, that the Central and South Florida Flood Control District be, and it is hereby requested to diligently pursue with the Corp of Engineers the aforesaid plan for the upper St. Johns River Basin to the end that such plan will be approved, and that the Florida Congressional Delegation be urged to secure a priority rating therefor and that the Legislature of the State of Florida be requested to adopt such legislation as might be necessary to procure funds for required land acquisition, all to the end that the necessary funds may be approved in the 1963 budget in order that the Central Florida area may receive the relief to which it is entitled so that its economic growth may not be stifled.

Be it further resolved, that this Resolution be spread upon the minutes of the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida and copies thereof delivered to Florida congressional delegation, the Corp of Engineers and other appropriate parties.

## 120 Years Service

The City Commission Monday night decided that a tribute is in order for three city officials with a total of 120 years on the job.

City Manager W. E. Knowles pointed out that Miss Ellen Hoy, tax collector, Fire Chief Mack Cleveland Sr. and Police Chief Roy Williams have completed 40 years service each.

The commissioners instructed Knowles to arrange a suitable event honoring the three veterans and prepare commendations commensurate with their long service.

## Oriente Gardens Water Still Rising

A delegation of residents of Oriente Gardens in south Seminole County told the County Commission this morning that water still is rising on their property and that another family moved out today.

They said water has risen another inch and a half in the past two days and asked again if the county can do anything to keep more water from entering the area.

They said the pump installed in that section cannot take off the water fast enough. The family who moved out today had a septic tank which couldn't be used because high waters kept overflowing it.

Residents "are standing vigil" over dikes that help keep some waters out, they said. They fear, however, that continued rise of waters will put on more pressure than the dikes can stand.

There is little the county can do in the situation. Appeals from other sections, including one today from a group of Slovak Village residents, can be met with only the emergency pumping activity which the county initiated with cooperation of the Civil Defense organization.

## Control Of Children At Games Asked

The city and school officials agreed Monday night to cooperate in an effort to restrain the romping of young children through the stands at high school football games.

Principal Andrew Bracken told the City Commission that he felt that the aid of parents would have to be enlisted in halting the "wild" antics of children during the games. There are many complaints from spectators that this is a major distraction from the games, he said. Parents will be asked to keep children in their seats.

The city commissioners requested that all school classes be advised that children allowed to roam the stands and grounds during games will be escorted out of the stadium.

The commission also asked the students to refrain from throwing confetti at the games because it creates an almost impossible cleaning job for the groundkeepers.

The city made its requests in granting the school use of the stadium without paying the regular fee for its scheduled football contests.

### Peace Talks Start

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast (UPI)—Eleven newly independent African nations meet here today to seek a compromise for ending the Algerian war. All are former French territories which now are members of the French Community of Nations.

### Big Vote Seen

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Secretary of State R. A. Gray predicted Monday that 1.25 to 1.3 million of Florida's 2,019,707 registered voters would cast ballots Nov. 8.

Gray, in issuing the official voting registration figures, said the interest in this year's presidential race would send a higher percentage of registrants to the polls than in 1954 and 1956, when 63 per cent voted.

### Charge Denied

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell has denied charges that a Negro was forced to resign as assistant secretary of labor to make room for the son of Henry Cabot Lodge, Republican vice presidential candidate. The charges connected with Lodge's proposal for a Negro in the next Republican cabinet, were made by Rep. Charles C. Diggs, (D-Mich.) He said the late J. Ernest Wilkins was forced to resign to make room for George C. Lodge.

### Health Officials Coffee Club Guests

The October meeting of the Coffee Club sponsored by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce will be held at 10 a. m. Thursday in the Chamber of Commerce building.

The staff of the Seminole County Health Department, headed by Director Dr. Clyde I. Brothers, will be special guests. Several newcomers to the area will also be welcomed.

# Campaign Blunter, Angrier

The presidential campaign, entering the final two weeks, was marked today by blunter words and angrier charges as the candidates stumped long hours for the support of crucial states.

Democratic nominee John F. Kennedy scheduled 20 speeches during his second grueling day in Illinois. State Democratic leaders were enthusiastic about his showing Monday. Sen. Paul H. Douglas, (D-Ill.), predicted Kennedy would capture the states 27 electoral votes.

GOP candidate Richard M. Nixon, making a whistle-stop tour in a 16-car train, arranged appearances in Ohio, which has an important bloc of 25 electoral votes, and in West Virginia. He makes his first nationwide political TV speech of the campaign tonight from Cincinnati.

In a speech prepared for Marietta, Ohio, the vice president kept up his charge that Kennedy is playing loose with the truth concerning U. S. prestige abroad. The Democratic nominee, Nixon said, "has been trying to win this election by recklessly downgrading the United States. He has done this with misleading statements, with misrepresentations, with half truths."

Kennedy attacked the GOP candidate's aid-to-education stand in an address prepared for Carpentersville, Ill. He said Nixon had raised a "false issue" by contending that federal aid for teachers' salaries could lead to government control of education.

Kennedy termed this a "political bogeyman" designed to defeat federal aid to education and "mislead the people."

The White House rivals traded some of the sharpest accusations of the campaign in their speeches Monday.

"Nixon told a Pittsburgh audience that Kennedy's spending plans were a 'major contributing factor' to the current gold specu-

lation in London. He suggested Kennedy's election could touch off a run on America's shrinking gold stocks.

Kennedy shrugged this off. He said Nixon was showing "signs of tension" by making the charge. A Rock Island, Ill., audience laughed when the Massachusetts senator declared, "He blames me for the increase in gold on the London market. If Mr. Nixon is listening, I didn't do it."

The Democratic candidate branded Nixon the leader of a Republican "wrecking crew" which he said had consistently opposed Social Security and would do little to help the aged meet medical expenses.

Nixon said during his Pennsylvania whistle-stop tour that Kennedy's Cuba, Malaya-Quebec and U2 policies represented "disastrous" errors of judgment that could plunge the world into war. He said Kennedy was "the kind of man Khrushchev could make mince-meat of."

Kennedy said any resemblance between the vice president's campaign promises and previous record "is purely coincidental." He described Nixon as a "no" man who would get a "no" from American voters on election day.

The GOP candidate accused Kennedy in a telegram of backing away from a statement about helping anti-Castro Cubans. "This is another case of your speaking first and thinking afterwards, a habit which is a very dangerous one for a man who is asking the American people to elect him commander-in-chief of all the armed forces of this nation," Nixon wired.

## City Water Deposit Fee Is Doubled

The City of Sanford last night increased its water connection deposit from \$7.50 to \$15 and instructed the city manager to turn delinquent accounts over to collectors.

The city manager showed commissioners a list of water accounts that have been unpaid much longer than the normal grace period and said that some people let the \$7.50 deposit go against bills of three months and simply move and open a new meter at a new location.

The doubled deposit will protect the city better against non-payment of the minimum monthly rate of \$3.15 in case of deaths, and all new applicants will be checked against the delinquent list.

## Snowfall Spreads Across Northeast, Cold Wave Hits

The season's first snow hit the nation's Northeast Monday as torrential rains deluged parts of Texas.

Wide-spread snow showers whipped across the eastern Great Lakes and New England during the night. The snow reached a depth of seven inches at the little town of Tropic, Pa., and five inches on Whiteface Mountain in the Adirondacks.

A cold wave followed hard on the heels of the wind-driven snows, dropping temperatures across the Midwest. Marquette, Mich., had a nighttime low of 17.

Snow removal crews went on 24-hour shifts along a 100-mile stretch of the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

New York City's first snow was recorded at the top of the world's largest building, the Empire State, but 44 degree temperatures melted the snow by the time it reached the street.

Highway crews in Michigan's Huron County battled blizzard-like snows. Five-foot waves lashed the Lake Huron shoreline. Four hunters were rescued from the storm, but two were still missing today.

Fall thunderstorms pounded New England and rained half-storms on Boston. Some Boston streets were flooded and lightning caused some damage to electrical service.

But the rain changed to snow over many sections of the six-state area during the night.

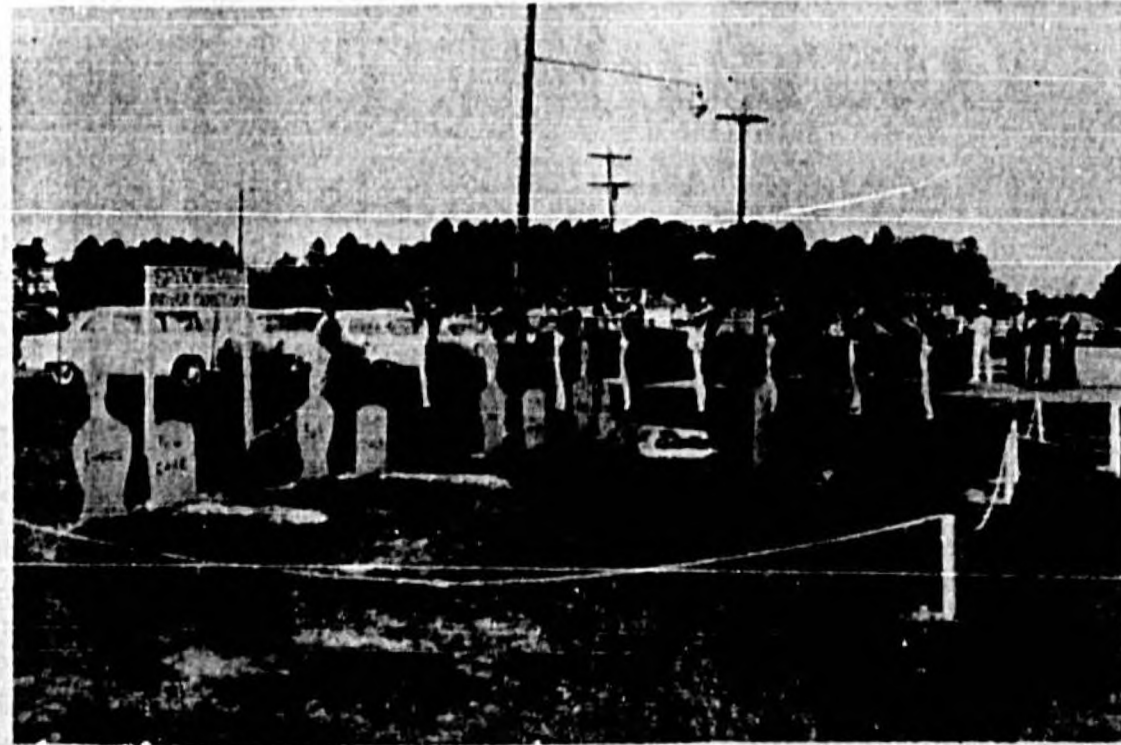
## Four Youths Held In Police Cases
